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Dear Attorney General Wasden:

We represent American Frame Corporation (“AFC”) headquartered in Maumee, Ohio, with respect to a potential data security incident described in more detail below. AFC takes the security and privacy of the information in its control seriously, and has taken steps to prevent a similar incident from occurring in the future.

This letter will serve to inform you of the nature of the security breach, what information has been compromised, and the steps that AFC is taking to secure the integrity of its systems. We have also enclosed hereto a sample of the notification made to the potentially impact individuals, which includes an offer of free credit monitoring.

1. Nature of the Security Incident

AFC is a custom frame and art printing service. On August 1, 2020, AFC detected that it was the target of a cybersecurity attack. An unauthorized third party attempted to infiltrate AFC’s computer network, encrypt AFC’s data, and then demand a ransom payment in exchange for decryption. Through this compromise, it is possible that certain individuals’ full name, mailing address, and either social security number or credit card information was exposed to cybercriminals.

2. Number of Idaho Residents Affected

A total of one hundred and seventeen (117) Idaho residents were potentially affected by this security incident. Notification letters to these individuals were mailed on January 14, 2021 by first class mail. A sample copy of the notification letter is included with this letter.

Upon detecting this incident, AFC moved quickly to initiate its incident response, which included conducting an investigation with the assistance of third-party forensic specialists and confirming the security of its network environment. AFC has reviewed and altered its tools, policies, and procedures relating to the security of its systems and servers, as well as its information life cycle management.

AFC values the safety of its customers' personal information and is therefore offering credit monitoring and identity theft protection services through ID Experts Corp. ("IDX"). IDX's services include: At least 12 months of credit monitoring and fully managed ID theft recovery services. With this protection, IDX will help the affected individuals resolve issues if their identity is compromised.

Notice of Data Breach

We are writing in order to inform you of an incident that may have exposed your sensitive personal information. We take the security of your personal information seriously and want to provide you with information and resources you can use to protect your information.

What Happened and What Information was Involved:

American Frame Corporation (“AFC”) is a custom frame and art printing service located in Maumee, Ohio.

On August 1, 2020, AFC detected that it was the target of a cybersecurity attack. An unauthorized third party attempted to infiltrate AFC’s computer network, encrypt AFC’s data, and then demand a ransom payment in exchange for decryption. Although we have found no evidence that your information has been specifically accessed for misuse, it is possible that your full name, mailing address, and social security number could have been exposed to cybercriminals.

This information was maintained by AFC for two primary purposes, being employee payroll and benefits, as well as contractor/vendor tax purposes.

What We Are Doing:

Upon detecting this incident, we moved quickly to initiate our incident response, which included conducting an investigation with the assistance of third-party forensic specialists and confirming the security of our network environment. We have reviewed and altered our tools, policies, and procedures relating to the security of our systems and servers, as well as our information life cycle management.

We value the safety of your personal information and are therefore offering credit monitoring and identity theft protection services through ID Experts Corp. (“IDX”). IDX’s services include: At least 12 months of credit monitoring and fully managed id theft recovery services. With this protection, IDX will help you resolve issues if your identity is compromised.

We encourage you to contact IDX with any questions and to enroll in free IDX services by calling 833-754-1801 or by going to <https://response.idx.us/frame> and using the Enrollment Code provided above. IDX is available Monday through Friday 9 am - 9 pm Eastern Time. Please note the deadline to enroll is April 14, 2021.

Again, at this time, there is no evidence that your information has been misused. However, we encourage you to take full advantage of this service offering. IDX representatives have been fully versed on the incident and can answer questions or concerns you may have regarding protection of your personal information.



### Additional Information

**Credit Reports:** You may obtain a copy of your credit report, free of charge, whether or not you suspect any unauthorized activity on your account. You may obtain a free copy of your credit report from each of the three nationwide credit reporting agencies. To order your free credit report, please visit [www.annualcreditreport.com](http://www.annualcreditreport.com), or call toll-free at 1-877-322-8228. You can also order your annual free credit report by mailing a completed Annual Credit Report Request Form (available at <https://www.consumer.ftc.gov/articles/0155-free-credit-reports>) to: Annual Credit Report Request Service, P.O. Box 105281, Atlanta, GA, 30348-5281.

**Security Freeze:** You also have the right to place a security freeze on your credit report. A security freeze is intended to prevent credit, loans, and services from being approved in your name without your consent. To place a security freeze on your credit report, you need to make a request to each consumer reporting agency. You may make that request by certified mail, overnight mail, regular stamped mail, or by following the instructions found at the websites listed below. The following information must be included when requesting a security freeze (note that if you are requesting a credit report for your spouse or a minor under the age of 16, this information must be provided for him/her as well): (1) full name, with middle initial and any suffixes; (2) Social Security number; (3) date of birth; (4) current address and any previous addresses for the past five years; and (5) any applicable incident report or complaint with a law enforcement agency or the Registry of Motor Vehicles. The request must also include a copy of a government-issued identification card and a copy of a recent utility bill or bank or insurance statement. It is essential that each copy be legible, display your name and current mailing address, and the date of issue. As of September 21, 2018, it is free to place, lift, or remove a security freeze. You may also place a security freeze for children under the age of 16. You may obtain a free security freeze by contacting any one or more of the following national consumer reporting agencies:

**Fraud Alerts:** You can place fraud alerts with the three credit bureaus by phone and online with:

A fraud alert tells creditors to follow certain procedures, including contacting you, before they open any new accounts or change your existing accounts. For that reason, placing a fraud alert can protect you, but also may delay you when you seek to obtain credit. As of September 21, 2018, initial fraud alerts last for one year. Victims of identity theft can also get an extended fraud alert for seven years. The phone numbers for all three credit bureaus are at the bottom of this page.

**Monitoring:** You should always remain vigilant and monitor your accounts for suspicious or unusual activity.

**File Police Report:** You have the right to file or obtain a police report if you experience identity fraud. Please note that in order to file a crime report or incident report with law enforcement for identity theft, you will likely need to provide proof that you have been a victim. A police report is often required to dispute fraudulent items. You can generally report suspected incidents of identity theft to local law enforcement or to the Attorney General.

**FTC and Attorneys General:** You can further educate yourself regarding identity theft, fraud alerts, security freezes, and the steps you can take to protect yourself, by contacting the consumer reporting agencies, the Federal Trade Commission, or your state Attorney General.

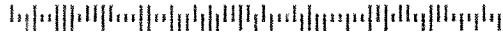

American Frame Corporation (“AFC”) is a custom frame and art printing service located in Maumee, Ohio.

On August 1, 2020, AFC detected that it was the target of a cybersecurity attack. An unauthorized third party attempted to infiltrate AFC’s computer network, encrypt AFC’s data, and then demand a ransom payment in exchange for decryption. It is possible that your full name, mailing address, and credit card information could have been exposed to cybercriminals. The impacted credit card has the last four digits of: VAR\_DATA\_1.

This information was maintained by AFC for customer payment processing.

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
