AFRICA

DRC: MONUSCO mandate

Resolution 2409 (2018) of 27 March 2018

Para. 29: Decides to extend until 31 March 2019 the mandate of MONUSCO in the DRC, including, on an exceptional basis and without creating a precedent or any prejudice to the agreed principles of peacekeeping, its Intervention Brigade;

The mandate will expire on 31 March 2019.

DRC: SG reports on MONUSCO

Resolution 2409 (2018) of 27 March 2018

Para. 59: Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Council every three months on the implementation of MONUSCO's mandate, including its Intervention Brigade, as set out in this resolution, including on: (...)

DRC: SG to conduct performance review of MONUSCO units, and report to the Council on satisfaction of requirements and related action

Resolution 2409 (2018) of 27 March 2018

Para. 60: Requests the Secretary-General to conduct a comprehensive performance review of all MONUSCO units in accordance with the Operational Readiness Assurance and Performance Improvement Policy and the Secretary-General zero-tolerance policy on Sexual violence and abuse by September 2018 and further report to the Council every three months, as part of its regular reporting, on the percentage of MONUSCO contingents who have satisfied the requirements of the these reviews, the status of any remediation action to address contingents who have not satisfied requirements, and detailing plans to address contingents where remediation is not deemed appropriate, as certified by the Force Commander;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in March 2019.

DRC: SG reports on implementation of the commitments under the PSC Framework

Resolution 2409 (2018) of 27 March 2018

Para. 62: Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Security Council every six months, in coordination with the Secretary-General's Special Envoy for the Great Lakes Region and the SRSG for the DRC on the implementation of the commitments under the PSC Framework and its linkages with the broader security situation in the Great Lakes Region;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in March 2019.

Libya: UNSMIL: SG to report to SC on the implementation of resolution 2434 (2018)
Resolution 2434 (2018) of 13 September 2018

Para. 7: Requests the Secretary-General to continue to report to the Security Council on the implementation of this resolution at least every 60 days;

The Secretary-General is expected to report in March 2019.

Libya: Sanctions: Committee reports

Resolution 1970 (2011) of 26 February 2011

Para. 24: Decides to establish, in accordance with rule 28 of its provisional rules of procedure, a Committee of the Security Council consisting of all the members of the Council (herein “the Committee”), to undertake the following tasks:

(e) To report within thirty days to the Security Council on its work for the first report and thereafter to report as deemed necessary by the Committee.

The Committee Chair is expected to report in March 2019.

Mali: SG reports on MINUSMA on the implementation of resolution 2423 (2018)

Resolution 2423 (2018) of 28 June 2018

Para. 70: Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Security Council every three months after the adoption of this resolution on the implementation of this resolution, focusing:

(i) on the progress in the implementation of the Agreement and on MINUSMA’s efforts to support it,

(ii) on progress in the implementation of the measures taken to improve MINUSMA’s performance and effectiveness to implement its mandate, as outlined in paragraphs 55 to 60 above, including measures to enhance the safety and security of MINUSMA’s personnel and to implement a comprehensive approach to protection of civilians,

(iii) on coordination, exchange of information and, when applicable, mutual operational and logistical support, between MINUSMA, the MDSF, the FCG5S, the French Forces and the European Union missions in Mali, as outlined in paragraph 41 above;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in March 2019.

Mali: SG to report to SC on progress achieved in the implementation of measures contained in para. 4 of resolution 2423 (2018) and on the “Pact for Peace” benchmarks
Resolution 2423 (2018) of 28 June 2018

Para. 6: Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Security Council, 6 months after the presidential inauguration, on progress achieved in the implementation of the measures referenced in paragraph 4 above and of the benchmarks developed in the framework of the “Pact for Peace”, expresses its intent to examine progress achieved in the implementation of the Agreement on the basis of the report of the Secretary-General, and further expresses its intent, in the absence of significant progress in the implementation of the measures and benchmarks referenced above, to request the Secretary-General to provide options for potential significant adaptation of MINUSMA after the expiration of its current mandate;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in March 2019.

