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1	PROCEEDINGS
2	THE REPORTER: Okay. You may proceed.
3	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Good morning. Under
4	the Open Meetings Act, I call the March 23, 2023,
5	Regular Open Meeting to order. Commissioners
6	Carrigan, McCabe, and Reddick are with me in Chicago.
7	We have quorum.
8	Before we get to the the agenda,
9	many of you may know Commissioner Reddick as he has
10	been in the public utility space for some time. But
11	in case you haven't had the privilege of working with
12	him, I would like to introduce him and read a little
13	bit about his bio.
14	Commissioner Reddick has is an
15	experienced corporate and regulatory attorney with a
16	career spanning over 40 years specializing in utility
17	regulation and litigation. Following legal positions
18	with telecommunications utilities, Reddick worked with
19	the City of Chicago as a special deputy corporation
20	counsel.
21	He led a team of staff attorneys on
22	utility regulation and provided strategic guidance on

1	energy and regulatory matters. As a regulatory and
2	energy consultant, he helped evaluate merger
3	proposals, divestiture plans, and renewable energy
4	programs outside of Illinois.
5	Immediately prior to joining the ICC,
6	he ran his own solo law practice; representing the
7	City of Chicago as a special assistant corporation
8	counsel and providing advice and guidance to the
9	City's Law and Environment departments.
10	He was also an advocate for large and
11	small consumers in diverse ICC proceedings, including
12	rate cases, utility system modernization proceedings,
13	rulemakings, and policy dockets. He has successfully
14	litigated client positions before the Commission and
15	in appellate courts.
16	Commissioner Reddick has also taught
17	telecommunications regulation at DePaul University and
18	administrative law at the University of Detroit Law
19	School. He earned his Bachelor of Arts from the
20	University of Pennsylvania majoring in mathematics and
21	Juris Doctorate from the University of Michigan.

2	him. I want to personally thank him for diving in
3	headfirst into the deep end of the dockets to
4	prepare excuse me to prepare for today's
5	meeting. His work ethic and committed commitment

8	with the agenda starting with the Transportation
9	Agenda.

L4	Are there any objections to approving
L5	the minutes as edited?
L6	Hearing none, the minutes are approved.
L7	Under our Railroad Items, Items RR-1
L8	through RR-3 concern various public safety improvement
L9	projects at the railway crossing across Illinois. The
20	orders approve the projects, authorize the
21	construction, and approve project costs apportionment.
22	Are there any objections to considering

1	these items together and approving the orders?
2	Hearing none, the orders are approved.
3	Under the Motor Carrier Items, MC-1 and
4	MC-2 concern applications for a certificate of public
5	convenience to transport household goods in intrastate
6	commerce. The orders grant the certificates, finding
7	that the applicants meet the certification
8	requirements.
9	Are there any objections to considering
10	these items together and approving the orders?
11	Hearing none, the orders are approved.
12	Item MC-3 concerns an application for
13	renewal of a commercial relocation license. The order
14	grants the renewal, finding that the applicant meets
15	the requirements.
16	Are there any objections to approving
17	the order?
18	Hearing none, the order is approved.
19	Item MC-4 concerns a stipulated
20	agreement regarding alleged violations of the Illinois
21	Commercial Transportation Law. The order accepts the
22	stipulated agreement.

1	Are there any objections to approving
2	the order?
3	Hearing none, the order is approved.
4	Under the Administrative Matters, Item
5	AM-1 concerns the Commission's 2022 Annual Report on
6	Accidents and Incidents Involving Hazardous Materials
7	on Railroads in Illinois. The report will be
8	submitted to the Governor and the General Assembly
9	upon Commission approval.
10	The report includes the accident
11	locations, the substances involved and their amounts,
12	as well; and the reason for each accident that
13	occurred in Illinois during the calendar year of 2022.
14	Are there any objections to approving
15	the report?
16	Hearing none, the report is approved.
17	Item AM-2 concerns the 2024 through
18	2028 Crossing Safety Improvement Program Five-Year
19	Plan that will be submitted to the Governor and
20	General Assembly upon the Commission approval.
21	The report represents the rail safety
22	section's recommended list of highway-rail safety

1	capital improvement projects for the Commission's 2024
2	through 2028 plan.
3	Among other spending, the report
4	recommends that \$476,000,000 from the Grade Crossing
5	Protection Fund and Rebuild Illinois be approved to
6	help local communities and railroads pay for safety
7	improvements at over 400 crossing locations.
8	Are there any objections to approving
9	the plan?
10	Hearing none, the plan is approved.
11	This concludes our Transportation
12	Agenda.
