Key benefits from this relationship include a **Deep and Comprehensive Free Trade Area (DCFTA)**, which opens the EU market to Georgian business and products, and **visa free travel** to the Schengen area for Georgian citizens since 28 March 2017.

The Neighbourhood, Development and International Cooperation
Instrument – Global Europe (NDICI) is the main financial instrument for
the EU's cooperation with external partners, including Georgia. The EU is
Georgia's largest donor. The EU's grants to Georgia for 2021-2024 amount to
€340 million and will be complemented by other regional and thematic programmes as
well as funding in the forms of loans and guarantees.

On **3 March 2022**, Georgia presented its application for EU membership.

The EU continues its **firm support of Georgia's sovereignty** and **territorial integrity** within its internationally recognised borders, including through the efforts of the EU Special Representative for the South Caucasus and the crisis in Georgia (EUSR), the European Union Monitoring Mission (EUMM) and through the European Peace Facility (€12.75 million) to help strengthen the Georgian Defence Force's medical, engineering and logistics units.