Mali: Report by France on implementation of mandate to support MINUSMA

Resolution 2423 (2018) of 28 June 2018

Para. 53: Authorizes French forces, within the limits of their capacities and areas of deployment, to use all necessary means until the end of MINUSMA's mandate as authorized in this resolution, to intervene in support of elements of MINUSMA when under imminent and serious threat upon request of the Secretary-General, and requests France to report to the Council on the implementation of this mandate in Mali and to coordinate its reporting with the reporting by the Secretary-General referred to in paragraph 70 below;

Mali: Sanctions: Panel of experts midterm and final reports

Resolution 2432 (2018) of 30 August 2018

Para. 4: Requests the Panel of experts to provide to the Council, after discussion with the Committee, a midterm report no later than 28 February 2019, a final report no later than 15 August 2019, and periodic updates in between, as appropriate;

The PoE midterm report dated 15 February 2019 (S/2019/137) is before the Security Council.

Somalia: UNSOM mandate

Resolution 2408 (2018) of 27 March 2018

Para. 1: Decides to extend until 31 March 2019 UNSOM's mandate as set out in paragraph 1 of resolution [2158 \(2014\)](#);

The mandate will expire on 31 March 2019.

Somalia: AU oral updates and written reports on the implementation of AMISOM's mandate

Resolution 2431 (2018) of 30 July 2018

Para. 9: Requests the AU to keep the Security Council regularly informed, through the Secretary-General, on the implementation of AMISOM's mandate, including its reconfiguration in support of the transition plan, and any performance issues, such as effective command and control, responses to attacks on civilians, adequate equipment and information, which may adversely affect effective mandate implementation, and to report to the Council, through the provision of oral updates and no fewer than three written reports, every 120 days with the first written report not later than 15 November 2018, and further requests that the first written report contains a reconfiguration plan detailing the modalities of the reduction in the level of uniformed personnel set out in paragraph 5 of this resolution;

Somalia: Sanctions: Federal Government of Somalia to report to SC

Resolution 2444 (2018) of 14 November 2018

Para. 21: Takes notes of FGS reporting to the Security Council pursuant to paragraph 9 of resolution [2182 \(2014\)](#) and as requested in paragraph 7 of resolution [2244 \(2015\)](#), calls on the FGS and FMSs to accelerate the implementation of the National Security Architecture agreement, the Security Pact, and the transition plan in order to provide Somali-led security and protection to the people of Somalia, and requests the FGS to report to the Security Council in accordance with paragraph 9 of resolution [2182 \(2014\)](#) and as requested in paragraph 7 of resolution [2244 \(2015\)](#), by 15 March 2019 and then by 15 September 2019, on the structure, composition, strength and disposition of its Security Forces, including the status of regional and militia forces, and to include as annexes the reports of the JVT requested in paragraph 7 of resolution [2182 \(2014\)](#);

South Sudan: UNMISS mandate

Resolution 2406 (2018) of 15 March 2018

Para. 5: Decides to extend the mandate of UNMISS until 15 March 2019;

The mandate will expire on 15 March 2019.

South Sudan: SG report on implementation of the UNMISS mandate and obstructions

Resolution 2406 (2018) of 15 March 2018

Para. 33: Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Security Council on implementation of the UNMISS mandate and the obstructions UNMISS encounters in doing so in a same comprehensive written report to be submitted within 90 days of the date of adoption of this resolution, every 90 days thereafter, and underscores that such reporting should include: (...)

The report of the Secretary-General dated 27 February 2019 (S/2019/191) is before the Council.

Sudan/South Sudan: SG to inform SC of progress in implementing UNISFA's mandate

Resolution 2445 (2018) of 15 November 2018

Para.33: Requests the Secretary-General to continue to inform it of progress in implementing UNISFA's mandate, in one written report, no later than 15 April 2019 and include reporting on: (...)

Para.34: Requests the Secretary-General to inform it of progress in implementing UNISFA's mandate, in a note, no later than 31 January 2019 and report on the progress in reduction of troops and increase in police per paragraphs 3 and 4;

The note requested in para. 34 dated 5 February 2019 is before the Security Council.

Sudan/South Sudan: SG to inform SC of progress in implementing steps regarding border demarcation (per paragraph 3 of resolution 2438 (2018))

Resolution 2438 (2018) of 11 October 2018

Para. 4: Requests the Secretary-General to inform it of progress in implementing any steps taken per paragraph 3, in writing, no later than 15 March 2019;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be presented no later than 15 March 2019.

