PROCEEDINGS

2	CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Pursuant to the provisions of
3	the Illinois Open Meetings Act, I now convene a
4	regularly scheduled Bench Session of the Illinois
5	Commerce Commission. With me in Springfield are
6	Commissioner Elliott and Acting Commissioner Colgan.
7	With us in Chicago are Commissioners Ford and
8	O'Connell-Diaz. I am Chairman Scott. We have a
9	quorum.
10	Before moving into the agenda,
11	according to Section 1700.10 of Title II of the
12	Administrative Code, this is the time we allow
13	members of the public to address the Commission.
14	Members of the public wishing to address the
15	Commission must notify the Chief Clerk's Office at
16	least 24 hours prior to the Bench Session. According
17	to the Chief Clerk's Office, we have no requests to
18	speak at today's session.
19	(The Transportation
20	portion of the proceedings was held at this time and
21	is contained in a separate transcript.)
22	

1 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Moving on to the Public 2 Utility Agenda, we will begin today with approval of minutes from prior Commission meetings. Up first are 3 4 minutes from our November 22 Regular Open Meeting. I 5 understand amendments have been forwarded. Is there a motion to amend the minutes? 6 ACTING COMMISSIONER COLGAN: So moved. 7 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Is there a second? 8 COMMISSIONER ELLIOTT: Second. 9 10 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: It's been moved and seconded. 11 All in favor say aye. 12 COMMISSIONERS: Aye. 13 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: The vote is five to nothing, 14 and the amendments to the November 22 ROM minutes are 15 adopted. 16 Is there a motion to approve the 17 minutes as amended? 18 COMMISSIONER ELLIOTT: So moved. 19 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Is there a second? 20 ACTING COMMISSIONER COLGAN: Second. 21 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: It's been moved and seconded. 22 All in favor say aye.

1 COMMISSIONERS: Aye. CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Any opposed? 2 3 (No response.) 4 The vote is five to nothing, and the 5 November 22 Regular Open Meeting minutes as amended 6 are approved. Turning next to the Electric portion 7 8 of today's agenda, Item E-1 concerns a filing by 9 MidAmerican seeking modification of its tariffs 10 governing disconnection of electric service for nonpayment for veterans and active military personnel 11 12 Staff recommends granting the company's request by 13 not suspending the filing. 14 Is there any discussion? 15 (No response.) 16 Is there a motion to not suspend the 17 filing? ACTING COMMISSIONER COLGAN: 18 So moved. 19 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Is there a second? 20 COMMISSIONER ELLIOTT: Second. CHAIRMAN SCOTT: It's been moved and seconded. 21 22 All in favor say aye.

1 COMMISSIONERS: Aye. 2 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Any opposed? 3 (No response.) 4 The vote is five to nothing, and the 5 filing will not be suspended. We will use this five to nothing vote 6 for the remainder of today's Public Utility agenda, 7 unless otherwise noted. 8 9 Item E-2 concerns a filing by ComEd, 10 its Rate RDS and Rate RESS tariffs related to any changes in a non-residential customer's federal tax 11 12 ID number. Staff recommends granting the company's 13 request by not suspending the filing. 14 Is there any discussion? 15 (No response.) 16 Any objections? 17 (No response.) 18 Hearing none, the filing will not be 19 suspended. Item E-3 is Docket Number 07-0566. 20 This is ComEd's 2007 rate case on remand from the 21 appellate court. We will be holding this item for 22

1 disposition at a future Commission meeting. Item E-4 is Docket Number 10-0275. 2 This is ComEd's 2008/2009 power procurement 3 4 expenditure reconciliation case. ALJ Jones 5 recommends entry of an Order approving the reconciliation. 6 Is there any discussion? 7 8 (No response.) 9 Any objections? 10 (No response.) 11 Hearing none, the Order is entered. Item E-5 is Docket Numbers 11-0279 and 12 13 11-0282 Consolidated. This is Ameren's rate case for 14 its electric and gas operations. Before us is a 15 motion by the company to sever and dismiss its 16 electric case, and we will hold disposition of this motion for a future Commission meeting. 17 18 With respect to oral argument, we plan 19 on holding oral argument in this matter at 1:00 20 o'clock p.m. on January 5 at the Commission's 21 Springfield offices. We will not enter a Final Order in this case until our January 10 Regular Open 22

1 Meeting, so entry of an Order regarding the requested rate increase will be held until then. 2 3 E-6 is Docket Number 11-0118. This is 4 Nicor's reconciliation case for 2010 expenditures 5 made for coal tar cleanup. ALJ Kimbrel recommends entry of an Order approving the reconciliation. 6 Is there any discussion? 7 8 (No response.) 9 Any objections? 10 (No response.) 11 Hearing none, the Order is entered. Items E-7 and E-8 (11-0702, 11-0715) 12 13 can be taken together. These are applications by 14 Trinity Energy Services and SourceOne for licensure 15 as an Agent, Broker and Consultant under Section 16-115C of the Public Utilities Act. In each case 16 17 ALJ Albers recommends entry of an Order granting the requested Certificate. 18 19 Is there any discussion? 20 (No response.) 21 Any objections? 22 (No response.)

1 Hearing none, the Orders are entered, 2 and the Certificates are granted. 3 Items E-9 through E-12 (11-0179, 4 11-0431, 11-0454, 11-0485) can also be taken 5 together. These are customer complaints against 6 ComEd. In each case the parties have apparently settled their differences and brought a Joint Motion 7 to Dismiss which the ALJ recommends we grant. 8 9 Is there any discussion? 10 (No response.) 11 Any objections? 12 (No response.) 13 Hearing none, the Joint Motions to Dismiss are granted. 14 Item E-13 is Docket Number 11-0660. 15 16 This is the Illinois Power Agency's petition for approval of its 2012 Procurement Plan. ALJ Wallace 17 recommends entry of an Order approving the plan. 18 19 Is there any discussion? 20 I would like to make just a few 21 comments if I could about this. I am going to vote 22 for the Order today.

