10 The Defendants above named having committed the crimes of CONSPIRACY TO  
11 COMMIT MURDER (Category B Felony - NRS 200.010, 200.030, 199.480 - NOC 50038)  
12 and MURDER WITH USE OF A DEADLY WEAPON, VICTIM 60 YEARS OF AGE OR  
13 OLDER (Category A Felony - NRS 200.010, 200.030.1, 193.165, 193.167 - NOC 58053), in  
14 the manner following, to wit: That the said Defendants, on or between March 3, 2019 and  
15 March 5, 2019, at and within the County of Clark, State of Nevada,

16 COUNT 1 - CONSPIRACY TO COMMIT MURDER

17 did willfully, unlawfully, and feloniously conspire with each other and KELSEY  
18 TURNER to commit murder, by the Defendants and/or conspirator committing the acts as set  
19 forth in Count 2, said acts being incorporated by this reference as though fully set forth herein.

20 COUNT 2 - MURDER WITH USE OF A DEADLY WEAPON, VICTIM 60 YEARS OF  
21 AGE OR OLDER

22 did willfully, unlawfully, with malice aforethought, kill THOMAS BURCHARD,  
23 who was 60 years of age or older, with use of a deadly weapon, to wit: a blunt instrument, by  
24 striking the said THOMAS BURCHARD on the head with said blunt instrument, the said  
25 killing having been willful, deliberate and premeditated.

was removed from the trunk. Burchard's body was partially clothed and there was apparent trauma to his head.

On March 8<sup>th</sup> your Affiant attended Burchard's autopsy. Dr. Gavin determined Burchard died from blunt force trauma to the head and ruled his manner of death a homicide. It appeared Burchard was struck multiple times with an unidentified object, which left a unique pattern on his head. There was also apparent defensive wounds to Burchard's body.

A records check on Burchard revealed his longtime girlfriend, Judy [REDACTED] reported him missing to LVMPD on March 4<sup>th</sup>. [REDACTED] claimed she last heard from Burchard on March 2<sup>nd</sup> via a text message. Burchard said he was excited to return home to California but had to take care of a few things in Las Vegas. [REDACTED] then started receiving several text messages which did not sound like Burchard. [REDACTED] tried to call Burchard's cell phone and the phone was off. [REDACTED] knew Burchard had flown to Las Vegas on March 1<sup>st</sup> to visit Kelsey Turner ID #8462418, who lived at [REDACTED]. Burchard was scheduled to fly home on March 4<sup>th</sup> and never made his flight. [REDACTED] sent LVMPD patrol officers to [REDACTED] to conduct welfare checks on March 3<sup>rd</sup>, 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup>. Each time patrol officers were unable to contact or locate Burchard. [REDACTED] said Burchard may have early stages of Alzheimer's disease and it was her belief Turner and Turner's boyfriend, Greg [REDACTED] ID #7067976, murdered him.

Notably, patrol officers went to the residence on March 5<sup>th</sup> they did not get an answer at the door. The patrol officers noticed all of the lights were on inside the home and the blinds were up. There was mail piled up at the mailbox and there was a package at the front door. Patrol officers went into the backyard and found the windows open. The front doors were unlocked so patrol officers made entry. Nobody was home and the officers noticed there were cleaning supplies throughout the residence, which suggested to them the occupants were in the process of moving out. The patrol officers then met with a neighbor who recognized the description of Burchard and thought Burchard was Turner's [REDACTED]. The welfare check was documented under LVMPD event 190300023673.

While your Affiant was attending the autopsy, Detective Jaeger and crime scene personnel searched the Mercedes Benz for evidence. Several items of evidence were recovered, including latent prints, swabs of possible DNA, blue latex gloves with apparent blood, clothing with apparent blood, Burchard's vest and house keys, and a Caesars Palace employee card in the name of Diana Pena. There were cleaning supplies in the vehicle and evidence of a clean-up. Furthermore, the blood evidence in the backseat suggested Burchard was attacked in the vehicle; however, it was unclear if the attack started and ended inside the vehicle, or if the attack started outside of the vehicle and continued inside. The blood evidence also suggested Burchard's body was removed through the passenger door and placed in the trunk.

