

**TENTATIVE FORECAST OF THE PROGRAMME OF WORK OF THE  
SECURITY COUNCIL FOR THE MONTH OF NOVEMBER 2021**

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This tentative forecast of the programme of work of the Security Council has been prepared by the Secretariat for the President of the Council. The forecast covers in particular those matters that may be taken up during the month pursuant to earlier decisions of the Council. The fact that a matter is or is not included in the forecast carries no implication that it will or will not be taken up during the month: the actual programme of work will be determined by developments and the views of members of the Council.

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SECURITY COUNCIL FOR THE MONTH OF NOVEMBER 2021**

**AFRICA**

**Central African region: SG reports on UNOCA, including on the situation in the Lake Chad region**

Resolution 2349 (2017) of 31 March 2017

Para.34: Requests the Secretary-General to produce a written report within five months on the United Nations' assessment of the situation in the Lake Chad Basin Region as it relates to elements of this resolution, particularly regarding the progress made and remaining challenges, and possible measures for consideration, including with respect to achieving greater coherence of efforts in the context of overlapping regional strategies, and thereafter to include these elements in regular reporting by UNOCA and UNOWAS.

S/PRST/2018/17 of 10 August 2018

Last para.: The Security Council requests the Secretary-General to provide a written report to it on the situation in Central Africa and UNOCA's activities, including on the situation in the Lake Chad region as requested in resolution 2349 (2017), by 30 November 2018 and every six months thereafter.

S/PRST/2020/12 of 4 December 2020

Last para.: Recalling its intention to review its request to the Secretary-General to report on the situation in Burundi every three months, as expressed in presidential statement S/2017/13, and noting that the Secretary-General's Special Envoy to Burundi completed his assignment on 30 November 2019, the Security Council requests the Secretary-General to cease his periodic reporting on the situation in Burundi and looks forward to the Secretary-General covering Burundi as part of his regular reporting on the Great Lakes region and Central Africa.

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in November 2021.

**CAR: MINUSCA mandate**

Resolution 2552 (2020) of 12 November 2020

Para. 26: Decides to extend the mandate of MINUSCA until 15 November 2021;

The mandate will expire on 15 November 2021.

**CAR: French forces mandate in support of MINUSCA**

Resolution 2552 (2020) of 12 November 2020

Para. 52: Authorises French armed forces, within the provisions of their existing bilateral agreement with the CAR and the limits of their capacities and areas of deployment, at the request of the Secretary-General, to use all the means to provide operational support to elements of MINUSCA when under serious threat, from the date of adoption of this resolution, and requests France to ensure reporting to the Council on the implementation of this mandate and to coordinate its reporting with that of the Secretary-General referred to in paragraph 54 of this resolution;

The mandate will expire on 15 November 2021.

**Libya: UNSMIL: SG to report to SC on the implementation of resolution [2542 \(2020\)](#)**

Resolution [2542 \(2020\)](#) of 15 September 2020

Para. 10: Requests the Secretary-General to continue to report to the Security Council on the implementation of this resolution at least every 60 days;

Resolution [2570 \(2021\)](#) of 16 April 2021

Para. 19: Further requests that the Secretary-General includes updates on UNSMIL's support to the relevant Libyan authorities and institutions ahead of the upcoming elections, the implementation of the 23 October ceasefire agreement, the progress made by the LCMM, the deployment of UNSMIL ceasefire monitors in support, and criteria for their eventual departure, in his regular reporting and in any additional reports, as necessary;

The Secretary-General is expected to report in November 2021.

**Libya: ICC Prosecutor briefing**

Resolution [1970 \(2011\)](#) of 26 February 2011

Para. 7: Invites the Prosecutor to address the Security Council within two months of the adoption of this resolution and every six months thereafter on actions taken pursuant to this resolution.

The ICC Prosecutor is expected to report in November 2021.