AMERICAS

Colombia: SG to report on Verification Mission

Resolution 2435 (2018) of 13 September 2018

Para. 1: Decides to extend, to 25 September 2019, the mandate of the Verification Mission and reporting requirements in accordance with its resolutions 2366 and [2377 \(2017\)](#), headed by a Special Representative of the Secretary-General of the United Nations;

The Secretary-General is expected to report in March 2019.

Haiti: MINUJUSTH: SG report on implementation of resolution 2410 (2018)

Resolution 2410 (2018) of 10 April 2018

Para. 4: Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Council on the implementation of this resolution, including any instances of mandate implementation failures and measures taken to address these, in reports every 90 days starting from 1 June 2018;

Haiti: MINUJUSTH: SG to conduct Strategic Assessment Mission and present recommendations to SC

Resolution 2410 (2018) of 10 April 2018

Para. 9: Requests the Secretary-General to conduct a Strategic Assessment Mission to Haiti by 1 February 2019 and, on this basis, to present to the Council recommendations on the future United Nations role in Haiti, including any recommendations for drawdown and exit, in the fourth 90-day report no later than 1 March 2019;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in March 2019.

ASIA/MIDDLE EAST

Afghanistan: UNAMA mandate

Resolution 2405 (2018) of 8 March 2018

Para. 4: Decides to extend until 17 March 2019 the mandate of UNAMA, as defined in its resolutions [1662 \(2006\)](#), [1746 \(2007\)](#), [1806 \(2008\)](#), [1868 \(2009\)](#), [1917 \(2010\)](#), [1974 \(2011\)](#), [2041 \(2012\)](#), [2096 \(2013\)](#), [2145 \(2014\)](#), [2210 \(2015\)](#), [2274 \(2016\)](#), [2344 \(2017\)](#) and paragraphs 6 and 7 below;

The mandate will expire on 17 March 2019.

Afghanistan: SG reports on UNAMA

Resolution 2405 (2018) of 8 March 2018

Para. 44: Requests that the Secretary-General reports to the Council every three months on developments in Afghanistan, and to include in his reports an evaluation of progress made against the benchmarks for measuring and tracking progress in the implementation of UNAMA's mandate, including at the subnational level, and priorities as set out in this resolution;

The report of the Secretary-General dated 28 February 2019 (S/2019/193) is before the Security Council.

Middle East: The situation in the Middle East, including the Palestinian question

Resolution 1322 (2000) of 7 October 2000

Para.7: Invites the Secretary-General to continue to follow the situation and to keep the Security Council informed.

The situation in the Middle East, including the Palestinian Question: SG to report to the Council on the implementation of resolution 2334 (2016)

Resolution 2334 (2016) of 23 December 2016

Para. 12: Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Council every three months on the implementation of the provisions of the present resolution;

The Secretary-General is expected to report in March 2019.

Middle East (Lebanon/UNIFIL): SG reports on implementation of resolution 1701 (2006)

Resolution 2433 (2018) of 30 August 2018

Para. 25: Requests the Secretary-General to continue to report to the Council on the implementation of resolution [1701 \(2006\)](#), every four months, or at any time as he deems appropriate, and to include in his reporting a prompt and detailed breakdown of all resolution [1701 \(2006\)](#) violations, prompt and detailed reports on violations of the sovereignty of Lebanon, prompt and detailed reports on the restrictions to UNIFIL's freedom of movement, an annex on the implementation on the arms embargo, reports on specific areas where UNIFIL does not access and on the reasons behind these restrictions, potential risks to the cessation of hostilities and UNIFIL's response as well as reports on the implementation of the recommendations of the 2016–2017 Strategic review and on additional identified efficiencies to most appropriately fulfil its mandated tasks; requests the Secretary-General to continue to provide concrete and detailed information on the aforementioned issues to the Council, in line with changes to enhance reporting since the adoption of resolution [2373 \(2017\)](#).

Middle East (Lebanon/UNIFIL): SG to present assessment with recommendations regarding Lebanon's naval capabilities

Resolution 2433 (2018) of 30 August 2018

Para. 7: Calls for the Government of Lebanon to develop a plan to increase its naval capabilities, including with appropriate support from the international community, with the goal of ultimately decreasing UNIFIL's Maritime Taskforce and transitioning its responsibilities to the Lebanese Armed Forces (LAF), in close conjunction with the effective build-up of the capabilities of the Lebanese Navy, and requests that the Secretary-General present to the Security Council an assessment with recommendations within 6 months;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in March 2019.

