- 7 Section 800.3 is amended to remove an explanation of TWC's provisions for helping HUBs bid

- 9 850.23, incorporating TWC's formal adoption of the rules of the Texas Comptroller of Public
- Accounts, consistent with Texas Government Code §2161.002 relating to HUBs.
