The ATPA Certificate of Origin format is found under the CBP Regulations, 19 CFR Part 10.201-10.207. The type of information collected includes the processing operations performed on articles, the material produced in a beneficiary country or in the U.S., and a description of those processing operations. The ATPDEA regulations are found in 19 CFR 10.251–10.257. Claims under ATPDEA are submitted using CBP Form 449.
