## MARIA BARNABY GREENWALD MEMORIAL PARK

Greenwald Park is a 47 acre park located in Cherry Hill, bounded by Park Boulevard (just south of Rt. 70), Grove Street and Kings Highway. The park was named in honor of Maria Barnaby Greenwald, a beloved mayor of Cherry Hill and the first woman to be elected as a Camden County Freeholder.

The Greenwald and adjacent Pennypacker Park areas were originally developed by the Emergency Conservation Works Administration stationed at Camp Cooper in Haddonfield. Between 1936 and 1937, two hundred employees thinned and cleared woodlands, planted trees and shrubbery, built foot trails and bridges, dredged for a lake site for erosion control, bank protection and beautification.

They also planted acres of new deciduous forest with the objective of growing various species of South Jersey flora. Today the park encompasses a variety of different habitats with plenty of wildlife, especially birds. The 1.8 mile Cooper River Watchable Wildlife Walk begins here, with brochures available at the Parks Building and 3 locations along the trail.