1 First with respect to the arguments 2 that were made regarding the need for long-term contracts and renewables, I am sympathetic to some of 3 4 those arguments. When I was at the EPA, I was in 5 charge of the Illinois Climate Change Advisory Group which was tasked with developing a set of policy 6 solutions to reduce carbon emissions in Illinois and 7 help lay the groundwork for the renewable portfolio 8 standard that we have in the state today. 9 10 And I fully understand that our 11 long-term strategy can't simply be to think about 12 compliance purely on an annual basis and only in 13 terms of the lowest possible compliance cost. Because, if we do that, we will eventually find 14 15 ourselves in the situation where the development of 16 renewables is constrained by transmission or other 17 barriers, and we will end up paying more REC procurement than if we take a longer term vision. 18 19 And I also understand that the RPS, at 20 least as it was envisioned I think legislatively, in 21 addition by the Climate Change Advisory Group, is 22 about developing low carbon generation resources and

1 not simply recognizing that they exist, and that does require some certainty for the developers to actually 2 develop those low carbon generation resources. 3 4 So I do see some of the appeal to 5 those arguments. But having said that, I don't think this is the right time to move forward with those 6 long-term projects as part of our Procurement Plan 7 for a couple of reasons. 8 9 First, we really don't know what our 10 renewable energy resource budget will look like one year from now, let alone three to five years from 11 12 But given what we know about the current growth now. 13 of the electric retail electricity space, we will 14 have a much better handle on that variable by this 15 time next year. So as long as that budget amount remains a little bit of a mystery, it would be 16 17 irresponsible of us to lock up too much of that budget in long-term contracts. 18 19 And, second, given the current low 20 prices of renewable energy credits, it is tough to

21 say this is the right time to increase the proportion 22 of the budget that's devoted to long-term deals.

1 Illinois ratepayers are benefitting from a glut of supply on the renewable side, specifically with wind, 2 and that's showing up in the REC prices. We do know 3 4 that those prices will rise eventually, but I don't 5 think we are at the point in the curve where we need to turn to those long-term solutions guite yet. 6 So while I am ultimately sympathetic 7 that we can't always think short-term, I don't 8 believe we are at the place yet where we need to jump 9 10 into the long-term area. 11 I am looking forward to discussing 12 these issues with the parties in the upcoming months. 13 I think it is really important for us to play an important role in these discussions, much as it is 14 15 for us to play a role in some of the other discussions we have had about the EPA and some of the 16 17 regs and other issues that are important to us and to the ratepayers. So in coming months I look forward 18 19 to some discussions surrounding the issues of this 20 one and hopefully getting a better sense of where 21 everybody is coming from on that.

22 One other thing I would just like to

1 touch on briefly, and that's the procurement of solar powered distributed generation. I am very happy that 2 our Order calls for workshops on the issue, and I 3 4 believe those will be very useful in understanding 5 how we can think through properly matching our procurement process, which can be very technical and 6 difficult to access for smaller parties, matching 7 8 that to the procurement distributed renewable resources. I think that's a challenge for us, and I 9 10 am really looking forward to that challenge in the 11 future. 12 Are there any other comments?

13 COMMISSIONER ELLIOTT: Yeah.

14 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Commissioner Elliott?

15 COMMISSIONER ELLIOTT: Yeah, I agree that the 16 situation was fairly well defined regarding long-term 17 contracts, and I think I have been on record in past IPA Orders regarding long-term contracts and customer 18 migration risk which was somewhat discussed in the 19 20 Order, and acknowledged that there are a lot of 21 municipal aggregation proposals that are out there. 22 I think this is an issue that most likely will

1 continue to grow and expand. As more communities get involved, I think more communities may take this up 2 through political means in their communities which 3 4 takes some time, as you well know. But we have also got a fledgling 5 residential commercial market now which is growing. 6 We have seen significant increases a year, month on 7 8 month, certainly year on year. And I think all of 9 those things sort of gravitate to taking a very 10 conservative view with regard to long-term contracting for what could potentially be a very 11 12 diminishing pool of potential KEs. 13 So as I said in my opinion, dissenting opinion in the Order, I think it was, a couple years 14 15 ago with regard to long-term contracting, I still 16 think there is a significant lack of discussion with 17 regard to customer migration risk and contracted positions over longer periods. I would like to see 18 19 more of that developed in future records, if this is 20 to be considered as we go forward. As we gain more 21 experience in customer migration and municipal aggregation, I think we will be able to see what the 22

1 trend is going to be. But I do believe it is going 2 to be increasing. I don't think anyone disavowed that in this case. 3 4 So with that, I am happy with the 5 Order as it stands as well. ACTING COMMISSIONER COLGAN: 6 Yeah. CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Commissioner Colgan? 7 8 ACTING COMMISSIONER COLGAN: I pretty much agree with both comments that have already been made. 9 10 I share a lot of your sentiments, Chairman, and I understand your point of view, Commissioner. 11 12 I think we are faced with some really 13 serious dilemmas in policy goals here. We have the 14 25 by 25 Policy that we need to take seriously. We 15 have the low cost issue that is argued very, I think, 16 effectively in this Procurement Plan by the parties. 17 I think there is a lot of issues that kind of bump into each other in the midst of all of that 18 19 discussion. 20 I have a little bit of a concern as to 21 how we get to the 25 by 25 if we don't put some of

these renewables in place. You know, the thing where

22

1 we -- I just discovered recently Oak Park went to the 2 aggregation and 100 percent of their energy is going to be RECs and they are saving a lot of money through 3 4 that. If a number of communities were to pick up 5 that similar kind of option, I am not sure that they will, but if they did, you know, we would start 6 bumping up against capacity on being able to meet 7 that, and I know that creates all kinds of 8 complications on transmission policies that need to 9 10 be thought through thoroughly.

And so, you know, I spent a lot of 11 12 time with this Order and I think that I agree with 13 its conclusions. A lot of good work, a lot of hard work, went into putting this together, and so I am 14 15 going to vote for it. But, you know, I share a 16 number of concerns that have already been expressed. 17 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Further discussion? COMMISSIONER ELLIOTT: All right. I would just 18 like to add that, you know, you mentioned 19 20 transmission policy and that is in a serious state of 21 flux, both regional and national, with regard to 22 renewables, with regard to cost allocation. I think

that the status quo doesn't lend itself, I think, to long-term views. It's -- until a number of issues are settled, I think both on the state level and regional and a national level, it's going to be quite disconcerting and difficult to take a long-term view. These things just agitate against this until they are resolved.

