The forecast covers in particular those matters that may be taken up during the month pursuant to earlier decisions of the Council. The fact that a matter is or is not included in the forecast carries no implication that it will or will not be taken up during the month: the actual programme of work will be determined by developments and the views of members of the Council.

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SECURITY COUNCIL FOR THE MONTH OF OCTOBER 2022**

**AFRICA**

**CAR: SG reports on the situation in CAR and MINUSCA**

Resolution [2605 \(2021\)](#) of 12 November 2021

Para. 58: (a) Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Council on 15 February 2022, 15 June 2022 and 14 October 2022, including on: the situation in the CAR, including the security situation, the respect by all parties of the ceasefire, the political process, the implementation of the APPR, including efforts made by MINUSCA to support the ceasefire and DDR process, progress on mechanisms and capacity to advance governance and fiscal management, and relevant information on the progress, promotion and protection of human rights and international humanitarian law and on the protection of civilians; violations of the Status of Forces Agreement and follow up on efforts to hold perpetrators accountable, including through joint investigations, as well as attacks, provocations and incitement to hatred and violence and disinformation campaigns against MINUSCA; the status of the implementation of MINUSCA's mandated tasks, including instances in which MINUSCA was unable to reach civilians in response to POC alerts; force and police generation and deployment of all MINUSCA's constituent elements, and information on the progress in the implementation of the measures taken to improve MINUSCA's performance, including measures to ensure force effectiveness as outlined in paragraphs 37 to 45, as well as information on the implementation of the zero-tolerance policy on sexual exploitation and abuse as outlined in paragraphs 42 and 43; overall Mission performance, the Mission's implementation of the Integrated Peacekeeping Performance and Accountability Framework (IPPAF) and Comprehensive Planning and Performance Assessment System (CPAS); including information on undeclared caveats, declining to participate in or undertake patrols and their impact on the mission, and how the reported cases of under-performance are addressed; implementation, performance and necessity ahead of each phase of the reinforcements decided in resolution [2566 \(2021\)](#) and recalled in this resolution;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in October 2022.

**CAR: France to report to SC on implementation of mandate to support MINUSCA**

Resolution [2605 \(2021\)](#) of 12 November 2021

Para. 56: Authorises French armed forces, within the provisions of their existing bilateral agreement with the CAR and the limits of their capacities and areas of deployment, at the request of the Secretary-General, to use all the means to provide operational support to elements of MINUSCA when under serious threat, from the date of adoption of this resolution, and requests France to ensure reporting to the Council on the implementation of this mandate and to coordinate its reporting with that of the Secretary-General referred to in paragraph 58 of this resolution;

**Great Lakes Region: SG reports on implementation of the commitments under the PSC Framework**

Resolution [2612 \(2021\)](#) of 20 December 2021

Para. 56: Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Security Council every six months, in coordination with the Secretary-General's Special Envoy for the Great Lakes Region and the SRSG for the DRC on the implementation of the commitments under the PSC Framework and its linkages with the broader security situation in the Great Lakes Region;

[S/PRST/2021/19](#) of 20 October 2021

Penultimate para.: The Security Council further requests the Secretary-General to continue to provide updates on the progress of the implementation of the PSC Framework, in his periodic reporting on the Great Lakes Region.

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in October 2022.

**Libya: UNSMIL mandate**

Resolution 2647 (2022) of 28 July 2022

Para. 1: Decides to extend until 31 October 2022 the mandate of the United Nations Support Mission in Libya (UNSMIL), as an integrated special political mission to carry out its mandate, as set out in resolution [2542 \(2020\)](#) and paragraph 16 of resolution [2570 \(2021\)](#);

The mandate will expire on 31 October 2022.

**Libya: UNSMIL: SG to report to SC on the implementation of resolution [2647 \(2022\)](#)**

Resolution 2647 (2022) of 28 July 2022

Para. 9: Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Security Council on the implementation of this resolution every 30 days;

Resolution 2570 (2021) of 16 April 2021

Para. 19: Further requests that the Secretary-General includes updates on UNSMIL's support to the relevant Libyan authorities and institutions ahead of the upcoming elections, the implementation of the 23 October ceasefire agreement, the progress made by the LCMM, the deployment of UNSMIL ceasefire monitors in support, and criteria for their eventual departure, in his regular reporting and in any additional reports, as necessary;

The Secretary-General is expected to report in October 2022.

