Page 2 (WHEREUPON, proceedings were had 1 which were not recorded 2 3 stenographically.) CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Go right ahead. 4 Thank you very much. MS. UTSET: 5 My name is Julia Utset. It's spelled 6 7 U T S E T. I'm grateful for the chance to address you today about a subject that matters to me a lot. I lived 8 in Chicago for about 20 years, and I'm here today 9 regarding Peoples Gas's request for a rehearing. I 10 encourage the Commission to reject their request to 11 12 increase rates by an additional \$7.9 million. Peoples Gas should have to come back for its next rate case to 13 ask to raise rates for the work it is proposed in the 14 rehearing. 15 I also want to encourage the Commission to 16 keep the pipeline replacement program on pause. 17 The Commission did the right thing last fall when it paused 18 the troubled Peoples Gas pipe replacement program and 19 opened an investigation. Please stick by your pause and 20 investigation and don't allow Peoples Gas to restore 21 more than half of its 2024 program budget through this 22 rehearing. 23 24 I'm deeply concerned by the recently published



Page 3 report by the Building Decarbonization Coalition, which 1 found that by 2035, in the best-case scenario, 2 residential customers across the state can expect an 3 average increase of \$74 per month during the winter. 4 Given the enormous cost of maintaining the 5 pipeline system and the question of how useful the pipes 6 7 will be in a decarbonized future, as we addressed climate change, I think it's unwise to invest large sums 8 of money in infrastructure that's potentially bad for 9 our environment, our wallets, and our health. 10 Thank you. 11 12 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Thank you for your comments, 13 Ms. Utset. We appreciate it. This concludes our request to speak this 14 morning. We will start the day's meeting with the 15 transportation agenda beginning with our railroad items. 16 Items RR1 and RR2 concern public safety improvement 17 projects at railroad crossings in the cities of Marion 18 and Ashkum respectively. The orders accept the 19 stipulation agreements and improved project timelines. 20 Are there any objections to considering these 21 items together and approving the orders? 22 Hearing none, the orders are approved. 23 24 Moving on to motor carrier items, Item MC1



Page 4 concerns an application for renewal of a commercial 1 relocation towing license. The order grants the renewal 2 finding that the applicant meets the requirements. 3 Are there any objections to approving the 4 order? 5 Hearing none, the order is approved. 6 7 Item MC2 concerns an application for an operator employment permit. The ALJ recommends granting 8 the application and the order grants the permit. 9 Are there any objections to approving the 10 order? 11 12 Hearing none, the order is approved. Items MC3 and MC4 concern alleged violations 13 of the Illinois Commercial Transportation Law. 14 The parties in both cases have reached stipulated settlement 15 agreements and the orders accept the agreements. 16 Are there any objections to considering these 17 items together and approving the orders? 18 Hearing none, the orders are approved. 19 This concludes our transportation agenda. 20 We will now turn to our public utilities 21 agenda. There are edits to the April 18th, 2024, public 22 utilities regular open meeting minutes and the 23 24 April 18th, 2024, Bipartisan Infracture Law and



Page 5 Inflation Reduction Act policy session minutes. 1 Are there any objections to considering these 2 items together and approving the minutes as edited? 3 Hearing none, the minutes are approved as 4 edited. 5 Moving on to our electric items, item E1 6 7 concerns a petition by ComEd to modify its parallel operation of retail customer generating facilities rider 8 or rider POG to update the compensation required as 9 required by commission rules -- the compensation rate as 10 required by commission rules. Staff has reviewed the 11 12 filing and recommends not suspending. Are there any objections to not suspending the 13 filing? 14 Hearing none, the filing is not suspended. 15 16 Item E2 concerns a petition by Mount Caramel to modify its parallel generation service rider or 17 Rider D. Staff has reviewed the filing and recommends 18 not suspending. 19 Are there any objections to not suspending the 20 filing? 21 Hearing none, the filing is not suspended. 22 Item E3 concerns the Commission's 23 24 investigation into and the development of a renewable