8 And so I think you made an excellent 9 point about transmission policy, which goes well 10 beyond our borders but has significant implications 11 on our purchases going forward.

12 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: I think all these comments are 13 very well made. I think they all point out the need 14 to have some further discussion with lots of parties 15 and lots of players that are involved in this, rather 16 than just kind of a silo kind of approach to it, as 17 we all, for good reasons, but we all fall into that 18 from time to time.

19 Further comments?
20 COMMISSIONER O'CONNELL-DIAZ: I just agree with
21 the comments that have been made so far. I think
22 what we need to always keep in mind is that this is a

1 developing situation that we see. And, I mean, who would think that -- I think today riding down on the 2 train, I think I read of probably five different 3 4 referendums that are going on with regard to 5 municipal aggregation. This Commission has been a 6 champion of development of a competitive market. We are now finally, finally, seeing some of the benefits 7 that come from that. But with the benefits come our 8 responsibility to plug in that knowledge and that 9 10 reality as we move forward.

11 And I guess my concern always is what 12 does it mean to the ratepayer. What does it mean --13 are we picking winners and losers, and that bottom 14 line price, and are we subsidizing something that may 15 not be in the best interest of our state or folks 16 that are paying for this.

17 So I think we continually have to put 18 the glasses on and look at it and, as the Chairman 19 suggested, have open dialogue with regard to how do 20 we do this.

21 And I thought the Order was extremely 22 well written. It covered, you know, all of the

various positions that are kind of out there. And, you know, if we look at that Order next year, it may not be -- I can guarantee it won't be the same facts that we should be looking at. So, again, this is a continually changing place that we find ourselves in with Interstate and also given the fact that we are in a national marketplace.

So we just have to continue to be 8 knowledgeable and try to make our best judgments 9 10 based on what the current information is, and it does change. And, you know, I just think that's what 11 12 developing appropriate policy is. And I know many 13 other states are looking at the amounts of renewable procurement that their legislatures have required for 14 15 their states, and those were all set a couple years 16 So things are different than they were a couple aqo. 17 years ago when we set those so we have to be able to re-look at things and make the best call. 18

19 So I look forward to the continuing 20 improvement of our marketplace, and IPA will be there 21 to bring us those Procurement Plans, and we will have 22 to keep looking at it. So I appreciate all the

1 parties' efforts in this and also I think Judge Wallace gave us an excellent Order here to move 2 3 forward with. 4 Thank you. 5 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Thank you. Further discussion? 6 7 (No response.) 8 Are there any objections to entering the Order approving the plan? 9 10 Oh, sorry, Judge. JUDGE WALLACE: I do want to acknowledge the 11 12 herculean effort of Steve Hickey in helping me with 13 this Order. 14 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Very good. I appreciate you 15 doing that. Thank you. 16 So are there any objections to 17 entering the Order approving the plan? 18 (No response.) 19 Hearing none, the Order is entered. 20 Turning now to Natural Gas, Items G-1 21 and G-2 can be taken together. These items concern 22 proposed modifications by Peoples and North Shore Gas

1 to change the audit due date in the Rider EEP tariffs. Staff recommends granting the companies' 2 request by not suspending the filing. 3 4 Is there any discussion? 5 (No response.) Any objections? 6 (No response.) 7 8 Hearing none, the filings will not be suspended. 9 10 Item G-3 concerns a filing by 11 MidAmerican seeking modification of its tariffs 12 covering disconnection of gas service for non-payment 13 for veterans and active military personnel. Staff 14 recommends granting the company's request by not 15 suspending the filing. 16 Is there any discussion? 17 (No response.) 18 Any objections? 19 (No response.) 20 Hearing none, the filing will not be 21 suspended. 22 Item G-4 is Docket Number 11-0082.

1 This is Cassandra Rodriguez's complaint against Just 2 Energy. ALJ Benn recommends entry of an Order dismissing this matter for want of prosecution. 3 4 Is there any discussion? 5 I actually will make a motion to deny 6 the Motion to Dismiss in just a moment. In looking at this case, the complainant had actually filed a 7 Brief on Exceptions. It is clear that, not only 8 taking that extra step, but wants to continue with 9 10 the prosecution of the case. The tenor of the company's response also in their brief talked about 11 12 the likelihood of prevailing on the merits and seemed 13 to advance an argument that said, because the contract said what it did, it really didn't matter 14 15 any of the other communications that were involved, 16 which I don't really subscribe to that argument. Ι 17 believe there is at least one that needs to be fleshed out a little bit more. 18 19 So I think that this case, because 20 even though it was without prejudice and the complainant could refile, since it's already been 21 22 filed and it is already on the record, I think it

1 would be better in this case if the motion were 2 denied and the case just moved forward. So I would move to deny the Motion to 3 4 Dismiss. Is there a second? 5 ACTING COMMISSIONER COLGAN: I will second. COMMISSIONER O'CONNELL-DIAZ: Chairman? 6 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Yes. 7 Commissioner O'Connell-Diaz? 8 9 COMMISSIONER O'CONNELL-DIAZ: Yeah, I too 10 have -- I saw your position on this and looked at all 11 of the relevant filings in this case. And I am 12 usually not someone that takes lightly the amount of time that our Commission and our Staff spends on a 13 14 case once it is filed here. When parties bring their 15 cases to the Commission, it is incumbent upon them to 16 prosecute that case. But I do understand that things 17 happen in people's lives and it seems that the complainant herein had some extraordinary 18 19 difficulties during the pendency of this case, and so 20 I would be in agreement with your proposal to allow 21 the case to proceed. 22 With that said, I would stress to the

