The dates for final updates are subject to change and may be earlier, depending on the quality of the national file.



Births: Provisional Data for 2023




This report was published in April 2024 and can be found at this link. The report presents 2023 provisional birth data based on 99.9% of all records. The provisional number of births for the United States in 2023 was 3,591,328, down 2% from 2022. The general fertility (births per 1,000 women ages 15–44) declined 3%. Rates declined for women in age groups 15-19 through 35-39. The cesarean delivery rate and the low-risk cesarean delivery rate both rose in 2023, to 32.4% and 26.6%, respectively. The preterm birth rate was essentially unchanged at 10.41%.

Maternal and Infant Characteristics Among Women with Confirmed or Presumed Cases of Coronavirus Disease (COVID-19) During Pregnancy



This marks the final release of findings for this project, which tracked characteristics and outcomes for mothers with COVID-19 during pregnancy for 15 vital statistics jurisdictions over the pandemic years. We would like to acknowledge the maternal COVID-19 reporting areas for their essential contributions to this important project: Alabama, Alaska, Arkansas, California, the District of Columbia, Idaho, Maine, Maryland, New Hampshire, North Dakota, Ohio, Oklahoma, Oregon, Tennessee and West Virginia.

New surveillance dashboard on Provisional Drug Overdose Death Counts for Specific Drugs



The NCHS Vital Statistics Rapid Release Program is pleased to announce a new surveillance dashboard that can be found at this link. This dashboard has information on specific drugs based on data from literal text of death certificates, unlike typical NVSS data releases for specific drugs that use ICD-10 coded death data. The surveillance site, "Provisional Drug Overdose Death Counts for Specific Drugs," will report 12month ending estimates for 6 drugs mentioned with involvement in drug overdose deaths. The specific drugs included the surveillance site are fentanyl, methamphetamine, cocaine, heroin. oxycodone, xylazine. The dashboard will be updated biannually, with the next update anticipated in July 2024.

MDI Connect Launches New Website

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) Collaborating Office for Medical Examiners and Coroners (COMEC) and the CDC Foundation have partnered to create

MDI Connect in order to enhance data sharing among medical examiners and coroners (MEC), public health departments, case management systems, toxicology, and other agencies. MDI Connect's mission is to modernize data systems to create a standardized process for exchanging medicolegal death investigation (MDI) data.

MDI Connect is comprised of MEC offices that are committed to modernizing MDI data systems. These offices, their key data sharing partners, information management system vendors, and subject matter experts work together to design, build and test FHIR®-enabled MDI data exchange practices. The MEC offices use standards-based approaches that are scalable and reusable across multiple locations with different data entities. MDI Connect recently launched a website to describe the project's mission and share progress and challenges of MEC offices funded to participate in this modernization initiative. The MDI Connect website also includes links to important tools and resources for any MEC office interested in data modernization.

Phase IV of the NVSS CoP Jurisdictional Outreach is officially underway, marking another significant step in our collective journey as we focus on jurisdictions completing precertification. We are thrilled to share that as of the completion of Phase III, an impressive 98% of the 57 jurisdictional Vital Records Offices have participated in an NCHS-organized testing event. We look forward to even more remarkable achievements as we transition into the next phase.

The next formal NCHS-organized testing event, another key milestone in the modernization journey, is scheduled for June 3rd-4th, 2024. In preparation for this event, observing and testing jurisdictional participants should ensure they have access to the NVSS API (test environment) through SAMS. If you

are not already in the process of getting access (or already have access based on past testing events), please reach out to NVSSmodernization@cdc.gov and make the request. The individuals doing the hands-on testing are the intended target audience for receiving access. In anticipation of the June testing event, NVSS has announced that May Weekly Optional Office Hours will serve as testing event prep meetings. Regular Office Hours will reconvene on June 11th. The NVSS CoP offers jurisdictions for the next testing event the ability to complete their FHIR mortality pre-certification steps during the testing event and attempt the new FHIR natality flow. Special thanks to the participating jurisdictions; your active involvement is critical to our collective success. Jurisdictions are encouraged to continue informal testing, accessing the NVSS API, between events, to post questions to Zulip for technical assistance, and to attend our weekly CoP Office Hours.

As the NVSS Modernization CoP continues to assist jurisdictions with their readiness for production with FHIR, we want to underscore the value of **Pre-Certification and Certification** in the NVSS Modernization Pathway. These steps are not only required, but also equip jurisdictions to handle FHIR data submissions and better prepare them for eventual production.