On the evening of March 8<sup>th</sup> your Affiant obtained a search warrant for [REDACTED] which was a split-level, single family residence with four bedrooms. The search warrant was served by

your Affiant and crime scene personnel. According to the landlord, Audra [REDACTED] the residence was rented by Turner in December of 2018 and her lease wasn't set to end until June of 2019. Your Affiant also learned from [REDACTED] that Turner's March rent had been paid by Burchard on March 1<sup>st</sup>. The residence was searched and several items of evidence were recovered. There were three upstairs bedrooms, including the master, and one downstairs bedroom. The master bedroom belonged to Turner. The northeast upstairs bedroom contained women's clothing, an empty dog crate, used blue latex gloves, and a prescription bottle in the name of Diana Pena. The northwest upstairs bedroom contained bunk beds and the door to room had been apparently ripped off the hinges. The bedroom door was later found in two halves in other parts of the home, with apparent blood on each half.

In the downstairs living room was a pile of unfolded laundry next to several piles of folded laundry. One of the piles included blue and white striped bath towels. A matching blue and white striped bath towel was one of the items of evidence removed from the trunk of the Mercedes Benz along with Burchard's body. Inside the downstairs bedroom was paperwork in the name of Jeremy [REDACTED] and Chelsea [REDACTED]. Inside the garage was the strong odor of ammonia, apparent blood, footwear impressions, cleaning supplies, evidence of a clean-up on the garage floor and the additional bottles of prescription medication in the name of Diana Pena.

A records check on the name Diana Pena returned to Diana Nicole Pena ID #6021007. A records check on the names Jeremy [REDACTED] and Chelsea [REDACTED] returned to Jeremy [REDACTED] ID # [REDACTED] and Chelsea [REDACTED] ID # [REDACTED].

Your Affiant obtained phone records for Turner's primary cell phone number [REDACTED], which included historical information from February 7<sup>th</sup> through March 8<sup>th</sup>. Your Affiant and Detective Jaeger later received and examined the records and learned Turner's cell phone was primarily in the area of her home with some variance from March 1<sup>st</sup> through March 5<sup>th</sup>. On March 6<sup>th</sup> at approximately 0010 hours Turner's cell phone appeared to go northbound on I-15 and eventually eastbound on Lake Mead Boulevard. At approximately 0038 hours the phone was in the area southwest of Nellis Boulevard and Lake Mead Boulevard. The last time Turner's cell phone appeared to be home was March 6<sup>th</sup> at approximately 1720 hours. On March 7<sup>th</sup> Turner's cell phone was turned off permanently during the late afternoon hours. Your Affiant and Detective Jaeger believe Turner turned off her cell phone after the media reported via the television that police had discovered a body in the trunk of a car near Lake Mead.

On March 12<sup>th</sup> your Affiant was contacted by San Francisco Police Department (SFPD) Detective Discenza. SFPD Detective Discenza had contacted [REDACTED] who was the registered owner of the Mercedes Benz, to determine ownership and any involvement in the crime. [REDACTED] was in China and provided SFPD Detective Discenza his records which documented a transaction between [REDACTED] [REDACTED] Rose and Turner. [REDACTED] placed an advertisement in [REDACTED] for someone to take over his car payments. Turner contacted [REDACTED] and they coordinated a sale to occur on November 17<sup>th</sup>, 2018.

Turner paid \$2500.00 and signed an agreement to take over the payments. [REDACTED] placed Turner on his insurance and Turner agreed to pay [REDACTED] \$541.72 a month until the loan was satisfied. It appears the Mercedes Benz has been in Turner's possession since she acquired it and is her vehicle.

Turner's most communicated phone number during the aforementioned date range was [REDACTED]. A records check on phone number [REDACTED] revealed it belonged to Diana Pena, which was the same name found in the Mercedes Benz and at [REDACTED] Turner's fourth most communicated phone number during the date range was [REDACTED]. A records check on phone number [REDACTED] revealed it belonged to Kelsey Holmes, which was one of Turner's aliases. The ninth most communicated phone number was [REDACTED] which was Burchard's cell phone number. Your Affiant and Detective Jaeger subsequently obtained and examined phone records for all three numbers.

Detectives learned Burchard's cell phone records showed he was in the area of [REDACTED] [REDACTED] once he arrived in town on March 1<sup>st</sup> through March 3<sup>rd</sup>. On March 3<sup>rd</sup> at approximately 1526 hours was Burchard's last outgoing text message. The text message was sent to Samantha [REDACTED] who was Turner's [REDACTED]. After that there does not appear to be any more outgoing activity until March 6<sup>th</sup> at approximately 1019 hours when a voice call was documented. The call appeared to be an anomaly, because it was an outgoing call to Burchard's cell phone number and there was no duration. The voice call also did not interface with a cell phone site. Burchard's cell phone records suggested to your Affiant and Detective Jaeger he was possibly killed sometime after the afternoon hours of March 3<sup>rd</sup>.