1 complainant that she is getting another bite at the 2 apple for full hearing and she needs to, you know, follow the notices that go out from our Clerk's 3 4 office as well as, if she is unable to make a date, 5 then she should contact the appropriate offices to, you know, set another date over as opposed to people 6 coming here and not having anyone show up. 7 It costs the State a lot of money. That's what we are here 8 for, but when they set dates, they should mean 9 10 something. 11 So with that caveat I would be in agreement to support your position. 12 13 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Is there further discussion? (No response.) 14 15 It's been moved and seconded to deny 16 the Motion to Dismiss. 17 All in favor say aye. 18 COMMISSIONERS: Aye. 19 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Any opposed? 20 (No response.) 21 The vote is five to nothing, and the Motion to Dismiss is denied. 22

1	Item G-5 is Docket Number 11-0252.
2	This is Nicor's application for a waiver of 49 CFR
3	Sections 192.53(c), 192.92, 192.123 and 192.619(a)
4	related to the installation of reinforced thermal
5	plastic pipeline for a project near Ottawa, Illinois.
6	ALJ Kimbrel recommends entry of an Order approving
7	the amended application and granting the waiver.
8	Is there any discussion?
9	(No response.)
10	Any objections?
11	(No response.)
12	Hearing none, the Order is entered.
13	Item G-6 is Docket Numbers 11-0280 and
14	11-0281 Consolidated. This is North Shore Gas and
15	Peoples Gas rate case. We will be entering the Final
16	Order on this matter at a later date, so we will hold
17	this matter for disposition to a future Commission
18	proceeding.
19	Item G-7 is Docket Numbers 11-0301 and
20	11-0302 Consolidated. This matter is the North Shore
21	Gas and Peoples Gas' reconciliation case related to
22	charges collected under the utilities' Rider VBA in

1 2010. ALJ Benn recommends entry of an Order 2 approving the reconciliation. 3 Is there any discussion? 4 (No response.) 5 Any objections? 6 (No response.) Hearing none, the Order is entered. 7 Item G-8 is Docket Number 11-0734. 8 This is Vista Energy Marketing's application for a 9 10 Certificate to Operate as an Alternative Gas 11 Supplier. ALJ Wallace recommends entry of an Order 12 granting the requested Certificate. 13 Is there any discussion? 14 (No response.) 15 Any objections? 16 (No response.) 17 Hearing none, the Order is entered, and the Certificate is granted. 18 19 Moving now to Telecommunications, Item T-1 is Docket Number 11-0586. 20 This is 21 Skybeam-Essex's application for a Certificate of 22 Local and Interexchange Authority to operate as a

1 reseller and facilities-based carrier in Illinois. 2 The company has moved to withdraw its application, and ALJ Benn recommends granting the withdrawal. 3 4 Is there any discussion? 5 (No response.) 6 Any objections? 7 (No response.) 8 Hearing none, the application is withdrawn. 9 10 Item T-2 is Docket Number 11-0612. 11 This is Covad Communication's application for 12 Certificates of Service Authority to provide 13 facilities-based interexchange services, resold, 14 local and interexchange services and facilities-based 15 local exchange services in Illinois. ALJ Benn 16 recommends entry of an Order granting the requested 17 Certificates. 18 Is there any discussion? 19 (No response.) Any objections? 20 21 (No response.) 22 Hearing none, the Order is entered,

1 and the Certificates are granted.

Item T-3 is Docket Number 11-0647. 2 This is First Cellular of Southern Illinois' petition 3 4 for cancellation of its Certificate of Service 5 Authority previously granted in Docket Number 90-0373. ALJ Benn recommends entry of an Order 6 granting the cancellation. 7 8 Is there any discussion? 9 (No response.) 10 Any objections? 11 (No response.) 12 Hearing none, the Order is entered, 13 and the Certificate is cancelled. 14 Item T-4 is Docket Number 10-0695. 15 This is a citation proceeding against CMC Telecom 16 concerning whether the company possesses the 17 requisite managerial resources and whether penalties should be assessed for its failure to comply with 18 19 reporting requirements. ALJ Benn recommends entry of 20 an Order fining the company \$2500 and revoking its 21 Certificate of Service Authority. 22 Is there any discussion?

1	(No response.)
2	Any objections?
3	(No response.)
4	Hearing none, the Order is entered,
5	and the company's Certificate is revoked.
6	Under Miscellaneous items we have got
7	resolutions expressing support and appreciation for
8	David Gilbert and John Hendrickson. We will address
9	those in just a couple of moments at the conclusion
10	of the Open Session.
11	Moving on, Item M-3 (11-0793), this
12	concerns the rate of interest to be paid by utilities
13	and telecommunication carriers on customer deposits
14	under Title 83 Sections 280.70 and 735.120 of the
15	Administrative Code. Staff recommends entry of an
16	Order setting the interest rate in accordance with
17	the governing rules.
18	Is there any discussion?
19	(No response.)
20	Any objections?
21	(No response.)
22	Hearing none, the Order is entered.

1 We have one Petition for Rehearing Item PR-1 is Docket Numbers 11-0059, 11-0141 2 today. and 11-0142 Consolidated. This is the rate case for 3 4 Great Northern Utilities, Camelot Utilities and Lake 5 Holiday Utilities Corporation. We have received Petitions for Rehearing in this case from the Camelot 6 Homeowners Association and from the Attorney General, 7 8 and ALJ Teague recommends denying all requests for 9 rehearing. 10 I have some topics I would like to 11 propose for rehearing, but I know Commissioner Colgan 12 _ _ 13 COMMISSIONER O'CONNELL-DIAZ: Mr. Chairman, before you go there could we have a briefing by Judge 14 15 Teague relative to the memo she has presented to the 16 Commission? 17 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Sure. JUDGE TEAGUE: Sure. Two Petitions for 18 Rehearing were filed, one by Camelot Homeowners 19 20 Association and the other by the Attorney General. 21 The deadline for Commission action is December 27 for 22 the Association's petition and December 28 for the

1 Attorney General's.

With respect to the Association's 2 application for rehearing, they present essentially 3 4 three arguments for rehearing. The first is that 5 there has been a recent announcement stating that the parent -- the owners of the parent for the company 6 Utilities, Inc., is exploring the possibility of 7 selling Utilities, Inc., and so the Association's 8 argument is that this announcement demonstrates the 9 10 company filed its rate case when it did officially as part of a marketing strategy to increase the price 11 12 for the potential buyers of the company. 13 And the memo essentially says this 14 argument is irrelevant. As the Order finds, the 15 company -- the record supports the fact that the companies could not recover their costs of service 16 17 under the current rates and that the rates that were approved were necessary for the companies to recover 18 19 their costs. 20 The Association also argues that, in light of this new information, the Commission should 21

22 reconsider the decision regarding rate shock and

gradualism. Again, they basically state the same arguments that they stated before. They didn't really present anything new. And they argue the same issues regarding water quality. They don't present any new evidence about water quality.

