Discussion of Racing Congress to be sponsored by The National Association of State Racing Commissionsers: The Chairman spoke to Thomas Brogan on Monday, December 12, 1966, and Mr. Brogan informed the Chairman that the Executive Committee had recommended and approved the Racing Congress. The Chairman asked Mr. Brogan if approval was received from all members of The Executive Committee and Mr. Brogan replied that it was. The Chairman asked if all Commissioners had been polled as to their opinion in the matter and Mr. Brogan replied that he would inquire and advise us. No further advice was received from Mr. Brogan.

Upon motion duly made and seconded, the Commission approved the applications of The New York Racing Association Inc., for drawings and specifications prepared by Arthur Froehlich & Associates, covering the site development work, including the paddock area, railroad terminal and Racing Department Building, at their race track, Belmont Park, Nassau County, New York, as set forth in letter dated December 12, 1966. The Chairman was authorized to issue permits therefor. It was agreed that Mr. Alex M. Robb would examine the blueprints and make any appropriate suggestions to the Commissions.

On December 21, 1966, Commissioners Hanrahan and de Roulet gave approval by telephone for The New York Racing Association Inc., to enter into agreement with C B S Television Network, extending their contract for the Belmont Stakes to include 1967, 1968 and 1969. This request was made in letter dated December 16, 1966 from Mr. George Fritz. This action was ratified at this meeting and the Chairman was requested to send the necessary letter of approval.

The Commission unanimously approved William H. Welch as Assistant to Alex M. Robb, of the Thoroughbred Breeders Service Bureau.

The Commission will circulate a draft of a Memorandum, submitted by Commissioner de Roulet, to staff members as follows:

"The Commissioners of the New York State Racing Commission unanimously request that all members of the Commission staff refrain from wagering at tracks under jurisdiction of the Commission."

Harry Peterson, Chief Chemist, reported that he is in the process of submitting laboratory statistics. These will probably be received by the Commission within the next week or ten days.

At the request of Commissioner de Roulet, there was a discussion of the operations at the Finger Lakes race track and Gerard A. Burke, the Commission's Steward at Finger Lakes, delivered his personal observations of the Finger Lakes' operations. The Discussion revealed that there was need for substantial improvement in the management area. It was decided to invite Francis J. D'Amanda, Trustee for the Finger Lakes Racing Association, to attend the next regular monthly Commission meeting which will be held on Thursday, February 9, 1967.

Other matters of interest to the Commission were discussed.

There being no further business, upon motion duly made and seconded, the meeting adjourned.

Approval was given for a special post time of 11:00 A.M. on Thursday, November 24, 1967, which is Thanksgiving Day.

The Commission again discussed Polyethylene Glycol and unanimously approved a policy requesting Francis Dunne, Steward, to notify trainers to cease using any medication that contains polyethylene glycol after the horse is entered in a race.

The following is a Press Release on Rule 10.6 of the Rules and Regulations of the State Racing Commission:

"The New York State Racing Commission today amended Rule 10.6 of its Rules and Regulations reducing the minimum pari-mutuel pay-off at all New York race courses from \$2.20 to \$2.10 on each winning two dollar wager.

This action was taken in accordance with the following statement of position adopted by The National Association of State Racing Commissioners at its recent Convention in Miami, Florida.

*Statistical studies and reports relating to the substantial increase in the number of minus pools at various tracks throughout the country disclose a condition which becomes a matter of paramount concern to the members of The NASRC. "We are concerned not so much with the loss of revenue incurred by track management when a minus pool occurs, although the financial soundness of racing operations should always command our attention. Rather, we are most disturbed by the persistent reports that minus pools have been caused in the main by an influx of professional players who have been attracted by the increase from five per cent to 10 per cent in the minimum pay-off per dollar.

*This is substantiated by our own knowledge that the vast majority of racetrack patrons are disinclined to risk their moderate wagers in order to make a profit of 20 cents on every two-dollar investment.

*Needless to say, the presence of the professionals has never worked to the benefit of any sport or the patrons of any sport. This is especially true in a sport as sensitive as racing.

'The welfare of the racing fan and the integrity of the sport has always been and must always be the primary concern of all racing commissions throughout the country and the world.

'With this in mind, it is the recommendation of this body that all commissions take such immediate steps as may be appropriate within their respective jurisdictions to remedy an unfortunate situation which, if allowed to go unchecked, can only cause harm and bring discredit to the great sport of racing.

