June 21, 2018

ITEM 45: Informal Matter – Technology Development Corporation (18-0206)

<u>Discussion:</u> Ms. Allgair briefed the Commission on a financial interest and secondary employment request regarding an employee at the Technology Development Corporation wanting to continue service as a board member and ownership interest in a social networking app business.

<u>Decision</u>: The Commission granted an exception to allow the financial interest and secondary employment.

<u>ITEM 46:</u> Informal Matter – Maryland Environmental Trust (18-0284)

<u>Discussion:</u> Ms. Allgair briefed the Commission on a request for guidance on the application of the post-employment and conflict of interest provisions of the Public Ethics Law by the agency related to an employee's potential transition to employment with an outside entity that may receive funding from the agency.

<u>Decision:</u> The Commission determined that the transition, as currently proposed, raises concerns under various conflict of interest provisions. The Commission directed staff to meet with agency representatives to provide guidance and offer to review additional future information related to this matter before anything is finalized by the agency.

<u>ITEM 47:</u> Informal Matter – State Highway Administration (18-0296) Mr. Roswell did not participate in this matter and therefore, there was no quorum.

<u>Decision:</u> This matter will be reviewed at a later meeting.

ITEM 48: Informal Matter – Department of Human Services (18-0317)

<u>Discussion:</u> Ms. Thompson briefed the Commission on this financial interest and secondary employment request regarding an employee at the Department of Human Services owning their own business and fulfilling a contract from a different Division of the Department of Human Services.

<u>Decision:</u> The Commission granted an exception to allow the financial interest and secondary employment.

<u>ITEM 49:</u> Informal Matter – Department of Labor, Licensing and Regulation (18-0295)

<u>Discussion:</u> Ms. Allgair briefed the Commission on a request for guidance related to a Department of Labor, Licensing and Regulation employee receiving a scholarship from a local group to attend a professional development program in exchange for performing certain tasks related to the program. The employee's agency supports participation in this program.

<u>Decision</u>: The Commission determined the scholarship is not a gift, but rather is given in exchange for specific services and tasks related to the program. The Commission also determined that the employee should be advised of the prestige of office restrictions.

ITEM 50: Executive Director's Report – Proposed Legislation

<u>Discussion:</u> Mr. Lord briefed the Commission on potential proposed legislation regarding mandatory electronic filing of lobbying records.

Decision: The Commission approved the proposed legislation.

<u>Discussion:</u> Mr. Lord briefed the Commission on the progress of the work to upgrade the online training modules with the cooperation of the University of Maryland and the work to upgrade the financial disclosure and lobbyist filing systems.

<u>ITEM 52:</u> Executive Director's Report – Publishing Appointee Exemption Forms

<u>Discussion:</u> Mr. Lord briefed the Commission on the status of the requirement for the Ethics Commission to post appointee exemption forms online.
