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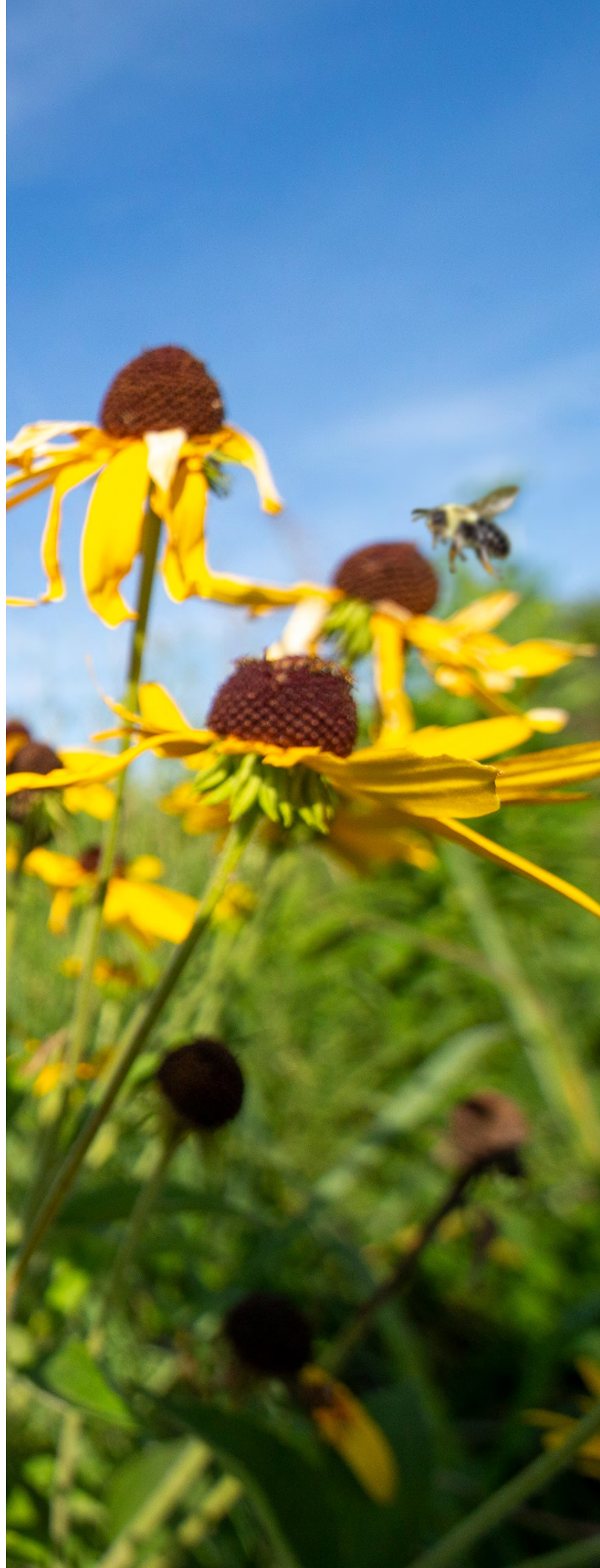

As Acting Chair and Vice-Chairperson of the Governor’s Organ Donation Advisory Committee (GODAC) during Fiscal Year 2022, I am pleased to present our 2022 Annual Report.

The GODAC is a unique and vitally important committee that serves Missourians waiting on the transplant list and the Missourians who have said “yes” to donation. We bring together representatives from Mid-America Transplant, Midwest Transplant Network, Saving Sight, Gift of Life, and the Missouri Kidney Program with the shared goal of saving and healing lives through organ, eye, and tissue donation. We also honor the more than 4.2 million Missourians currently listed in our statewide, confidential donor registry.

Fiscal Year 2022 saw GODAC return to normalcy with five in-person/virtual meetings. We also saw growth as we welcomed newly appointed members to the committee. This report will describe some of our activities, programs and goals, all of which were possible because of our partners, the Departments of Health and Senior Services, Elementary and Secondary Education, Revenue and Conservation.

