The fact that a matter is or is not included in the forecast carries no implication that it will or will not be taken up during the month: the actual programme of work will be determined by developments and the views of members of the Council.

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SECURITY COUNCIL FOR THE MONTH OF NOVEMBER 2022**

**AFRICA**

**Central African region: SG reports on UNOCA, including on the situation in the Lake Chad region**

Resolution 2349 (2017) of 31 March 2017

Para.34: Requests the Secretary-General to produce a written report within five months on the United Nations' assessment of the situation in the Lake Chad Basin Region as it relates to elements of this resolution, particularly regarding the progress made and remaining challenges, and possible measures for consideration, including with respect to achieving greater coherence of efforts in the context of overlapping regional strategies, and thereafter to include these elements in regular reporting by UNOCA and UNOWAS.

S/PRST/2018/17 of 10 August 2018

Last para.: The Security Council requests the Secretary-General to provide a written report to it on the situation in Central Africa and UNOCA's activities, including on the situation in the Lake Chad region as requested in resolution 2349 (2017), by 30 November 2018 and every six months thereafter.

S/PRST/2020/12 of 4 December 2020

Last para.: Recalling its intention to review its request to the Secretary-General to report on the situation in Burundi every three months, as expressed in presidential statement S/2017/13, and noting that the Secretary-General's Special Envoy to Burundi completed his assignment on 30 November 2019, the Security Council requests the Secretary-General to cease his periodic reporting on the situation in Burundi and looks forward to the Secretary-General covering Burundi as part of his regular reporting on the Great Lakes region and Central Africa.

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in November 2022.

**CAR: MINUSCA mandate**

Resolution 2605 (2021) of 12 November 2021

Para. 29: Decides to extend the mandate of MINUSCA until 15 November 2022;

The mandate will expire on 15 November 2022.

**CAR: French forces mandate in support of MINUSCA**

Resolution 2605 (2021) of 12 November 2021

Para. 56: Authorises French armed forces, within the provisions of their existing bilateral agreement with the CAR and the limits of their capacities and areas of deployment, at the request of the Secretary-General, to use all the means to provide operational support to elements of MINUSCA when under serious threat, from the date of adoption of this resolution, and requests France to ensure reporting to the Council on the implementation of this mandate and to coordinate its reporting with that of the Secretary-General referred to in paragraph 58 of this resolution;

The mandate will expire on 15 November 2022.

**Libya: ICC Prosecutor briefing**

Resolution 1970 (2011) of 26 February 2011

Para. 7: Invites the Prosecutor to address the Security Council within two months of the adoption of this resolution and every six months thereafter on actions taken pursuant to this resolution.

The ICC Prosecutor is expected to report in November 2022.

**Peace and security in Africa: SG to report on piracy and armed robbery at sea in the Gulf of Guinea**

Resolution 2634 (2022) of 31 May 2022

Para. 16: Further requests the Secretary-General to report, within five (5) months and on an exceptional basis in advance of the 10-year anniversary of the Yaoundé Code of Conduct, on the situation of piracy and armed robbery at sea in the Gulf of Guinea and its underlying causes, including any possible and potential linkages with terrorism in West and Central Africa and the Sahel, on the United Nations' support and contributions, and on any recommendations for further supporting and enhancing national efforts and regional and international cooperation towards combatting piracy and armed robbery at sea in the Gulf of Guinea;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in November 2022.

**Somalia: Sanctions: Authorization to inspect vessels bound to and from Somalia**

Resolution 2607 (2021) of 15 November 2021

Para. 5: Decides to renew and expand the provisions set out in paragraph 15 of resolution 2182 (2014) until 15 November 2022 and authorises Member States, acting nationally or through voluntary multinational naval partnerships such as "Combined Maritime Forces," in cooperation with the FGS and which the FGS has notified to the Secretary-General and which the Secretary-General has subsequently notified to all Member States, in order to ensure strict implementation of the arms embargo on Somalia, the charcoal ban, and the IED components ban, to inspect, without undue delay, in Somali territorial waters and on the high seas off the coast of Somalia extending to and including the Arabian sea and Persian Gulf, vessels bound to or from Somalia which they have reasonable grounds to believe are: [...]