**Mali: SG reports on MINUSMA on the implementation of resolution [2640 \(2022\)](#)**

Resolution 2640 (2022) of 29 June 2022

Para. 57: Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Security Council every three months after the adoption of this resolution on the implementation of this resolution, focusing on: (i) the situation in Mali, including major political and security developments, the terrorist threat, the implementation of the Agreement, the human rights situation, including women's rights, small arms, light weapons and explosive ordnance threat mitigation, as needed, and whether and how the mission's activities have contributed toward achieving the mission's strategic priority tasks referenced in paragraph 26, (ii) coordination, exchange of information and, when applicable, mutual operational and logistical support, between MINUSMA, the MDSF, the FC G5S, the French Forces until the planned end of their presence in Mali and the European Union missions in Mali, (iii) overall performance, including implementation of the Adaptation Plan, roll out of the IPPAF and the CPPAS, the improvement and the performance of the Casualty Evacuation System, rotations of uniformed personnel, including information on undeclared caveats, declining to participate in or undertake patrols and their impact on the mission, and how the reported cases of under-performance are addressed, (iv) capacities of the mission, including safety, security, access and freedom of movement of MINUSMA's personnel, instances in which MINUSMA was unable to reach civilians to carry out its mandated activities and respond to potential protection threats, and all instances of interference with MINUSMA's activities by all actors, including violations of the SOFA, denied flight authorizations, attacks, provocations and incitement to hatred and violence and disinformation and misinformation campaigns against MINUSMA, and efforts to hold perpetrators of such actions accountable, as applicable, (v) measures to improve external communication of the mission and to counter disinformation and misinformation;

S/PRST/2020/10 of 15 October 2020

Last para.: The Security Council also requests MINUSMA, within its mandate and existing resources, to support the political transition in Mali, particularly by exercising good offices, confidence-building and facilitation at the national and local levels, and by supporting, together with the United Nations country team, the holding of inclusive, free, fair, transparent, and credible elections, conducted in a peaceful environment, including through the provision of technical assistance and security arrangements,

consistent with the provisions of the Agreement. It requests the Secretary General to include in its quarterly reports updates on how MINUSMA supports the political transition.

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in October 2022.

### **Peace and security in Africa: SG to report on piracy and armed robbery at sea in the Gulf of Guinea**

Resolution 2634 (2022) of 31 May 2022

Para. 16: Further requests the Secretary-General to report, within five (5) months and on an exceptional basis in advance of the 10-year anniversary of the Yaoundé Code of Conduct, on the situation of piracy and armed robbery at sea in the Gulf of Guinea and its underlying causes, including any possible and potential linkages with terrorism in West and Central Africa and the Sahel, on the United Nations' support and contributions, and on any recommendations for further supporting and enhancing national efforts and regional and international cooperation towards combatting piracy and armed robbery at sea in the Gulf of Guinea;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in October 2022.

### **Somalia: UNSOM mandate**

Resolution 2632 (2022) of 26 May 2022

Para. 1: Decides to extend until 31 October 2022 the mandate of UNSOM as set out in paragraph 1 of resolution [2158 \(2014\)](#), and further decides that UNSOM should continue to implement that mandate in accordance with resolution [2592 \(2021\)](#);

The mandate will expire on 31 October 2022.

### **Somalia: ATMIS: Federal Government of Somalia to update the SC on the implementation of STP and roadmap**

Resolution 2628 (2022) of 31 March 2022

Para. 52: Requests the FGS to provide an update to the Security Council, by 10 July 2022, 10 October 2022, and 10 January 2023 on: (a) progress in implementing the STP and NSA and force generation and integration, as set out in paragraphs 7 and 8 of this resolution; (b) progress in implementing the roadmap agreed on 27 May 2021;

### **Somalia: AU to report to SC on the implementation of ATMIS's mandate**

Resolution 2628 (2022) of 31 March 2022

Para.53: Requests the African Union to keep the Security Council informed, through the Secretary-General, on the implementation of ATMIS' mandate, by 10 July 2022, 10 October 2022 and 10 January 2023 and further requests in this regard, these reports contain specific reporting on: [...]