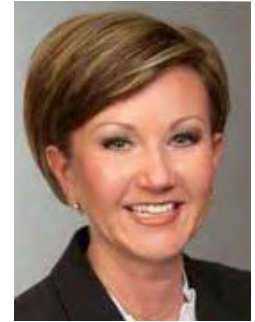

The committee recommends expenditure priorities from the Organ Donor Program Fund; assists in the development of organ donor awareness programs; and submits an annual report of activities and recommendations to the Governor, the General Assembly, and the Director of the Department of Health and Senior Services ([RSMo 194.297](#), [194.299](#), and [194.302](#)). The Committee is dedicated to this service through collaboration with partners across the state.

APPOINTMENTS & ACTIVITIES

The Governor appointed and the Senate confirmed four individuals in FY22: Kevin Lee, Mid-America Transplant; Lori Clark, Midwest Transplant Network; Mary Ann Burns, donor family; and Kenny Kovacs, Saving Sight. Phil Duncan, recipient, resigned from the committee in February 2022. He served 11 years and received an award for his dedicated service. Kenny Kovacs took a new position in March 2022, leaving his seat open on the committee.

The GODAC Committee monitors the Organ Donor Program Fund balance and registry data, engages with donor families, and continues to monitor, discuss and make recommendations on any concern related to organ, eye and tissue donation. During the 2022 Regular Legislative Session, the committee provided feedback to the Department about legislation. Election of officers was postponed until FY23 so new members can become oriented to the committee.

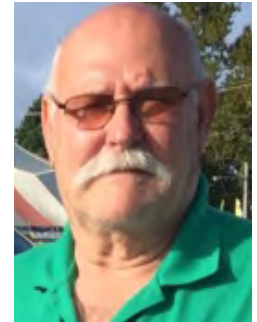
Sanford "San" Simaitis

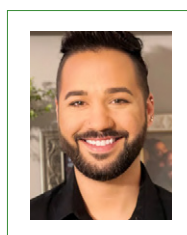

The Department is in the planning phase of making modification to the Donate Life Missouri registry to make administrative functions more efficient.

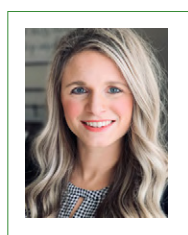

The 7th annual Donor Family Day Recognition program was held in person April 12, 2022. The 2022 program differed from previous in-person events through the use of three locations to honor 89 organ, eye and tissue donors from across Missouri. The event expanded beyond the Capitol to include the Harry S. Truman building and the Carnahan Memorial Garden, also known as the Governor’s Garden.

Donor families were invited to visit the Capitol building and grounds. Midwest Transplant Network, Mid-America Transplant and Saving Sight were on hand in the Capitol third floor rotunda to meet with families and show their gratitude for the generous gift of life their loved ones provided. A picture wall was in place for families to display a photo to honor their loved one. The capitol portion of the event had an incredible turnout which was a wonderful outcome for all involved in planning of the event.

The Donor Family Recognition Day program took place at the Harry S. Truman state building. Families enjoyed creating bracelets with their loved ones name that gave the gift of life. The donor families also decorated luminary bags. These bags were on display in the Carnahan Memorial Garden that evening. Program speakers shared powerful stories of their personal donor or transplant journey. First Lady Teresa Parson shared her brother’s organ donation story. Moreover, each family received a certificate of appreciation with the name of their loved one. Department of Health and Senior Services Acting Director Paula Nickelson presented the certificates.

In the evening, families gathered in the Carnahan Memorial Garden. It was a quiet time for families to reflect on the gift their loved one had given and their personal journey. The luminaries were lit by candle and placed in the garden. The evening ended with a prayer by Rev. Anthony McPherson from Mid-America Transplant.

