1 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Pursuant to the provisions of
2 the Illinois Open Meetings Act, I now convene a
3 Special Open Meeting of the Illinois Commerce
4 Commission. With me in Chicago are Commissioners
5 Ford, O'Connell-Diaz and McCabe. With us in
6 Springfield by videoconference is Commissioner
7 Colgan. I'm Chairman Scott.

8 We have a quorum.

9 Before moving into the agenda,
10 according to Section 1700.10 of Title 2 of the
11 Administrative Code, this is the time we allow
12 members of the public to address the Commission.
13 Members of the public wishing to address the
14 Commission must notify the Chief Clerk's Office at
15 least 24 hours prior to our Commission meeting.
16 According to the Chief Clerk, there are no requests
17 to speak at today's Special Open Meeting.

18 Moving on to our agenda for today,
19 Item 1 is the approval of minutes from our May 22nd
20 Regular Open Meeting. I understand amendments have
21 been forwarded.

22 Is there a motion to amend the

1 minutes?

2 COMMISSIONER FORD: So moved.

3 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Is there a second?

4 COMMISSIONER McCABE: Second.

5 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: It's been moved and seconded.

6 All in favor say "aye."

7 (Chorus of ayes.)

8 Any opposed?

9 (No response.)

10 The vote is 5-0 and the amendments to
11 the May 22nd minutes are adopted.

12 Is there a motion to approve the
13 minutes as amended?

14 COMMISSIONER McCABE: So moved.

15 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Is there a second?

16 COMMISSIONER FORD: Second.

17 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: It's been moved and seconded.

18 All in favor say "aye."

19 (Chorus of ayes.)

20 Any opposed?

21 (No response.)

22 The vote is 5-0 and the May 22nd

1 minutes as amended are approved.

2 Item 2 concerns the approval from our
3 May 29th Special Open Meeting. I understand
4 amendments have been forwarded.

5 Is there a motion to amend the
6 minutes?

7 COMMISSIONER FORD: So moved.

8 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Is there a second?

9 COMMISSIONER McCABE: Second.

10 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: It's been moved and seconded.

11 All in favor say "aye."

12 (Chorus of ayes.)

13 Any opposed?

14 (No response.)

15 The vote is 5-0 and the amendments to
16 the May 29th minutes are adopted.

17 Is there a motion to approve the
18 minutes as amended?

19 COMMISSIONER FORD: So moved.

20 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Is there a second?

21 COMMISSIONER O'CONNELL-DIAZ: Second.

22 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: It's been moved and seconded.

1 All in favor say "aye."

2 (Chorus of ayes.)

3 Any opposed?

4 (No response.)

5 The vote is 5-0 and the May 29th
6 minutes as amended are approved.

7 Item 3 is Docket No. 11-0721. This is
8 ComEd's formula rate filing under Section 16-108.5 of
9 the Public Utilities Act. Before us today is an
10 application for rehearing filed by the Company. ALJs
11 Sainsot and Kimbrel recommend denying the Company's
12 application for rehearing. The application for
13 rehearing cites a host of issues on which the Company
14 would like rehearing. So we will tackle the primary
15 issues first and then move on to address the
16 remainder of the petition.

17 On the issue of methodology for
18 calculating interest on reconciliation adjustments, I
19 would move that we grant the rehearing on that issue.

20 Is there a second?

21 COMMISSIONER McCABE: Second.

22 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: It's been moved and seconded.

1 Is there any discussion?

2 COMMISSIONER McCABE: Chairman.

3 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Commissioner McCabe.

4 COMMISSIONER McCABE: On the interest rate
5 issue, while the Commission's decision was within its
6 discretion, we want the record as complete as
7 possible in the gather of further testimony and
8 expertise from all parties in this case. We would
9 benefit from a discussion on the appropriate length
10 of time to calculate such interests.