### **Somalia: Sanctions: 751 Committee (Somalia) briefings to SC**

Resolution 1844 (2008) of 20 November 2008

Para. 11: Decides further to expand the mandate of the Committee as set out in resolution [751\(1992\)](#) to include the following tasks:

(g) to report at least every 120 days to the Security Council on its work and on the implementation of this resolution, with its observations and recommendations, in particular on ways to strengthen the effectiveness of the measures imposed by paragraphs 1, 3 and 7 above.

Resolution 2444 (2018) of 14 November 2018

Para. 55: Requests the Committee, in accordance with its mandate and in consultation with the Panel of Experts and other relevant United Nations entities, to consider the recommendations contained in the reports of the Panel of Experts and recommend to the Security Council ways to improve the

implementation of and compliance with the Somalia arms embargo, the measures regarding the import and export of charcoal from Somalia, as well as implementation of the measures imposed by paragraphs 1, 3 and 7 of resolutions [1844 \(2008\)](#) in response to continuing violations;

The Committee Chair is expected to report in October 2022.

### **Somalia: Sanctions: Panel of Experts final report**

Resolution [2607 \(2021\)](#) of 15 November 2021

Para. 41: Requests the Panel to provide regular updates to the Committee, including a minimum of four different thematic reports delivered on a quarterly basis, including one of smuggling and trafficking on weapons and military equipment, a comprehensive mid-term update and, for the Security Council's consideration, through the Committee, a final report by 15 October 2022 and urges the Panel to seek feedback from the Committee on the findings of their reporting;

The final PoE report is expected to be presented by 15 October 2022.

### **Sudan/South Sudan: SG to inform SC on status of compliance with resolution [2046 \(2012\)](#)**

Resolution [2046 \(2012\)](#) of 2 May 2012

Para. 6: Requests the Secretary-General to consult with the African Union on the implementation of this resolution and the decisions of the AU PSC, to work closely with the AUHIP in support of its facilitation efforts, and to inform the Security Council within 15 days and in two week intervals thereafter on the status of compliance by Sudan, South Sudan, and the SPLM-N with the decisions set forth in this resolution, and expresses its intention, in the event that any or all of the parties have not complied with the decisions set forth in this resolution, to take appropriate additional measures under Article 41 of the Charter as necessary.

Note by the PSC of 2 December 2016 ([S/2016/1029](#))

Following consultations among the members of the Security Council, it has been agreed to amend the reporting period established in paragraph 6 of resolution [2046 \(2012\)](#), and subsequently amended in notes by the President of the Security Council ([S/2013/657](#) and [S/2014/613](#)), to six-month intervals, beginning with the first report under the new timeline due to the Council by 15 May 2017.

The Secretary-General is expected to report in October 2022.

### **Sudan/South Sudan: SG to inform SC of progress in implementing UNISFA's mandate**

Resolution [2630 \(2022\)](#) of 12 May 2022

Para. 7: Requests the Secretary-General to continue to inform the Security Council of progress in implementing UNISFA's mandate as set out in paragraph 34 of resolution [2609 \(2021\)](#), in particular concerning progress with the increase in police, appointment of a civilian Deputy Head of Mission, usage of Athony airport, and the issuance of visas to support implementation of the mandate, as well as on progress on the issues described in paragraph 5 of this resolution, with a written report no later than 15 October 2022;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in October 2022.

### **Western Sahara: MINURSO mandate**

Resolution [2602 \(2021\)](#) of 29 October 2021

Para. 1: Decides to extend the mandate of MINURSO until 31 October 2022;

The mandate will expire on 31 October 2022.

### **Western Sahara: SG report on Western Sahara**

Resolution [2602 \(2021\)](#) of 29 October 2021

Para. 10: Requests the Secretary-General to brief the Security Council on a regular basis, and at any time he deems appropriate during the mandate period, to include within six months of this mandate's renewal and again prior to its expiration, on the status and progress of these negotiations under his auspices, on the implementation of this resolution, assessment of MINURSO's operations and steps taken to address challenges, expresses its intention to meet to receive and discuss his briefings and in this regard, further requests the Secretary-General to provide a report on the situation in Western Sahara well before the end of the mandate period;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in October 2022.

## AMERICAS

**Colombia: Verification Mission mandate**

Resolution [2603 \(2021\)](#) of 29 October 2021

Para. 1: Decides to extend the mandate of the Verification Mission until 31 October 2022;

The mandate will expire on 31 October 2022.