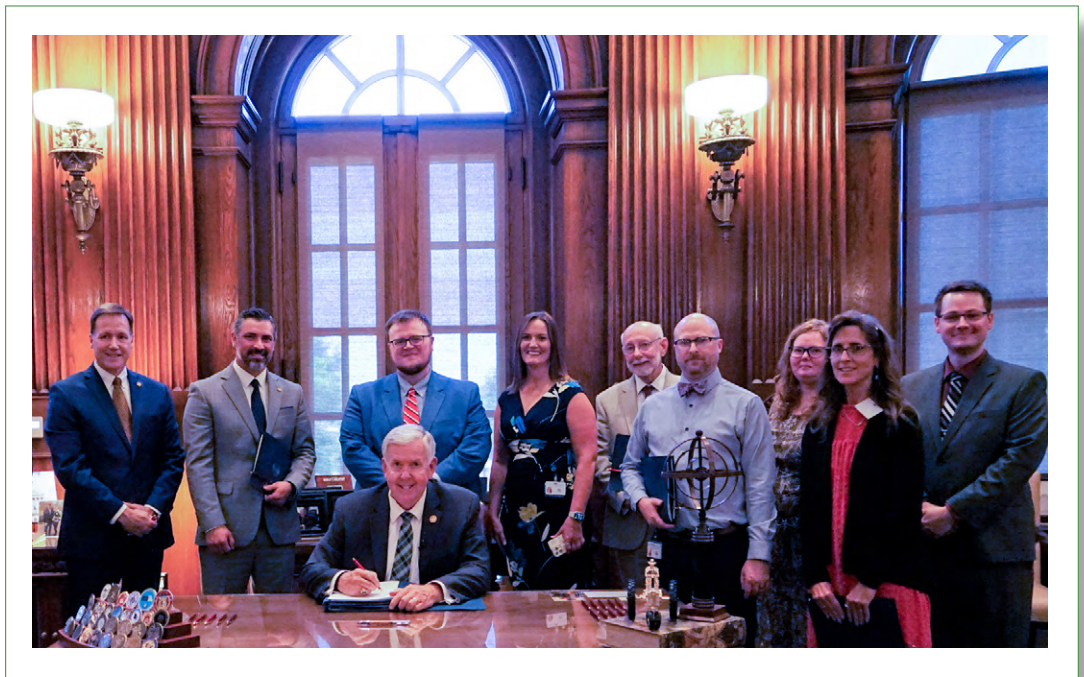

Legislation *by Virginia Beatty*

On June 30, 2022, Governor Michael L. Parson signed HB 2331 and SB 710. The bills allow the Organ Donor Program Fund to receive contributions from grants, gifts, bequests, the federal government and other sources. This will allow the program to pursue funding to support programmatic efforts including education, registry, living donation, donor family initiatives, training, and strategic planning efforts.

The state treasurer is to invest any moneys in excess of \$500,000, not required for immediate disbursement, in the same manner that surplus state funds are invested. The earnings will be deposited back into the Organ Donor Program Fund. The passage and signing of these two pieces of legislation became effective on August 28, 2022.

Together We Are Better *by Virginia Beatty*

COVID-19 continued into FY22 and staff shifted efforts from COVID-19 to program activities in February 2022. Vacant staff positions were filled, and program activities resumed, including the Donor Family Recognition Program.

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services recently modified care coordination measures.

One of those measures is the Percentage of Prevalent Patients Waitlisted or PPPW. With this measure and the efforts of Missouri Kidney Program, the My Transplant-Ready Workbook is being utilized by many dialysis centers for their patients who are ready to seek a transplant.

In FY23, the Organ and Tissue Donor Program,

Missouri Kidney Program, and Health Literacy Media will begin working on improving the workbook.

Program staff continue to work with Gift of Life and volunteers to present the Learn Life Savers program to schools within their assigned

geographic location. Local school board associations have welcomed the presentations and they decide if the online program will be presented in their school district. Learn Life Savers has been accepted by many districts.

