1	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: I did check all the
2	commissioners. I know we're looking at a video with
3	Commissioner Kimbrel's chair empty, but he is dialed
4	in. So we'll do roll call and phone text as well.
5	Commissioner Bocanegra.
б	COMMISSIONER BOCANEGRA: Good morning, Carrie.
7	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Commissioner Carrigan.
8	COMMISSIONER CARRIGAN: Good morning, Chairman.
9	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Thank you. Commissioner
10	Kimbrel.
11	COMMISSIONER KIMBREL: Good morning, Madam Chair.
12	I apologize for the video feed. I need to work that
13	out.
14	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: No worries. Commissioner Oliva.
15	COMMISSIONER OLIVA: Yes, I'm here. Good
16	morning.
17	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Judge Teague-Kingsley, can you
18	hear us?
19	JUDGE TEAGUE-KINGSLEY: Yes, I can hear you,
20	Madam Chairman.
21	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Great. Under the Open Meetings
22	Act and in accordance with the governor's executive

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1	orders, I call the March 4, 2021 regular open meeting
2	to order. Before we proceed, for clarity of the
3	record, I would ask everyone to state their name
4	before speaking and to speak slowly and clearly so
5	that the court reporter can capture everything that
6	is said. I have already checked, we have all five
7	commissioners on with us. We have no requests to
8	speak.
9	We are going to go on to our public utilities
10	agenda. There are edits to the February 4, 2021
11	regular open meeting minutes. Are there any
12	objections to approving the minutes as edited?
13	(No response.)
14	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Hearing none, the minutes are
15	approved.
16	Under our electric items, Item E-1 concerns
17	Commission staff's assessment of MidAmerican Energy
18	Company's reliability report and performance for
19	calendar year 2019. Staff reviewed MidAmerican's
20	2019 reliability report for compliance with the
21	requirements of Part 411 of the Commission rules and
22	assessed the company's report and reliability

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1	performance against the Section 411.140 criteria.
2	Staff also inspected a number of circuits in the
3	MidAmerican distribution system. The assessment
4	recommends actions that MidAmerican could undertake
5	to improve system reliability. The order adopts
6	staff's assessment. Are there any objections to
7	approving the order?
8	(No response.)
9	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Hearing none, the order is
10	approved.
11	Item E-2 concerns Commission's investigation
12	to determine whether ComEd's rider POGNM and rider
13	POGCS correctly implements Section 16-107.5 of the
14	Public Utilities Act. The Commission staff
15	recommends initiating this investigation in light of
16	the Commission's findings and conclusions made in
17	its recent order in docket number 20-0738. ComEd
18	notified the Commission that on December 23rd of 2020
19	the company's, quote, "total generating capacity for
20	net metering customers reached three percent", end
21	quote. The order initiates the investigation and
22	directs staff to verify that ComEd is calculating the

1	three percent threshold figure correctly. Are there
2	any objections to approving the order?
3	(No response.)
4	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Hearing none, the order is
5	approved.
6	Item E-3 concerns Commission staff's proposed
7	2021 price index for applications to provide
8	alternative retail electric service for the purposes
9	of setting the amount for guarantees, payment bonds
10	or letters of credit. The order adopts staff's
11	recommended index of \$2.22 per megawatt hour, which
12	is based on the PJM day ahead locational marginal
13	prices for the northern Illinois hub. Are there any
14	objections to approving the order?
15	(No response.)
16	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Hearing none, the order is
17	approved.
18	Item E-4 concerns a petition for
19	interlocutory review of an ALJ order, excuse me, ALJ
20	ruling to strike Count 2 of a complaint against ComEd
21	which is an alleged failure to honor a contractual
22	agreement. Complainant asserts that the ALJ ruling

¹ contains incorrect statements and analysis and ² engages in speculation without the benefit of fact ³ finding. ComEd maintains that the ALJ ruling ⁴ comports with Commission rules and there is no legal ⁵ basis for complainant's petition for interlocutory ⁶ review. ⁷ The ALJ ruling grants ComEd's motion to

8 strike and finds that the amended Count 2 violates 9 Section 200.170(c) of Commission rules and improperly 10 raises new allegations. The ALJ ruling further notes 11 that complainant's demands are not part of the final 12 written agreement and it is not clear if there was an 13 oral contract that the parties relied upon. The 14 Commission agrees with the ALJ ruling. Are there any 15 objections to denying the petition for interlocutory 16 review?

(No response.)