**Colombia: SG to report on Verification Mission**

Resolution [2366 \(2017\)](#) of 10 July 2017

Para. 8: Further requests the Secretary-General, based on the reporting of the Special Representative, to report to the Security Council on the implementation of the Verification Mission's mandate every 90 days after the start of its verification activities;

Resolution [2545 \(2020\)](#) of 25 September 2020

Para. 1: Decides to extend, to 25 September 2021, the mandate of the Verification Mission and reporting requirements in accordance with its resolutions [2366 \(2017\)](#), [2377 \(2017\)](#), [2435 \(2018\)](#), and [2487 \(2019\)](#), headed by a Special Representative of the Secretary-General of the United Nations;

Resolution [2574 \(2021\)](#) of 11 May 2021

Para. 3: Welcomes the Secretary-General's proposal to incorporate reporting with respect to the verification of compliance with the sentences referred to in paragraph 1 of this resolution within the existing reporting cycle for the Verification Mission, and to keep the Council fully informed of the preparations of the Verification Mission and the progress, assessment, and eventual results of the verification;

The report of the Secretary-General dated 27 September 2022 ([S/2022/715](#)) is before the Security Council.

**Haiti: SG to submit a report on consultations regarding options for security support for the HNP**

Resolution [2645 \(2022\)](#) of 15 July 2022

Para. 10: Requests the Secretary-General to consult with the Government of Haiti, relevant countries, and regional organizations regarding possible options for enhanced security support for the HNP's efforts to combat high levels of gang violence, and to submit a written report to the Security Council regarding these consultations by 15 October 2022;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in October 2022.

**Haiti: SG reports on BINUH on the implementation of resolution [2645 \(2022\)](#)**

Resolution [2645 \(2022\)](#) of 15 July 2022

Para. 1: Decides to extend, to 15 July 2023 the mandate of BINUH in accordance with its resolution [2476 \(2019\)](#), headed by a Special Representative of the Secretary-General of the United Nations, and the reporting requirements specified in resolution [2476 \(2019\)](#) adjusted to 90 days;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in October 2022.

**Haiti: Government of Haiti to provide an update to the SC**

Resolution 2645 (2022) of 15 July 2022

Para. 3: Reiterates the need for all Haitian stakeholders, including with BINUH's support, to reach an urgent agreement on a sustainable, time-bound and commonly accepted framework for a political process led by Haitians to permit the organization of inclusive, peaceful, free, fair, and transparent legislative and presidential elections as soon as security conditions and logistical preparations permit, and with the full, equal and meaningful participation of women and the engagement of youth, civil society, and other relevant stakeholders through an inclusive inter-Haitian national dialogue, and in this regard requests the Government of Haiti to provide an update to the Security Council by 17 October 2022;

**ASIA/MIDDLE EAST**

**Iraq: SG reports on UNAMI**

Resolution 2631 (2022) of 26 May 2022

Para. 5: Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Council every four months on the progress made towards the fulfilment of all UNAMI's responsibilities;

The report of the Secretary-General dated 26 September 2022 ([S/2022/714](#)) is before the Security Council.

**Iraq/Kuwait: missing persons and return of property**

Resolution 2107 (2013) of 27 June 2013

Para. 4: requests that the Special Representative of the Secretary-General and Head of the United Nations Assistance Mission to Iraq (UNAMI) promote, support and facilitate efforts regarding the repatriation or return of all Kuwaiti and third country nationals or their remains, and the return of Kuwaiti property, including the national archives, seized by Iraq, further requests the Secretary-General to report separately to the Security Council on these matters in his reports on the progress made towards the fulfilment of all UNAMI's responsibilities...;

The report of the Secretary-General dated 16 September 2022 ([S/2022/696](#)) is before the Security Council.

**Middle East (Lebanon): SG reports on resolution 1559 (2004)**

Resolution 1559 (2004) of 2 September 2004

Para. 7: Requests that the Secretary-General report to the Security Council within thirty days on the implementation by the parties of this resolution and decides to remain actively seized of the matter.

S/PRST/2004/36 of 19 October 2004

Last para.: The Security Council appreciates the Secretary-General's intention to keep the Council updated. It requests that he continue to report on the implementation of the resolution to the Council every six months.

Para. 7: Invites the Secretary-General to continue to follow the situation and to keep the Security Council informed.