Detectives learned Pena's cell phone was primarily in the area of her home with some variance from March 1<sup>st</sup> through March 3<sup>rd</sup>. During the late evening hours of March 3<sup>rd</sup> into the early morning hours of March 4<sup>th</sup> the phone was in the area west of I-15 and Flamingo Road, which was likely the Rio All-Suites Hotel and Casino. At approximately 0123 hours Pena's phone appeared to return home. At approximately 0423 hours the cell phone was back in the area of I-15 and Flamingo Road. Pena's phone remained in that area until approximately 1016 hours when it returned to her home. At approximately 1558 hours the phone went back to the area of I-15 and Flamingo Road and where it appeared until the very early morning hours of March 6<sup>th</sup>.

On March 6<sup>th</sup> at approximately 0110 hours Pena's cell phone appeared to be home. At approximately 0243 hours the phone appeared to go northbound along I-15 before heading eastbound along Lake Mead Boulevard. Pena's cell phone stopped short of going over Sunrise Mountain, which was in the direction where the Mercedes Benz was abandoned, and stayed in eastern Las Vegas. At approximately 1110 hours the phone was back in the area of I-15 and Flamingo Road. It was inconclusive, but Pena's cell phone may have returned home on March 7<sup>th</sup> at approximately 1650 hours, but otherwise it appears the phone never again returned home. Pena's cell phone was turned off permanently during the early afternoon hours of March 11<sup>th</sup>.

Detectives learned Turner's second cell phone [REDACTED] was primarily in the area of her home with little variance from March 1<sup>st</sup> through March 3<sup>rd</sup>. On March 3<sup>rd</sup> at approximately 2120 hours the cell phone went to the general area of Sunset Road and Eastern Avenue, before going to the area southeast of Tropicana Avenue and Las Vegas Boulevard South at approximately 2139 hours. At approximately 2241 hours the cell phone went to the area northeast and east of I-15 and Silverado Ranch Boulevard. On March 4<sup>th</sup> at approximately 1008 hours the phone appeared to return home.

On March 5<sup>th</sup> at approximately 0427 hours the cell phone was in the area northeast of Desert Inn Road and Valley View Boulevard. On March 6<sup>th</sup> at approximately 2321 hours the phone was in the area of the Rio All-Suites Hotel and Casino. On March 7<sup>th</sup> the cell phone was in the area southwest of Lake Mead Boulevard and Nellis Boulevard. At approximately 1140 hours the cell phone was likely back at the Rio All-Suites Hotel and Casino. On March 7<sup>th</sup> after approximately 2247 hours the cell phone appeared to be permanently turned off. The turning off of Turner's second cell phone [REDACTED] appeared to coincide with the turning off of her primary cell phone on the same day. A review of the communications between Turner's primary and secondary cell phone number were with each number, which likely meant the second cell phone number being used by someone other than Turner.

On March 14<sup>th</sup> your Affiant and Detective Jaeger met with Caesars Palace personnel to follow-up on the employee card in the name of Diana Pena. Your Affiant confirmed the Caesars Palace employee was the same Diana Pena your Affiant had previously identified following the search warrant at [REDACTED] on March 8<sup>th</sup>. Detectives learned Pena worked her last shift as a bartender on March 6<sup>th</sup> but failed to show up for either of her next two scheduled shifts on March 12<sup>th</sup> and 13<sup>th</sup>. On March 18<sup>th</sup> Detective Jaeger contacted Caesars Palace personnel and learned Pena never returned to work and never contacted the company to explain her extended absence.

On March 15<sup>th</sup> your Affiant obtained an arrest warrant for Turner for the crime of Open Murder with Deadly Weapon.

