

Walkway Talks: Where The Waters Are Never Still Sunday, September 7 – 2:30-3:30 p.m. Ulster Welcome Center, Highland

Join Eddie Moran and Lindsay Dalton of Historic Huguenot Street for "Where the Waters are Never Still," a presentation on the relationship between people and local rivers in the late 17th century. Attendees will learn how Native people, European settlers, and enslaved and free Africans interacted with the Hudson River and its estuaries in the first decades after colonization.

Lindsay Dalton and Eddie Moran have overseen tours and education at Historic Huguenot Street for the last two years. Historic Huguenot Street is a ten-acre historic landmark district in New Paltz that aims to engage diverse audiences in the exploration of America's multicultural past to understand the historical forces that have shaped America. This event is free to attend and appropriate for guests of all ages.

What did the "Gilded Age" mean to the free, Black community of the Staatsburg village? Join site staff for a one-hour conversation exploring that

question through census records, historic maps, and the larger context of race relations during the Gilded Age. Often pushed to the outskirts of society by White Americans, Black men and women were nonetheless able to foster a strong community in the face of constant adversity. This 90-minute guided hike will lead visitors through the park, exploring the history of three historic estates: from Staatsburgh's

Step back in time to the late 18th century! This free family-friendly outdoor festival features costumed reenactors and hands-on activities. September was the time of year when tenant farmers on the Philipse Manor would harvest

their wheat and start to bring it to the Philipse grist mills for assessment and grinding into flour. September was also apple harvest time in the Philipse orchards. Try your hand at grinding grain in a stone mill, grinding up apples for cider in a cider press, and other hands-on activities. Meet military and civilian reenactors, including General George Washington and his horse Nelson, members of Lord Dunmore's Ethiopian Regiment and the First Rhode Island Regiment, Westchester Patriot Ann Miller, colonial era craftspeople, and more. Enjoy live 18th century music from Carla & Keyes and try old-fashioned country dancing. Visit a traveling exhibit from the Odell House/Rochambeau Headquarters Museum. Play colonial-era games, try your hand at our Revolutionary War spy activity, and learn more about the history of Westchester County before and during the American Revolution.



September 14, Saturday at 12 noon The Aqueduct along Amsterdam Avenue Walk Meet up address: In front of Highbridge Recreation Center at 173rd St. and Amsterdam Ave., Manhattan Most of the Old Croton Aqueduct in Manhattan ran under Amsterdam Avenue.

Walk along this route and learn why that avenue was chosen, see vestiges of the aqueduct today, and immerse yourself in the historic and present-day activities of this part of Manhattan. Meet in front of the Highbridge Recreation Center at 173rd St. and Amsterdam Ave. We will end the walk in front of the gatehouse at 135th St. Public restrooms are available at the beginning and end

of the walk. For this two-hour walk, wear comfortable shoes and bring water. The walk begins with the descent of a five-story staircase. Walk may be rescheduled if weather does not cooperate. Required: pre-registration: <u>https://aqueduct.org/events/aqueduct-along-amsterdam-avenue-walk-8</u>



September 15, Sunday at 12 noon – The Aqueduct in Central Park Walk. Meet up address: Meet in front of the Central Park Tennis House in Central Park - Locate the tennis house on <u>Google Maps</u>.

Uncover hidden clues to the Aqueduct in Central Park and discover links between the Aqueduct's presence and the park's design. Meet in front of the Central Park Tennis House in Central Park. From the southeast corner of 96th St. and Central Park West, walk east in the park until you see the tennis courts on your left. Walk around the tennis courts to the tennis house. (Locate the

tennis house on <u>Google Maps</u>.) We will end the walk at Central Park West and W. 81st Street. Public restrooms are available at the beginning of the walk. For this two-hour walk, wear comfortable shoes and bring water. Walk will be cancelled if weather does not cooperate. September 15, Sunday at 10 am – Croton Dam & Reservoir Hike. Meet up address: Meet near the restrooms at the rear (south end) of the parking lot at Croton Gorge Park, Rte. 129, Cortlandt, NY. 10567, GPS Coordinates: 41°13' 20.46" N -73°51'12.59" W.

As part of the Hudson River Valley Ramble, enjoy a free, easy, 2 miles/2 hours (total) loop hike north along the Aqueduct and atop the beautiful Croton Dam. Meet near the restrooms at the rear (south end) of the parking lot at Croton

Gorge Park, Rte. 129, Cortlandt, NY. 10567, GPS Coordinates: 41°13′ 20.46″ N -73°51′12.59″ W. <u>Note</u>: Fee of \$10/car to enter park. The leader of the hike will discuss the history and construction of the Old Croton Aqueduct and the features of the Croton Dam, the trailhead of the Old Croton Aqueduct Trail. The Aqueduct was completed in 1842 to supply fresh water to a thirsty New York City. (From Metro-North Hudson Line Croton-Harmon Train Station: 15-minute taxi.) 

Featured Trail of the Month Hopeland Trails: Mills-Norrie State Park 9 Old Post Rd. Staatsburg, NY 12580 Distance: 1.8 miles Difficulty Rating: Easy

In the northern most section of Mills-Norrie State Park, park visitors can find the quiet and secluded Hopeland Area. Featuring almost two miles of trails, Hopeland is a favorite destination for birders, bikers, and dog walkers. Throughout the summer you will find a diverse landscape of meadows and woodlands which makes excellent habitat for wildlife. In the colder months snowshoeing and cross country skiing is a favorite for winter enthusiasts. Linking the Hopeland and Huntington trails will make a 1.5 mile loop around the property, or a short half mile out and back to Dragonfly Pond provides ample opportunities for recreation.

To celebrate the *Centennial of New York State Parks,* the Taconic Region is excited to present **Poetry in the Parks**, a new public art initiative that integrates poems in public parks and historic sites. Poets selected for the inaugural installation of **Poetry in the Parks** include: *Andrea Cohen* at FDR State Park; *Ada Limón*, *U.S. Poet Laureate*, at Walkway Over the Hudson (West side); *Robert Hass* at Lake Taghkanic State Park; *Ishion Hutchinson* at Clermont State Historic Site; *Patricia Spears Jones*, *NY Poet Laureate*, at Walkway Over the Hudson (East side).

Poetry in the Parks is presented as a partnership between Poetry Society of America and New York State / Taconic Region in the Hudson Valley. Poetry Society of America selected a range of diverse poems from poets who have published at least two books of poetry.

The <u>Poetry Society of America</u>, the nation's oldest poetry organization, was founded in 1910. Its mission is to place poetry at the crossroads of American life. The PSA transforms public spaces into sites for imaginative encounters with poems, engages diverse and often underserved communities, amplifies the voices of poets around issues of common concern, and honors their aesthetic contributions to our lives.