Page 6 energy access plan pursuant to Section 8-512 of the 1 Public Utilities Act. The Commission will hold this 2 item for further disposition. 3 Items E4 and E5 concern applications seeking 4 certificates of authority to install, maintain, or 5 repair electric vehicle charging stations. The orders 6 7 grant the certificates. Are there any objections to considering these 8 items together and approving the orders? 9 Hearing none, the orders are approved. 10 Items E6 through E14 concern applications 11 12 seeking certificates of service authority to operate as installers of distributed generation facilities. The 13 orders grant the certificates. 14 Are there any objections to considering these 15 items together and approving the orders? 16 Hearing none, the orders are approved. 17 Item E15 concerns an application seeking 18 authority to operate as an agent, broker, or consultant. 19 The order grants the certificate. 20 Are there any objections to approving the 21 order? 22 Hearing none, the order is approved. 23 24 Item E16 concerns an application seeking a



Page 7 certificate of service authority to operate as an 1 alternative retail electric supplier. The applicant 2 requests a certificate of service authority under 3 Subpart C and Part 451 of the Public Utilities Act. The 4 5 applicant also requests to surrender its authority to operate as in areas under Subpart D of Part 451 of the 6 7 act. The order cancels and grants the applicant's area certificates accordingly. 8 Are there any objections to approving the 9 order? 10 Hearing none, the order is approved. 11 12 Items E17 through E24 concern applications seeking certificates of service authority to operate as 13 installers of energy efficiency measures. The orders 14 grant the certificates finding that the applicants meet 15 the requirements. 16 Are there any objections to considering these 17 items together and approving the orders? 18 Hearing none, the orders are approved. 19 Moving on to gas items. Item G1 concerns a 20 complaint against Peoples Gas alleging that low pressure 21 in the company's gas lines prevented the complainant's 22 property from being heated. The company made an oral 23 24 motion to dismiss the case with prejudice citing the



Page 8 complainant's lack of appearance in the matter. The ALJ 1 recognizes granting the motion to dismiss without 2 prejudice. 3 Are there any objections to granting the 4 motion to dismiss without prejudice? 5 Hearing none, the motion is granted and the 6 7 proceeding is dismissed without prejudice. Item G2 concerns a complaint against Nicor Gas 8 regarding billing issues. The parties filed a 9 stipulation in a joint motion to dismiss and requests 10 that the Commission dismiss the proceeding with 11 prejudice. 12 Are there any objections on granting the 13 motion and dismissing the proceeding with prejudice? 14 Hearing none, the motion is granted and the 15 proceeding is dismissed with prejudice. 16 Item G3 concerns a request for confidential 17 treatment of information in the petitioner's annual 18 report for a period of two years. The order grants the 19 protection finding that the information is highly 20 proprietary and confidential. 21 Are there any objections to approving the 22 order? 23 24 Hearing none, the order is approved.



1 Item G4 concerns a request to cancel a 2 certificate of service authority to operate as an 3 alternative gas supplier. The order cancels the 4 certificate finding that it will not deprive Illinois 5 residents of any necessary service and is not otherwise 6 contrary to the public interest.

7 Are there any objections to approving the 8 order?

9 Hearing none, the order is approved.

Item G5 concerns the complaint against Peoples 10 Gas in Chicago. The complaint alleges that the company 11 12 seeks an erroneous balance from the customer. The company asserts tampering at the customer's meter 13 resulted in the balance. The proposed order denies the 14 complaint finding that the company met its burden in 15 showing that tampering occurred. The customer benefited 16 from the tampering and that the company's billing 17 estimate is reasonable. 18

19 There are substantive edits to the order. The 20 edits find that the company met its burden of proof in 21 showing the meter was tampered with and that the 22 customer benefited from the tampering. However, the 23 company's timeline for determining the billing estimate 24 continuously from August 4, 2016 to March 7, 2022, is



1 not reasonable.

