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1 COMMISSIONER ROSALES: Good morning, everyone. 2 (No response.) 3 Good morning, everyone. (Audience responded.) 4 5 Are we ready to proceed in 6 Springfield? 7 MR. MATRISCH: Yes, we are. COMMISSIONER ROSALES: I am Commissioner John 8 Rosales. 9 10 Pursuant to the Open Meetings Act, I call the May 25, 2016 Regular Open Meeting of the 11 12 Illinois Commerce Commission to order. 13 Commissioner McCabe, Commissioner 14 del Valle, and Commissioner Edwards are present with 15 me in Chicago. We have a quorum. Commissioner 16 Sheahan is participating by phone. 17 Are you with us, Mr. Chairman? 18 CHAIRMAN SHEAHAN: I am. Thank you. 19 COMMISSIONER ROSALES: I move to allow 20 Chairman Sheahan to participate by phone. Is there 21 a second? 2.2 COMMISSIONER MAYE EDWARDS: Seconded.

1 COMMISSIONER ROSALES: All those in favor, say 2 aye. 3 (Chorus of ayes.) 4 Opposed, say nay. 5 (No response.) 6 The ayes have it, and Chairman Sheahan 7 is granted permission to participate by phone. 8 We have no requests to speak. Under Public Utilities, there are 9 edits to the Minutes of our April 26, 2016 Regular 10 11 Open Meeting, April 26, 2016 Policy Session, and 12 April 29, 2016 Special Open Meeting. 13 Are there any objections to approving 14 the Minutes as edited? 15 (No response.) 16 Hearing none, the Minutes as edited 17 are approved. 18 Item E-1 concerns ComEd's filing 19 modifying its Rider Parallel Operation of Retail 20 Customer Generating Facilities ("Rider POG"). Are there any objections to not 21 22 suspending the filing?

1 (No response.) 2 Hearing none, the filing is not 3 suspended. Item E-2 concerns Mt. Carmel Public 4 Utility's filing modifying its Rider D, Parallel 5 б Generation. 7 Are there any objections to not 8 suspending the filing? 9 (No response .) 10 Hearing none, the filing is not 11 suspended. 12 Item E-3 concerns the ICC's own motion to adopting Staff's Report on Ameren Illinois' 2014 13 14 Annual Reliability Report. 15 Are there any objections to approving 16 the proposed Order? 17 (No response.) 18 Hearing none, the Order is approved. 19 Items E-4 through E-6 concern various 20 customer complaints against ComEd. Are there any objections to 21 22 considering these items together and approving the

proposed Orders? 1 2 (No response.) 3 Hearing none, the Orders are approved. Item E-7 concerns Southeastern 4 Illinois Electric and Ameren Illinois' Joint 5 6 Petition for Approval of a Commercial Customer 7 Release. 8 Are there any objections to approving 9 the proposed Order? 10 (No response.) 11 Hearing none, the Order is approved. 12 Items E-8 through 12 concern various 13 Petitions for Confidential Treatment of Certain 14 Reports. 15 Are there any objections to 16 considering these items together and approving the 17 proposed Orders? 18 (No response.) 19 Hearing none, the Orders are approved. 20 Items E-13 and E-14 concern 21 Applications Requesting Certificates of Service 22 Authority to Operate as Installers of Distributed

1 Generation Facilities.

2 Are there any objections to considering these items together and approving the 3 4 proposed Orders? 5 (No response.) б Hearing none, the Orders are approved. 7 Item E-15 concerns Gulf Plains 8 Energy's Application for a Certificate of Service 9 Authority to Operate as Agents, Brokers, and 10 Consultants. 11 Are there any objections to approving 12 the proposed Order? 13 (No response.) 14 Hearing none, the Order is approved. 15 Item E-16 concerns Ravinia Plumbing and Heating's Application for a Certificate of 16 17 Service Authority to Install, Maintain, or Repair 18 Electric Vehicle Charging Stations. 19 Are there any objections to approving 20 the proposed Order? 21 (No response.) 2.2 Hearing none, the Order is approved.

1 Items E-17 and 18 concern Applications for Cancellation of Certificates of Service 2 3 Authority to Operate as Agents, Brokers, and 4 Consultants. 5 Are there any objections to 6 considering these items together and approving the 7 proposed Orders? 8 (No response.) Hearing none, the Orders are approved. 9 10 Moving on to our Gas Agenda, Item G-1 concerns Ameren Illinois' Filing to Update its 11 12 Customer-Requested Discontinuance of Service Charges 13 and to Modify its Rider Q.I.P., to Exclude Certain 14 Revenue from Rate Base Revenue. 15 Are there any objections to not 16 suspending the filing? 17 (No response .) 18 Hearing none, the filing is not 19 suspended. 20 Item G-2 will be postponed to a future 21 meeting. 22 Item G-3 concerns the Approval of a

Stipulation and Settlement Agreement Concerning an
Investigation of Peoples Gas.

