1 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Good morning. Under the
2 Open Meetings Act, I call the June 29th, 2023, Regular
3 Open Meeting to order.

4 Commissioners Carrigan, McCabe, and Reddick
5 are with me in Springfield. We have a quorum.

6 (Whereupon, the Transportation Agenda was
7 held.)

8 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Moving on to the public
9 utilities agenda. There are edits to the June 1st
10 Regular Opening Meeting minutes.

11 Are there any objections to approving the
12 minutes as edited?

13 (No verbal response)

14 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the minutes
15 are approved as edited.

16 Moving on to our electric items.

17 Item E-1 concerns the initiation of
18 investigations into the value of and compensation for
19 distributed energy resources as required by Section
20 16-107.6(e) of the Public Utilities Act.

21 The order initiates the investigation and
22 accepts recommendations proposed by Commission staff
23 to give staff the authority to select and engage

1 experts or consultants to assist the investigation.
2 The order also accepts staff's recommendation to
3 convene two series of workshops with stakeholders.

4 Are there any objections to approving the
5 order?

6 (No verbal response)

7 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the order is
8 approved.

9 Item E-2 concerns an application for
10 certification to install distributed generation
11 facilities in Illinois. The order denies the
12 certificate finding that the applicant did not
13 demonstrate compliance with the requirements of
14 Section 16-128A of the Public Utilities Act.

15 Are there any objections to approving the
16 order?

17 (No verbal response)

18 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the order is
19 approved.

20 Items E-3 and E-4 concern applications for
21 certification to install distributed generation
22 facilities in Illinois. The orders grant those
23 certificates, finding that the applicants meet the

1 requirements.

2 Are there any objections to considering
3 these items together and approving the orders?

4 (No verbal response)

5 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the orders
6 are approved.

7 Items E-5 through E-7 concern citations for
8 failure to comply with Part 454 of the Commission
9 rules. The orders suspend respondents' certificates
10 of service authority to operate as agents, brokers,
11 and consultants.

12 Are there any objections to considering
13 these items together and approving the orders?

14 (No verbal response)

15 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the orders
16 are approved.

17 Item E-8 concerns an application for
18 certification to install, maintain, or repair electric
19 vehicle charging station facilities. The order grants
20 the certificate, finding that the applicant meets the
21 certification requirements.

22 Are there any objections to approving the
23 order?

1 (No verbal response)

2 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the order is
3 approved.

4 Item E-9 concerns a joint petition for
5 approval of release of 14 nonresidential customers
6 from Ameren to Eastern Illini Electric Cooperative.
7 The order grants the petition.

8 Are there any objections to approving the
9 order?

10 (No verbal response)

11 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the order is
12 approved.

13 Items E-10 through E-18 concern petitions to
14 cancel certificates of service authority to install
15 energy efficiency measures. The order cancels the
16 certificates.

17 Are there any objections to considering
18 these items together and approving the orders?

19 (No verbal response)

20 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the orders
21 are approved.

22 Items E-19 through E-27 concern applications
23 for certifications to install energy efficiency

1 measures in Illinois. The orders grant the
2 certificates, finding that the applicants meet the
3 requirements.

4 Are there any objections to considering
5 these items together and approving the orders?

6 (No verbal response)

7 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the orders
8 are approved.

9 Moving on to the gas items. Item G-1
10 concerns a complaint against Nicor in Cook County,
11 Illinois. The order denies the complaint for failure
12 to sustain burden of proof.

13 Are there any objections to approving the
14 order?

15 (No verbal response)

16 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the order is
17 approved.

18 Item G-2 concerns a filing by Liberty
19 Utilities seeking special permission to place a
20 revised tariff into effect on less than 45 days'
21 notice and without suspension. The company is seeking
22 to correct a mathematical error relating to
23 calculation of credits under its Volume Balancing

1 Adjustment Rider (Rider VBA). Commission Staff
2 recommends granting special permission.

3 Are there any objections to granting special
4 permission?

5 (No verbal response)

6 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, special
7 permission is granted.