Missouri Kidney Program

ETCLC *by Laurie Hines*

Missouri Kidney Program Director Laurie Hines was invited and accepted being a member of the federally-led work group named End-Stage Renal Disease Treatment Choices Learning Collaborative or the ETCLC. This national learning collaborative and change package of transplant facilities, organ procurement organizations, and patient/family advocates is focused on improving the number of deceased kidney donors, increasing the number of kidneys made available for recovery/transplant and decreasing the number of recovered kidneys that are discarded.

Transplant Assistance *by Laurie Hines*

The Missouri Kidney Program (MoKP) reimburses for non-medical related expenses for a transplant recipient and/or a living donor. This can include lost wages due to time off from surgery and travel expenses. There are many barriers to transplant and these funds help alleviate some of those barriers. The Transplant Assistance Program will reimburse up to \$1,000 for each applicant.

In an effort to continue to reach recipients, MoKP continues to cultivate relationships with transplant centers throughout Missouri.

Dental Assistance *by Laurie Hines*

The Missouri Kidney Program recognized that many of the people we serve with End Stage Renal Disease (ESRD) face significant barriers to oral healthcare, which often results in worsening conditions and diminishing their already restricted quality of life. The MoKP team decided to expand MoKP's financial assistance support to include oral health. The team applied for a grant with Delta Dental of Missouri. The grant application was to pilot a program, collect the data, and determine the full extent of the need.

The grant application was completed and submitted. If

awarded, notification will be received in FY23.

Meanwhile, and in collaboration with the Missouri Primary Care Association, the team reached out to seven Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs) around the state to secure facilities willing to embark on this unprecedented pilot program. If awarded, the program will provide restorative and pre-transplant care for MoKP's participant population. We look forward to learning about the particular oral health needs and gaps in care for this often-neglected population.

