

# 2022 Governor's Supplemental Budget Recommendations

#### Education

##### Universal Free Meals with Community Eligibility Provision (CEP)

The Governor recommends providing free breakfast and lunch to students attending any registered, certified Minnesota school participating in the National School Lunch Program and School Breakfast Program. Funding will be used on school meals for Minnesota students, as well as administration costs for the Minnesota Department of Education to implement this proposal. Also all eligible schools and districts with an Identified Student Percentage (ISP) of 62.5% or higher will be required to participate in the federal Community Eligibility Provision leading to increased federal funding for school meals.

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##### Public Pre-K for Eligible 4-Year Old Children

The Governor recommends full-day, state-funded prekindergarten for the most underserved four-year old children, using a mixed-delivery model comprised of school-based, Head Start, and community-based licensed center and family child care programs. This funding request combined with consolidating existing Pre-K funding streams could serve more than 22,000 young learners and supports the Governor's Due North Education Plan goal of ensuring that every child receives a world class education.

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##### Redefine Early Learning Scholarships for 0-3 Year Old Children

The Governor recommends redefining Early Learning Scholarships by expanding the eligibility and prioritization of scholarships to eligible 0-2 year old children in addition to prioritizing 3-year-old children. This shift recognizes the need to offer supports earlier especially with the youngest infants and toddlers, to support their optimal development while supporting the family's choice in what program they choose to attend.

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##### Student Support Personnel

The Governor recommends funding to address shortages of school support personnel services. This funding will benefit students' social, emotional, academic, and physical health through additional support personnel positions within district and charter schools, as well as dedicated staff at the Department of Education. The department will also implement a workforce development initiative. By increasing support staff across the state, this proposal will help support and strengthen students' academic performance, mental health, and well-being, so they are more prepared for learning.

### Education

#### School Based Mental Health Screening

The Governor recommends funding statewide implementation of mental health screening and referral systems in schools by school-based mental health staff, including school administrators, to ensure the mental health and well-being of Minnesota students and staff. Funds will be provided to school districts, charter schools and tribal schools, through a per pupil allocation based on K-12 enrollment count, to obtain professional development on mental health screening of students and school staff well-being self-assessments, procure needed resources and supplies, pay for school staff and time conducting student mental health screening and school staff well-being self-assessments, and other expenses in implementing systems for mental health screening of students and school staff well-being self-assessments.

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#### School-Linked Behavioral Health Grants

The Governor recommends funding for School-Linked Behavioral Health Grants administered by the Minnesota Department of Human Services to address an increased need for community behavioral health services, partially as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. The funds will be distributed to school-linked behavioral health providers and other behavioral health providers who serve children, youth, and families with young children as well as school staff. The funds may be used to mitigate service interruptions and prioritize in-person services, purchase critical care supplies, cover public health-related training costs, and address the behavioral health needs of communities of color and American Indian communities.

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#### Infant and Early Childhood Mental Health Consultation in Schools

The Governor recommends increased access to infant and early childhood mental health consultation for school-based early childhood programs through grants with the Minnesota Department of Human Services Behavioral Health Division. This would create an early childhood mental health system of care to meet the needs of the state's children by integrating services with local schools and early childhood programs that serve young children and their families. This work already takes place in child care programs with federal funding and has long been demonstrated as a need for schools.

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#### Mental Health Services and Early Childhood Social Workers

The Governor recommends funding for social workers focused solely on early childhood systems, like early intervention, Head Start, and early Head Start. Early care and education can strengthen programs within these systems and improve outcomes for participating children and families.

#### American Indian History and Culture Relicensure Requirements

The Governor recommends the development and implementation of American Indian history and culture training required for teacher relicensure. This will create a new relicensure requirement specific to American Indian history and culture and fund materials to support teacher training. In order to support teachers in meeting this relicensure requirement, funding will be dedicated to the creation of American Indian history and culture training and the delivery of that training free to Minnesota educators. This includes design and development for this training, statewide training for educators, and funding for the training materials, as well as certification of new trainers.