On March 19<sup>th</sup> your Affiant and Detective Jaeger discovered Pena checked into room [REDACTED] at the Rio All-Suites Hotel and Casino on March 4<sup>th</sup> with a check-out date of March 6<sup>th</sup>. Pena checked out on March 6<sup>th</sup> and checked back into the hotel the same day with a new check-out date of March 9<sup>th</sup>. On March 9<sup>th</sup> housekeeping personnel went to Pena's room and discovered her property was still there but she was not. Based on the existence of the property, however, housekeeping personnel believed Pena was still staying at the hotel and extended her stay. On March 14<sup>th</sup> housekeeping personnel returned to the room and cleaned it in preparation of a new guest. The property, which Pena either abandoned or forgot, was moved to the lost and found property room. Rio All-Suites Hotel and Casino security personnel advised, based on the room's lock interrogation, that Pena likely left the room on March 8<sup>th</sup>.

Your Affiant spoke to Cecil [REDACTED] over the telephone. Cecil is Turner's [REDACTED] [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] to the couple's [REDACTED] [REDACTED] Cecil called your Affiant because he heard through another relative that

Turner had a warrant for murder and he was concerned for the welfare of his [REDACTED] when she is taken into custody. Cecil claimed Turner and [REDACTED] moved to Las Vegas in 2018 but he did not know where they were living. Cecil was familiar with [REDACTED] and thought he was Turner's former boyfriend. Cecil had heard through others that Turner's current boyfriend was a guy named Logan Kennison. A records check on the name Logan Kennison returned to Jon Logan Kennison ID #2828460.

Later that same day your Affiant and Detective Jaeger learned there was suspicious vehicle that arrived at [REDACTED] around 1500 hours. A neighbor took a photo of the vehicle, which was a silver Volkswagen four-door sedan bearing Nevada registration [REDACTED]. The Volkswagen parked in front of the residence and the passenger, later identified as Salvador [REDACTED] got out and appeared to enter the home through the garage. [REDACTED] exited the garage a short time later and went into the backyard. [REDACTED] exited the backyard and left in the Volkswagen.

On March 20<sup>th</sup> your Affiant and Detective Jaeger interviewed [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] stated Turner contacted him on February 17<sup>th</sup> about cleaning her house. [REDACTED] ran a house cleaning service which he advertised on [REDACTED]. On February 18<sup>th</sup> [REDACTED] went to [REDACTED] to clean the house and met Turner, Pena and Kennison, who identified himself as Turner's boyfriend. [REDACTED] described Turner's house in detail and confirmed Turner's bedroom was the master bedroom and Pena's bedroom was the northeast upstairs bedroom. The northwest upstairs bedroom had bunk beds and the 4<sup>th</sup> bedroom as downstairs.

On February 28<sup>th</sup> and March 4<sup>th</sup> [REDACTED] returned to the residence for his scheduled cleanings. During the March 4<sup>th</sup> cleaning, Turner asked [REDACTED] if he could fix the upstairs northwest bedroom door if they purchased a new door. [REDACTED] inspected the door frame observed damage. The actual bedroom door was broken into two halves. [REDACTED] believed the damage to the door and door frame was the likely the result of a fight. Just inside the same bedroom, [REDACTED] saw Pena scrubbing an apparent red stain on the floor with a bottle of pet stain remover. The stain was approximately three inches in diameter and had a couple satellite stains. Pena told [REDACTED] they would pay him an extra \$20.00 dollars to remove the stains. [REDACTED] agreed and used his chemicals and a scrub brush to remove the stains. [REDACTED] thought the stain was wine and not blood. While [REDACTED] cleaned the rest of the residence, Turner, Pena, Kennison and another individual left the residence without paying [REDACTED].

[REDACTED] completed his work and tried to follow up with Turner regarding payment. Turner never agreed to a location to meet, and [REDACTED] was not paid for his work. Over the next couple weeks [REDACTED] attempted several times without success to contact Turner regarding payment. On March 19<sup>th</sup> [REDACTED] went to [REDACTED] basically unannounced to collect payment and nobody answered the door. [REDACTED] claimed he never went into the garage and did not know the garage code.

On March 21<sup>st</sup> your Affiant obtained a follow-up search warrant for [REDACTED] and Pena's property at the hotel. The red stains were not found in the northwest upstairs bedroom, but

detectives and crime scene personnel, who were aided by sunlight, discovered evidence of apparent blood throughout the room. The stains, which were found on a mattress, both bed frames, the north wall, a small table and on a DirecTV receiver, were swabbed and collected as evidence along with some cleaning supplies from the same room. A red bottle of pet stain remover was also recovered from the landing area outside the bedroom. Several items bearing Kennison's name were also photographed in Turner's bedroom.