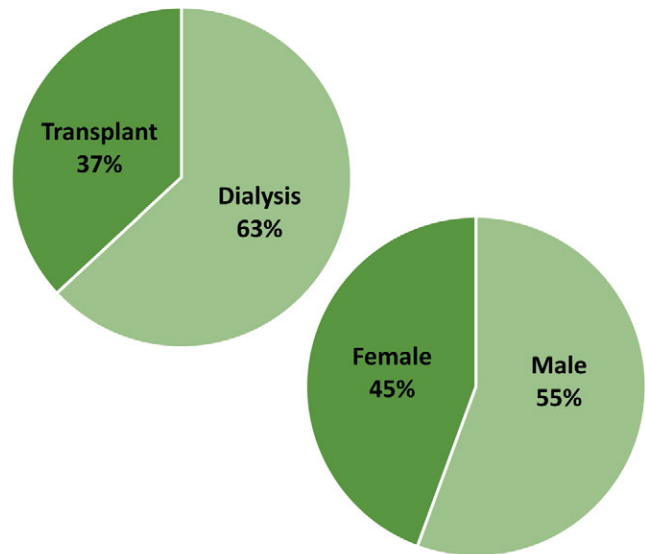

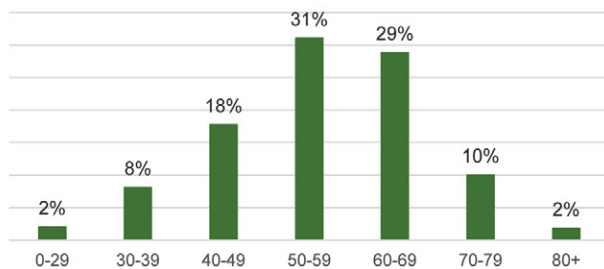

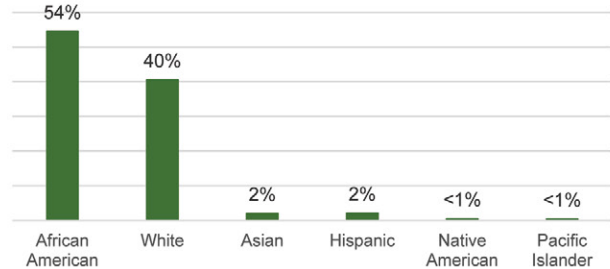

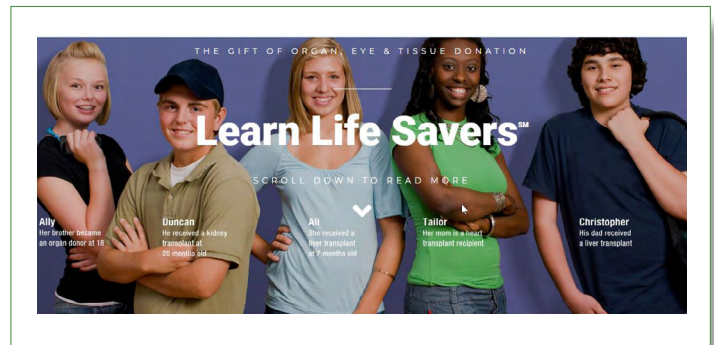
Educating High School Students in Missouri | learnlifesavers.com

As Missouri and the rest of the country begin to face a new normal, Gift of Life (GOL) is back! GOL is back in high school classrooms in the Kansas City and St. Louis areas. The classroom course, Life Savers, educates students about organ, eye, and tissue donation. Yet, we cannot get to every classroom in Missouri for an in-person presentation. So, Learn Life Savers was born.

The Gift of Life and a subcommittee of the Governor's Organ Donation Advisory Committee (GODAC) formed a creative team. The team used the Life Savers program as a starting point. Legislation passed in 2018 giving GODAC the opportunity to present to local school boards of education. In 2019, the customization of the Life Savers program transformed into an on-line teacher guided lesson plan, Learn Life Savers. The plan includes teacher resources and is available free of charge with one click. With both programs, educating high school students across the state is attainable.

The goal is for students to understand the question "Do you want to be a donor?" when they receive a drivers' license or state identification card. The program encourages students to share their informed decision with a loved one, because the conversation matters.



The state, divided into regions, has team leaders. The leaders train volunteers who assist in presenting to school boards. Response from local school boards has been positive. The goal is to reach all 500 school districts by the end of 2025.

In 2022, Mid-America Transplant (MT) launched the *Fans for Life* campaign with the St. Louis Cardinals and their AA affiliate, the Springfield Cardinals. The spokesperson for this partnership is 2006 World Series Most Valuable Player, David Eckstein. The campaign focuses on raising awareness around the need for organ and tissue donors and encouraging people to join the organ, tissue, and eye donor registry.

David Eckstein and his family are strong advocates for organ and tissue donation. Four of David's family members have received kidney transplants, and three additional family members have donated their kidneys. As part of the partnership, David recorded radio spots which played during all home and away games. In these radio spots, David asked Cardinals fans to join the registry at www.FansforLife.org. The organization held registry events at home games in St. Louis and Springfield throughout the season.

The Cardinals partnership allowed our staff to interact with thousands of people to share the importance of joining the registry. This collaboration led to nearly 200 people signing up to give hope to those who wait. We look forward to the 2023 baseball season and encouraging our community to become a *fan for life*.

SCAN FOR A VIRTUAL TOUR

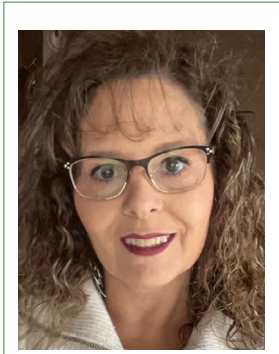


In May 2022, Mid-America Transplant opened its new, expanded Family House providing more patients waiting for and recovering from organ transplants a comfortable, safe place to rest and heal. As patients must relocate to St. Louis for their lifesaving transplant, finding a comfortable and affordable place to stay can be a real challenge for families. Family House allows them to stay together during this period and focus on what matters most--the health and recovery of the patient. "The Family House is an important part of our mission to be stewards of our donors' lifesaving gifts," said Diane Brockmeier, President and CEO at Mid-America Transplant. "Family House will allow us

to better support recipients and families by providing a home away from home during the difficult time of treatment and recovery." With six one-bedroom and 15 two-bedroom private residences, the new facility more than doubled the number of families Mid-America Transplant is able to serve compared to the original Family House. ~ Karen Spector

