Subject: Urgent Review of Federal Funds

We are requesting your review and response on federal awards received by the Minnesota Department of Human Services so that these federal funds can be distributed as soon as possible to support community needs in order to avoid waiting ten days for distribution.

The Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security Act (CARES Act), as well as other coronavirus related federal legislation, included several specific grant increases and new grant programs that will be distributed through state government agencies. As state agencies receive notice of these awards, we would like to deploy these resources to support the community as quickly as possible.

These grants are separate from and in addition to the \$1.87 billion state award for the Coronavirus Relief Fund.

Today I am submitting two requests to the Legislative Advisory Commission (LAC) for federal review under the provisions of Minnesota Statute 3.3005, subdivisions 4 and 5. I have attached to this email for summary purposes a descriptive list of the two requests and the federal funds review request forms for each grant award.

## Crisis Counseling Regular Services Program (RSP)

**Amount:** FY 2021 = \$1,826,991

**Urgency:** Funds must be spent quickly to provide mental health services. Funds are provided for 9 months.

**Flexibility:** Funds must be spent on mental health services distributed to identified grantees **Summary:** Minnesota applied for and received funds from FEMA and the Central for Mental Health Services for the Regular Services Program (RSP). The RSP grant provides funding for 9 months after the end of the Immediate Services Program (ISP) funding ends in October. Minnesota will use these funds to make grants to 11 community-based organizations. This program provides funding for outreach, crisis counseling, referrals, and short-term intervention counseling for mental health problems caused or aggravated by COVID-19.

## 2020 Disaster Response State Grant Program – Public Health Service Act

Amount: FY 2021 - \$3,000,000, FY 2022 - \$1,000,000

**Urgency:** Urgent to provide mental health services to school-aged children and youth impacted by severe flooding on four American Indian reservations and 51 counties.

Funds must be expended within 12-months of award notice (October 2021). Waiting until February 2021 for legislative approval places significant risk to funding given the shorten timeframe.

**Flexibility:** State must spend award on mental health services for school-aged children, youth and their families impacted by this declared natural disaster (FEMA-442-DR)

**Summary:** This new award will direct federal funding toward mental health services for school-aged children, youth and their families impacted by severe flooding on four American Indian reservations and in 51 counties. Specific interventions involve evidenced-based, culturally and linguistically competent, and developmentally appropriate school and community-based mental health services. The interventions will address prolonged and severe stress, anxiety, depression, post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), and substance use disorder (SUD) as a result of this declared natural disaster. Goals for this funding are to train 60 mental health and SUD providers and serve 5,000 school-aged children for one year.

#### Narrative Description of the Federal Award

Minnesota applied and is receiving from Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and the Center for Mental Health Services (CMHS) within the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) a grant for Crisis Counseling Regular Services Program (RSP). This fund is a continuation of the Immediate Services Program fund received to provide crisis counseling services to those affected by COVID-19 for which the President declared a major disaster on April 7, 2020. This declaration, designated FEMA-4531-DR-MN, on May 4, 2020 to authorize the Crisis Counseling Program. The RSP grant provides funding for additional 9 months after the end of the 60 days Presidential major disaster declarations.

Minnesota will use this fund and contracts with 11 community based organizations for outreach, crisis counseling and referral services and short-term intervention counseling for mental health problems caused or aggravated by the COVID-19 disaster. The RSP grant will begin after the 60-days ISP program ends on October 3, 2020.

This is a time limited grant related to the COVID-19 pandemic for Crisis Mental Health Services.

## **Part Three – Grant Description**

## Narrative Description of the Federal Award

The Behavioral Health Division, Minnesota Department of Human Services, will focus the 2020 Disaster Response Grant Program from SAMHSA on school-aged children and youth (K-12) and their families, who have been impacted by severe flooding on four American Indian reservations and in 51 counties, including in Ramsey County, the seat of Minnesota's capital, St. Paul.

On 06/12/2019, FEMA declared the severe weather incident a natural disaster, FEMA-4442-DR. School-aged children and youth (K-12) and their families ("population of focus") who have been impacted by this declared natural disaster, FEMA-4442-DR, present with trauma- and stressor-related clinical symptoms, indicating prolonged and severe stress, anxiety, depression, Post-traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD), and Substance Use Disorder (SUD) which call for specific interventions, including counseling services. In addition, traumatized children and youth show a marked decrease in social functioning and academic performance, further exacerbating their clinical symptoms. The demographic makeup of the population of focus is: 51.5% male and 48.5% female; 36.9% American Indian and Students of Color; 38% are students with a reduced/free school lunch; 16.6% are students in special education; 10% are English language learners; and less than 1% are homeless.

The main intervention strategy involves the provision of evidence-based, culturally and linguistically competent, and developmentally appropriate school-based and community-based mental health services across all 51 counties and on four American Indian reservations impacted by the declared natural disaster, FEMA-4442-DR. Mental health services include, but are not limited to, the initial screening and assessment of the client, the referral to a provider, followed by service delivery and counseling. All services provided to the client adhere to the National CLAS Standards. The infrastructure for the implementation of this strategy already exists in form of the school-linked mental health resources and multi-tiered systems of support (MTSS) in Minnesota's schools, and services related to this declared natural disaster will build on this infrastructure to ensure high efficiency. The respective program goals are: a) train 60 mental health and SUD providers; and b) serve 5000 school-aged children and youth (K-12) and their families in one year.

Delay in approving spending authorization would delay the start-up planning and implementation process which could lead to noncompliance with the terms and conditions of the award.