18 CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Hearing none, the petition is 19 denied.

Item E-5 concerns docket 20-0201, which is a
complaint against RPA Energy for switching
complainant's account from ComEd to RPA without

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1	authorization. Respondent filed a motion to dismiss.
2	The order finds that the motion to dismiss should be
3	granted because the complainant does not intend to
4	proceed with the matter and the parties appear to
5	have settled the matter. Are there any objections to
б	approving the order?
7	(No response.)
8	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Hearing none, the order is
9	approved.
10	Item E-6 concerns a complaint against ComEd
11	for not providing information on LIHEAP and
12	residential special hardship programs on time to
13	allegedly stop the complainants from receiving the
14	assistance. ComEd filed a motion to dismiss,
15	asserting that ComEd did not violate any law,
16	Commission rule or tariff. The order dismisses the
17	complaint with prejudice, noting that the Commission
18	does not have jurisdiction over the administration of
19	LIHEAP funds. The order finds that the complainants
20	failed to state any statutory provision or Commission
21	rule that ComEd has violated. Are there any
22	objections to approving the order?

1	(No response.)
2	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Hearing none, the order is
3	approved.
4	Item E-7 concerns docket 20-0441, which is a
5	complaint against ComEd regarding tampering with a
б	meter. The complainant was billed from January 2018
7	to October 2019 for back billing and tampering fees.
8	The order denies the complaint, finding that ComEd
9	proved by the preponderance of evidence that the
10	tampering did take place, the customer benefited from
11	the tampering and that the utility's billing was
12	reasonable. Are there any objections to approving
13	the order?
14	(No response.)
15	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Hearing none, the order is
16	approved.
17	Item E-8 concerns docket 20-0823, which is a
18	complaint against Nexamp regarding improperly
19	installed distributed generation projects. The
20	complainants filed a motion to voluntarily dismiss
21	the complaint without prejudice. Are there any
22	objections to granting the motion to dismiss?

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1	(No response.)
2	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Hearing none, the motion to
3	dismiss is granted.
4	Item E-9 concerns docket 20-0310, which is a
5	moratorium on in-person marketing of services by
6	alternative retail electric suppliers during the
7	public health emergency. We have several matters for
8	the Commission to decide today. First, Inspire
9	Energy Holding's January 21, 2021 second motion for
10	modification to allow limited in-person solicitation.
11	Second, Vistra's January 19, 2021 second verified
12	motion to allow limited in-person solicitation. And
13	third, Vistra's February 2, 2021 petition for
14	interlocutory review of the January 15, 2021 ALJ
15	ruling.
16	First, I will call a vote on the Inspire
17	Energy's motion to allow limited in-person
18	solicitation. Inspire Energy requests that the
19	Commission allow them to engage in in-store marketing
20	and enrollments in retail establishments that have
21	been authorized to reopen by the governor and the
22	director of the Illinois Department of Public Health

1	or IDPH. Inspire also requests to resume in-person
2	solicitation of non-residential customers resulting
3	from prior appointments.
4	There are substantive edits to the second
5	interim order that is before us today. The edits
6	grant both Inspire Energy's requests, finding that
7	it's reasonable and in the public interest to allow
8	Inspire Energy to resume in-store marketing and
9	appointment-based, non-commercial solicitations
10	except for soliciting small commercial customers.
11	The second interim order modifies
12	Commission's emergency order solely as requested for
13	the limited purpose described in the second interim
14	order. I move the edits. Is there a second?
15	COMMISSIONER KIMBREL: Commissioner Kimbrel
16	seconds.
17	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Thank you. I am going to call
18	a roll for this vote. So if you are in favor of
19	approving edits to the second interim order, please
20	say aye. And if you are opposed, please say nay.
21	Commissioner Bocanegra.
22	COMMISSIONER BOCANEGRA: I vote nay. Because I

1	do not agree with the outcome on this matter imposing
2	limitations, I must vote nay as I would instead grant
3	Inspire Energy's motion in full without any carve out
4	excepting small commercial customers of any kind as
5	defined in the Public Utilities Act. Thank you.
6	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Thank you. Commissioner
7	Carrigan.
8	COMMISSIONER CARRIGAN: Aye.
9	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Commissioner Kimbrel.
10	COMMISSIONER KIMBREL: Aye.
11	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Commissioner Oliva.
12	COMMISSIONER OLIVA: This is Commissioner Oliva,
12 13	COMMISSIONER OLIVA: This is Commissioner Oliva, for the record. And I would grant Inspire's request
13	for the record. And I would grant Inspire's request
13 14	for the record. And I would grant Inspire's request to engage in limited in-person solicitation for
13 14 15	for the record. And I would grant Inspire's request to engage in limited in-person solicitation for in-store marketing and enrollment in retail