2 The company also proposes to use historical data to estimate usage despite the intermittency of 3 complainant's residence. The record does not establish 4 continuous service at the complainant's premises during 5 2016 to 2022 or identifies nonspeculative timeline for 6 7 when the tampering occurred. Therefore, the edits find the company's billing estimate is not reasonable. The 8 edits direct the company to remove any charges from the 9 complainant's bill associated with usage between 10 August 4, 2016, and March 7, 2022. They direct the 11 complainant to pay the fees associated with tampering. 12 And finally, the edits direct the Commission's 13 Safety and Reliability Division to examine whether the 14 company is complying with its mandatory safety 15 inspection requirements. I move the edits. 16 Is there a second? 17 COMMISSIONER PARADIS: Second. 18 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Second by Commissioner Paradis. 19 Are there any objections to approving the 20 edits? 21 Hearing none, the edits are approved. 22 Are there any objections to approving the 23 24 order as edited?



Page 11 Hearing none, the order as edited is approved. 1 Item G6 concerns two requests for oral 2 argument on rehearing in Docket 23-0068 and 23-0069 3 consolidated. This docket concerns Peoples Gas and 4 North Shore Gas's 2023 rate case rehearing. 5 The City of Chicago requests the Commission 6 7 grant oral argument and the rehearing on the following topics: Legal standard, rehearing scope, work in 8 progress, emergency work, and the company's revenue 9 requirement on rehearing. The Public Interest Research 10 Group requests oral argument on S&P work in progress, 11 12 emergency work, and the company's revenue requirement on rehearing. 13 The ALJ recommends granting the requests for 14 oral argument on rehearing. 15 Are there any objections to granting the 16 requests for oral argument on rehearing? 17 Hearing none, the requests for oral argument 18 on rehearing are granted and a due notice of oral 19 argument will be served on the parties shortly. 20 Moving on to telecommunications items, Item T1 21 concerns the request to withdraw a pending application 22 for designation as knowledgeable telecommunications 23 24 carrier. The applicant states it wishes to withdraw its



Page 12 application without prejudice to refile it another date. 1 ALJ recommends granting a motion to withdraw. 2 Is there any objection to granting the motion 3 to withdraw? 4 Hearing none, the motion to withdraw is 5 6 granted. 7 Item T2 concerns the petition requesting to cancel the petitioner's certificates of service 8 authority. The certificates allow the petitioner to 9 provide facilities-based local and resold interexchange 10 telecommunication services. The order cancels the 11 12 certificate. Are there any objections to approving the 13 order? 14 Hearing none, the order is approved. 15 16 Item T3 concerns the request for confidential treatment of information in the petitioner's annual 17 report. The order grants the protection, finding that 18 the information is highly proprietary and confidential. 19 Are there any objections to approving the 20 order? 21 Hearing none, the order is approved. 22 Moving on to water and sewer items. Item W1 23 24 concerns a filing by Illinois American Water Company to



Page 13 update its large user tariff to align with the rates 1 approved in Docket 22-0210. 2 The staff recommends not suspending the 3 4 filing. Are there any objections to not suspending the 5 filing? 6 7 Hearing none, the filing is not suspended. Item W2 concerns a filing from Illinois 8 American Water Company for a certificate of public 9 convenience in necessity under Section 8-406 of the 10 Public Utilities Act. Illinois American seeks to expand 11 12 its service area in Peoria County. The order grants the certificate. 13 Are there any objections to approving the 14 order? 15 16 Hearing none, the order is approved. Item W3 concerns a filing from Illinois 17 American Water for a certificate of public convenience 18 and necessity to provide wastewater collection service 19 to areas in Madison County and for the approval of the 20 purchase of assets of the Metro East Sanitary District. 21 Pursuant to Section 9-210.5 Sub C of the act, Illinois 22 American is seeking approval of engagement contracts 23 24 with appraisers to determine the fair market value of



