AFRICA

CAR: Sanctions: Secretariat to provide options for elaboration of benchmarks to assess arms embargo and information on recommended working group

Resolution 2339 (2017) of 27 January 2017

Para. 29: Requests the Secretariat to provide to the Security Council, by 30 May 2017, options for the elaboration of benchmarks, in coordination with EUTM and other active partners in the field of SSR and in consultation with the CAR Authorities, to assess the arms embargo measures according to the progress of the SSR, including FACA and Internal Security Forces and their needs, as well as additional information on the Panel of Experts' recommended arms embargo working group to be potentially established within MINUSCA by the Security Council, including on the composition, tasks, functioning, resource requirements and implication with regards the implementation of MINUSCA's mandate, of such a working group, with reference to previous similar experiences in other UN Peacekeeping Missions;

The report of the Secretary-General dated 10 July (S/2017/597) is before the Security Council.

CAR: Sanctions: Panel of experts midterm report

Resolution 2339 (2017) of 27 January 2017

Para.9: Requests the Group of Experts to fulfil its mandate as consolidated below, and to provide to the Council, after discussion with the Committee, a mid-term report no later than 30 December 2016, and a final report no later than 15 June 2017, as well as submit monthly updates to the Committee, except in the months where the mid-term and final reports are due:

Para.5: Extends to 15 August 2017 the deadline for the submission of the final report of the Group of Experts requested in paragraph 9 of resolution 2293 (2016), given the extraordinary circumstances under which the Group of Experts is currently operating and taking into account the letter dated 15 June 2017 from the Chair of the Committee to the President of the Security Council;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in August 2017.

Guinea-Bissau: SG report on progress made and recommendations on the continuation of the sanctions regime

Resolution 2343 (2017) of 23 February 2017

Para.22: Requests the Secretary-General to submit to the Security Council regular reports every six months on the implementation of this resolution and to submit a report within six months, with a briefing to the Committee established pursuant to its resolution 2048 (2012), on the progress made with regards to the stabilization of the country and restoration of constitutional order and recommendations on the continuation of the sanctions regime in the post-election environment, in line with paragraph 12 of resolution 2048 (2012);

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in August 2017.

Liberia: SG report on UNMIL and oral updates

Resolution 2333 (2016) of 23 December 2016

Para.21: Requests the Secretary-General to keep it regularly informed of the situation in Liberia and the implementation of the mandate of UNMIL and to provide a report on the situation on the ground and implementation of this resolution no later than 15 June 2017, with an oral update for the Security Council on elections preparation no later than 31 August 2017 and another oral update after elections no later than 15 December 2017, with a concluding report by 15 April 2018;

The Secretary-General is expected to report in August 2017.

Libya: UNSMIL: SG to report to SC on the implementation of resolution 2323 (2016)

Resolution 2323 (2016) of 13 December 2016

Para.5: Requests the Secretary-General to continue to report to the Security Council on the implementation of this resolution at least every 60 days;

The Secretary-General is expected to report in August 2017

Peace & Security in Africa: SG report on the situation in the Lake Chad Basin Region

Resolution 2349 (2017) of 31 March 2017

Para.34: Requests the Secretary-General to produce a written report within five months on the United Nations' assessment of the situation in the Lake Chad Basin Region as it relates to elements of this resolution, particularly regarding the progress made and remaining challenges, and possible measures for consideration, including with respect to achieving greater coherence of efforts in the context of overlapping regional strategies, and thereafter to include these elements in regular reporting by UNOCA and UNOWAS.

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in August 2017.

Peace & Security in Africa: SG to report on activities of the FC-G5S

Resolution 2359 (2017) of 21 June 2017

Para.7: Requests the Secretary General, in close coordination with the G5 Sahel States and the African Union, to report to the Security Council on the activities of the FC-G5S, including on its operationalization, on challenges encountered and possible measures for further consideration, as well as on ways to mitigate any adverse impact of its military operations on the civilian population, including on women and children, with an oral update within 2 months of the adoption of this resolution, with a written report within 4 months of the adoption of this resolution, and thereafter to include these elements in regular reporting by UNOCA and UNOWAS;

The Secretary-General is expected to report in August 2017.

Somalia: SG to conduct joint assessment mission of AMISOM and present options and recommendations to the SC

Resolution 2297 (2016) of 7 July 2016

Para.24: Requests the Secretary-General, in consultation with the African Union, to conduct a joint assessment mission of AMISOM, after the 2016 electoral process, to ensure that AMISOM is properly configured to support the next phase of state-building in Somalia, and to present options and recommendations to the Security Council by 15 April 2017

The options and recommendations are expected to be submitted in August 2017.

Somalia: Piracy: States and regional organisations cooperating with Somali authorities and States contributing through the CGPC to inform SC and SG

Resolution 2316 (2016) of 9 November 2016

Para.32: Requests States and regional organizations cooperating with Somali authorities to inform the Security Council and the Secretary-General in nine months of the progress of actions undertaken in the exercise of the authorizations provided in paragraph 14 above and further requests all States contributing through the CGPCS to the fight against piracy off the coast of Somalia, including Somalia and other States in the region, to report by the same deadline on their efforts to establish jurisdiction and cooperation in the investigation and prosecution of piracy;

Somalia: AMISOM mandate

Resolution 2355 (2017) of 26 May 2017

Para.1: Decides to authorize the Member States of the African Union to maintain the deployment of AMISOM until 31 August 2017, in line with the Security Council's request to the African Union for a

maximum level of 22,126 uniformed personnel, and authorizes AMISOM to take all necessary measures to carry out its mandate, as set out in paragraphs 4-7 of resolution 2297 (2016);

The mandate expires on 31 August 2017.

