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Page 2 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Good morning, everyone. Under 1 the Open Meetings Act, I call the March 7, 2024 PUBLIC 2 3 UTILITY REGULAR OPEN MEETING to order. Commissioners Carrigan, McCabe, Reddick and 4 Paradis are with me in Springfield; We have a quorum. 5 There are no requests to speak today. 6 We'll move now to the public utilities agenda, 7 and start with electric items. 8 Item E-1 concerns a filing 9 by ComEd to revise its rider delivery service pricing 10 reconciliation, or rider DSPR. The revisions clarify 11 ComEd's ability to recover certain costs pursuant to 12 section 16-107.5(1)(3). The revisions also modify the 13 section of the rider titled Determination of the 14 delivery reconciliation amount. Staff recommends not 15 suspending the filing. 16 Are there any objections to not suspending the 17 filing? 18 (No verbal response) 19 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the filing is 20 21 not suspended. Item E-2 concerns a filing 22



Page 3 by mid American to revise its rider curtailment service 1 2 or rider CS. The revisions incorporate changes approved in MidAmerican Energy's efficiency plan. MidAmerican 3 Energy Efficiency Plan Docket 23-0600. Staff recommends 4 not suspending the filing. 5 Are there any objections to not suspending the 6 7 filing? (No verbal response) 8 9 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the filings are not suspended. 10 Items E-3 and E-4 concern 11 interim orders on scheduling and Docket 22- four, eight-12 6 and 23 55 consolidated and Docket 22 four eight seven 13 and 23 80 consolidated. These Dockets concern ComEd and 14 Ameren's petitions for approval of each company's multi-15 16 year integrated Grid Plan and multi-year Rate Plan. The interim order in each Docket directs ComEd and Ameren to 17 refile their Grid Plans in the existing consolidated 18 Dockets. 19 The interim order further directs the establishment 20 21 of a procedural schedule in each Docket that will allow the Commission to enter a final order in December 2024 22



Page 4 and to implement rates that will go into effect January 1 1, 2025, inclusive of a Grid Plan. 2 3 Are there any objections to approving the orders? (No verbal response) 4 5 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the orders are approved. 6 Items E-5 through E-7 concern 7 request by Ameren to approve the reconciliation of 8 revenues collected under its coal tar rider with actual 9 costs incurred during the 2022 reconciliation period. 10 The orders approve the reconciliations as set forth in 11 the appendices to the orders, finding that the costs 12 were reasonably and prudently incurred. 13 Are there any objections to considering these items 14 together and approving the orders? 15 16 (No verbal response) CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the orders are 17 18 approved. Item E-8 concerns a request by 19 Ameren to approve the reconciliation of revenues 20 collected under its electric uncollectible adjustment or 21 rider EUA and its gas uncollectible adjustment rider 22



Page 5 The reconciliation period covered the 2021 GUA. 1 2 calendar year. The order approves the reconciliations as set forth in the appendices to the order finding that 3 the costs were reasonably and prudently incurred. 4 Are there any objections to approving the order? 5 (No verbal response) 6 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the order is 7 approved. 8 Item E-9 concerns a 9 complaint against ComEd alleging meter and billing 10 issues. ComEd has filed a motion to dismiss in the 11 Docket. The order dismisses the complaint without 12 13 prejudice, finding that the complainant is not prepared to proceed with the matter at this time. 14 Are there any objections to approving the order 15 16 dismissing the complaint without prejudice? (No verbal response) 17 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the order is 18 approved and the complaint is dismissed without 19 prejudice. 20 Item E-10 concerns a 21 complaint against ComEd alleging that the company was 22



Page 6 responsible for an extreme power surge that damaged 1 2 complainant's property. Parties have filed a stipulated and joint motion to dismiss stating that all matters in 3 the Docket have been resolved. The ALJ recommends 4 granting the motion and dismissing the proceeding with 5 prejudice. 6 Are there any objections to granting the motion and 7 dismissing the matter with prejudice? 8 (No verbal response) 9 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the motion is 10 granted and the matter is dismissed with prejudice. 11 Items E-11 and E-12 concern 12 13 applications for licenses to operate as retail electric agents, brokers, and consultants in Illinois. The 14 orders grant the licenses, finding that the applicants 15 16 meet the requirements. Are there any objections to considering these items 17 together and approving the orders? 18 (No verbal response) 19 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, of the orders 20 21 are approved. 22 JUDGE KINGSLEY: Excuse me, Mr. Chairman.