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#### Increase Funding for Grow Your Own

The Governor recommends increasing funding for the Grow Your Own program, as well as creating new Grow Your Own programs for early childhood education professionals, and targeting licensure shortage areas. Grants for Grow Your Own programs develop a teaching workforce that more closely reflects the state's increasingly diverse student population and ensure all students have equitable access to effective and diverse teachers. Funds are used for scholarships or stipends for adults to pursue a teaching license or for secondary students to explore teaching careers, and may be used to reimburse aspiring teachers for teacher licensure fees and teacher licensure exams in an effort to reduce financial burden and increase access to the teaching profession, with a specific focus on Indigenous individuals and individuals of color participating in the program.

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#### Statewide Teacher Mentoring Program

The Governor recommends the creation of statewide teacher induction and mentoring program. This program will improve the experiences of early career teachers, teachers new to buildings, and Indigenous teachers and teachers of color, encouraging them to remain in the profession and thrive as professional educators. Funds will be used for grants to regional partners, such as institutions of higher education or professional organizations, to provide mentoring support for new teachers as well as training, technical assistance, and networks or communities of practice for local new teachers. Funding will also be used for contracts with national content experts and research collaboratives to assist in developing Minnesota's induction model and to evaluate the program over time.

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#### Educator Career Pathways

The Governor recommends the development of a career pathway for students interested in pursuing education-related professions. Funding will be used for development of rigorous middle and high school coursework in partnership with districts and charter schools, development of an apprenticeship program, grants for school districts to launch education and training career pathway programs, and grants for school districts and charter schools to incentivize high school teachers to obtain credentials for teaching concurrent enrollment.

#### Education

##### Recruit and Retain Education Support Professionals

The Governor recommends increased training for education support professionals serving students receiving special education services. It would provide all education support professionals working primarily in special education with 20 hours of special education focused professional development annually, as well as paying the exam fee for individuals who may qualify for these positions in Minnesota schools.

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##### Aspiring Teacher Retention Bonuses

The Governor recommends funding for teacher retention bonuses for teachers new to the profession, with priorities for teacher candidates of color and American Indian teacher candidates, teachers filling licensure shortage areas, or low-income teachers. The requested funds would provide retention bonuses to approximately 460 newly licensed, first-time teachers as they progress through their first three years in the profession.

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##### Early Childhood Family Education Teacher Licensing Support

The Governor recommends funding for student scholarships to the University of Minnesota's Parent and Family Education program to help address a shortage in licensed parent and family educators. The scholarships will be used for students from rural areas and/or students from traditionally underrepresented communities. The direct result would be an estimated 15 additional licensed parent and family educators.

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##### General Education Formula Increase of 2 Percent for FY 2023

The Governor recommends increasing the general education basic formula by 2 percent in FY 2023. The per-pupil formula would increase by \$137, from \$6,863 to \$7,000 in FY 2023 and later.

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##### Reduce Financial Burden for Aspiring Teachers

The Governor recommends reducing the financial burden for aspiring teachers by paying costs of the Minnesota Teacher Licensure Exam and the First Professional Teacher License fees for graduates in the spring 2022 through spring 2025.

### Education

#### Reduce English Learner Cross-Subsidy

The Governor recommends funding to increase English learner (EL) aid and lower the EL cross-subsidy more than eight percentage points to 59.3 percent of all EL expenditures. The EL funding formula was enacted in 2003 and has remained flat while costs increased. This proposal is partially offset by eliminating the existing separate \$2 million annual EL cross-subsidy reduction aid for FY 2023-25 and allocating those funds to this ongoing cross-subsidy reduction.

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#### Multi-Tiered Systems of Support

The Governor recommends reinforcing systemic approaches to meet the needs of all students and ensure all schools effectively implement multi-tiered systems of support that deliver evidence-based academic, social, emotional, and physical health services based on targeted, individual needs of students. Funding would be used to support the six Regional Centers of Excellence, the Early Childhood Special Education Centers of Excellence, and Minnesota Service Cooperatives in training, technical assistance, and coaching to districts, as well as establishing validated practices across the early learning continuum. Additional funds will be used to defer costs for school and district personnel to participate in cohort activities and other learning activities including stipends, costs for substitute teachers, materials, travel expenses, etc.

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#### Expand Competency-Based Education

The Governor recommends expansion of competency or standards-based approach to education, using evidence-based models that focus on what students know and are able to do, rather than the traditional A-F model. Funds will be used for professional development of staff, family engagement, and increasing the Minnesota Department of Education's capacity to implement this proposal.