The Attorney General's application for 6 rehearing, they present arguments for rehearing based 7 on rate shock, rate of return, rate -- the rate base 8 and allocation factor corrections. All of these 9 10 arguments are the same arguments they presented in the initial case. They don't present any new 11 12 evidence on those topics. And then they also include an argument regarding the possible sale of Utilities, 13 Inc., stating that, given this new information, the 14 15 Commission should grant rehearing to investigate the 16 effects of the potential sale on the investments made 17 by the companies and the rates requested.

18 The memo also -- you know, I state 19 that this argument lacks merit because the evidence 20 supports the approved rates for the reasons stated 21 above for the Association and the record also 22 supports the capital investments that were made.

COMMISSIONER O'CONNELL-DIAZ: Thank you.
 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Commissioner Colgan?
 ACTING COMMISSIONER COLGAN: Yes, thank you,
 Mr. Chairman.

5 I hear those arguments and I pretty much agree with it, if there is no new evidence. 6 But as I discussed and I think all of us discussed during 7 this as we entered this Final Order, we talked about 8 how the company had waited so long, I believe it was 9 10 18 years, to file a rate case and they didn't take advantage of the simplified rate case procedures that 11 12 they might have in one of these cases and I think 13 that resulted in extremely high rate increases for 14 the ratepayers. And all of the parties in this 15 proceeding acknowledged either that there were very 16 large rate increases or rate shock was going to 17 result from these large increases.

So I remain concerned that, despite
the acknowledgment of rate shock in this proceeding,
no party suggested any solution whatsoever to
mitigate the effect of these enormous bill increases.
And as a result, I am going to recommend that we

1 grant rehearing in this proceeding on the issue of 2 rate shock mitigation. I think in this way the 3 Commission can be provided with record evidence that 4 we can use to base a decision regarding whether or 5 not the affected consumers should be spared the 6 immediate huge increases.

Also, I want to say that I am in no way suggesting that rates previously approved by the Commission be reopened or re-examined. I am only suggesting that the parties provide the Commission with viable options with which to alleviate the resulting rate shock.

13 So with that, Mr. Chairman and Fellow 14 Commissioners, I recommend that the Commission grant 15 rehearing on this issue of rate shock mitigation, and 16 I ask for your support.

17 COMMISSIONER FORD: I certainly agree with 18 that, John. Because after listening to the testimony 19 and realizing that there were no new evidence, I 20 understand the fact that I did hear from -- look at 21 the record that said that it was because it would 22 have been so costly if they had come in earlier. But

I can certainly agree with you on the rate mitigation
 piece.

3 COMMISSIONER O'CONNELL-DIAZ: If I might, I 4 think in our initial discussions about this, when we 5 were entering the Order the Commission entered, rate 6 mitigation was an item I think I might have brought 7 up.

With that said, you know, the 8 Commission, I don't think, has the authority to order 9 10 a company to come in with a rate mitigation plan. But since the issue has come up in the rehearing 11 12 request and additionally this was danced around a 13 little bit, I think, in the record of the case itself 14 and I thought it should have been explored more 15 thoroughly by the parties and, you know, getting the 16 company to, you know, file something in the case in 17 chief, which we did not see. So our record is bereft of any information relative to what a rate mitigation 18 plan might look like. 19

20 Obviously, there are costs involved 21 with that. The Order stands as it is, and there is a 22 rate increase that is going to occur. The question

is how will that be achieved on a going-forward
 basis. And there is nothing in the record for us to
 look at with regard to that.

So as Commissioner Colgan has succinctly stated, it is appropriate for us to look at that and, you know, figure out potentially a manner that this rate increase could be smoothed so the pocketbooks of the ratepayers are -- they will be damaged, but at a less astounding speed.

10 So I look forward to seeing what has 11 been filed in the rehearing process and in support of 12 Commissioner Colgan's request for this.

13 COMMISSIONER ELLIOTT: Yeah, and I will chime 14 in as well. I think we all spent a great deal of 15 time in the oral argument in this case searching for 16 something with regard to record evidence and 17 mitigation strategies to try and deal with this. So 18 I would also support the rehearing on this issue.

19 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: You made that in the form of a 20 motion?

ACTING COMMISSIONER COLGAN: It's a motion.
 COMMISSIONER ELLIOTT: I will second that

1 motion.

CHAIRMAN SCOTT: It's been moved and seconded. 2 Is there any further discussion on 3 4 this topic? 5 (No response.) 6 All in favor say aye. COMMISSIONERS: 7 Aye. 8 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Any opposed? (No response.) 9 10 The vote is five to nothing, and rehearing will be had in this matter on mitigation 11 12 strategies to alleviate rate shock as a result of the 13 adopted rates. 14 I also had, and it goes along with the theme that Commissioner O'Connell-Diaz talked about 15 16 and Commissioner Colgan talked about as well, this idea that there are issues that were not fully 17 developed in the case. And we also spent a lot of 18 19 time at oral argument talking about the water quality 20 issue, for example, and made a request of the 21 Illinois EPA to follow up on the issue of whether or 22 not they met the drinking water standards that are

1 available to us.