11 For example, should the calculation
12 cover one- or two-year debt? Are there independent
13 sources or look up tables to be used in setting the
14 interest rate? And is it appropriate to apply any
15 increase over baseline interest rate? If so, at what
16 rate? And setting the final reconciliation rate of
17 interest.

18 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Is there further discussion?

19 COMMISSIONER O'CONNELL-DIAZ: I would just
20 support -- since Commission McCabe and I worked on
21 the language for this edit, I would support what
22 Commission McCabe has set forth. Additionally I

1 think the backdrop for this obviously is the
2 legislative structure that we're working under. So I
3 would look forward to further flushing out the issue
4 of interest and giving a clear path to us being in
5 compliance with what the legislation provides with
6 the appropriate rate that should be used. So I look
7 forward to rehearing the parties engaging in this.

8 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Is there further discussion?

9 (No response.)

10 The motion is to grant rehearing on
11 the methodology for calculating interest on
12 reconciliation adjustments.

13 All in favor say "aye."

14 (Chorus of ayes.)

15 Any opposed?

16 (No response.)

17 The vote is 5-0 and that item will be
18 reheard.

19 On the definition of pension asset, is
20 there any discussion or a motion?

21 Commissioner McCabe.

22 COMMISSIONER McCABE: I move for rehearing on

1 their treatment of pension asset and pension
2 contributions. This is the first formula rate case
3 under YIMA. There are complex issues, debate over
4 the statutory interpretation, definition of terms,
5 and tight deadlines. We want to make sure we get
6 this right going forward to ensure smart grid
7 development and infrastructure improvements.

8 COMMISSIONER FORD: I certainly support
9 Commissioner McCabe's language and look forward to
10 the rehearing.

11 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Is that in the form of a
12 motion, Commissioner McCabe?

13 COMMISSIONER McCABE: The first part, yes.

14 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Is there a second?

15 COMMISSIONER O'CONNELL-DIAZ: Second.

16 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Further discussion on this
17 issue?

18 (No response.)

19 The motion is to grant rehearing on
20 the definition of pension asset.

21 All in favor say "aye."

22 (Chorus of ayes.)

1 Any opposed?

2 (No response.)

3 The vote is 5-0 and that issue will be
4 reheard.

5 On the issue of average versus
6 year-end rate base, is there any discussion or a
7 motion?

8 COMMISSIONER O'CONNELL-DIAZ: I would --
9 Commissioner Ford.

10 COMMISSIONER FORD: No. Go on.

11 COMMISSIONER O'CONNELL-DIAZ: No. Go ahead.

12 COMMISSIONER FORD: I would certainly -- I read
13 this and reread it and I certainly want to rehear it
14 because I want to see it flushed out like we did for
15 the other issues. I know this is a contentious issue
16 and that's why I move that we rehear the average
17 versus year-end rate base.

18 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: It's been moved.

19 Is there a second?

20 COMMISSIONER O'CONNELL-DIAZ: I would second
21 that.

22 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Further discussion?

1 COMMISSIONER O'CONNELL-DIAZ: Mr. Chairman,
2 thank you.

3 I would support certainly based upon
4 Commissioner Ford's representation of rehearing this
5 issue. This is the first time out of the box for us
6 to interpret all of this legislation and also our
7 time frames are extremely tight given the deadline
8 features of the legislation. Initially in the first
9 go-around on this issue I had put for the language
10 that was -- didn't make its way to the final version
11 and I continued to believe that my way was the right
12 way.

13 But I think another look at it will be
14 beneficial for all of us. And, again, with the goal
15 of really fine-tuning and ensuring that we get it
16 right as the Commission and I think rehearing will
17 afford us that. So I appreciate the support from my
18 colleagues with regard to rehearing on this issue.

19 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Further discussion?