Toni Eaglen joined the Midwest Transplant Network (MTN) volunteer Ambassador team in 2015 just a little over a year after losing her son, Kevin. Kevin had come home to watch his little brother play in the first home football game of the year; sadly, he would be involved in a fatal ATV accident on the way to the game.

Toni recalls her youngest son, Brodie, talking about a helicopter flying over the game that evening and looking to the sky to tell the person inside, "Don't worry, I've got you." At the time, Brodie did not know that was his brother being life-flighted to a nearby trauma center.

When Toni recalls hearing that Kevin had joined the organ, eye and tissue donor registry at the local license office, she felt overwhelming pride. Although she struggled to understand why her son was taken from her, she has found great comfort in believing that God hand-picked her son to be the answer to others' prayers. Kevin donated his kidneys, lungs, corneas and additional tissues.

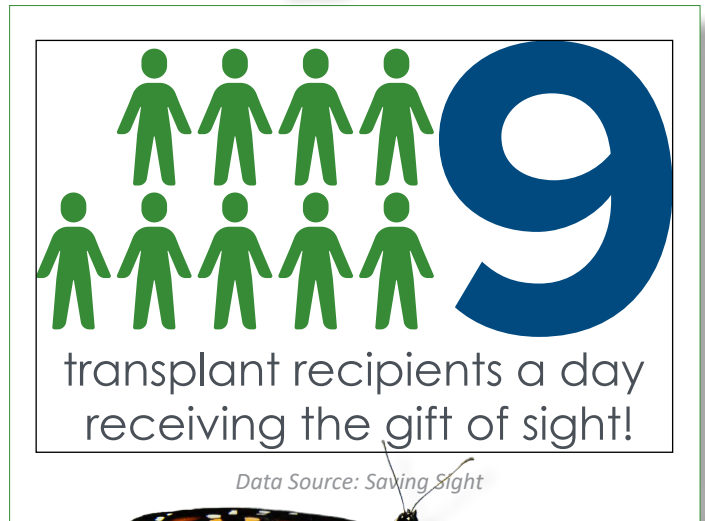
National Collaborative Drives Improvement *by Becky Storm*

Midwest Transplant Network is participating in the End-Stage Renal Disease Treatment Choices Learning Collaborative (ETCLC), a federal collaborative designed to improve treatment choices for those with kidney disease over a five-year timespan. The ETCLC has three aims: increase the number of deceased donor kidneys transplanted; decrease the national discard rate of all procured kidneys; and increase the percentage of change for kidneys recovered for transplant in the 60 – 85 Kidney Donor Profile Index score group.

Each ETCLC participant selects their desired initiatives from the program's Change Package. Midwest Transplant Network's chosen focal areas are: honor First Person Authorization without exception, provide consistent messaging to families in critical care settings, incorporate end-stage renal disease facts into stakeholder education opportunities and develop an expedited allocation protocol for donation after circulatory death. Donor hospitals and transplant centers within MTN's service area have also committed to the ETCLC, further leveraging process improvement with kidney donation and utilization outcomes.

Missouri Department of Revenue *by Gina Wisch*

The Missouri Department of Revenue (DOR) Division of Motor Vehicle and Driver Licensing Division and its contract license offices continue as significant contributing partners in donor registry enrollment and monetary contributions. During FY 2022, the DOR issued approximately 1.5 million driver license, nondriver license or permit transactions. During these transactions each applicant should be presented with the opportunity to indicate their election to enroll or continue enrollment in the registry and their election to have the donor symbol placed on the face of their printed document.