**Middle East (Syria): OPCW DG to report to SC (through SG) on implementation of resolution 2118 (2013)**

Resolution 2118 (2013) of 27 September 2013

Para.12: Decides to review on a regular basis the implementation in the Syrian Arab Republic of the decision of the OPCW Executive Council of 27 September 2013 and this resolution, and requests the Director-General of the OPCW to report to the Security Council, through the Secretary-General, who shall include relevant information on United Nations activities related to the implementation of this resolution, within 30 days and every month thereafter, and requests further the Director-General of the OPCW and the Secretary-General to report in a coordinated manner, as needed, to the Security Council, non-compliance with this resolution or the OPCW Executive Council decision of 27 September 2013;

The report is expected to be presented in October 2022.

**Middle East (Syria): SG briefings and reports on the implementation of resolutions 2139 (2014), 2165 (2014), 2191 (2014), 2258 (2015), 2332 (2016), 2393 (2017), 2401 (2018), 2449 (2018), 2504 (2020), 2533 (2020), 2585 (2021), and 2642 (2022)**

Resolution 2642 (2022) of 12 July 2022

Para. 5: Requests the Secretary-General to brief the Council monthly and to provide a report on a regular basis, at least every 60 days, on the implementation of resolutions 2139 (2014), 2165 (2014), 2191 (2014), 2258 (2015), 2332 (2016), 2393 (2017), 2401 (2018), 2449 (2018), 2504 (2020), 2533 (2020), 2585 (2021) and this resolution and on compliance by all relevant parties in Syria and further requests the Secretary-General to include in his reports overall trends in unhindered and safe United Nations cross-line operations, in particular on their progress to all parts of Syria, on early recovery projects, and detailed information on the humanitarian assistance delivered through United Nations humanitarian cross-border operations, including their transparency, the distribution mechanism, the number of beneficiaries, operating partners, locations of aid deliveries at district-level and the volume and nature of items delivered;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in October 2022.

**Middle East (Syria): SG report on the implementation of resolution 2268 (2016)**

Resolution 2268 (2016) of 26 February 2016

Para.10: Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Council on the implementation of this resolution, including by drawing on information provided by the ISSG ceasefire taskforce, and on resolution 2254 (2015), within 15 days of the adoption of this resolution and every 30 days thereafter;

The Secretary-General is expected to report in October 2022.

**Middle East (UNDOF): SG reports on developments in the situation and measures taken to implement resolution 338 (1973)**

Resolution 2613 (2021) of 21 December 2021

Para. 16: Requests the Secretary-General to report every 90 days on developments in the situation and the measures taken to implement resolution 338 (1973).

The report of the Secretary-General dated 22 September 2022 ([S/2022/711](#)) is before the Security Council.

**Middle East (Yemen): SG to report to SC on implementation of resolution 2643 (2022) and resolution 2451 (2018)**

Resolution 2643 (2022) of 13 July 2022



Para. 8: Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Security Council on a monthly basis on progress regarding the implementation of this resolution, including, inter alia on any obstructions to the effective operation of UNMHA caused by any party, any violations of the Hodeidah Agreement ceasefire, any attempts to bring any military reinforcements and military objects to and through the city, the ports of Hodeidah, Salif, and Ras Issa, and the governorate, any failures to remove any military manifestations from the city, and on resolution [2451 \(2018\)](#), including on any non-compliance by any party;

The Secretary-General is expected to report in October 2022.

## EUROPE

### **UNMIK: SG briefings and concurrent reports to SC**

Resolution [1244 \(1999\)](#) of 10 June 1999

Para. 20: Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Council at regular intervals on the implementation of this resolution, including reports from the leaderships of the international civil and security presences, the first reports to be submitted within 30 days of the adoption of this resolution;

Note by the PSC of 7 February 2019 ([S/2019/120](#))

The members of the Security Council have agreed upon a schedule of meetings on UNMIK, with concurrent Secretary-General reports to the Council. In 2019, the Council intends to hold briefings on 7 February, in June, and in October. As of 2020, the Council intends to hold briefings twice a year (in April and October) on the issue. The Council will continue to review this issue, taking into account the situation on the ground.

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in October 2022.

## OTHER

### **Women and peace and security: Annual reports on the implementation of resolution [1325 \(2000\)](#)**

Resolution [2106 \(2013\)](#) of 24 June 2013