20 The motion is to grant rehearing on
21 average versus year-end rate base.

22 All in favor say "aye."

1 (Chorus of ayes.)
2 Any opposed?
3 (No response.)
4 The vote is 5-0 and rehearing is
5 granted on that issue.
6 Are there any other topics on which
7 Commissioners seek rehearing?
8 (No response.)
9 Hearing none, I would move to deny the
10 remainder of ComEd's request for rehearing insofar as
11 it was not addressed by our prior votes.
12 Is there a second?
13 COMMISSIONER O'CONNELL-DIAZ: Second.
14 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: It's been moved and seconded.
15 Is there any discussion?
16 (No response.)
17 All in favor say "aye."
18 (Chorus of ayes.)
19 Any opposed?
20 (No response.)
21 The vote is 5-0 and the remainder of
22 ComEd's application for rehearing is denied.

1 Item No. 4 is Docket No. 12-0298.
2 This is ComEd's petition for the approval of its AMI
3 Plan under Section 16-108.6 of the Public Utilities
4 Act. We've got a few things to consider here and
5 we'll start with AARP's request for oral argument. I
6 would move to deny AARP's request for oral argument.

7 Is there a second?

8 COMMISSIONER FORD: Second.

9 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: It's been moved and seconded.

10 Is there any discussion?

11 (No response.)

12 All in favor say "aye."

13 (Chorus of ayes.)

14 Any opposed?

15 (No response.)

16 The vote is 5-0 and AARP's oral
17 argument request is denied.

18 Next up we will address the Order
19 itself. ALJ Haynes recommends entry of an Order
20 approving ComEd's AMI Plan with modification. There
21 are at least two sets of revisions here. I'll
22 start -- I have some revisions. They're fairly

1 extensive to the Order, although in the interest of
2 time, they don't change any of the conclusions
3 contained in the Order and I'll walk through these
4 fairly briefly.

5 First, clarify how ComEd has met the
6 condition for a statement of AMI strategy through
7 tightening up this section of summary ordering of
8 things and narrowing the focus.

9 Second, clarifying and expanding the
10 explanation of the authority under which the
11 Commission has the authority to modify the AMI Plan,
12 which includes a discussion of ComEd's motion for a
13 stay and expected request for rehearing regarding the
14 deployment schedule.

15 Third, clarify and add caveats
16 regarding the additional metrics for vulnerable
17 populations to deal with the challenge ComEd may have
18 to collecting and tracking which customers are
19 vulnerable.

20 Fourth, assert that consideration of
21 time of use or other dynamic pricing options as part
22 of the education plan will not hinder the development

1 of the competitive retail market.

2 Fifth, clarify some language and
3 remove other language regarding the discount rate
4 used in the cost-benefit analysis which should make
5 clear that despite the limitations of the record, the
6 cost-benefit analysis provided by ComEd is cost
7 beneficial as contemplated by the statute.

8 Sixth, and perhaps most significantly,
9 decline to order ComEd to file a TOU Tariff. Instead
10 we will be asking ComEd to work with the Smart Grid
11 Advisory Counsel and other stakeholders in a wider
12 exploration of increasing dynamic pricing including
13 the role of ARES, RRTP, as well as the proposed
14 Company-offered TOU.

15 Seven, some minor wording changes
16 to -- to not change the conclusion on the peak time
17 rebate, but just to soften the conclusion.

18 And lastly, minor changes on the
19 findings in the ordering section to make it clear
20 that the cost-benefit test is met and that the plan
21 must be modified as discussed otherwise in the Order.

22 So those are the revisions. There's a

1 lot there, but they've been circulated and reflect
2 feedback from, I think, all of the offices, which I
3 appreciate. And as I mentioned before, these
4 revisions do maintain the existing conclusions from
5 the Proposed Order.

6 With that, is there any discussion of
7 those revisions?

8 COMMISSIONER FORD: None from me.

9 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Commissioner McCabe.

10 COMMISSIONER McCABE: I just want to commend
11 the ALJs, Staff, and all the various parties for
12 doing all they did in a limited amount of time.

13 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Okay.