Middle East (Lebanon/UNIFIL): SG to provide recommendations regarding the management of UNIFIL civilian resources

Resolution 2433 (2018) of 30 August 2018

Para.12: Stresses the need to improve the management of UNIFIL civilian resources, including through fostering enhanced cooperation with the Office of the United Nations Special Coordinator for Lebanon (UNSCOL), with the goal of improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the missions, and requests that the Secretary-General provide recommendations on the matter by 31 December 2018;

The recommendations of the Secretary-General dated 31 December 2018 (S/2018/1182) are before the Security Council.

Middle East (Syria): OPCW DG to report to SC (through SG) on impl. of resolution 2118 (2013)
Resolution 2118 (2013) of 27 September 2013

Para.12: Decides to review on a regular basis the implementation in the Syrian Arab Republic of the decision of the OPCW Executive Council of 27 September 2013 and this resolution, and requests the Director-General of the OPCW to report to the Security Council, through the Secretary-General, who shall include relevant information on United Nations activities related to the implementation of this resolution, within 30 days and every month thereafter, and requests further the Director-General of the OPCW and the Secretary-General to report in a coordinated manner, as needed, to the Security Council, non-compliance with this resolution or the OPCW Executive Council decision of 27 September 2013.

The report is expected to be presented in March 2019.

Middle East (Syria): SG to report on implementation of resolutions 2139 (2014), 2165 (2014), 2191 (2014), 2258 (2015), 2332 (2016), 2393 (2017), 2401 (2018), and 2449 (2018)

Resolution 2449 (2018) of 13 December 2018

Para.6: Requests the Secretary-General to brief the Council monthly and to provide a report on a regular basis, at least every 60 days, on the implementation of resolutions 2139 (2014), 2165 (2014), 2191 (2014), 2258 (2015), 2332 (2016), 2393 (2017), 2401 (2018) and this resolution and on compliance by all relevant parties in Syria and further requests the Secretary-General to continue to include in his reports overall trends in UN cross-line and cross-border humanitarian access and detailed information on the humanitarian assistance delivered through UN humanitarian cross-border operations as authorised by resolution 2165 (2014), including on the number of beneficiaries, locations of aid deliveries at district-level and the volume and nature of items delivered;

The Secretary-General is expected to report in March 2019.

Middle East (Syria): SG report on the implementation of resolution 2268 (2016)

Resolution 2268 (2016) of 26 February 2016

Para.10: Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Council on the implementation of this resolution, including by drawing on information provided by the ISSG ceasefire taskforce, and on resolution 2254 (2015), within 15 days of the adoption of this resolution and every 30 days thereafter;

The Secretary-General is expected to report in March 2019.

Middle East (UNDOF): SG reports on developments in the situation and measures taken to implement resolution 338 (1973)

Resolution 2450 (2018) of 21 December 2018

Para. 14: Requests the Secretary-General to report every 90 days on developments in the situation and the measures taken to implement resolution 338 (1973).

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in March 2019.

Middle East (Yemen): SG to report on the implementation of resolution 2201 (2015) and on developments in Yemen

Resolution 2201 (2015) of 15 February 2015

Para. 13: Requests the Secretary-General to report on the implementation of this resolution, and to continue to report on developments in Yemen, including on the implementation of the Gulf Cooperation Council Initiative and its Implementation Mechanism, the outcomes of the comprehensive National Dialogue conference, and the Peace and National Partnership Agreement and its security annex within 15 days after the date of adoption of this resolution and every 60 days thereafter;

Middle East (Yemen): SG to report to SC on implementation of resolution 2452 (2019), including obstructions to operation of UNMHA and non-compliance, and on resolution 2451 (2018)

Resolution 2452 (2019) of 16 January 2019

Para. 7: *Requests* the Secretary-General to report to the Security Council on a monthly basis on progress regarding the implementation of this resolution, including on any obstructions to the effective operation of UNMHA caused by any party; and on resolution [2451 \(2018\)](#), including on any non-compliance by any party;

The Secretary-General is expected to report in March 2019.

