HOPKINS POND

Originally an underground stream, Hopkins Pond was created in 1789 when an earthen dam was built by John Estaugh Hopkins. The pond was built to power the Haddon Mill which stayed operational until the 1850s.

Hopkins Lane sits on top of the original dam, though it has been rebuilt many times. In 1916, the Borough of Haddonfield bought the Hopkins, Driscoll and Evans ponds, as well as 24 acres of land.

In 1927, Camden County purchased the park from Haddonfield. The park includes a variety of flora, fauna and wildlife, and is a great fishing spot.