14 COMMISSIONER O'CONNELL-DIAZ: Mr. Chairman, I
15 just wanted to address the -- first of all, it was
16 great because everybody behind the scenes was busy
17 working on this through the weekend and we did have
18 these really, really terribly short time frames. Our
19 assistants were -- it was a hot bed of action
20 yesterday. The Commissioners were likewise engaged
21 and going through the revisions that were being
22 bounced around. I know that Commissioner Colgan has

1 some other points; but with regard to the Motion for
2 Stay, we're going to take that separately?

3 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Yes.

4 COMMISSIONER O'CONNELL-DIAZ: Okay. Then we'll
5 talk about that then. But I would also like to thank
6 Judge Haynes for giving us a very well-drafted Order.
7 Obviously we did a little fine-tuning because we had
8 more time -- and the parties, this was -- the
9 deadlines on these cases are -- really require a
10 Herculean task, so everyone had to put their shoulder
11 to the wheel and the result is, I think, culminated
12 in a good Order, a fine Order, and a path forward.
13 So I would like to thank everyone for their effort.

14 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: I second that. I was going to
15 do that at the end as well, so we'll do that again at
16 the conclusion, too.

17 Is there any discussion on the
18 revisions? If not, I would move the adoption of
19 those revisions.

20 Is there a second?

21 COMMISSIONER FORD: Second.

22 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: It's been moved and seconded.

1 All in favor say "aye."

2 (Chorus of ayes.)

3 Any opposed?

4 (No response.)

5 The vote is 5-0 and my revisions are
6 adopted.

7 Commissioner Colgan, you have some
8 revisions as well, sir?

9 COMMISSIONER COLGAN: Yes. Thank you,
10 Chairman.

11 First of all, I would like to thank
12 all of the Commissioner's offices for the valuable
13 input regarding the edits. The edits commend the
14 Commission analysis and conclusion in the section of
15 the Order which discusses whether or not a knock -- a
16 door knock is required at the time of disconnection
17 for nonpayment. The edits are intended to strengthen
18 the position of the Commission's rule regarding a
19 premises visit prior to disconnection and it is an
20 important consumer protection that can prevent a
21 dangerous health and safety condition due to a loss
22 of electricity service. The edits also make

1 reference to consistent language in the Commission's
2 Orders in the ComEd AMI Pilot Program docket and the
3 recent Ameren metrics docket regarding remote
4 disconnection of service.

5 Mr. Chairman and Commissioners, with
6 that I move that this edit be adopted and I request
7 your support for the edits.

8 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Is there a second to the
9 motion?

10 COMMISSIONER McCABE: Second.

11 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Is there any discussion of
12 Commissioner Colgan's revisions?

13 COMMISSIONER O'CONNELL-DIAZ: I would like to
14 thank Commissioner Colgan for going through this
15 section and, you know, not changing the outcome; but
16 strengthening the commitment of the Commission with
17 regard to the important safety of our ratepayers with
18 regard to this issue and -- so thanks for his work on
19 this.

20 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Further discussion?

21 (No response.)

22 It's been moved and seconded on

1 Commissioner Colgan's revisions.

2 All in favor say "aye."

3 (Chorus of ayes.)

4 Any opposed?

5 (No response.)

6 The vote is 5-0 and Commissioner
7 Colgan's revisions are adopted.

8 Is there any further discussion on
9 this matter?

10 COMMISSIONER COLGAN: I would just like to echo
11 a big thank you to ALJ Haynes. I think she's done a
12 remarkable job here. And considering the voluminous
13 record of evidence that was presented in this case
14 and boiling it down to what we had and what she
15 presented to us, I thought it was a very well-done
16 job.

17 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Further discussion on the
18 matter?

19 (No response.)

20 Is there a motion to enter the Order
21 as revised?

22 COMMISSIONER FORD: So moved.

1 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Is there a second?

2 COMMISSIONER O'CONNELL-DIAZ: Second.

3 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: It's been moved and seconded.

4 All in favor say "aye."

5 (Chorus of ayes.)

6 Any opposed?

7 (No response.)