3 Commissioner del Valle, do you have something to say. 4 5 COMMISSIONER del VALLE: Thank you, 6 Commissioner. 7 When this investigation was initiated, 8 I objected and attempted to expand its scope. Ι still believe that we have failed to ask the real 9 question that needed to be answered, whether the 10 11 Commission was knowingly misled in the 11-month, 12 \$6 billion Integrys and WEC merger proceeding last 13 year. 14 This question was not asked in this investigation; and, as a result of this vote today, 15 will never be asked. At stake is whether the 16

17 Commission and the public can trust that when a 18 company comes before us, the Commission will have 19 all the necessary information to fulfill its 20 statutory duty to protect the public interest. I do 21 not believe this investigation and settlement 22 provides that assurance.

1 This investigation was structured from 2 the beginning to frustrate the on-the-record, 3 fact-finding necessary to get to the truth. For reasons never adequately explained, the Commission 4 5 dismissed a petition filed by the AG and CUB seeking б a full investigation and initiated this expedited 7 and limited investigation focused only on a 8 May 20, 2015, 30-minute meeting. That meeting 9 consisted of a short presentation from executives who were not under oath, nor giving testimony as 10 part of a formal proceeding. 11 12 In addition to the constrained scope, which excluded the merger, the Commission's 13 expedited, self-imposed deadline was also used to 14 15 deny the parties the opportunity to conduct a full, 16 proper investigation. 17 The Commission's desire for an 18 expedited result was used as a rationale to block 19 subpoenas of the executives, but the request to review the ALJ decision was ignored by the 20 21 Commission without explanation for three months, even though this request had halted all work in the 22

1 docket.

2 The parties' options, given this investigation, were limited. First, the Commission 3 ensured the merger proceeding was off limits and out 4 5 of this investigation's scope. б Second, the very executives at the 7 center of the omission were excluded by the 8 Commission from the investigation and could not be 9 questioned. 10 Third, this investigation had been 11 paused at its initial stages since February waiting 12 for the Commission to vote on an interlocutory review concerning whether to subpoena those 13 executives, but the Commission did not consider the 14 15 petition. And, finally, though the investigation 16 17 sat idle, the deadline, which has now passed, was 18 still in effect, and instead of engaging in 19 fact-finding, everyone started negotiating. 20 Given these circumstances, how could this 21 investigation come out any other way? 22 Ultimately, this investigation and the

settlements are yet another lost opportunity by the 1 2 Commission to more aggressively protect the public 3 interest in asserting oversight into the ways Peoples Gas and its modernization program is 4 managed, and, more broadly, to demonstrate to all 5 б the utilities and their affiliates that we will 7 fully investigate any and all alleged deception. 8 Some will characterize this 9 investigation and these settlements as a deterrent to others, but I strongly disagree. If one of the 10 first things WEC did at the ICC was to knowingly 11 12 mislead the Commission in their merger proceeding, they should be brought before the Commission and 13 questioned about it. 14 15 I believe that to deter executives from this kind of conduct, they must know that the 16 Commission will aggressively and transparently seek 17 out the truth on the record. The Commission will 18 19 scrutinize their conduct and how it affects the culture of its employees; and, in the end, the 20 Commission will make a finding of fact. That is 21 deterrence that serves the public interest, but 22

1 that's not what the Commission has done.

2 Instead, the public interest has been reduced to a dollar amount in exchange for 3 Commission agreement to not ask the difficult 4 5 questions of executives. The companies will agree б to pay \$18.5 million; ratepayers and the government 7 get a one-time payment; the shareholders buy their 8 way out of further scrutiny of their \$6 billion 9 merger and 8 billion project; and the executives walk away with their \$61 million and more. This 10 does not sound like a deterrence to me. It sounds 11 like the cost of doing business in Illinois. 12 13 Accordingly, I will be voting no on 14 this settlement. Thank you. 15 COMMISSIONER ROSALES: Thank you, Commissioner. 16 Commissioner McCabe. 17 COMMISSIONER McCABE: I would like to point out 18 that this stipulation agreement does not preclude 19 adjustments and findings in future rate case and 20 Q.I.P. dockets regarding possible pre-merger cost 21 overruns and mismanagement. Thank you. 2.2 COMMISSIONER ROSALES: Thank you.