**Somalia: UNSOM/AMISOM: SG reports on the implementation of resolutions [2592 \(2021\)](#) and [2568 \(2021\)](#)**

Resolution [2592 \(2021\)](#) of 30 August 2021

Para. 17: Requests the Secretary-General to keep the Security Council regularly informed on the implementation of this resolution, and to identify and report on progress towards achieving key political benchmarks, in particular progress towards elections, including through oral updates and no fewer than four written reports, with the first written report due by 15 November and every 90 days thereafter;

Resolution [2592 \(2021\)](#) of 30 August 2021

Para. 15: Requests the United Nations, the FGS and FMS to consider the adverse implications of climate change, environmental degradation, other ecological changes and natural disasters, among other factors, in their programmes in Somalia, including by undertaking comprehensive risk assessments and risk management strategies relating to these factors, and requests the Secretary-General to provide an update in mandated reporting as appropriate;

Resolution [2568 \(2021\)](#) of 12 March 2021

Para. 41: Requests the Secretary-General to keep the Security Council regularly informed on the implementation of this resolution, in his regular reports requested in paragraph 16 of resolution [2540 \(2020\)](#) and in this regard further requests the Secretary-General to assess in his regular reports: (i) implementation of the STP and MAF as referenced in paragraph 1 of this resolution; (ii) implementation of HRDDP; and (iii) UNSOS support to AMISOM, UNSOM and the Somali security forces;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in November 2021.

**Somalia: AMISOM: SG to produce a proposal on the strategic objectives, size and composition of a reconfigured African Union mission**

Resolution [2568 \(2021\)](#) of 12 March 2021

Para. 9: Requests the Secretary-General, jointly with the African Union and in consultation with the FGS and donors, to produce a proposal on the strategic objectives, size and composition of a reconfigured African Union mission by the end of September 2021;

PSC letter of 4 October 2021 ([S/2021/859](#))

I have the honour to inform you that your letter dated 29 September 2021 in connection with Security Council resolution [2568 \(2021\)](#), in which the Council requested the Secretary-General, jointly with the African Union, and in consultation with the Federal Government of Somalia and donors, to produce a

proposal on the strategic objectives, size and composition of a reconfigured African Union mission by the end of September 2021, has been brought to the attention of the members of the Security Council. The members of the Council have taken note that a joint United Nations-African Union proposal that has been fully consulted with the Federal Government of Somalia and partners should be submitted to the Security Council by 15 November 2021 and they look forward to the submission.

The Secretary-General is expected to report in November 2021.

#### **Somalia: Sanctions: Authorization to inspect vessels bound to and from Somalia**

Resolution 2551 (2020) of 12 November 2020

Para. 23: Condemns any exports of charcoal from Somalia in violation of the total ban on the export of charcoal, reaffirms its decision regarding the ban on the import and export of Somali charcoal, as set out in paragraph 22 of its resolution 2036 (2012) (“the charcoal ban”), and paragraphs 11 to 21 of resolution 2182 (2014), and decides to renew the provisions set out in paragraph 15 of resolution 2182 (2014) until 15 November 2021;

The authorization will expire on 15 November 2021.

#### **Somalia: Sanctions: Panel of Experts on Somalia mandate review**

Resolution 2551 (2020) of 12 November 2020

Para. 30: Decides to renew, with effect from the date of adoption of this resolution, until 15 December 2021, the Panel on Somalia and that the mandate of the Panel shall include the tasks referred to in paragraph 11 of resolution 2444 (2018) and paragraph 1 of this resolution, requests the Secretary-General to include dedicated gender expertise, in line with paragraph 11 of its resolution 2467 (2019), and expresses its intention to review the mandate of the Panel and take appropriate action regarding any extension to the mandate no later than 15 November 2021;

The Security Council is expected to take action no later than 15 November 2021.