We specifically recommend that laws be enacted or rules passed guaranteeing a minimum pay-off of 5 per cent instead of 10 per cent on every dollar wagered, with the strong belief, based on past experience, that such action will eliminate in a substantial way the attraction to professional players and at the same time have little or no effect on the great majority of racing fans.*"

The Commission considered amendment to its Rules and Regulations, and upon motion duly made and seconded, it amended its rules as follows:

Section 10.6 now reading as follows:

10.6 Minimum pay-off. Each association must in all cases of a pari-mutuel pool distribute not less than \$2.20 on each winning two dollar wager. No part of any minus pools resulting from such payments shall be charged against the State's participation in the total pools or the breaks.

is hereby amended to read as follows:

10.6 Minimum pay-off. Each association must in all cases of a pari-mutuel pool distribute not less than \$2.10 on each winning two dollar wager. No part of any minus pools resulting from such payments shall be charged against the State's participation in the total pools or the breaks.

The Chairman read the existing rule in California, After the discussion, it was recommended that Counsel Joseph E. Ruggiero take this matter up with the Attorney General and report back at the May meeting.

The Commission approved the post time for the Finger Lakes Racing Association's 1967 rac e meetings for 2:00 P.M., as requested in their letter of April 3, 1967.

On motion duly made and seconded, the Commission approved revised names of racing officials at the Finger Lakes Racing Association as requested in their letter of April 3, 1967:

Upon motion duly made and seconded, the Commission approved the Agreement between The New York Racing Association Inc., and Sports Network Incorporated for broadcast by television and radio of certain horse races at N.Y.R.A. tracks during the 1967 racing season.

Discussion of pari-mutuel machines, (time of locking same) was held and it was decided that no change in the rule be made as requested in letter from Assemblyman Orest V. Maresca, dated March 14, 1967.

Discussion of Polyethylene Glycol was held and the Chairman stated that Harry Peterson's opinion and report on PEG was substantiated by the Chief Chemist of the California Racing Board and the Chairman was proud to announce that Robert E. Vessiny is a product of our New York Commission Laboratory.

The following is a telegram from Governor Nelson A. Rocke-feller to the Chairman with regard to the strike by the horsemen at Aqueduct, from Wednesday, April 5 to Monday, April 10, 1967:

"April 7, 1967:

It is imperative we take action to forestall any further loss of critical revenues resulting from the cessation of the racing at Aqueduct. These revenues are essential to finance vital State services.

In keeping with discussions had between you and members of my staff, I authorize you to explore immediately with The New York Racing Association the possibility of their reaching an agreement with the Association's creditor banks to permit a one-year moratorium of the payments on the Association's outstanding loans to the extent that such a moratorium would make available immediately an amount of \$3.5 millon for increased purses. Nelson Rockefeller"

Commissioner Edmond M. Hanrahan suggested that the Minutes record the appreciation of the Commission for the efforts of Chairman Gimma in the recent strike by the horsemen at Aqueduct. At the suggestion of Commissioner Hanrahan and with the endorsement of Commissioner Vincent de Roulet, the State Racing Commission herewith records with great satisfaction the role played by Chairman Joseph A. Gimma in the recent successful negotiations involving the horsemen which threatened to curtail Thoroughbred racing indefinitely in New York State.

Chairman Gimma's handling of an extremely delicate situation was recognized by Governor Nelson A. Rockefeller, Speaker of the State Assembly Anthony Travia, the horsemen, press and public who were united in their praise of Chairman Gimma's important individual contribution in helping mediate a situation which threatened the future of Thoroughbred racing in the Empire State.

Chairman Gimma's devotion to his position as a representative of New York State's interest in Thoroughbred racing emphasizes the part played by the Commission to bring about a better understanding between the sport of Thoroughbred racing and our State government.

There was a tote failure at Aqueduct on Monday, March 20, 1967. The Counsel, Joseph E. Ruggiero was requested to write to Mr. Edward T. Dickinson, President of The New York Racing Association Inc.

Upon motion duly made and seconded, the Commission approved the request of The New York Racing/Inc., in their letter of May 1, 1967, regarding "A Day at the Races" program to be held at Aqueduct from May 19th and continuing on each Friday thereafter until October 27th. Approval was also given for the meeting to be held at Saratoga.

Letter and explanation from Edward T. Dickinson, President of The New York Racing Association Inc., regarding the tote failure at Aqueduct Race track on March 20th, was received and discussed.