Following the search warrant at [REDACTED] your Affiant and crime scene personnel responded to the lost and found property room at the Rio All-Suites Hotel and Casino. Inside the property room were two bags of miscellaneous property. Both bags of property were recovered as evidence and later examined. Inside the bags, among other items, were five pieces of paper bearing Burchard's handwriting, Turner's Nevada driver's license and several prescription bottles bearing Pena's name. The paperwork was shown to [REDACTED] who positively identified them as pages with Burchard's handwriting removed from his planner, wherein he kept meticulous financial notes and password information.

On March 21<sup>st</sup> a California fugitive team located and arrested Turner at [REDACTED] in Stockton, California without incident. Turner was with her young [REDACTED] [REDACTED] and Kennison. Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) Agent Coxon briefly spoke to Kennison over the phone following Turner's arrest. Kennison agreed to meet with your Affiant and Detective Jaeger after they arrived in Stockton. On March 22<sup>nd</sup> your Affiant and Detective Jaeger went to the San Joaquin County Jail where Turner was incarcerated and attempted to interview her. Turner invoked her right to an attorney and was not interviewed in connection with the murder. Your Affiant and Detective Jaeger then went to [REDACTED] [REDACTED] and attempted to interview Kennison but there was no answer at the door. Kennison has never reached out to FBI Agent Coxon or Homicide Detectives since that date.

On March 30<sup>th</sup> your Affiant and Detective Jaeger interviewed Chelsea [REDACTED] and her boyfriend, Jeremy [REDACTED] [REDACTED] stated [REDACTED] was living with Turner at [REDACTED] since the end of last year. [REDACTED] bedroom was on the bottom floor. On March 2<sup>nd</sup> [REDACTED] who was inebriated, came over to the residence and tried to talk to [REDACTED] who was sleeping. [REDACTED] and Turner got into an argument and Burchard offered to give her a ride. Burchard drove [REDACTED] around the block and they came back to the residence. When they returned, [REDACTED] was awake. A taxi was called and [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] left to get something to eat and stay at their friend's apartment. [REDACTED] told [REDACTED] while she was gone with Burchard he got into an argument with Turner and Kennison wherein Kennison punched [REDACTED] in the face. Kennison purportedly told [REDACTED] that he needed to take [REDACTED] out to the desert, beat her up and send him photos of the injuries. [REDACTED] was also told he was no longer allowed to live at the residence. LVMPD patrol officers stopped the cab after it left the residence because someone had called the incident into the police. The incident occurred at 1606 hours and was documented under LVMPD event 190300007885.

On March 6<sup>th</sup> [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] returned to [REDACTED] to get his property and move out. The house was locked and nobody answered the door. LVMPD patrol officers were called to the house at approximately the same time and contacted the couple in front of the home. The incident occurred at 1634 hours and was documented under LVMPD event 190300027077. [REDACTED] explained to the officers they were there to pick up his property but they were locked out of the house. The patrol officers left and [REDACTED] contacted Turner via her phone number. Turner told the couple she had the garage door opener and they needed to come to the Rio All-Suites Hotel and Casino to pick it up from the front desk.

[REDACTED] and [REDACTED] took an Uber to the hotel and they were greeted by Kennison who gave them the garage door opener. The couple returned to the residence and entered through the garage. Turner's Mercedes Benz was not there and there was a strong odor of ammonia. They went inside and discovered some suspicious things. [REDACTED] saw half of the broken door in the living room and the damage to upstairs northwest bedroom door frame. She also saw the kitchen was filled with food and there were two expensive looking steaks left out on the counter. [REDACTED] contacted Turner who told her to tidy up the house. [REDACTED] asked Turner what happened to the bedroom door and Turner told her [REDACTED] had locked himself in the room and the door had to be busted down to get him out. At that point [REDACTED] sensed something was not right in the home and he and [REDACTED] left after gathering his belongings.

[REDACTED] who has known Turner for about two years, moved in with Turner, Turner's [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] right before Christmas. Turner and [REDACTED] had a volatile relationship and they often argued over Turner's drinking. In January [REDACTED] was arrested for beating up Turner and went to jail. When [REDACTED] got out of jail he tried to come back but Turner would not let him. Turner then stated dating Logan (Kennison), who moved in around the middle of February. Turner started hanging around Kennison and his friends, which appeared to change her as a person. [REDACTED] thought on either March 4<sup>th</sup> or 5<sup>th</sup> he was introduced to Thomas (Burchard). (Note: the correct date per LVMPD records was March 2<sup>nd</sup>.) [REDACTED] learned Thomas was a psychiatrist and the two men had a brief conversation before [REDACTED] went to sleep. [REDACTED] was later awakened by Turner after [REDACTED] came to the house. Turner was upset and concerned [REDACTED] would disclose to Burchard that Turner had a boyfriend.