#### **Somalia: Piracy: SG to report to SC on the implementation of resolution 2554 (2020) and the situation with respect to piracy and armed robbery at sea off the coast of Somalia**

Resolution 2554 (2020) of 4 December 2020

Para. 29: Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Security Council within eleven months of the adoption of this resolution on the implementation of this resolution and on the situation with respect to piracy and armed robbery at sea off the coast of Somalia, including assessment of National Coast Guard capabilities as well as voluntary reports by cooperating States and regional organizations;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in November 2021.

#### **Sudan/South Sudan: UNISFA mandate**

Resolution 2575 (2021) of 11 May 2021

Para. 1: Decides to extend until 15 November 2021 the mandate of UNISFA as set out in paragraph 2 of resolution 1990 (2011) and acting under Chapter VII of the Charter of the United Nations, further decides to extend until 15 November 2021 the tasks of UNISFA as set out in paragraph 3 of resolution 1990 (2011), and further decides that UNISFA should continue to implement that mandate and tasks in accordance with resolution 2550 (2020);

The mandate will expire on 15 November 2021.

#### **Sudan/South Sudan: UNISFA mandate modification in support of the JBVMM**

Resolution 2575 (2021) of 11 May 2021

Para. 2: Decides to extend until 15 November 2021 UNISFA's mandate modification set forth in resolution 2024 (2011) and paragraph 1 of resolution 2075 (2012), which provides for UNISFA's support

to the Joint Border Verification and Monitoring Mechanism (JBVMM), and further decides that UNISFA should continue to implement that mandate and tasks in accordance with resolution [2550 \(2020\)](#);

The mandate will expire on [15 November 2021](#).

**Peace and security in Africa: SG to report to SC on activities of the Force conjointe du G5 Sahel**  
**Resolution [2391 \(2017\)](#) of 8 December 2017**

Para. 33: Requests the Secretary-General, in close coordination with the G5 Sahel States and the African Union, to report to the Security Council on the activities of the FC-G5S, five months after the adoption of this resolution and then every six months, focusing:

- (i) on progress in the operationalization of the FC-G5S,
- (ii) on international support granted to the FC-G5S and possible measures to enhance its efficiency,
- (iii) on implementation of the technical agreement, including through a detailed outline of the support provided by MINUSMA to the FC-G5S, an assessment of its potential impact on MINUSMA as well as the provision of benchmarks to indicate the level of operationalization of the FC-G5S at which MINUSMA's logistical and operational support may be gradually withdrawn,
- (iv) on challenges encountered by the FC-G5S and possible measures for further consideration,
- (v) on implementation by the G5 Sahel States of the compliance framework, the HRDDP, as well as on ways to mitigate any adverse impact of the military operations of the FC-G5S on the civilian population, including on women and children;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in [November 2021](#).

## ASIA/MIDDLE EAST

**Afghanistan: SG reports on UNAMA**

**Resolution [2596 \(2021\)](#) of 17 September 2021**

Para. 5: Requests the Secretary-General to submit a written report to the Security Council by 31 January 2022 on strategic and operational recommendations for the mandate of UNAMA, in light of recent political, security and social developments, further requests the Secretary-General to brief the Council on the situation in Afghanistan and the work of UNAMA every other month until 17 March 2022;

The Secretary-General is expected to report in [November 2021](#).

**Iraq: SG reports on UNAMI**

**Resolution [2576 \(2021\)](#) of 27 May 2021**

Para. 7: Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Council every three months on the progress made towards the fulfilment of all UNAMI's responsibilities;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in [November 2021](#).

**Iraq: SG to provide a detailed summary report to SC on Iraq's electoral process and UNAMI's assistance**

**Resolution [2576 \(2021\)](#) of 27 May 2021**

Para. 3: Requests the Secretary-General to provide a detailed summary report to the Council on Iraq's electoral process and UNAMI's assistance to that process, no later than 30 days after the conclusion of Iraq's forthcoming elections;

The Secretary-General is expected to report in [November 2021](#).