During 2022, the DOR continued to present motor vehicle and driver license record holders with the opportunity to enroll in DOR's electronic notification program. As of July 2022, persons who had enrolled in the electronic notification program began receiving their motor vehicle and driver license renewal notification by text or email.

On December 5, 2022, the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) announced a further extension of the full enforcement provisions REAL ID Act of 2005 until May



7, 2025. The DOR, and its contract offices encourages applicants to enroll early to ensure they have a compliant card prior to the new effective date. Individuals may request a "Be An Organ Donor" specialty motor vehicle license plate to show their ongoing support of donor programs. As of November 2022 there were 852 active donor specialty plates on record. 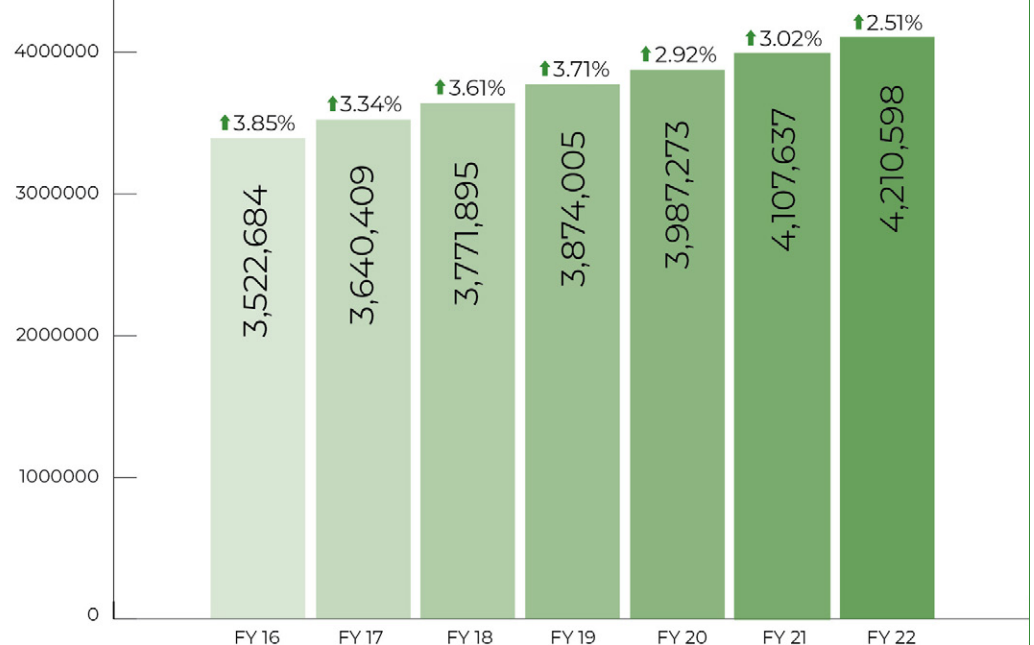

