We will utilize our Tribal assets to provide the necessary tools to become successful, hard-working community members who proudly represent our culture. With these values we will move the Tribe forward.



The Academic Services Team also provides support to local Title VI/Indian Education Programs (Federal formula grant to support Native students academically and culturally).

Higher Education – provides services to LTBB Tribally enrolled citizens, such as:

- Michelle Chingwa Education Honorarium (MCEH): Honorariums awarded directly to students pursuing post-secondary opportunities found in and out of the United States.
- Completion Merit: Award made out to the student recognizing the individual's completion of their academic program through MCEH.
- GED Assistance: Assistance in the costs associated with completing a GED program.
- Post Secondary Resource Support for Students: Providing students with resources & assistance in post – secondary matters such as admissions, housing, financial aid, FASFA etc. at the student's request.

Nitaazhitoojik Industrial Training (NIT) Program – The Nitaazhitoojik Industrial Training program is a Social and Economic Development (SED's) grant administered by the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians Niigaandiwin Education Department. Nitaazhitoojik (Ni taa zhi too jik) translates to "those who are good at making things or the ones who are talented at making things" in Anishinaabemowin. What could be more appropriate name for a vocational training program for our citizens who are looking to start a new career. To achieve this, NIT offers short term Industrial Training programs that offer skill – based training that prepares candidates for mid – tier jobs in the manufacturing industry. Manufacturing represents Northwest Michigan's largest gross national product, and is the most locally produced and consumed industry. To prepare candidates NIT collaborates with our training partners at North Central Michigan College and leading manufacturers in Northwest Michigan to provide streamlined training opportunities that can be completed in as little as two semesters.

NIT preference for services is given to indigenous students, veterans, high school juniors and seniors, individuals between the ages of 18 and 49, applicants residing in the Emmet, Charlevoix and Cheboygan County service area, those who are under/unemployed or individuals from a displaced household.