The authorization will expire on 15 November 2022.

**Somalia: Sanctions: Panel of Experts on Somalia mandate review**

Resolution 2607 (2021) of 15 November 2021

Para. 38: Decides to renew, with effect from the date of adoption of this resolution, until 15 December 2022, the Panel on Somalia and that the mandate of the Panel shall include the tasks referred to in paragraph 11 of resolution 2444 (2018) and paragraph 2 of this resolution, requests the Secretary-General to include dedicated gender expertise, in line with paragraph 11 of its resolution 2467 (2019) and further requests the Panel to include gender as a cross-cutting issue in its investigations and reporting, and expresses its intention to review the mandate of the Panel and take appropriate action regarding any extension to the mandate no later than 15 November 2022;

The Security Council is expected to take action no later than 15 November 2022.

**Somalia: Piracy: SG to report to SC on the implementation of resolution 2608 (2021) and the situation with respect to piracy and armed robbery at sea off the coast of Somalia**

Resolution 2608 (2021) of 3 December 2021

Para. 29: Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Security Council within eleven months of the adoption of this resolution on the implementation of this resolution and on the situation with respect to piracy and armed robbery at sea off the coast of Somalia, including assessment of National Coast Guard capabilities as well as voluntary reports by cooperating States and regional organizations;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in November 2022.

### **Sudan/South Sudan: UNISFA mandate**

Resolution 2630 (2022) of 12 May 2022

Para. 1: Decides to extend until 15 November 2022 the mandate of UNISFA as set out in paragraph 2 of resolution 1990 (2011) and acting under Chapter VII of the Charter of the United Nations, further decides to extend until 15 November 2022 the tasks of UNISFA as set out in paragraph 3 of resolution 1990 (2011), and further decides that UNISFA should continue to implement that mandate and tasks in accordance with resolution 2609 (2021);

The mandate will expire on 15 November 2022.

### **Sudan/South Sudan: UNISFA mandate modification in support of the JBVMM**

Resolution 2630 (2022) of 12 May 2022

Para. 2: Decides to extend until 15 November 2022 UNISFA's mandate modification set forth in resolution 2024 (2011) and paragraph 1 of resolution 2075 (2012), which provides for UNISFA's support to the Joint Border Verification and Monitoring Mechanism (JBVMM), and further decides that UNISFA should continue to implement that mandate and tasks in accordance with resolution 2609 (2021);

The mandate will expire on 15 November 2022.

### **Peace and security in Africa: SG to report to SC on activities of the Force conjointe du G5 Sahel**

Resolution 2391 (2017) of 8 December 2017

Para. 33: Requests the Secretary-General, in close coordination with the G5 Sahel States and the African Union, to report to the Security Council on the activities of the FC-G5S, five months after the adoption of this resolution and then every six months, focusing:

- (i) on progress in the operationalization of the FC-G5S,
- (ii) on international support granted to the FC-G5S and possible measures to enhance its efficiency,
- (iii) on implementation of the technical agreement, including through a detailed outline of the support provided by MINUSMA to the FC-G5S, an assessment of its potential impact on MINUSMA as well as the provision of benchmarks to indicate the level of operationalization of the FC-G5S at which MINUSMA's logistical and operational support may be gradually withdrawn,
- (iv) on challenges encountered by the FC-G5S and possible measures for further consideration,
- (v) on implementation by the G5 Sahel States of the compliance framework, the HRDDP, as well as on ways to mitigate any adverse impact of the military operations of the FC-G5S on the civilian population, including on women and children;

Resolution 2640 (2022) of 29 June 2022

Para. 35: Requests that the next report by the Secretary-General on the FC-G5S contains updates, as appropriate, on the Independent High-Level Panel strategic assessment on Security and Development in the Sahel, as well as a section assessing how Mali's decision to withdraw from the G5 Sahel impacts the support referred to in paragraph 34 above, and expresses its intent to make a decision on the continuation of such support while noting this report and the G5 Sahel and the European Union's views and decisions;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in November 2022.