1	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Okay. I vote aye. So the three
2	ayes have it and the edits are approved. So now I'm
3	going to call a vote on approving the order as
4	edited. If you are in favor of approving the second
5	interim order as edited, please say aye. And if you
6	are opposed, please say nay.
7	Commissioner Bocanegra.
8	COMMISSIONER BOCANEGRA: Nay.
9	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Commissioner Carrigan.
10	COMMISSIONER CARRIGAN: Aye.
11	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Commissioner Kimbrel.
12	COMMISSIONER KIMBREL: Aye.
13	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Commissioner Oliva.
14	COMMISSIONER OLIVA: Nay.
15	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: I vote aye. So the three ayes
16	have it and the second interim order is approved.
17	So next I am going to call a vote on
18	Vistra's Vistra Retailers' January 19, 2021 second
19	verified motion to allow limited in-person
20	solicitations. The fourth interim order that is
21	before us grants the motion, finding it in the public
22	interest to allow Vistra Retailers to resume in-store

1	marketing subject to conditions stated in the fourth
2	interim order that require compliance with health and
3	safety requirements and oversight of the employees
4	and agents. Are there any objections to approving
5	the fourth interim order?
6	(No response.)
7	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Hearing none, the order is
8	approved.
9	Next I will call the vote on Vistra's
10	petition for interlocutory review. Vistra Retailers
11	petitioned the Commission for interlocutory review of
12	the administrative law judge ruling dated January 15,
13	2021 which denied Vistra Retailers' motion to engage
14	in limited in-person solicitations. The relief that
15	Vistra Retailers are seeking is to conduct in-person
16	solicitation at non-residential business customers'
17	premises for the purpose of soliciting that business
18	itself where in-person business is allowed by Restore
19	Illinois guidelines issued by the Illinois Department
20	of Commerce and Economic Opportunity or DCEO. Vistra
21	Retailers specifically committed to following DCEO
22	guidelines without further action by the Commission.

1	The petitioners also note that to the extent
2	that the Commission is concerned because Vistra
3	Retailers did not explicitly carve out solicitation
4	of small commercial retail customers or small
5	commercial customers, Vistra Retailers are willing to
б	add that as a condition of approval.
7	Having considered the petition, the
8	Commission finds it is reasonable it is just and
9	reasonable and in the public interest to allow Vistra
10	Retailers to resume appointment-based solicitation of
11	non-residential customers except for small commercial
12	retail customers or small commercial customers as
13	defined by the Public Utilities Act and subject to
14	the same condition as indicated in the fourth interim
15	order. Vistra Retailers' petition for interlocutory
16	review is thus granted as noted and the ALJ's January
17	15, 2021 ruling is reversed.
18	I'm going to call a roll on this vote as
19	well. If you are in favor of granting Vistra's
20	petition for interlocutory review as noted, please
21	say aye. And if you are opposed and want to deny it,
22	please say nay.

1	Commissioner Bocanegra.
2	COMMISSIONER BOCANEGRA: Yes, I will be voting
3	nay for similar reasons. Because I don't agree with
4	the outcome on this matter imposing limitations, I
5	must vote nay as I would instead grant the motion in
6	full without any carve outs excepting any kind of
7	small commercial customers as defined in the Public
8	Utilities Act since the Act itself clearly sets out
9	that these classes are not considered residential.
10	Thank you.
11	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Commissioner Kimbrel. Or excuse
12	me, Commissioner Carrigan. I'm sorry.
13	COMMISSIONER CARRIGAN: Aye.
14	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Commissioner Kimbrel.
15	COMMISSIONER KIMBREL: Aye.
16	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Commissioner Oliva.
17	COMMISSIONER OLIVA: I will also be voting nay
18	because of the outcome. I think it is just and
19	reasonable and in the public interest to allow Vistra
20	Retailers to resume appointment-based solicitation of
21	non-residential customers, but I don't think there
22	needs to be an exception for small commercial retail

1	customers or small commercial customers as defined in
2	the Public Utilities Act. So for these reasons, I
3	will be voting nay.
4	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: I vote aye. So the three ayes
5	have it and the interlocutory review is granted as
б	noted.
7	Fourth and finally, in light of the current
8	state of the public health and the Commission's
9	recent practice of allowing limited in-person
10	solicitations, the Commission directs staff to file,
11	within five business days from today, a motion to
12	modify the emergency order in this docket to allow
13	for in-store solicitations and appointment-based
14	non-residential customer solicitations by all
15	alternative retail suppliers in the same manner as
16	the Commission previously granted to several
17	alternative retail suppliers in this docket.
18	So I will now call a roll on this vote. If
19	you are in favor of directing staff to file a motion
20	as noted, please say aye. And if you are opposed and
21	want to deny it, please say nay.
22	Commissioner Bocanegra.