Total Registrants By Fiscal Year

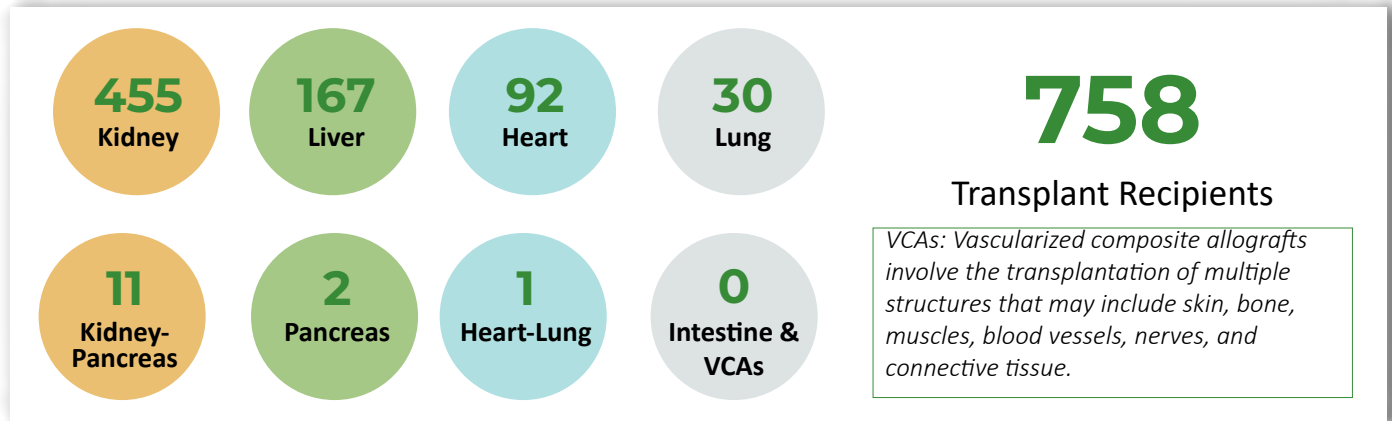

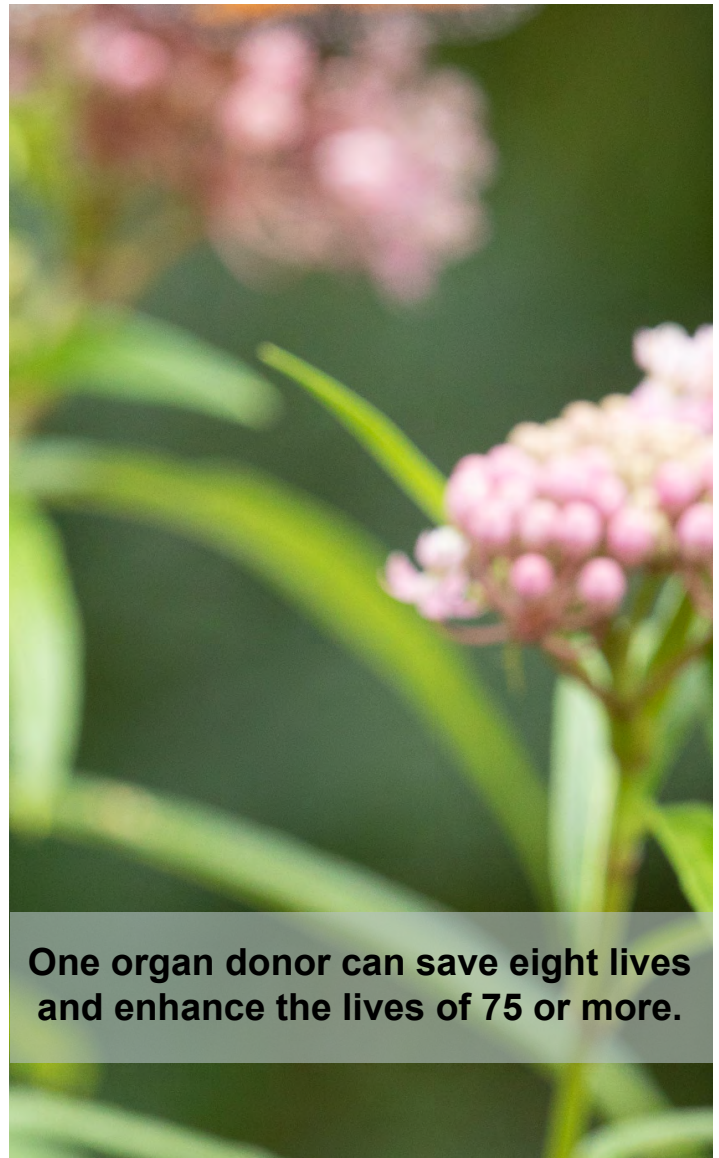
