FELLOWSHIP PROGRAMME

Time-Table and Curriculum of Studies with  
the Trade Intelligence Division

1. The part of the programme during which studies will be guided by the Officers of the Trade Intelligence Division will cover four weeks, from Monday, 15 September, to Friday, 10 October (with an interruption of three days, 24-26 September, when Fellows will attend the meeting of the Inter-sessional Committee).
2. During this period, an introductory talk on the subjects listed below will as a rule be given each morning, starting at 9.30, the remainder of the day being devoted to reading (see items listed) and to group and individual discussions which will be arranged for as required. The exact time schedule for such discussions has to remain flexible, in order to allow Officers to deal with their current official duties.
3. The programme includes, as an essential part, work by each Fellow on an individual assignment, so chosen as to be of interest from a commercial policy angle, and to offer an opportunity to select and use original sources of information. On 16 September, part of the morning session will be devoted to choosing these individual projects. During the days then following, Fellows will be expected to think over their subjects and to plan their work on them. The papers submitted will be discussed and evaluated on 9 and 10 October.
4. While working with the Trade Intelligence Division, Fellows are regarded for administrative purposes as temporary members of the Division's staff.