8 Moving on to our telecommunications items.

9 Item T-1 concerns an application for
10 designation as an eligible telecommunications carrier
11 for the sole purpose of qualifying for Lifeline
12 support. The order grants the request finding that
13 the applicant has sufficiently demonstrated that it
14 satisfied the federal and state requirements for
15 designation as an ETC for the limited purpose of
16 receiving federal universal Lifeline support.

17 Are there any objections to approving the
18 order?

19 (No verbal response)

20 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the order is
21 approved.

22 Item T-2 concerns a proceeding initiated by
23 the Commission against the respondent for failure to

1 maintain the required managerial resources and
2 abilities. The respondent failed to show cause why
3 the Commission should not revoke its license or take
4 other action. The order revokes the certificate.

5 Are there any objections to approving the
6 order?

7 (No verbal response)

8 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the order is
9 approved.

10 Item T-3 concerns an application for a
11 certificate of wireless authority to operate as a
12 reseller of telecommunications services throughout
13 Illinois. The order grants the certificate finding
14 that the applicant meets the requirements.

15 Are there any objections to approving the
16 order?

17 (No verbal response)

18 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the order is
19 approved.

20 Moving on to water and sewer items.

21 Item W-1 concerns a complaint against
22 Illinois American Water in East St. Louis, Illinois.
23 The company has indicated that the complainant and

1 Illinois American's insurer have entered into a
2 settlement indicating that there is no longer a
3 dispute. The order dismisses the complaint.

4 Are there any objections to approving the
5 order?

6 (No verbal response)

7 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the order is
8 approved.

9 Item W-2 concerns a complaint against Aqua
10 Illinois in Bourbonnais, Illinois. The order
11 dismisses the complaint in part due to statute of
12 limitations and denies the complaint in part finding
13 that Aqua's billing in this matter is supported by the
14 record.

15 Are there any objections to approving the
16 order?

17 (No verbal response)

18 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the order is
19 approved.

20 Item W-3 concerns a complaint against
21 Illinois American Water in Peoria, Illinois. The
22 complainant failed to appear at the hearings in the
23 proceeding and did not otherwise request any

1 continuance of the proceeding. The order dismisses
2 the complaint without prejudice.

3 Are there any objections to approving the
4 order?

5 (No verbal response)

6 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the order is
7 approved.

8 Item W-4 concerns an application for
9 rehearing in Illinois American Water's 2022 rate case.
10 The order on rehearing reaffirms the final order's
11 conclusion to adopt staff's proposed rate design for
12 customer charges and finds that Illinois American's
13 compliance filing is consistent with the final order's
14 approval of cost-based rates.

15 Are there any objections to approving the
16 order?

17 (No verbal response)

18 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the order is
19 approved.

20 Item PR-1 concerns an application for
21 rehearing in Docket 20-0665/20-0666 consolidated
22 regarding Peoples' and North Shore's petition for
23 reconciliation of the companies' 2018 uncollectible

1 costs. The ALJ recommends denying the petition,
2 finding that the companies raise no new arguments in
3 their application.

4 Are there any objections to denying the
5 application for rehearing?

6 (No verbal response)

7 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the
8 application is denied.

9 Item PR-2 concerns an application for
10 rehearing in Docket 22-0352, which is a complaint case
11 against ComEd in Chicago. ALJ recommends denying the
12 application, finding that the complainant does not
13 present any new issues or facts for the Commission to
14 consider.

15 Are there any objections to denying the
16 application for rehearing?

17 (No verbal response)

18 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the
19 application is denied.

20 Moving on to other business.

21 Item O-1 concerns approval of batches,
22 contracts, and confirmations under the Illinois
23 Adjustable Block Program.

1 Are there any objections to approving the
2 program administrator's submissions?

3 (No verbal response)

4 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the
5 submissions are approved.

6 Items 0-2 concerns June 2023 solicitations
7 of bids to sell Indexed Renewable Energy Credits from
8 New Utility-Scale Solar, New Utility-Scale Wind, and
9 New Brownfield Photovoltaic Projects to Ameren, ComEd,
10 and MidAmerican.

11 Are there any objections to approving the
12 procurement administrator's recommendations on
13 selection of winning bids?