Page 14 the system. The interim order approves the engagement 1 2 contracts. Are there any objections to approving the 3 interim order? 4 Hearing none, the interim order is approved. 5 Moving on to petitions for rehearing. 6 7 Item PR1 concerns a complaint against ComEd in Homewood, Illinois, alleging multiple power outages at the 8 customer's home harmed the customer financially. The 9 initial complaint was filed April 20th, 2023. The 10 Commission entered its final order on April 4th, 2024, 11 denying the complaint. The ALJ recommends denying the 12 petition for rehearing finding that the complainant did 13 not present any new evidence that would warrant 14 rehearing. 15 Are there any objections to denying the 16 petition for rehearing? 17 Hearing none, the petition is denied. 18 Before we continue, are there comments from 19 commissioners? Commissioner McCabe? 20 COMMISSIONER McCABE: Customers are often at a 21 disadvantage because of unfamiliarity with the Public 22 Utilities Act rate structures and complaint procedures. 23 24 Denying the complaint, the order states that given the



1 frequency of outages in Ms. Wilson's area, the 2 Commission is concerned the feeders and facilities in 3 her neighborhood are not providing the required 4 resilience in typical weather.

A quote from the order, the Commission 5 encourages ComEd to conduct a review of the facilities 6 7 that service Ms. Wilson's home to determine if any remedial measures are warranted. ComEd should 8 coordinate its review with the Commission's Safety and 9 Reliability Division to jointly inspect the facilities 10 servicing Ms. Wilson's neighborhood to ensure compliance 11 12 with the act and Commission rules. I hope this direction brings Ms. Wilson the needed resolution. 13 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: And I would also like to note that 14 the customer represented herself as we heard pro se in 15 this docket. Further, she improperly filed her petition 16 for rehearing with the clerk's office and parties in 17

18 this docket.

But to ensure that pro se complainants have the opportunity to be heard in dockets going forward, I encourage the ALJ's and Commission's staff to assist a pro se complainant where appropriate to correctly file petitions or motions with the Commission.

Turning to other business, Item 01 concerns



Page 16 approval of the submission of the nuclear 1 decommissioning funding assurance status report to the 2 Illinois General Assembly. The report contains a copy 3 of the status report for shutdown units as submitted by 4 the owner or operator of a nuclear power plant in this 5 state to the Nuclear Regulatory Commission and as 6 7 applicable to the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission. Are there any objections to approving the 8 submission of this year's nuclear decommissioning 9 funding assurance status report to the General Assembly? 10 Hearing none, the submission is approved. 11 12 Item 02 concerns the Illinois Power Agency's May 2024 solicitation of bids to sell zonal resource 13 credits to Ameren. 14 Are there any objections to approving the 15 16 procurement administrator's recommendations on selection of winning bids? 17 Hearing none, the program administrator's 18 recommendations are approved. 19 20 Items 03 and 04 concern approval of batches, contracts, and confirmations under the Illinois 21 Adjustable Block Program and the Illinois Solar for All 22 Program. 23 24 Are there any objections to considering these



Page 17 items together and to approving the program 1 administrator submissions? 2 Hearing none, the submissions are approved. 3 Item 05 concerns approval of the IPA's 4 proposed credit amount for the customer's self-direct 5 renewal portfolio standard compliance program pursuant 6 7 to the IPA's 2024 long-term renewable resources procurement plan. 8 Are there any objections to approving the 9 IPA's proposed credit amount? 10 Hearing none, the IPA's proposed credit amount 11 12 for the self-direct program is approved. This concludes our agenda. 13 Judge Teague Kingsley, do we have any other 14 matters to come before the Commission today? 15 16 JUDGE KINGSLEY: No, Mr. Chairman. CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Thank you. 17 Do the commissioners have other business to 18 discuss? 19 Before we adjourn this meeting, it's with deep 20 sadness that we inform you of the death of a former 21 colleague and friend, Regina Jeannie Goodwin, who passed 22 away on Tuesday April 30th. Jeannie worked for the ICC 23 24 right out of high school in 1968 and retired in 2002.

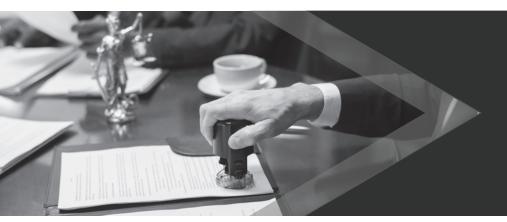