But the issue of water quality 2 actually went far beyond that, and I liken it to an 3 4 electric utility because the affidavits and the 5 testimony that we had in the case were that they could only use the water that was being provided for 6 a small number of the services for which people 7 8 traditionally purchase water and that they were purchasing water. They could not drink it. 9 They 10 could not give it to their pets. They couldn't wash clothes in it, which to me kind of gets at the heart 11 of what we are doing as a Commission and what a 12 13 public utility service is supposed to be. It is kind 14 of like if you had electric service but it only 15 powered, you know, five of the things in your home and didn't provide heat or whatever else it was 16 17 supposed to provide. And I think there is specifically under Section 8-102 of the Public 18 19 Utilities Act, I think that the responsibility to 20 provide that service puts that squarely in our lap. 21 So I have three things I would like to 22 First is the water quality issue for propose.

1 Camelot Utility residents only. That's where it was raised in the case for rehearing. And hope that 2 the rehearing would flesh out some of the, to me, 3 4 disturbing issues that we only received a small 5 window into through customer affidavits in the case. Additionally, I would also like to see 6 rehearing issues on the 100,000 gallon storage tank 7 for Camelot and its inclusion in the rate base and 8 the Camelot Estates water system study and its 9 10 inclusion as an operating expense. I think in both those issues I don't believe the record was very 11 12 close regarding whether cost recovery should have 13 been borne by Camelot Utility ratepayers. 14 And hopefully through rehearing we can 15 get a much better sense of whether there is a 16 sufficient level of certainty surrounding both the 17 cost and the fate of that storage tank because at the time, if you recall, the evidence was at the time 18 that they had not received a permit from the Illinois 19 20 EPA to construct it and also that the study which 21 attributed -- while the testimony attributed certain 22 benefits to doing this study which was done initially

to bring on another subdivision into the water service. But when that didn't happen, other benefits were attributed to that and the customers were left paying for the entire cost of that study. I think they were addressed in passing in the case and I believe rehearing would allow us to make a much more informed decision on them.

8 And so for all three of those issues, 9 the water quality and the inclusion of the 100,000 10 gallon storage tank in the rate base and the water 11 system study in its operating expense, I would make a 12 motion that we grant rehearing on those topics as 13 well.

14 Is there a second? 15 (No response.) 16 Seeing no second, the motion dies. 17 Additionally, we have one other issue that we need to take up then because we have granted 18 19 rehearing on Commissioner Colgan's motion. We should 20 probably formally deny the remainder of the topics 21 that were proposed in the parties' Petitions for 22 Rehearing.

1 Any objections to denying the remainder of the Association's and the Attorney 2 General's issues on Petition for Rehearing? 3 4 (No response.) 5 Hearing none, insofar as those 6 petitions are inconsistent with the topic on which we have already granted rehearing, those Petitions for 7 Rehearing are denied. 8 9 We will address one other item of 10 business before moving on to the two remaining resolutions that we have. This item concerns 11 12 solicitation of public comment on a plan to foster 13 coordination of energy efficiency activities between 14 our electric and gas utilities. Staff has put 15 together a plan for coordination and recommends 16 approving making this plan available for public 17 comment through March 30, 2012. 18 Is there any discussion? 19 (No response.) 20 Any objections? 21 (No response.) 22 Hearing none, the plan will be made

1

available for the public comment period.

And with that we will now move on to 2 our resolutions. We will start with what was noticed 3 4 as Item M-1 (11-0791) on our public utility agenda, a 5 resolution acknowledging and expressing our 6 appreciation for Judge David Gilbert, given his upcoming retirement. 7 Is Judge Gilbert there? 8 9 COMMISSIONER FORD: Yes, he is. 10 COMMISSIONER ELLIOTT: Where is he? Get him on 11 camera. 12 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: You have got to get into 13 camera view there. 14 JUDGE GILBERT: I am waiting for my close-up. 15 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: I am not sure how to work this 16 thing, so I don't know if we could zoom in that 17 close. 18 I have a resolution that I would like to read, Judge. It reads: 19 "WHEREAS, on August 3, 1998, David G. Gilbert 20 21 began his career at the Illinois Commerce Commission 22 in the Administrative Law Judge Division and

1 continued to serve for 13 years;

2	WHEREAS, throughout Judge Gilbert's years with
3	the Commission he has been an invaluable member of
4	the Administrative Law Judge Division providing
5	leadership, experience and an example of
6	professionalism for others to emulate, Judge Gilbert
7	has remained on course throughout his years of
8	service undeterred and true to his objective to
9	represent the Commission; and
10	WHEREAS, Judge Gilbert has served the utility
11	customers of Illinois well and has in the course of
12	doing so earned the respect and admiration of his
13	colleagues at the Commission, the utility
14	representatives and consumer advocates based upon his
15	skill, diligence and good natured professional
16	courtesy; and
17	WHEREAS, it is well known in the Administrative
18	Law Judge Division and throughout the Illinois
19	Commerce Commission that Judge Gilbert possesses
20	excellent writing skills and superb analytical
21	ability;
22	THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Illinois

1 Commerce Commission hereby acknowledges David J. Gilbert's 13 years of public service during his 2 employment with the Illinois Commerce Commission and 3 4 expresses its deep appreciation for his public 5 service and dedication upon his retirement." Commissioners, any further comments? 6 Start in Chicago this time 7 8 COMMISSIONER FORD: Certainly. I have only known Dave since 2003 but he has certainly been an 9 10 astute ALJ. I am not sure I comprehended all of your 11 Order. 12 I am not sure I did, either. JUDGE GILBERT: 13 COMMISSIONER FORD: But it has certainly been a delight working with you, Mr. Gilbert, and I look 14 15 forward to hearing from you in the future at the 16 Commission. COMMISSIONER O'CONNELL-DIAZ: Well, I have 17 known Dave since he came to the Commission. We had 18 19 the opportunity to work together. And I was aware of 20 your former life, not the movie part but the other work that you did for the State, so I knew he came in 21

22 knowing a lot about public utility regulation and was

1 certainly not disappointed in that knowledge base. I will say that you have been the 2 person that reviewed all the Orders that went out of 3 4 the ALJ Division. Judge Gilbert's Orders were always 5 -- they were excellent, lots of footnotes, thoroughly gone through, worried about. I would see Dave pacing 6 back trying to figure out a difficult issue, but 7 always were a credit to the ALJ Division and the 8 Commission in general. 9 10 So I continue looking at your Orders 11 every time they are up and we will miss your 12 professionalism, and I just can't believe you are 13 retiring. 14 COMMISSIONER FORD: Such a young man. 15 COMMISSIONER O'CONNELL-DIAZ: Yes. And I know 16 that you have a lot of activities with your play 17 writing and cinematography and all the things that you do that are really interesting and your two young 18 19 boys that are probably the most interesting things. 20 So we really wish you well and I am sure we will see 21 you around and give you the best of fortune in the 22 future.