South Sudan: SG to provide detailed information on UNMISS force, impediments and obstructions

Resolution 2327 (2016) of 16 December 2016

Para.31: Requests that the Secretary-General provide detailed information within 30 days on force generation, restructuring of the UNMISS force, logistical support and enablers, and civilian personnel to implement the mandate, as well as whether the TGNU has maintained its consent in principle to deployment of the RPF and not imposed any political or operational impediments to operationalizing the RPF or obstructed UNMISS in the performance of its mandate, and requests the Secretary-General to review needs on the ground, and provide an updated assessment of the RPF's operations, deployment, and future requirements, as well as any political or operational impediments to operationalizing the RPF and obstructions to UNMISS in performance of its mandate, within 30 days after the adoption of this resolution, and every 30 days thereafter;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected in August 2017.

South Sudan: Sanctions: Panel of Experts updates

Resolution 2353 (2017) of 24 May 2017

Para.2: Decides to extend until 30 June 2018 the mandate of the Panel of Experts as set out in subparagraphs (a), (b), (c), (e) and (f) of paragraph 12 of resolution 2290 (2016), and decides that the Panel of Experts should provide to the Council, after discussion with the Committee, an interim report by 1 December 2017, a final report by 1 May 2018, and, except in the months when these reports are due, updates each month, and expresses its intention to review the mandate and take appropriate action regarding the further extension of the mandate no later than 31 May 2018;

The update from the PoE is expected to be provided in August 2017.

Sudan/South Sudan: SG written reports on UNISFA

Resolution 2352 (2017) of 15 May 2017

Para. 32: Requests the Secretary-General to continue to inform the Council of progress in implementing UNISFA's mandate in two written reports, no later than 31 July 2017 and 15 October 2017, and continue to bring to the Council's immediate attention any serious violations of the above referenced Agreements;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in August 2017.

Sudan/South Sudan: SG to brief on progress on efforts towards implementation of the 2011 agreements

Resolution 2352 (2017) of 15 May 2017

Para. 4: Urges the Governments of Sudan and South Sudan to resume direct negotiations in order to urgently agree on a final settlement of the Abyei question, calls upon the parties to take concrete confidence-building measures to contribute to achieving this objective with renewed support from the AUHIP, encourages the AUHIP and the Special Envoy of the Secretary-General to continue

coordinating efforts towards calling for full implementation of the 2011 agreements, and requests the Secretary-General to brief on progress in that regard by 15 August 2017;

The Secretary-General is expected to brief by 15 August 2017.

Sudan: SG reports on UNAMID

Resolution 2363 (2017) of 29 June 2017

Para.41: Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Council every 60 days following adoption of this resolution on UNAMID, including:

- (i) information on the political, humanitarian and security situation in Darfur, including detailed reporting on incidents of violence and attacks against civilians, including sexual and gender-based violence, by whomsoever perpetrated;
- (ii) information on violations of the Status of Forces Agreement, including those involving attacks or threats of attack on UNAMID, violations of international humanitarian law perpetrated by any party to the conflict, as well as access restrictions and significant operational obstacles such as those related to customs clearances and visas;
- (iii) developments and progress towards achievement of UNAMID's strategic priorities and benchmarks;
- (iv) progress in the implementation of the recommendations made in the Special Report, including the progress of reductions to UNAMID's military and police component and its impact, including on protection needs and violations and abuses of human rights;
- (v) developments and progress on strategically addressing the underlying drivers of inter-communal conflict and the action plan on the prevention and resolution of inter-communal conflict;
- (vi) developments and progress in addressing the challenges facing UNAMID;
- (vii) enhanced, detailed and full information on abuses and violations of human rights, including those committed against women and children and violations of international humanitarian law;
- (viii) developments regarding UNAMID's support for local conflict resolution mechanisms, including progress regarding the full and effective participation of women; and
- (ix) on the implementation of this resolution;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be submitted in August 2017

AMERICAS

Colombia: SG present recommendations on size, operational aspects and mandate of Verification Mission

Resolution 2366 (2017) of 10 July 2017

Para.6: Further requests the Secretary-General to initiate preparations now, including on the ground, and to present detailed recommendations to the Security Council for its consideration and approval regarding the size and operational aspects and mandate of the Verification Mission, consistent with the Final Agreement, within 45 days of the adoption of this resolution;

The recommendations are expected to be presented in August 2017.

ASIA/MIDDLE EAST

Afghanistan: SG conduct a strategic review of UNAMA and report to the SC

Resolution 2344 (2017) of 17 March 2017

Para. 7: Affirms its continuing commitment to UNAMA, and to ensure that the Mission is able to effectively support Afghanistan, requests the Secretary-General, in accordance with best practices, to conduct a strategic review of UNAMA, examining mandated tasks, priorities, and related resources, assessing the mission's efficiency and effectiveness, in order to optimize the division of labour and configuration to ensure better cooperation and minimize duplication with other UN related organizations, and further requests the Secretary-General to report to the Security Council on the results of this review by July 2017;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in August 2017.

Middle East (Lebanon/UNIFIL): UNIFIL mandate

Resolution 2305 (2016) of 30 August 2016

Para.1: Decides to extend the present mandate of UNIFIL until 31 August 2017;

The mandate expires on 31 August 2017.

Middle East (Lebanon/UNIFIL): SG reports on implementation of resolution 1701 (2006)

Middle East (Syria): SG to report on implementation of resolutions 2139 (2014), 2165 (2014), 2191 (2014), 2258 (2015) and 2332 (2016)

Resolution 2139 (2014) of 22 February 2014

Para.17: Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Council on the implementation of this resolution by all parties in Syria, in particular paragraphs 2 through 12, in 30 days of its adoption and every 30 days thereafter, and upon receipt of the Secretary-General's report, expresses its intent to take further steps in the case of non-compliance with this resolution;