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#### Expand Rigorous Coursework

The Governor recommends expanding rigorous coursework, such as Advanced Placement, Career and Technical Education or International Baccalaureate, to foster opportunities for Indigenous students, students of color, students with disabilities, and students in greater Minnesota to prepare and train for career and college. Funds will be used for grant programs to support regional partnerships and statewide programs to support professional development for high school teachers to develop and expand offerings for these types of courses. A second grant program will support rigorous course expansion and career and technical education programs for school districts and charter schools.

### Education

#### Increase American Indian Education Aid Base Funding

The Governor recommends increasing the base funding for American Indian Education Aid program (AIEA). Districts, charter schools and tribal schools that report an American Indian student count of 20 or more to the Minnesota Department of Education (MDE) are eligible to participate in the AIEA program. This program uses the state American Indian student count along with a per-pupil funding formula to determine aid award estimates. Currently 170 districts participate in the program across the state.

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#### BOLD Literacy

The Governor recommends funding to effectively implement the Minnesota BOLD: A Birth–Grade 12 Action Plan for Literacy Achievement. Minnesota BOLD will increase the equitable access to effective literacy experiences for all students by ensuring school leaders and educators are trained in the Science of Reading; support effective implementation and measurement of instructional practices aligned to state standards; utilize data literacy to inform instruction, educator development, evaluate resource deployment and policy, and employ intentional family and community engagement strategies.

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#### Culturally Specific Learning Opportunities

The Governor recommends funding to expand opportunities for culturally-specific learning opportunities in schools and communities across the state for Minnesota students. This grant program will provide funds for schools to build out class offerings and support for implementing course work focused on culturally specific education opportunities. These grants could form partnerships between community organizations and schools for programming to design and offer culturally specific learning opportunities that offer critical thinking and engagement in learning.

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#### Increase Career Technical Education (CTE) Revenue

The Governor recommends changes to Career and Technical Education (CTE)-related policies, additional funding for schools providing CTE, and the creation of a new student transportation reimbursement program to support the additional costs of transporting students enrolled in work-based learning experiences.

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#### Expand Supplemental Enrollment

The Governor recommends that the legislature amend statute to allow broader access to public education through supplemental courses offered by state-approved online providers. The funds requested will allow students enrolled in students in Bureau of Indian Education (BIE) Schools to access supplemental Online Learning (OLL) courses from state approved OLL providers.

#### Paid High School Equivalency Test

The Governor recommends funding to allow any Minnesotan to take a commissioner-approved high school equivalency assessment for free. A full high school equivalency assessment battery can cost up to \$144. The funding would purchase high school equivalency assessments through approved test vendors.

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#### Additional State Funding to Special Education Separate Site and Programs

The Governor recommends funding to provide additional services that students with disabilities with the highest needs require, and which are not sufficiently met with state and federal special education funds, in special education separate schools, sites and programs (Special Education Settings 4 and higher).

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#### Reduce Funding Disparities for Young Children with Disabilities

The Governor recommends amending statute to ensure that young children with disabilities have equal access and equitable funding as their general education peers and are enrolled in general education funded programs. This recommendation includes changing the average daily membership calculation for kindergarten students with a disability by making it the same as the calculation for other kindergarten students. Additionally, this recommendation includes making changes to the eligibility of English language learner and school breakfast programs to include early childhood special education.

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#### Specific Learning Disability (SLD) Criteria Change and Multi-Tiered System of Support (MTSS)

The Governor recommends updating the policy and state rule to update the rule to remove the option for discrepancy route to eligibility along with other language changes to update and align with other state and federal language, as well as supporting districts to implement the rule changes. Minnesota policy would then be aligned to current and evolving evidence-based practices in identification. Funds are requested to operationalize changes to existing criteria, and to provide training, guidance, and evaluation on those policy changes, once implemented.

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#### Provision of Special Instruction

The Governor recommends extending special instruction and services for students with a disability until age 22, consistent with federal law. This proposal results in additional special education costs because students remain eligible for services up to a year longer than they would under current law. This proposal will allow for students age 20 and 21 to have more time to achieve goals and improve daily living skills.