Upon motion duly made and seconded, the Commission approved the proposed agreement between E. J. Burke Security Systems Inc., and the Department of State, on behalf of the State Racing Commission, providing for certain services to be rendered at the Finger Lakes Park, Town of Farmington, Ontario County, New York, from May 1, 1967 to April 30, 1968.

Dr. Edmond Comans' letter of resignation was regretfully accepted by the Commission. Dr. Comans was urged to detain his resignation until Dr. James Brewer can replace him. Dr. Brewer's appointment as Supervisor of Drug Tests was approved by the Commission.

The following letter was received by hand from the attorneys for Mr. Manuel Ycaza:

Re: Manuel Ycaza

Dear Chairman Gimma:

In connection with the appeal of the suspension

recently imposed upon our client, Mr. Manuel Ycaza, there are additional facts which we wish to bring to your attention.

Initially, we wish to point out that we and our client have absolutely no desire to embarrass the Commission, the Stewards or any other party connected with the case and we have made every effort to handle the matter in a manner least calculated to cause embarrassment to anyone. Furthermore, we are fully cognizant of the adverse effect that litigation of this dispute could have upon racing in our State. It was never our client's intention to run the risk of causing any harm to racing by bringing this matter to the courts. Had court action been contemplated we would have requested a formal hearing with a stenographer present. would have sought to examine the Stewards, jockeys and other witnesses under oath, and otherwise would have endeavored to create a record suitable for court action. Obviously, we would have moved long before this time if we wanted to institute legal proceedings. cerely hope that our client's appeal has not suffered because of his desire to protect racing by avoiding litigation.

We also wish to emphasize that the action taken by our client and ourselves was never intended to reflect in any way, upon the honor, dignity or competence of the Stewards. We know full well that the Stewards are men of unimpeachable integrity, who are scrupulously fair in their judgments. The fact that no suspension handed down by the Stewards has previously been appealed by a jockey is a testament which speaks for itself. Nevertheless, all men can make honest mistakes and we and our client firmly believe that an honest mistake was made in this instance. We are certain that the Stewards are men of sufficient stature to admit the possibility of an honest mistake.

We know that the Stewards viewed the motion pictures of the subject race and made their judgment on the basis of these pictures. However, motion pictures can be deceiving, since they are not 3-dimensional and are not necessarily taken from an angle which gives the clearest indication of what occurred. Realizing this, a member of our firm met with jockey Angel Cordero last night to get a first hand version of the facts. After hearing his explanation, we endeavored to procure from him an affidavit. He told us, however, that

it was not in his best interests to give an affidavit and he indicated that he had been advised not to do so. Nevertheless, he stated that he would testify before the Commission if he was called.

Mr. Cordero advised us that our client at no time forced him into the rail in the stretch run of the Grey Lag Handicap and that he never intended to give such an impression. He further advised us that any interference which might have been caused was clearly unintentional, that our client's horse had a tendency to lug in to the left and that, in his opinion, our client made every effort to control his horse and keep him on a straight path.

Mr. Cordero further advised us that he made no claim of interference against our client at the 3/16th pole and that his complaint was against Mr. Ussery and his mount, as it was Mr. Ussery's horse which bothered him and forced him into the rail at that point in the race. Moreover, he advised us that he was in a perfect position to observe, and actually did observe, what occurred at that point in the race. He informed us that our client did not, in any way, interfere with Mr. Rotz' horse or with any other horse at the 3/16th pole and that any jam-up which occurred at that point was in no way attributable to our client or his mount.

In view of the information given by Mr. To corder wand we can assure you that this letter accurately relects his information and that a further hearing is really unneccessary) we strongly urge that the dictates of justice require a mitigation of Mr. Ycaza's penalty.

We firmly believe that a decision by the Commission, reducing the term of Mr. Ycaza's suspension will be a positive benefit to racing and will significantly advance the interests of racing in our state. It will firmly establish that the right of appeal conferred by the Rules is a meaningful right. It will clearly demonstrate that the ultimate control of the matter resides where it was intended to reside, with the Racing Commission. It will confirm to the public at large and to those connected with racing that the Commissioners are men of integrity, courage and conviction, with the best interests

of racing at heart, who can and will act with justice and fairness in a meritorious case by alleviating an undue hardship imposed upon a sincere and able jockey.

Since the suspension of Mr. Ycaza has already been in effect for nine days, we earnestly request that you and your fellow Commissioners take immediate action in the matter.