Page 7 Item E-12 is a motion to withdraw. 1 2 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Okay. And the order would allow the motion to withdraw to be accepted? 3 JUDGE KINGSLEY: Yes. There's a recommending 4 5 that it be dismissed. CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Okay. So we'll do it this 6 7 way. Thank you very much. Item E-11 concerns an 8 application for a license to operate as a retail 9 electric agent, broker, and consultant in Illinois. The 10 order grants the license, finding that the applicant 11 meets the requirements. Are there any objections to 12 13 approving the order? (No verbal response) 14 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, that order is 15 16 approved. And item E-12 is a motion 17 for an application for a licensure of agent, broker, and 18 consultant under section 16-115 C of the Public 19 Utilities act. The applicant has filed a motion to 20 withdraw and the order would grant the motion to 21 withdraw; Is that correct, Judge Kingsley? 22



Page 8 JUDGE KINGSLEY: Yes, Mr. Chairman. 1 2 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Very good. Is there any objection to approving the order and 3 allowing the applicant to withdraw? 4 5 (No verbal response) CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the order is 6 approved. Thank you, Judge Teague Kingsley. Appreciate 7 it. 8 Item E-13 concerns an 9 application for certification to install, maintain, or 10 repair electric vehicle charging station facilities. 11 The order grants the certificate, finding that the 12 13 applicant meets the certification requirements. Are there any objections to approving the order? 14 (No verbal response) 15 16 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the order is approved. 17 Item E 14 concerns an 18 application for certification to install distributed 19 generation facility in Illinois. The order grants the 20 certificate finding that the applicant meets the 21 certification requirements. 22



Page 9 Are there any objections to approving the order? 1 2 (No verbal response) 3 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the order is approved. 4 5 Item E 15 concerns a request by a petitioner to cancel its certificate of 6 service authority as an alternative retail electric 7 supplier. The order cancels the certificate. 8 Are there any objections to approving the order? 9 (No verbal response) 10 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the order is 11 approved. 12 Items E-16 and E-17 concern 13 Dockets 23-0072 and 23-0073 which are ComEd and Ameren's 14 proposed facilitation of alternative retail electric 15 16 suppliers access to interval data. The Commission's investigations in these matters have not concluded. 17 Therefore, the orders re-suspend the proceedings to 18 allow the Commission to complete its investigations. 19 Are there any objections to hearing these items 20 together and approving the orders? 21 (No verbal response) 22



Page 10 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the orders are 1 2 approved. 3 Items E-18 and E-19 concern applications for certifications to install energy 4 efficiency measures in Illinois. The orders grant the 5 certificates, finding that the applicants meet the 6 requirements. 7 Are there any objections to considering these items 8 together and approving the orders? 9 (No verbal response) 10 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the orders are 11 approved. 12 13 Turning now to Gas items. Item G-1 concerns an order 14 initiating a proceeding to examine the future of natural 15 gas and issues associated with decarbonization of the 16 gas distribution system. The Commission's final orders 17 in Peoples, North Shore, Ameren, and Nicor's rate cases 18 approved on November 16, 2023, direct staff to present 19 an initiating order to the Commission within 90 days. 20 The order initiates a future of gas proceeding that will 21 include a two step workshop process. This process will 22



1 be moderated by a third party facilitator.

2 The first series of workshops will commence within 30 days of this order. The first series of workshops 3 will allow interested stakeholders to identify all 4 relevant topics related to the future of natural gas 5 distribution in Illinois. Stakeholders may also furnish 6 any relevant informational sources related to proposed 7 topics. Upon conclusion of the first series of 8 workshops, the facilitator will draft an initial report 9 that will identify the topics and information presented 10 by stakeholders. 11 Parties will have the opportunity to respond to the 12 13 first draft of the report, and the facilitator will incorporate feedback into a final draft produced by 14 August 1, 2024. This initial report will inform the 15 16 second series of workshops that will begin on September 1, 2024. In the second series of workshops, 17 stakeholders will examine the issues and information 18 identified in the initial report and develop positions 19 and perspectives relevant to these topics. 20 Stakeholders will assess identified issues through 21

