DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE

I hope this newsletter finds you well and enjoying the warmer weather. And of course, what better way to soak up some sun than with a good book? Our digital book machines can be charged so you can listen to books wherever you go, whether that's your porch, garden, while camping, or on a summer vacation. And if you're feeling adventurous this summer, you might even try out the BARD app on your smartphone or tablet. BARD stands for Braille and Audio Reading Download, and it's an app provided by the National Library Service for the Blind and Print Disabled (NLS). You can use the BARD app to download books and magazines directly onto your mobile device so that you can access your reading materials wherever you go without having to carry the player. If you're interested, give the library a call, and we can help get you set up to try it out. We even offer a class every few months for people who want to learn more about the BARD app. Finally, we'd like to thank everyone who completed this year's patron survey. We'll be publishing the results in our next newsletter, but we wanted you to know that we appreciate the time you took to give us feedback!

ABLE Book Club

Join us for our <u>ABLE Book Club</u> that meets every third Wednesday of the month from 3:30 to 4:30 pm.
