

What components make up my sewer line connection?

A Side Sewer Lateral Line

This is the portion of the sewer pipe that runs from the connection at the sewer main to the property line, typically a six-inch diameter.

Building Sewer Line

This is the sewer pipe that runs from the property line to the connection of the building or home, typically a four-inch diameter. The maintenance and repairs of this line are the responsibility of the home or building owner.

G Sewer Main

This is the county sewer pipe that transports sewage from a property to a pumping station or to a sewage treatment facility. The side sewer line connects to the sewer main which is typically eight-inches or larger in diameter.

Sewer Cleanout

A sewer cleanout is a capped pipe which provides above ground access and allows homeowners to remove blockages in their building sewer line.

Maintaining your sewer line

- Locate & cap your sewer cleanout—keeps rainwater, leaves, tree-limbs and soil from entering and clogging the sewer line.
- **Disconnect downspouts**—keeps excess rainwater from entering the sewer system and overwhelming your sewer line.
- G Occasionally have a professional inspect this line for cracks, leaks and possible tree root intrusion.

- Hair
- Trash
- Feminine hygiene products
- Band-Aids
- Cotton swabs
- Pharmaceuticals
- Paint/Paint cleanersToxic chemicals
- Grease
- Fats
- Oils
- Bones
- Excess food
- Produce stickers