1	Mr. Chairman.
2	CHAIRMAN SHEAHAN: Thank you. I would like to
3	begin by thanking the Commission Staff for all their
4	hard work to bring the settlement to a close. I
5	would also like to thank the Attorney General and
6	her staff for their advocacy on behalf of
7	ratepayers.
8	It's also notable that we are here
9	today because of an enforcement tool written and
10	advocated for by the Citizens Utility Board to
11	ensure that individuals and entities that appear
12	before the Commission can be held accountable when
13	they undermine the process.
14	The settlement represents, we are
15	told, perhaps the only enforcement action in the
16	country ever based on a company's omissions. It
17	sends a strong signal to all parties who appear
18	before the Commission that threats to the integrity
19	of the process will not be tolerated and the conduct
20	of employees, who were involved in this matter, is
21	deplorable.
22	The Commission expects in the future

that the employees of entities that appear before 1 the Commission will do so with honesty and 2 3 integrity, and when they do not, there will be 4 significant consequences. Thank you. 5 Commissioner Rosales. 6 COMMISSIONER ROSALES: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. 7 Any other discussion? 8 (No response.) 9 I move to approve the proposed Order. Is there a second? 10 11 COMMISSIONER MAYE EDWARDS: Seconded. 12 CHAIRMAN SHEAHAN: Seconded. 13 COMMISSIONER ROSALES: All those in favor, say 14 aye. 15 COMMISSIONER MAYE EDWARDS: Aye. 16 COMMISSIONER McCABE: Aye. 17 CHAIRMAN SHEAHAN: Aye. 18 COMMISSIONER ROSALES: Opposed, say nay. 19 COMMISSIONER del VALLE: Nay. 20 COMMISSIONER ROSALES: The vote is 4 to 1, and 21 the Order is approved, and I also voted aye. 22 Item G-4 concerns Ameren Illinois'

Petition for a Certificate of Public Convenience and 1 2 Necessity to Construct, Operate, and Maintain a Natural Gas Distribution Main. 3 4 Are there any objections to approving 5 the proposed Order? 6 (No response.) 7 Hearing none, the Order is approved. 8 Items G-5 and 6 concern Applications for Certificates of Service Authority to Operate as 9 Alternative Gas Suppliers. 10 11 Are there any objections to 12 considering these items together and approving the 13 proposed Orders? 14 (No response.) 15 Hearing none, the Orders are approved. Items G-7 and 8 concern various 16 Petitions for Confidential Treatment of certain 17 18 reports. 19 Are there any objections to 20 considering these items together and approving the 21 proposed Orders? 2.2 (No response.)

1 Hearing none, the Orders are approved. 2 Item G-9 concerns a customer complaint 3 against Ambit Illinois. 4 Are there any objections to approving 5 the proposed Order? б (No response.) 7 Hearing none, the Order is approved. 8 Under Telecommunications, Items T-1 through 3 concern the Initiation of Rulemaking 9 Proceedings and Authorizing First-Notice Periods. 10 11 Are there any objections to entering 12 the Orders Initiating Rulemaking Proceedings and Authorizing First-Notice Periods? 13 14 (No response.) 15 Hearing none, the Orders are entered. 16 Item T-4 concerns Ignition Wireless' Application for a Certificate of Wireless Authority 17 18 to Operate as a Reseller of Telecommunications 19 Services. 20 Are there any objections to approving 21 the proposed Order? 2.2 (No response.)

1	Hearing none, the Order is approved.
2	Item T-5 concerns Etrali North
3	America's Application for a Certificate of
4	Interexchange Service Authority to Operate as a
5	Reseller of Telecommunications Services.
6	Are there any objections to approving
7	the proposed Order?

9	Hearing none, the Order is approved.
10	Item T-6 concerns WirelessCo., LLC's
11	Joint Petition to Withdraw WirelessCo. L.P's
12	Certificate of Service Authority and to issue a new
13	Certificate of Service Authority to WirelessCo.,
14	LLC.
15	Are there any objections to approving
16	the proposed Order?
17	(No response.)
18	Hearing none, the Order is approved.
19	Items T-7 and 8 concern various
20	Petitions for Confidential Treatment of certain
21	reports.
22	Are there any objections to

1 considering these items and approving the proposed 2 Orders?

