Through this programme, we aim to engage young leaders from across the globe to realise the objectives of the UN Plan of Action to Prevent Violent Extremism, the Youth 2030 Strategy, and the Global Counter Terrorism Strategy.

We are very proud to call these young leaders our partners. Today we will hear from South Asian and Southeast Asian young leaders who will share with us their recommendations on how best to include youth in the development and implementation of PCVE policy frameworks.

We believe that young people are critical to building resilient societies, and ensuring lasting solidarity. My Office is therefore committed to enhancing the capacities of young women and men to adapt and grow, including through events like this Regional Policy Dialogue.