22 short, medium, and long term horizons, identify areas of



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Page 12 consensus and areas of disagreement, propose legislative 1 2 and or regulatory solutions to individual topics, and make recommendations for Commission action where 3 relevant. Upon completion of the second series of 4 workshops, the facilitator will develop a first draft of 5 a final report that captures the discussions, 6 recommendations, and content of the second series of 7 workshops. 8 Stakeholders will have the opportunity to provide 9 comments to this report that the facilitator will 10 incorporate into a final public report for issues where 11 Commission action is recommended. In the report, 12 13 Commission staff will develop a draft initiating orders for the Commission to consider. 14 The Second series of workshops and facilitator 15 report should conclude by July 1, 2025. For both series 16 of workshops and associated reports, the Commission may 17 amend the time lines just described as it sees fit. The 18 order further directs all investor owned natural gas and 19 electric distribution utilities in Illinois to 20 participate in the proceeding and encourages all

21 participate in the proceeding and encourages all

22 municipal and rural electric cooperatives to participate



Page 13 as well. 1 2 Are there any objections to approving the order? 3 (No verbal response) CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the order is 4 approved. 5 Item G-2 concerns a 6 petition from Ameren to reconcile revenues under its 7 special purpose charge rider SPC for the reconciliation 8 period ending September 30, 2022. The order approves 9 the reconciliation as set forth in the appendices to the 10 order, finding that the costs were appropriately 11 reconciled. 12 13 Are there any objections to approving the order? CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the order is 14 approved. 15 16 Item G-3 concerns a consolidated request to reconcile revenues by North 17 Shore and People's Gas under their rider EOAs, which 18 recover costs for their energy efficiency and on bill 19 financing programs. The reconciliation period covered 20 the 2022 calendar year and adjustments that went into 21 effect for the nine month period beginning April 1, 22



Page 14 The order approves the reconciliations as set 2023. 1 2 forth in the appendices to the order, finding that the costs were appropriately reconciled. 3 Are there any objections to approving the order? 4 5 (No verbal response) CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the order is 6 7 approved. Item G-4 concerns 8 request by Liberty utilities to reconcile revenues under 9 its volume balancing adjustment or rider VBA for the 10 2022 calendar year. The order approves the 11 reconciliation as set forth in the appendices to the 12 13 order, finding that the costs were appropriately reconciled. 14 Are there any objections to approving the order? 15 16 (No verbal response) CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the order is 17 approved. 18 Item G-5 concerns 19 Consumers Gas company's proposed increase in rates for 20 gas distribution service. The Commission's 21 investigation into this matter has not concluded. 22 The



Page 15 order re-suspends the filing. 1 2 Are there any objections to approving the order? (No verbal response) 3 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the order is 4 5 approved. Items G-6 and G-7 concern 6 request for proprietary treatment of the petitioner's 2023 7 reports. The orders grant the protections, finding that 8 the information is highly proprietary and confidential. 9 Are there any objections to considering these items 10 11 together and approving the orders? (No verbal response) 12 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the orders are 13 approved. 14 Turning now to Telecommunications items. 15 16 Item T-1 concerns an application for a certificate to become a 17 telecommunications carrier in Illinois. The order 18 grants the certificate, finding that the applicant meets 19 20 the requirements. Are there any objections to approving the order? 21 (No verbal response) 2.2



Page 16 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the order is 1 2 approved. 3 Items T-2 and T-3 concern applications for certificates of wireless authority to 4 operate as a reseller of telecommunications services. 5 The orders grant the certificates, finding that the 6 applicants meet the requirements. 7 Are there any objections to considering these items 8 together and approving the orders? 9 (No verbal response) 10 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the orders are 11 approved. 12 Turning now to Other Business. 13 Items OB-1 and OB-2 concern 14 approval of batches, contracts, and confirmations under 15 16 the Illinois Solar for All program and the Illinois Adjustable Block Program. 17 Are there any objections to considering these items 18 together and to approving the program administrator's 19 submissions? 20 (No verbal response) 21 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the submissions 22