1 JUDGE GILBERT: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Commissioner Elliott? 2 COMMISSIONER ELLIOTT: Well, Dave, I just want 3 4 to wish you the best of luck, continued success, I 5 know, with your photography and writing. And I am 6 sure I will see you at the poker table as time goes I look forward to that. And just best wishes 7 on. 8 and good luck. 9 Thank you, Commissioner, and I JUDGE GILBERT: 10 look forward to going all in against you some day. COMMISSIONER ELLIOTT: 11 There you go. ACTING COMMISSIONER COLGAN: Well, I won't try 12 13 to elaborate further on some things that have already been said. I have appreciated you in the Orders that 14 15 I have seen come by with your name on them, and I 16 just want to wish you the very best in retirement and 17 I hope you are looking forward to that and that there is something you are going to there that you are 18 19 going to be able to enjoy those years with. So best of wishes to you. 20

JUDGE GILBERT: Thank you, Commissioner.
 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: And, Judge, the only thing I

1 will add, just in the short time I have been here I
2 have gotten to know you, and enjoyed that and enjoyed
3 the couple of longer conversations we have had and
4 hopefully we will have a chance to do that again in
5 the future.

And just pass on to you that, in talking to other people about you, the words that came up all the time were courtesy, professional and thorough, all of which I think all of us appreciate very much and I know the people that come before the Commission appreciate that very much.

So I will add my best wishes and good luck to you in whatever you choose to do in the future. And please, if you would, say a couple words.

JUDGE GILBERT: I will thank you, Mr. Chairman,
first of all for those comments.

I thought about what might be worth hearing from me and I kind of drew a blank. I guess the only thing I would say is that, you know, never has someone done so much for so many for so long. Other than that I have nothing to say about myself.

1 COMMISSIONER ELLIOTT: It's good to be humble. 2 JUDGE GILBERT: As you probably know, I will be going down to Quantanamo and doing some military 3 4 tribunals which I always hoped to be doing as a kid. 5 No. 6 COMMISSIONER O'CONNELL-DIAZ: It's good you have your Army greatcoat. 7 JUDGE GILBERT: Yes, I do. I have the Army 8 coat, yes. 9 10 Actually, I could use some advice from 11 folks. Let me go with that. I was talking to a 12 friend over the weekend and saying, now that I have 13 all this time available, and I really will have all 14 this time available. I am not hiding any balls, I am 15 not being coy here. I really want to do the things that some of the Commissioners have mentioned. 16 Ι 17 really want to advance with the photography and hopefully the theatrical work. 18 19 Do you go wide with your time or do 20 you go deep? Do you go to the bucket list and try to 21 do all of those things you said someday I am going to 22 try at least once or do you sort of plunge down into

1 one or two things that you really like to get good I am not sure yet. Haven't worked that out. 2 at. So if anyone has any advice, please, an e-mail or a 3 4 phone call; I would love to hear from you. Certainly a lot of people in this room 5 I have known for a long time, in some cases over 20 6 I will miss a lot of folks and I hope this 7 vears. will not be the last time that I will get to talk to 8 you or hear from you. 9 10 So thanks very much. 11 Thanks, Judge. CHAIRMAN SCOTT: We also have what was noticed as M-2 12 13 (11-0792) on today's Public Utility agenda. This is a resolution acknowledging and expressing our 14 15 appreciation for John Hendrickson of our Rates 16 Department in light of his upcoming retirement. 17 You get the hot seat there, John. 18 The benefit of going last is you know 19 the pattern now. So you know I get to read a It reads: 20 resolution first here. 21 "By the Commission: 22 WHEREAS, John Hendrickson joined the Illinois

1 Commerce Commission on October 1, 1998, as a rate 2 analyst in the Rates Department; and WHEREAS, John brings to the ICC years of 3 4 experience in regulatory rate issues from the 5 electric utility side; and WHEREAS, John's broad experience and considerable 6 educational credentials made him an expert witness 7 who provided valuable testimony recommendations to 8 the Commission in scores of rate cases; and 9 10 WHEREAS, John's ability to lead people was recognized almost immediately by his supervisors and 11 12 he was appointed to the position of manager of the 13 ICC's Rates Department in January 1, 2000; and 14 WHEREAS, John provided technical leadership on 15 rate design, cost of service studies and myriad 16 tariff issues both for the Rates Department and his 17 colleagues in the agency; and WHEREAS, John worked superbly with others in 18 19 identifying solutions to often difficult regulatory 20 issues and used excellent judgment to develop 21 practical recommendations for the Commission; and

22 WHEREAS, John always demonstrated extreme

1 patience in explaining complex ratemaking issues to Commissioners, Executive Directors, Administrative 2 Law Judges and Staff; and 3 4 WHEREAS, John's regulatory expertise was shared 5 during trips to Kazakhastan on behalf of the National 6 Association of Regulatory Utility Commissioners and the U.S. Agency for International Development in 7 August 2000 and February 2002; 8 9 THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Illinois 10 Commerce Commission commends John Hendrickson for a 11 job well done, extends its sincere appreciation for 12 his regulatory efforts on behalf of the people of 13 Illinois, and offers its best wishes for the future." 14 Congratulations. 15 Commissioner? 16 COMMISSIONER ELLIOTT: Well, John, I have known 17 you since you got there. You have done a terrific I know we have had our arguments over issues 18 iob. 19 and policies, but you have demonstrated extreme 20 patience and great knowledge. And it's a difficult 21 task trying to slice the pie. It's one of the 22 hottest issues time after time in rate cases as we go

forward. And to have your patience and years of
 experience has been an enormous benefit, and
 appreciated.