**Iraq: Special Adviser to submit and present reports on the Investigative Team (UNITAD)'s activities to the SC**

**Resolution [2379 \(2017\)](#) of 21 September 2017**

Para. 15: Requests the Special Adviser to complete the first report of the Team's activities, within 90 days of

the date on which it commences its activities, as notified by the Secretary-General, and to complete subsequent reports every 180 days thereafter, and requests the Special Adviser to present these reports to the Security Council;

SG letter of 15 August 2018 (S/2018/773)

Penultimate para.: In this regard, and following the mission of the Special Adviser to Iraq, I have the honour to notify the Security Council that the Investigative Team will begin its work on 20 August 2018.

Resolution 2597 (2021) of 17 September 2021

Para.3: Requests the Special Adviser to continue to submit and present reports to the Council on the team's activities every 180 days;

The report of the Special Adviser is expected to be presented in November 2021.

### **Iraq/Kuwait: missing persons and return of property**

Resolution 2107 (2013) of 27 June 2013

Para. 4: requests that the Special Representative of the Secretary-General and Head of the United Nations Assistance Mission to Iraq (UNAMI) promote, support and facilitate efforts regarding the repatriation or return of all Kuwaiti and third country nationals or their remains, and the return of Kuwaiti property, including the national archives, seized by Iraq, further requests the Secretary-General to report separately to the Security Council on these matters in his reports on the progress made towards the fulfilment of all UNAMI's responsibilities...;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in November 2021.

### **Middle East (Lebanon/UNIFIL): SG reports on implementation of resolution 1701 (2006)**

Resolution 2591 (2021) of 30 August 2021

Para. 29: Requests the Secretary-General to continue to report to the Council on the implementation of resolution 1701 (2006), every four months, or at any time as he deems appropriate, and to include in his reporting a prompt and detailed breakdown of all resolution 1701 (2006) violations, clarifications by the parties and updates on all pending investigations into such violations of resolution 1701, prompt and detailed reports on violations of the sovereignty of Lebanon, prompt and detailed reports on the restrictions to UNIFIL's freedom of movement, an enhanced annex on the implementation on the arms embargo, reports on specific areas where UNIFIL does not access and on the reasons behind these restrictions, potential risks to the cessation of hostilities and UNIFIL's response as well as reports on progress made as regards the detailed plan on the implementation of the 1 June assessment report as set out in paragraph 8 of the present resolution and on additional identified efficiencies to most appropriately fulfil its mandated tasks; requests the Secretary-General to continue to provide concrete and detailed information on the aforementioned issues to the Council, in line with changes to enhance reporting since the adoption of resolution 2373 (2017), 2433 (2018), 2485 (2019) and 2539 (2020);

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in November 2021.

### **Middle East: The situation in the Middle East, including the Palestinian question**

Resolution 1322 (2000) of 7 October 2000

Para.7: Invites the Secretary-General to continue to follow the situation and to keep the Security Council informed;

### **Middle East (Syria): OPCW DG to report to SC (through SG) on implementation of resolution 2118 (2013)**

Resolution 2118 (2013) of 27 September 2013

Para.12: Decides to review on a regular basis the implementation in the Syrian Arab Republic of the decision of the OPCW Executive Council of 27 September 2013 and this resolution, and requests the Director-General of the OPCW to report to the Security Council, through the Secretary-General, who shall include relevant information on United Nations activities related to the implementation of this resolution,

within 30 days and every month thereafter, and requests further the Director-General of the OPCW and the Secretary-General to report in a coordinated manner, as needed, to the Security Council, non-compliance with this resolution or the OPCW Executive Council decision of 27 September 2013;

The report is expected to be presented in November 2021.