## **ASIA/MIDDLE EAST**

### **The situation in the Middle East, including the Palestinian question**

Resolution 1322 (2000) of 7 October 2000

Para. 7: Invites the Secretary-General to continue to follow the situation and to keep the Security Council informed.

**Middle East (Lebanon/UNIFIL): SG reports on implementation of resolution 1701 (2006)**

Resolution 2650 (2022) of 31 August 2022

Para. 30: Requests the Secretary-General to continue to report to the Council on the implementation of resolution 1701 (2006), every four months, or at any time as he deems appropriate, and to include in his reporting a prompt and detailed breakdown of all resolution 1701 (2006) violations, clarifications by the parties and updates on all efforts to hold perpetrators of such violations accountable as well as pending investigations into such violations of resolution 1701, prompt and detailed reports on violations of the sovereignty of Lebanon, on restrictions to UNIFIL's freedom of movement, including details concerning requests submitted by UNIFIL to the Lebanese authorities and any additional steps taken by UNIFIL, attacks, provocations and incitement to hatred and violence and disinformation and misinformation campaigns against UNIFIL, an annex on the implementation of paragraph 11 by 31 March 2023 and progress made in mobilization of international support for the LAF during this period, an enhanced annex on the implementation on the arms embargo, reports on specific areas where UNIFIL does not access and on the reasons behind these restrictions, potential risks to the cessation of hostilities and UNIFIL's response as well as reports on progress made as regards the detailed plan on the implementation of the 1 June assessment report as set out in paragraph 8 of the present resolution and on additional identified efficiencies to most appropriately fulfil its mandated tasks; measures to improve external communication of the mission and to counter disinformation and misinformation; requests the Secretary-General to continue to provide concrete and detailed information on the aforementioned issues to the Council, in line with changes to enhance reporting since the adoption of resolution 2373 (2017), 2433 (2018), 2485 (2019) and 2539 (2020);

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in November 2022.

**Middle East (Syria): OPCW DG to report to SC (through SG) on implementation of resolution 2118 (2013)**

Resolution 2118 (2013) of 27 September 2013

Para.12: Decides to review on a regular basis the implementation in the Syrian Arab Republic of the decision of the OPCW Executive Council of 27 September 2013 and this resolution, and requests the Director-General of the OPCW to report to the Security Council, through the Secretary-General, who shall include relevant information on United Nations activities related to the implementation of this resolution, within 30 days and every month thereafter, and requests further the Director-General of the OPCW and the Secretary-General to report in a coordinated manner, as needed, to the Security Council, non-compliance with this resolution or the OPCW Executive Council decision of 27 September 2013;

The report is expected to be presented in November 2022.

**Middle East (Syria): SG report on the implementation of resolution 2268 (2016)**

Resolution 2268 (2016) of 26 February 2016

Para.10: Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Council on the implementation of this resolution, including by drawing on information provided by the ISSG ceasefire taskforce, and on resolution 2254 (2015), within 15 days of the adoption of this resolution and every 30 days thereafter;

The Secretary-General is expected to report in November 2022.

**Middle East (Yemen): SG to report on the implementation of resolution 2201 (2015) and on developments in Yemen**

Resolution 2201 (2015) of 15 February 2015

Para. 13: Requests the Secretary-General to report on the implementation of this resolution, and to continue to report on developments in Yemen, including on the implementation of the Gulf Cooperation Council Initiative and its Implementation Mechanism, the outcomes of the comprehensive National Dialogue conference, and the Peace and National Partnership Agreement and its security annex within 15 days after the date of adoption of this resolution and every 60 days thereafter;

The Secretary-General is expected to report in November 2022.