4 MR. HENDRICKSON: Thank you.

5 ACTING COMMISSIONER COLGAN: I echo that. You 6 come with a depth of experience and I am sure there's going to be a lot that it is going to be hard to 7 8 replace as you depart. But as I have said to the 9 other people, you know, I am hoping that you are 10 going to something more than away from something. 11 COMMISSIONER ELLIOTT: A golf course. 12 ACTING COMMISSIONER COLGAN: And I hope that 13 you enjoy yourself out there, and you have certainly earned the right to have a good long retirement. 14 15 So best wishes to you. 16 MR. HENDRICKSON: Thank you. 17 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Commissioners? COMMISSIONER O'CONNELL-DIAZ: Well, you know, I 18 19 have had John in hearings. I have read his 20 testimony. You know, I have seen him maneuver through cases, and I say that in an appropriate way, 21 22 and also on the Commissioner side, you know,

assisting the Commissioners as a Staff expert for us.
 So it is hard when you have somebody that has that
 vast amount of knowledge that we can depend on and,
 you know, we want to keep you here. But we know that
 you have bigger things to do outside of the
 Commission.

But I can say that you are very 7 8 fortunate being in our Springfield office because I know that there is a collegiality in that office. 9 Ι 10 mean, not that we don't have that in Chicago, but it just seems to be more magnified down there. And that 11 12 once you are there and you leave and go do something 13 else, there is different social events, there is golf outings, all different things that I know former 14 15 colleagues of mine that were at the Commission still 16 participate in and see their friends from their 17 Commission days on a regular basis. So I am sure you will be able to find your way to that group and so it 18 19 really probably is not going to be so horrible. You 20 won't have to be doing rate cases and all those nasty 21 things we do at the Commission.

22 But I wish you the best and thank you

1 so much for your years of service and your 2 dependability in the important work that you have done at the Commission and for the state of Illinois 3 4 and all the ratepayers here. So thank you very much, 5 John, and I wish you the best. 6 MR. HENDRICKSON: Thank vou. COMMISSIONER FORD: I would like to echo what 7 my fellow Commissioners have said, John, about you. 8 9 And there is life after retirement; I plan to follow 10 you very soon. 11 MR. HENDRICKSON: Thank you. 12 COMMISSIONER FORD: Thank you. Have a great 13 one. 14 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: John, would you like to --15 MR. HENDRICKSON: Yeah, I would like to say 16 that I have been in this seat when it truly was hot. 17 It is not hot today. Thank you for those kind words. I would like to express appreciation to everybody for 18 their support over the years, especially from the 19 20 people in the Financial Analysis Division. I have 21 worked with them on a daily basis. They have always

22 been good to me and support and help in trying to

1 resolve issues and get things done.

2	Other than that, I don't have any
3	particular plans at this point for my retirement. I
4	think we probably all look at at least two things,
5	one how is our health and is it time to enjoy that.
6	My wife and I both have our health. The second thing
7	you look at is will you have enough money. All you
8	can do is hope.
9	CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Don't get in Sherman's poker
10	game.
11	MR. HENDRICKSON: I won't. But I thank for
12	everything. It's been an enjoyable 13 plus years, 25
13	before that at the utility, so 38 years career. Kind
14	of by accident getting into the utility business, but
15	it's been good. I have enjoyed it. These 13 years
16	have gone faster than I ever expected, but I am
17	looking forward to moving to the next chapter.
18	Thank you.
19	CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Thank you.
20	I think it says a lot about how many
21	people wanted to be down here and wish you the best.
22	And I wish we had a bigger room; we needed it. But

1 that speaks a lot of you and how well you are thought 2 of around -- not just outside the building but inside 3 the building as well.

4 MR. HENDRICKSON: Thank you. A lot of good
5 friendships.

6 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Thank you.

7 COMMISSIONER ELLIOTT: Thanks, John.

8 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: We don't get to vote on 9 whether or not to accept their retirements because 10 that vote would probably turn out very differently. 11 But we do need a motion to adopt all three of the 12 resolutions that we have awarded today. 13 ACTING COMMISSIONER COLGAN: So moved. 14 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Is there a second?

15 COMMISSIONER ELLIOTT: Second.

16 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: It's been moved and seconded.
 17 All in favor of the resolutions say

18 aye.

19 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

20 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Any opposed?

21 (No response.)

22 The vote is five to nothing; the

1 resolutions are adopted and again --

2	COMMISSIONER ELLIOTT: Just a note of the
3	tremendous resource lost. I think we have got more
4	of this than we do less, and I know that there are
5	Staff that are going to step in and do the work. But
6	it is something to acknowledge the thinning of the
7	work force and there is still a lot of work to do.
8	JUDGE WALLACE: Darn it.
9	CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Not to say we are very happy
10	for the individual involved, but a tremendous loss
11	for us. But we certainly wish them all the best and
12	thanks mostly.
13	Last up is one additional matter of
14	other business and that's a FERC item which we will
15	take in Closed Session.
16	Is there a motion to go into Closed
17	Session?
18	ACTING COMMISSIONER COLGAN: So moved.
19	CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Is there a second?
20	COMMISSIONER ELLIOTT: Second.
21	CHAIRMAN SCOTT: It's been moved and seconded.
22	All in favor say aye.

1	COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
2	CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Any opposed?
3	(No response.)
4	The vote is five to nothing, and we
5	will head into Closed Session. Please let me know
6	when you are ready in Chicago.
7	(Whereupon at this point
8	pages 58 - 72 of the

10	CHAIRMAN SCOTT: It's been moved and seconded.
11	All in favor say aye.
12	COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
13	CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Any opposed?
14	(No response.)
15	The vote is five to nothing, and the
16	Comments will be filed with FERC.
17	Judge Wallace, are there any other
18	matters to come before the Commission today?
19	JUDGE WALLACE: No, I believe that's it, Mr.
20	Chairman.
21	CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Thanks.
22	Everybody have safe and very happy

1	holidays, and we will see you soon.
2	This meeting stands adjourned.