3 (No response.) 4 Hearing none, the Orders are approved. In other business, we have a matter 5 б concerning the Transmission Cost Allocation 7 Settlement Agreement in FERC No. Docket No. 8 EL05-121-009. We also have a matter concerning the 9 Illinois Supreme Court case Zahn v. North American 10 Power and Gas LLC which addresses the question of 11 whether the Commission has exclusive jurisdiction 12 over a reparation claim brought by a residential 13 customer against an ARES. 14 These involve potential litigation and so we will enter into closed session for our 15 16 discussion. 17 Is there a motion to enter closed 18 session? 19 COMMISSIONER McCABE: So moved. 20 COMMISSIONER ROSALES: Is there a second? 21 COMMISSIONER MAYE EDWARDS: Seconded. 2.2 COMMISSIONER ROSALES: All those in favor, say

nay. (Chorus of ayes.) Opposed, say nay. (No response.) We now move to closed session. (Whereupon, closed session б consisted of Pages 20 to 30.)

1 (Whereupon, the following 2 proceedings were held 3 in open session:) Are there any objections to approving 4 the Transmission Cost Allocation Settlement 5 б Agreement in FERC Docket No. EL05-121-009? 7 (No response.) 8 Hearing none, the settlement agreement 9 is approved. 10 Are there any objections to approving OGC's recommendation that the Commission authorize 11 12 OGC to file an amicus curiae brief addressing the 13 question presented in the Zahn case? 14 (No response.) 15 Hearing none, the OGC's recommendation 16 is adopted. 17 MR. HINES-SHAH: I am sorry to interrupt, 18 Commissioner. I just wanted to clarify on the PJM 19 docket I think, just for purposes of clarity, the Commission is joining the FERC settlement before the 20 21 FERC. We're not approving the settlement. I think 22 there might have been a mistake in the language of

1 the script.

2 COMMISSIONER ROSALES: I agree. I agree. Would3 you say that again.

4 MR. HINES-SHAH: Certainly. The language in the motion is for the Commission to join the FERC 5 6 settlement in FERC Docket EL05-121-009. 7 COMMISSIONER MAYE EDWARDS: We already voted. Do 8 we need to rescind that? 9 MR. HINES-SHAH: I don't think you need to rescind that, but that's a clarification. I think 10 you can offer the motion. So if you agree with that 11 12 language, then I think if you accept the 13 clarification, we are clear on the record. 14 COMMISSIONER ROSALES: I accept the clarification, but I would like to go back and say, 15 16 once again, are there any objections to approving 17 the Transmission Cost Allocation Agreement and 18 joining the FERC docket -- joining the 19 decision --20 MR. HINES-SHAH: Joining the settlement --21 COMMISSIONER ROSALES: -- not approving but joining the settlement --22

MR. HINES-SHAH: -- in FERC. 1 2 COMMISSIONER ROSALES: -- in FERC EL05-121-009? 3 4 Would that be acceptable? 5 MR. HINES-SHAH: Absolutely. 6 COMMISSIONER ROSALES: Okay. 7 Any objections? 8 (No response.) 9 Hearing none, that's been approved. 10 Thank you. 11 MR. HINES-SHAH: Thank you. 12 COMMISSIONER ROSALES: Judge Kimbrel. JUDGE KIMBREL: Nothing further. 13 14 COMMISSIONER ROSALES: I need to ask you do you 15 have any other matters? 16 JUDGE KIMBREL: No, Mr. Commissioner. 17 COMMISSIONER ROSALES: I have someone in the 18 audience who's spent 30 years working with ComEd. 19 Claudia, everyone here agrees how your 20 work has been helpful to our agency. I just wanted 21 to put that of record that we really appreciate all the work that you have done for us in terms of 22

working with us -- working with us I think is the 1 2 appropriate word, so I want to thank you and wish you the best, and I'm sure all of my fellow 3 Commissioners agree. 4 5 MS. CHEVERE: Thank you. 6 COMMISSIONER ROSALES: Commissioners, anything 7 else to discuss? COMMISSIONER MAYE EDWARDS: Yes. 8 Commissioner, 9 thank you very much. Just two quick announcements. 10 On behalf of the Chairman, Commissioners, and Executive Director, I would like 11 12 to welcome our new Director of Community Affairs, 13 Lisa Williams. 14 Lisa, if you would just stand and let 15 everyone know who you are. 16 Lisa's coming to us from many years with state government. She was previously the head 17 18 of Work Force Diversity for the Illinois Tollway, as 19 well as its CEO officer, ADA coordinator, and ethics 20 officer. She brought rich diversity programs and was honored with five awards for her 21 22 accomplishments.

1 On behalf of her work in Africans With 2 Disabilities, she received the Chicago Defender's 3 Excellence Award, among others. We are excited to have her.