COUNTER-TERRORISM/NON-PROLIFERATION

ISIL (Da'esh) and Al-Qaeda Sanctions: Office of Ombudsperson reports

Resolution 2368 (2017) of 20 July 2017

Annex II, para. 20: In addition to the tasks specified above, the Ombudsperson shall: (...) (c): Submit biannual reports summarizing the activities of the Ombudsperson to the Security Council.

The report of the Office of the Ombudsperson dated 6 February 2019 (S/2019/112) is before the Security Council.

Non-proliferation/DPRK: Sanctions: SC to review Panel of Experts mandate

Resolution 2407 (2018) of 21 March 2018

Para. 1: Decides to extend until 24 April 2019 the mandate of the Panel of Experts, as specified in paragraph 26 of resolution [1874 \(2009\)](#) and modified in paragraph 29 of resolution [2094 \(2013\)](#), decides that this mandate shall apply also with respect to the measures imposed in resolutions [2270 \(2016\)](#), [2321 \(2016\)](#), [2356 \(2017\)](#), [2371 \(2017\)](#), [2375 \(2017\)](#), and [2397 \(2017\)](#), expresses its intent to review the mandate and take appropriate action regarding further extension no later than 24 March 2019, and requests the Secretary-General to take the necessary administrative measures to this effect;

The Security Council is expected to take action no later than 24 March 2019.

Non-proliferation/DPRK: Sanctions: Panel of Experts final report

Resolution 2407 (2018) of 21 March 2018

Para. 2: Requests the Panel of Experts to provide to the Committee no later than 3 August 2018 a midterm report on its work, as requested in paragraph 43 of resolution [2321 \(2016\)](#), and further requests that, after a discussion with the Committee, the Panel of Experts submit to the Council its midterm report by 7 September 2018, and requests also a final report to the Committee no later than 1 February 2019 with its findings and recommendations, and further requests that, after a discussion with the Committee, the Panel of Experts submit to the Council its final report no later than 14 March 2019;

The PoE final report is expected to be presented no later than 14 March 2019.

Non-proliferation/DPRK: Sanctions: Member States to report to SC on concrete measures taken to implement resolution 2397 (2017)

Resolution 2397 (2017) of 22 December 2017

Para. 17: Decides that Member States shall report to the Security Council within ninety days of the adoption of this resolution, and thereafter upon request by the Committee, on concrete measures they have taken in order to implement effectively the provisions of this resolution, requests the Panel of Experts, in cooperation with other UN sanctions monitoring groups, to continue its efforts to assist Member States in preparing and submitting such reports in a timely manner;

WMD: 1540 Committee brief the SC

Resolution 2325 (2016) of 15 December 2016

Para. 2: Decides that the 1540 Committee will continue to submit to the Security Council its Programme of Work, before the end of each January, and will brief the Security Council in the first quarter of each year, and welcomes the continuous submission of the Annual Review on the Implementation of Resolution 1540 (2004), prepared with the assistance of the Group of Experts, within December annually;

The Committee Chair is expected to brief the Security Council in March 2019.

OTHER

Security Council annual report: Secretariat to submit the draft report to SC

Note by the PSC of 10 December 2015 (S/2015/944)

Sixth para.: The Secretariat should submit the draft report to the members of the Council no later than 15 March, immediately following the period covered by the report, so that it may be discussed and thereafter adopted by the Council in time for consideration by the General Assembly in the spring of that calendar year.

United Nations peacekeeping operations: SG to present revised strategy to double the numbers of women in military and police contingents

Para. 19: Recalls its resolution 2242 (2015) and its request that the Secretary-General initiate, in collaboration with Member States, a revised strategy to double the numbers of women in military and police contingents of United Nations peacekeeping operations by 2020 and further requests that this strategy ensures the full, effective and meaningful participation of women in all aspects of peacekeeping, and that this revised strategy is presented to the Security Council by March 2019;

Resolution 2447 (2018) of 13 December 2018

Para. 14.: Recalls its resolution 2242 (2015) and its request that the Secretary-General initiate, in collaboration with Member States, a revised strategy to double the numbers of women in police contingents of United Nations peacekeeping operations by 2020 and further requests that this strategy ensures the full, effective and meaningful participation of women in all aspects of peacekeeping, and that this revised strategy is presented to the Security Council by March 2019;