[REDACTED] had left with Burchard in the Mercedes Benz, which made Kennison upset. Kennison told [REDACTED] to get [REDACTED] back to the house or Kennison would kill him. [REDACTED] called a taxi and walked outside to wait for it and [REDACTED] [REDACTED] stated he left his cell phone in the house and when he attempted to walk back inside he was confronted by Kennison who shoved him. Kennison told [REDACTED] he was no allowed back inside the home. [REDACTED] attempted to push his way past Kennison and Kennison punched [REDACTED] in the face. Turner retrieved [REDACTED] cell phone and gave it to him. A few minutes later [REDACTED] returned with Burchard and the taxi arrived. [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] left in the

taxi and were later stopped by the police. [REDACTED] stated he and [REDACTED] tried to find a hotel room but all the rooms were booked due to NASCAR weekend so they went to stay with his friend.

[REDACTED] said he and [REDACTED] returned to [REDACTED] on March 6<sup>th</sup> to get his belongings. He did not have a key and the house was locked and appeared unoccupied. The police arrived, asked them some questions and left. [REDACTED] contacted Turner, who was staying at the Rio Hotel, and she told him to come to the hotel to get a key. When they arrived at the hotel they met with Kennison in the valet area who gave them the garage door opener. [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] left and while they were headed back to the residence Turner told them to clean the house for her. During the same conversation Turner purportedly told them the door to [REDACTED] bedroom was broken. Turner said [REDACTED] locked himself in the room and they kicked it down to free him. They arrived at the residence and entered through the garage. The residence smelled of ammonia and things looked out-of-place. There was uncooked food out in the kitchen and unfolded laundry in the living room.

Turner called [REDACTED] and asked him to buy a new bedroom door using Burchard's credit card number that way the landlord would not know. [REDACTED] asked Turner why the house reeked of ammonia and Turner said it was due to the cat. [REDACTED] gathered his belongings and he and [REDACTED] left. [REDACTED] has never been able to contact Turner since that day and is still in possession of the garage door opener. Turner also appears to have stopped posting on social media. [REDACTED] added [REDACTED] [REDACTED] used to be [REDACTED] cell phone number. When Turner and [REDACTED] broke up, she gave the cell phone to Kennison.

On April 4<sup>th</sup> your Affiant and Detective Jaeger received a report of examination from the LVMPD Latent Print unit. Forensic Scientist Manigault compared Pena's and Kennison's fingerprints to the latent prints recovered from the Mercedes Benz. Pena's right middle finger matched to a latent print recovered from the driver's side exterior. Kennison's right middle finger matched to two latent prints recovered from the roof exterior on the driver's side, and his right index finger matched to a latent print recovered from the roof exterior on the driver's side.

On March 1<sup>st</sup> Burchard traveled to Las Vegas to visit Kelsey Turner, with whom he was having an intimate relationship. Burchard stayed at [REDACTED] which was where Turner lived with her roommate Pena and boyfriend Kennison. Burchard was active on his cell phone until the afternoon hours of March 3<sup>rd</sup>. On March 4<sup>th</sup> Burchard failed to return home to California and never rescheduled his appointments that were scheduled for the rest of the week. On March 7<sup>th</sup> Burchard's body was found in the trunk of Turner's Mercedes Benz in a desolate area of eastern Clark County. Burchard had been bludgeoned to death. Phone records indicated Turner, Pena and Kennison abruptly moved out of the residence, despite March's rent being paid. The group likely stayed for a short time at the Rio All-Suites Hotel and Casino before they turned off their cell phones. Turner and Kennison fled the state, and it's your Affiant and Detective Jaeger's belief that Pena likewise fled the state. Therefore, based on the above

facts and circumstances there is probable cause to believe Diana Pena and Jon Kennison were involved in Burchard's death.

Wherefore, Declarant prays that a Warrant of Arrest be issued for suspect Jon Logan Kennison on the charge(s) of Open Murder with Deadly Weapon Victim Over 60 and Conspiracy to Commit Murder.