1	COMMISSIONER BOCANEGRA: Yes, I will be voting
2	aye but I do have a brief comment. Given my prior
3	vote today on both Vistra and Inspire, I would like
4	and encourage the parties to brief the issue of
5	whether it is in fact necessary to impose carve outs
6	for Aries and/or AGS as to small commercial and small
7	commercial retail customers as defined in the Public
8	Utilities Act. Thank you.
9	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Thank you. All right,
10	Commissioner Carrigan.
11	COMMISSIONER CARRIGAN: Aye.
12	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Commissioner Kimbrel.
13	COMMISSIONER KIMBREL: Aye.
14	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Commissioner Oliva.
15	COMMISSIONER OLIVA: Aye.
16	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: I vote aye as well. So the five
17	ayes have it. And the staff is directed to file the
18	motion as noted.
19	Item E-10 concerns Ameren's proposed creation
20	of Rider Modernization Action Plan Reconciliation or
21	Rider MAP, dash, R. Section 16-108.5 of the Public
22	Utilities Act requires that the formula rate for

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1	Ameren shall be inoperative after December 31st of
2	2022. The Act requires that at such time, the then
3	current rates shall remain in effect until such time
4	as new rates are set pursuant to Article IX of this
5	Act, subject to retroactive adjustment, with
6	interest, to reconcile rates charged with actual
7	costs.
8	Proposed Rider MAP-R is intended to provide a
9	mechanism for reconciliation of the costs under the
10	Act upon the sunset of the formula rates. The order
11	approves Rider MAP-R, finding it just and reasonable.
12	Rider MAP-R will become inoperative should Ameren not
13	elect to file an Article IX rate case prior to
14	March 31st of 2023. Are there any objections to
15	approving the order?
16	(No response.)
17	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Hearing none, the order is
18	approved.
19	Item E-11 concerns an application for
20	certification to operate as an installer of
21	distributed generation facilities in Illinois. The
22	order grants the certificate, finding that the

1	applicant meets the requirements. Are there any
2	objections to approving the order?
3	(No response.)
4	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Hearing none, the order is
5	approved.
б	Items E-12 through E-15 concern citations for
7	failure to file compliance recertification reports as
8	required by Section 454 of the Commission rules.
9	Respondents failed to appear at the hearings and did
10	not file exceptions to the proposed orders. The
11	orders suspend respondent's certificates of service
12	authority to operate as agents, brokers and
13	consultants. Are there any objections to considering
14	these items together and approving the orders?
15	(No response.)
16	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Hearing none, the orders are
17	approved.
18	Item E-16 concerns ComEd's revenue neutral
19	tariff changes related to rate design. On November
20	18, 2020 the Commission suspended the proposed tariff
21	changes through March 20th of 2021. The Commission's
22	investigation has not concluded and the order

resuspends the filing until June 21st of 2021. Are
there any objections to approving the resuspension
order?
(No response.)
CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Hearing none, the order is
approved.
Item E-17 concerns Ameren's petition for
approval of the program administrator for the retail,
excuse me, the residential retail real-time pricing
and the program administrator's compensation. The
Public Utilities Act requires Ameren to establish a
program administered by a non-affiliated program
administrator under which residential retail
customers can opt for real-time pricing for their
electricity needs.
The order approves Hughes Leahy and Karlovic,
Inc. as the program administrator and approves
proposed compensation. Are there any objections to
approving the order?
(No response.)
CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Hearing none, the order is
approved.