**Middle East (Syria): SG report on the implementation of resolution 2268 (2016)**

Resolution 2268 (2016) of 26 February 2016

Para.10: Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Council on the implementation of this resolution, including by drawing on information provided by the ISSG ceasefire taskforce, and on resolution 2254 (2015), within 15 days of the adoption of this resolution and every 30 days thereafter;

The Secretary-General is expected to report in November 2021.

**Middle East (Yemen): SG to report to SC on implementation of resolution 2586 (2021) and resolution 2451 (2018)**

Resolution 2586 (2021) of 14 July 2021

Para. 7: Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Security Council on a monthly basis on progress regarding the implementation of this resolution, including on any obstructions to the effective operation of UNMHA caused by any party; and on resolution 2451 (2018), including on any non-compliance by any party;

The Secretary-General is expected to report in November 2021.

**Middle East (Yemen): SG to report on the implementation of resolution 2201 (2015) and on developments in Yemen**

Resolution 2201 (2015) of 15 February 2015

Para. 13: Requests the Secretary-General to report on the implementation of this resolution, and to continue to report on developments in Yemen, including on the implementation of the Gulf Cooperation Council Initiative and its Implementation Mechanism, the outcomes of the comprehensive National Dialogue conference, and the Peace and National Partnership Agreement and its security annex within 15 days after the date of adoption of this resolution and every 60 days thereafter;

The Secretary-General is expected to report in November 2021.

## EUROPE

**BiH: EUFOR ALTHEA authorisation**

Resolution 2549 (2020) of 5 November 2020

Para.3: Authorizes the Member States acting through or in cooperation with the EU to establish for a further period of twelve months, starting from the date of the adoption of this resolution, a multinational stabilization force (EUFOR ALTHEA) as a legal successor to SFOR under unified command and control, which will fulfil its missions in relation to the implementation of Annex 1-A and Annex 2 of the Peace Agreement in cooperation with the NATO Headquarters presence in accordance with the arrangements agreed between NATO and the EU as communicated to the Security Council in their letters of 19 November 2004, which recognize that EUFOR ALTHEA will have the main peace stabilization role under the military aspects of the Peace Agreement;

The mandate will expire on 5 November 2021.

**BiH: Authorization of NATO Headquarters**

Resolution 2549 (2019) of 5 November 2020

Para. 4: Decides to renew the authorization provided by paragraph 11 of its resolution 2183 (2014) for a further period of twelve months starting from the date of adoption of this resolution;



The authorization will expire on 5 November 2021.

**BiH: Reports of High Representative to SC thru SG**

Resolution 2183 (2014) of 11 November 2014

Para. 20: Also requests the Secretary-General to continue to submit to the Council reports from the High Representative, in accordance with annex 10 of the Peace Agreement and the conclusions of the Peace Implementation Conference held in London on 4 and 5 December 1996 ([S/1996/1012](#)), and later Peace Implementation Conferences, on the implementation of the Peace Agreement and in particular on compliance by the parties with their commitments under that Agreement

The report of the High Representative is expected to be issued in November 2021.

**BiH: EUFOR ALTHEA/NATO reports to SC**

Resolution 2183 (2014) of 11 November 2014

Para. 18: Requests the Member States acting through or in cooperation with the EU and the Member States acting through or in cooperation with NATO to report to the Council on the activity of EUFOR ALTHEA and NATO Headquarters presence respectively, through the appropriate channels and at least at six-monthly intervals;

**COUNTER-TERRORISM/NON-PROLIFERATION**

**Non-proliferation/DPRK: Sanctions: 1718 Committee reports**

Resolution 1718 (2006) of 14 October 2006

Para. 12: Decides to establish, in accordance with rule 28 of its provisional rules of procedure, a Committee of the Security Council consisting of all the members of the Council, to undertake the following tasks:

(g) To report at least every 90 days to the Security Council on its work, with its observations and recommendations, in particular on ways to strengthen the effectiveness of the measures imposed by paragraph 8 above.

The Chair of the 1718 Committee is expected to brief in November 2021.