**Middle East (Yemen): SG to report to SC on implementation of resolution 2643 (2022) and resolution 2451 (2018)**

Resolution 2643 (2022) of 13 July 2022

Para. 8: Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Security Council on a monthly basis on progress regarding the implementation of this resolution, including, inter alia on any obstructions to the effective operation of UNMHA caused by any party, any violations of the Hodeidah Agreement ceasefire, any attempts to bring any military reinforcements and military objects to and through the city, the ports of Hodeidah, Salif, and Ras Issa, and the governorate, any failures to remove any military manifestations from the city, and on resolution 2451 (2018), including on any non-compliance by any party;

The Secretary-General is expected to report in November 2022.

## EUROPE

**BiH: EUFOR ALTHEA authorisation**

Resolution 2604 (2021) of 3 November 2021

Para. 1: Authorizes the Member States acting through or in cooperation with the EU to establish for a further period of twelve months, starting from the date of the adoption of this resolution, a multinational stabilization force (EUFOR ALTHEA) as a legal successor to SFOR under unified command and control, which will fulfil its missions in relation to the implementation of Annex 1-A and Annex 2 of the General Framework Agreement for Peace in Bosnia and Herzegovina and the annexes thereto (collectively the Peace Agreement, S/1995/999, Annex) in cooperation with the NATO Headquarters presence in accordance with the arrangements agreed between NATO and the EU as communicated to the Security Council in their letters of 19 November 2004, which recognize that EUFOR ALTHEA will have the main peace stabilization role under the military aspects of the Peace Agreement;

The mandate will expire on 3 November 2022.

**BiH: Authorization of NATO Headquarters**

Resolution 2604 (2021) of 3 November 2021

Para. 2: Decides to renew the authorization provided by paragraph 11 of its resolution 2183 (2014) for a further period of twelve months starting from the date of adoption of this resolution;

The authorization will expire on 3 November 2022.

**BiH: Reports of High Representative to SC thru SG**

Resolution 2183 (2014) of 11 November 2014

Para. 20: Also requests the Secretary-General to continue to submit to the Council reports from the High Representative, in accordance with annex 10 of the Peace Agreement and the conclusions of the Peace Implementation Conference held in London on 4 and 5 December 1996 (S/1996/1012), and later Peace Implementation Conferences, on the implementation of the Peace Agreement and in particular on compliance by the parties with their commitments under that Agreement

The report of the High Representative is expected to be issued in November 2022.

**BiH: EUFOR ALTHEA/NATO reports to SC**

Resolution 2183 (2014) of 11 November 2014

Para. 18: Requests the Member States acting through or in cooperation with the EU and the Member States acting through or in cooperation with NATO to report to the Council on the activity of EUFOR

ALTHEA and NATO Headquarters presence respectively, through the appropriate channels and at least at six-monthly intervals;

## COUNTER-TERRORISM/NON-PROLIFERATION

### **Non-proliferation/DPRK: Sanctions: 1718 Committee reports**

Resolution [1718 \(2006\)](#) of 14 October 2006

Para. 12: Decides to establish, in accordance with rule 28 of its provisional rules of procedure, a Committee of the Security Council consisting of all the members of the Council, to undertake the following tasks:

(g) To report at least every 90 days to the Security Council on its work, with its observations and recommendations, in particular on ways to strengthen the effectiveness of the measures imposed by paragraph 8 above.

The Chair of the 1718 Committee is expected to brief in November 2022.

### **WMD: 1540 Committee mandate**

Resolution [2622 \(2022\)](#) of 25 February 2022

Para. 1: Decides to extend until 30 November 2022 the mandate of the 1540 Committee with the continued assistance of its group of experts, as specified in paragraph 5 of resolution [1977 \(2011\)](#), and requests the Secretary-General to take the necessary administrative measures to this effect;

The mandate will expire on 30 November 2022.