1	Item E-18 concerns an application for
2	certificate to service, excuse me, certificate of
3	service authority to install, maintain and repair
4	electric vehicle charging stations. The order grants
5	the certificate, finding that the applicant meets the
6	requirements. Are there any objections to approving
7	the order?
8	(No response.)
9	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Hearing none, the order is
10	approved.
11	Item E-19 concerns an application for
12	certificate of service authority to operate as an
13	electric retail agent, broker or consultant. The
14	order grants the certificate, finding that the
15	applicant meets the requirements. Are there any
16	objections to approving the order?
17	(No response.)
18	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Hearing none, the order is
19	approved.
20	Item E-20 concerns an application for
21	certification to install energy efficiency measures
22	in Illinois. The order denies the certificate,

1	finding that the applicant did not meet the
2	requirements by failing to file a proper certificate
3	of insurance. Are there any objections to approving
4	the order?
5	(No response.)
6	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Hearing none, the order is
7	approved.
8	Items E-21 and E-22 concern petitions to
9	cancel certificates of service authority to install
10	energy efficiency measures. The orders cancel the
11	certificates. Are there any objections to
12	considering these items together and approving the
13	orders?
14	(No response.)
15	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Hearing none, the orders are
16	approved.
17	Items E-23 through E-33 concern applications
18	for certifications to install energy efficiency
19	measures in Illinois. The orders grant the
20	certificates, finding that the applicants meet the
21	requirements. Are there any objections to
22	considering these items together and approving the

1	orders?
2	(No response.)
3	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Hearing none, the orders are
4	approved.
5	Moving on to our gas items. Item G-1
6	concerns Nicor's reconciliation of revenues collected
7	under purchase gas adjustment or PGA for 2019. The
8	order approves reconciliations as set in the appendix
9	to the order, finding that the costs were prudently
10	incurred. Are there any objections to approving the
11	order?
12	(No response.)
13	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Hearing none, the order is
14	approved.
15	Item G-2 concerns docket 19-1070, which is a
16	complaint against Nicor Gas regarding the removal of
17	a meter in Oak Forest. Nicor Gas filed a motion to
18	dismiss. Complainant has failed to file his response
19	to the motion by the deadline. Therefore, the order
20	grants Nicor's motion to dismiss the matter for want
21	of prosecution without prejudice. Are there any
22	objections to approving the order?

1	(No response.)
2	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Hearing none, the order is
3	approved.
4	Item G-3 concerns a complaint filed against
5	Direct Energy Services. The parties filed a
6	stipulation and joint motion to dismiss, stipulating
7	that all matters in dispute have been resolved and
8	requesting that the Commission dismiss the complaint.
9	Are there any objections to granting the joint motion
10	to dismiss?
11	(No response.)
12	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Hearing none, the motion is
13	granted.
14	Item G-4 concerns docket 20-0311, which is a
15	moratorium on in-person marketing of services by
16	alternative gas suppliers during the public health
17	emergency. We have several matters for the
18	Commission to decide today, first on Vistra's
19	January 19, 2021 second verified motion to allow
20	limited in-person solicitation, and second, Vistra's
21	February 2, 2021 petition for interlocutory review of
22	the January 15, 2021 ALJ ruling.

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1	First, I will call the vote on Vistra
2	Retailers' January 19, 2021 second verified motion to
3	allow limited in-person solicitation. The second
4	interim order before us grants the motion, finding it
5	is in the public interest to allow Vistra Retailers
6	to resume in-store marketing subject to conditions
7	stated in the order that require compliance with the
8	healthy and safety requirements and oversight of the
9	employees and agents. Are there any objections to
10	approving the second interim order?
11	(No response.)
12	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Hearing none, the order is
13	approved.
14	Next, I will call a vote on Vistra's petition
15	for interlocutory review. Vistra Retailers
16	petitioned the Commission for interlocutory review of
17	the administrative law judge's ruling dated January
18	15th of 2021 which denied Vistra Retailers' motion to
19	engage in limited in-person solicitation.
20	The relief that Vistra Retailers are
21	seeking is to conduct in-person solicitation at
22	non-residential business customers' premises for the

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1	purpose of soliciting that business itself where
2	in-person business is allowed by Restore Illinois
3	guidelines issued by the Illinois Department of
4	Commercial and Economic Opportunity or DCEO. Vistra
5	Retailers specifically committed to following DCEO
6	guidelines without further action by the Commission.
7	The petitioners also note that to the extent that the
8	Commission is concerned because Vistra Retailers did
9	not explicitly carve out solicitation of small
10	commercial retail customers or small commercial
11	customers, Vistra Retailers are willing to add that
12	as a condition of approval.
13	Having considered the petition, the
14	Commission finds it is just and reasonable and in the
15	public interest to allow Vistra Retailers to resume
16	appointment-based solicitation of non-residential
17	customers except for small commercial retail

¹⁸ customers or small commercial customers as defined by ¹⁹ the Public Utilities Act and subject to the same ²⁰ conditions as indicated in the second interim order ²¹ in this docket.