14 (No verbal response)

15 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the
16 recommendations are approved.

17 Item 0-3 concerns approval of batches,
18 contracts, and confirmations under the Illinois Solar
19 For All Program.

20 Are there any objections to approving the
21 program administrator's submissions?

22 (No verbal response)

23 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Hearing none, the

1 submissions are approved.

2 Judge Teague Kingsley, do we have any other
3 matters to come before the Commission today?

4 (No verbal response)

5 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: I take that as a no? All
6 right.

7 Do any of the Commissioners have any other
8 business to discuss? Commissioner Reddick.

9 MR. REDDICK: Thank you, Chairman. I would
10 like to take a moment to welcome a new member of our
11 advisory staff, my new advisor, Nathan Carrier.

12 Nathan comes to the ICC from the Federal Energy
13 Regulatory Commission where he was a lawyer advisor
14 for the FERC administrative judges.

15 He joined FERC after earning his law degree
16 with high honors and a brief stint with a law firm.
17 He was attracted to us in Illinois, and the ICC in
18 particular, by the enormous task the Commission has
19 before it to implement CEJA, Climate and Equitable
20 Jobs Act, which defines Illinois's regulatory response
21 to our environmental challenges.

22 Environmental matters have been a focus of
23 Nathan's undergraduate studies, his clinical

1 experience, and his law school coursework.

2 Nathan has already joined the Commission's
3 outstanding band of advisors and has already begun the
4 work required to inform and support our decisions.

5 I'm very pleased to have his help after
6 several months without help, and appreciative that he
7 is so eager to dive in. Welcome, Nate.

8 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Absolutely welcome Nathan
9 to the Commission. Other commissioners?

10 (No verbal response)

11 CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Just to beg your indulgence
12 for a couple of moments, I would like to say that I'm
13 delighted to be back at the ICC and very much look
14 forward to all of the work that is in front of us.

15 I want to thank Chair Zaleski for her
16 service, for her leadership, and her friendship as we
17 worked on a very smooth transition, and I wish her all
18 the best going forward.

19 I'm very fortunate to be able to work with
20 this talented, dedicated group of commissioners.
21 You've all been very welcoming, and I appreciate that
22 very much.

23 As I said often in my first go-round here at

1 the ICC, I'm very thankful for the terrific public
2 servants on the ICC staff. We have put a lot on them,
3 and I say we because of my role with CEJA working
4 through the Governor's office, and especially in the
5 last couple years we've put a lot of extra
6 responsibilities on the staff, and they continue to
7 produce terrific results.

8 I'm fully aware of all the challenges that
9 are part of the CEJA compliance, but I believe in the
10 goals of the legislation and see it as my
11 responsibility that I do my part to help bring about
12 the energy transition in Illinois.

13 Of course, I fully understand that our core
14 job hasn't changed in the eight and a half years since
15 I've been gone to make sure that Illinoisans now have
16 access to safe, affordable, reliable energy, but the
17 law also now mandates that this energy be clean as
18 well, and we need to make sure that that happens, as
19 the ICC and staff have been doing.

20 It's also incumbent on me that I look around
21 the corners to try to anticipate what's coming next
22 and how we can best position Illinois to do the best
23 by our citizens.

1 CEJA also requires us to consider how the
2 changing energy system impacts disadvantaged
3 communities and those who struggle to pay the bills.
4 I take this very seriously, as I know my colleagues
5 do. The energy transition needs to work for everyone
6 or it really doesn't work for anyone.

7 There's a lot of work in addition to
8 utilities as the ICC has many responsibilities as we
9 just went through in the meeting. I'm looking forward
10 to all the work that we have. In fact, the reality of
11 what a busy time this is for the ICC is a large part
12 of why I chose to come back. What better time and
13 what better place to work on all of these issues with
14 these wonderful people?

15 So thanks for indulging me. I promise I
16 won't do this every meeting, but it's great to be
17 back. Thank you.

18 Is there any other business to come before
19 the Commission today? Hearing none, without
20 objection, this meeting is adjourned. Thank you.
