

### Evansville chiropractor ordered to halt practices

EVANSVILLE, Ind. (AP) — An Evansville chiropractor will keep his license by agreeing to stop telling patients their health problems are caused by demons, evil spirits or other supernatural creatures.

Law Walden, owner of a chiropractic clinic that bears his name, also agreed to stop advertising and performing a sinus treatment in which a balloon is inserted into the nose, inflated and then burst.

The agreement between Walden, the State Board of Chiropractic Examiners and the state Attorney General's Office was signed March 16, said Jim Gallagher, a deputy attorney general for consumer protection.

and is not pregnant, he or she may give blood.

After having your pulse, blood pressure and temperature taken, the nurse will gently remove one pint of blood from a vein in your arm. The prick of the needle will be felt, but it won't be too painful.

For a short time after, the donor may be a bit weak but after taking the refreshments that are provided to all donors, strength returns.

Plan to be at the blood bank a little more than half an hour. It takes between five and 15 minutes to collect the blood. Blood can be donated once every 56 days up to five times a year. It takes about two weeks for the donor to replace all lost blood cells.

Merrillville police are reviewing good lists and employee records to gather names of people to interview.

Jasper County, Merrillville and Indiana State Police investigators from the Lafayette post swap bits of information daily on the two slayings and compare notes on similar robbery-slayings that have occurred elsewhere.

Police have ruled out any connection between the killings of the Indiana motel clerks and the robbery-slayings of motel clerks in Illinois and Kentucky last year.

"We are sending and receiving messages from police departments all over the country," said State Police Detective Herbert Gilchrist.

In Jasper County, where Gilchrist was shot three times, times and dumped on farm property 15 miles away, Sheriff Steven L. Reames is awaiting the turning point in the case.

"I don't have that essential piece yet. I'm constantly on this. It's a continuing thing," said Reames.

### Police hoping for concrete break in motel clerk slayings

MERRILLVILLE, Ind. (AP) — Police here investigating body fluid samples and soon will have ballistic test results, but they still lack a suspect or eyewitness in the slaying of two northern Indiana Days Inn motel clerks.

"If we ever have a suspect, we would have good evidence in court," said Don Markle, Merrillville Assistant Police Chief. "We have all kinds of leads, but nothing concrete. We have no sightings, no description — nothing."

Mary Margaret Gill, 34, of Ross Township, was killed and Deanne Marie Gilchrist, 34, of Hesseville, was robbed, abducted and killed on March 3.

Gill, the night auditor at the Days Inn along U.S. 30 and Interstate 65 in Merrillville, was found shot to death in a closed off section of the motel. The body of Gilchrist, an employee at the Days Inn on U.S. 24 in Remington, was found along Indiana 18 in rural White County.

"There is still enough activity in the case that we are by no means up against a brick wall," said Merrillville Police Chief Jerry McCoy.

Gill and Gilchrist were shot with a small caliber weapon. Gill was shot twice, Gilchrist three times.

Police are waiting to review the results of ballistic tests performed on the bullets.

Detectives say robbery appears to be the motive for the crimes. Just over \$425 was stolen from each drawer.

Traces of semen were found on the Merrillville scene, McCoy said, but while there was prob-