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Vistra Retailers' petition for interlocutory

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1	review is thus granted as noted and the ALJ's
2	January 15, 2021 ruling is reversed. So I will now
3	call a roll on this vote. If you are in favor of
4	granting Vistra's petition for interlocutory review
5	as noted, please say aye. And if you are opposed and
6	want to deny, please say nay.
7	Commissioner Bocanegra.
8	COMMISSIONER BOCANEGRA: Yes, similar to my
9	previous vote, I will be voting nay on this one as
10	well for the same reasons. Because I don't agree
11	with the outcome in this matter imposing these
12	limitations, I must vote nay and instead I would have
13	granted a review in full without any carve out
14	excepting small commercial customers as defined in
15	the Public Utilities Act since the Public Utilities
16	Act clearly sets out that this class is not
17	considered residential. Thanks.
18	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Thank you. Commissioner
19	Carrigan.
20	COMMISSIONER CARRIGAN: Aye.
21	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Commissioner Kimbrel.
22	COMMISSIONER KIMBREL: Aye.

1	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Commissioner Oliva.
2	COMMISSIONER OLIVA: Nay for the reasons stated
3	earlier.
4	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: I vote aye. So the three ayes
5	have it and the interlocutory review is granted as
б	noted.
7	Finally, in light of the current state of the
8	public health and the Commission's recent practice of
9	allowing in-person solicitation, the Commission
10	directs staff to file, within five business days from
11	today, a motion to modify the emergency order in this
12	docket to allow for in-store solicitations and

10	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Hearing none, the order is
11	approved.
12	Under the water and sewer items, Item W-1 $$
13	concerns utility services' filing to propose rate
14	increases for water and sewer services. The order
15	suspends the file pending hearing until July 3rd of
16	2021. Are there any objections to approving the
17	suspension order?
18	(No response.)
19	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Hearing none, the order is
20	approved.
21	Under miscellaneous items, item M-1 concerns
22	CableOne's notice of transfer and application for

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1	state issued authorization to provide cable and video
2	services. Staff's review concluded that the notice
3	complied with the requirements of completeness and
4	contained the assurances required by the law. Are
5	there any objections to granting the requested
6	authorization?
7	(No response.)
8	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Hearing none, the authorization
9	is granted.
10	Under the petitions for rehearing, Item PR-1
11	concerns application for rehearing in the docket
12	19-0892, which is a complaint against North Shore Gas
13	as to a mandatory installation demand of the 5G
14	meter. The issues raised in complainant's
15	application for rehearing provide no new facts or
16	evidence to support the complainant's position, but
17	instead concern another docket regarding a different
18	type of meter still under review by another
19	administrative law judge that has not been approved
20	by the Commission yet. Complainant has raised no new
21	evidence or case law on any issue that should cause
22	the Commission to revisit these issues. The ALJ

1	recommends denying the rehearing. Are there any
2	objections to denying the application for rehearing?
3	(No response.)
4	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Hearing none, the application
5	for rehearing is denied.
б	Item PR-2 concerns an application for
7	rehearing in the docket 20-0308, which is Ameren's
8	proposed general increase in rates and revisions to
9	other terms and conditions of service. On
10	February 16, 2021, IIEC, CUB and FEA jointly filed an
11	application for rehearing. IIEC and FEA also filed a
12	joint application for rehearing.
13	IIEC/CUB/FEA and IIEC/FEA seek rehearing on
14	various issues. First, the order's denial of an
15	independent audit of Ameren Service Company costs.
16	Second, the Commission's adoption of the averaging
17	method for determining the authorized return on
18	equity. Third, rate for GDS-4 Rider T greater than
19	60 psig customers. And fourth, denial of IIEC/FEA's
20	recommended equal percent allocation of the revenue
21	requirement.
22	The Commission finds that the applicants have

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1	not offered any new evidence on these issues to
2	warrant rehearing but instead reiterate their
3	previous arguments. The administrative law judge
4	recommends that the Commission deny rehearing on
5	these issues. Are there any objections to denying
б	both applications for rehearing?
7	(No response.)
8	CHAIR ZALEWSKI: Hearing none, the applications
9	for rehearing are denied.
10	Under the other business, Item O-1 concerns
11	approval of batches, contracts and confirmations
12	under the Illinois Adjustable Block Program. Are

3	Item O-3 concerns approval of the new ICC
4	executive director contract. Are there any
5	objections to approving the contract?
6	(No response.)