8 The vote is 5-0 and the ComEd AMI Plan
9 Order as revised is entered.

10 And as Commissioner O'Connell-Diaz
11 pointed out, we have a Motion to Stay which was filed
12 by ComEd asking us to stay the Order while they seek
13 rehearing on the issue of their deployment schedule.

14 Is there any discussion on this
15 motion?

16 COMMISSIONER FORD: Chairman, I certainly --
17 not being a lawyer -- had evaluated that it's just
18 premature in my opinion because it certainly did not
19 have any prevailing merits and it did not show
20 irreparable harm from the petitioner. So I am just
21 surprised that they put this Order in without showing
22 us the kind of harm that it would do to us or to the

1 parties or what result it would have and it's
2 certainly premature.

3 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Further discussion?

4 COMMISSIONER O'CONNELL-DIAZ: I would echo
5 Commissioner Ford's analysis. Commissioner Ford sat
6 next to me and I think she knows more about the law
7 at this point than I do because she's got it down
8 with regard to a Motion to Stay.

9 A Motion to Stay in my mind, you know,
10 I'm a process person and I was kept looking for the
11 magic buzz words in this motion and I did not find
12 them. So it was deficient from that standard which
13 is something that one learns, I think, the first year
14 in law school. I'm not too sure, you know, the
15 irreparable harm so -- and it's also premature
16 because we normally would be having rehearing if the
17 parties are aggrieved in the Order that we just
18 entered, then we would have rehearing. So at that
19 point in time when the Commission is done with its
20 due diligence at that point, that's when I would
21 suggest we he would be seeing a Motion for Stay.

22 So it's premature, it's deficient, and

1 it's also deficient from the standard of what's
2 contained in what was filed. It does not give us the
3 type of ammunition we would need to grant -- a Motion
4 for Stay is a very serious business. And in Order to
5 do that, the Commission would need to have credible
6 information, credible numbers -- and this is about
7 numbers -- to show that irreparable harm and that is
8 just not present in the motion as it currently
9 stands.

10 So I think that we have entered a good
11 Order and maybe we won't have any petitions for
12 rehearing and we won't have a Motion for Stay, but
13 that certainly is down the road. And this is just
14 not in the sequence that we would normally see, so I
15 was surprised to see that in this motion.

16 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: I think the point you made is
17 very good about not having the particulars that you
18 would really need to have to make that kind of
19 decision. And one of the revisions that you brought
20 up while we were doing the revisions, the language is
21 in there now that talks about the kinds of
22 information that would be needed either on rehearing

1 or rehearing with a Motion for Stay, which could
2 obviously be filed in the future as well. So I think
3 that that's a very good point.

4 Is there a motion to deny ComEd's
5 Motion for Stay?

6 COMMISSIONER COLGAN: So moved.

7 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Is there a second?

8 COMMISSIONER O'CONNELL-DIAZ: Second.

9 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: It's been moved and seconded.
10 Is there further discussion?

11 (No response.)

12 All in favor say "aye."

13 (Chorus of ayes.)

14 Any opposed?

15 (No response.)

16 The vote is 5-0 and ComEd's Motion for
17 Stay is denied.

18 And just briefly, Judge Haynes, others
19 have said it; but I wanted to add my thanks to you
20 and to all of the parties and all of the offices for
21 their work on this, but especially to you, Judge,
22 because this is a tremendous undertaking for you to

1 have to do in a very short time frame. And I know we
2 didn't help matters a lot with our oral argument
3 scheduling and the timing on that, but it's a
4 testament to you and the Staff and the parties that
5 practice before the Commission that this was able to
6 get done in only 60 days. So, again, thank you very
7 much and we really appreciate that.

8 Judge Wallace, are there any other
9 matters to come before the Commission today?

10 JUDGE WALLACE: No. That's all, Mr. Chairman.

11 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, this meeting
12 stands adjourned and we'll be back with our next
13 Bench Session on Wednesday, June 27th.

14 Thanks, everybody.

15 (And those were all the
16 proceedings had.)

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