### Education

#### Establishment of Visually Impaired (VI) Graduate Program

The Governor recommends establishing a Visual Impairment (VI) graduate program within the State of Minnesota. Providing qualified teachers for the blind and visually impaired will ensure equitable access to education for all students, and contribute to Minnesota being a top place to live and for each and every child to grow up. After the initial phase of external funding, the program would be sustainable via tuition recapture.

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#### Intermediate School District Mental Health Innovative Grant Program

The Governor recommends funding to establish a temporary program to improve mental health outcomes for youth attending an intermediate school district or service cooperative that provide instruction to students with disabilities in a setting on federal instructional level four or higher. This program is closely modeled after a state-funded grant program administered by the Minnesota Department of Human Services in 2018. The proposal would provide funding for contracts with a qualified responders to perform the tasks and services to support mental health for students attending intermediate districts.

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#### Intermediate District Support

The Governor recommends funding for grants to the five intermediate districts within Minnesota for the purpose of establishing and maintaining a full-service community school model, and providing professional development to teachers and staff. This is a new grant program closely aligned with Minnesota's existing competitive full-service community school grant program, but it builds off of a prior professional development grant model.

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#### Expand Targeted Services

The Governor recommends a revision to Minnesota statute to include all students placed in residential programs during the summer, excluding those that already generate extended time revenue, to be eligible to generate extended time revenue for the instruction they receive. Extended time revenue allows a school district to count a student for the time spent in extended day, extended week, or summer school. Currently only students enrolled in state-approved alternative programs and two residential programs in Willmar are eligible to generate extended time revenue for summer instruction. This addition is expected to increase the number of students currently generating extended time revenue by about 1,200 students resulting in higher state funding to school districts.

#### Special Education Life Skills & Vocational Skills Secondary Transition Programs

The Governor recommends additional state funding to improve the capacity of special education secondary transition programs, serving 18 to 21 year old students with disabilities, to provide life skills and vocational skills instruction. Funds will be used for grants for up to 25 school districts, charter schools or tribal schools, with allowable expenditures of the funding to include: hiring or contracting instructional and support staff; procuring instructional resources; providing needed assistive technology, job coaching and other supports for employment; and technology to instruct and improve life skills and vocational skills of students with disabilities age 18-21.

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#### Reduce Special Education Cross-Subsidy

The Governor recommends cross-subsidy reduction aid be increased to reduce the state total cross-subsidy per average daily membership (ADM) steady at the FY 2019 level of \$807. The special education cross-subsidy refers to general education funding that is used to pay for special education costs. This would be accomplished by increasing the cross-subsidy reduction aid from 6.43 percent to 12.14 percent of the cross-subsidy in FY 2023 and later years.

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#### Out of School Time / Community Partnership

The Governor recommends funding for grants to community organizations to support youth engagement and youth employment and training. A portion of the funding would also be used to provide training and technical assistance to the community-based organizations receiving grant funds so that they can engage in best practices and effectively implement evidence-based programming.

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#### After School Grant Programs

The Governor recommends funding to reestablish the After School Community Learning grant program that expired in FY 2009, in order to meet the needs for expanded learning opportunities in communities across the state. Included are changes to the existing statute to include funding to support organizational capacity building and professional development activities. The funding will provide grants that connect schools and communities so that they can offer afterschool programs that meet the need of students and their families. Funding would be used for a contract with Ignite Afterschool to build a state-wide system of support so that all afterschool program providers have access to professional development and technical assistance.

#### Full Service Community Schools

The Governor recommends funding to expand and sustain the full-service community schools grant program. This will broaden community engagement and access to wrap-around supports in school and local communities. The grants will be structured to support schools with either creating a plan to implement the full-service community school model or, for schools that already have a plan in place, to fund a full-service community school coordinator.

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#### Legalizing Adult-Use Cannabis

The Governor recommends funding for the safe and responsible legalization of cannabis for adults in Minnesota. Funds provided to the Department of Education would be used to identify model programs that may be used to educate middle and high school youth on the health effects on children and adolescents of cannabis use and substance use.

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#### Online Learning Application Fee Spending Authority

The Governor recommends that the Legislature grant the Minnesota Department of Education authority to spend the revenue that is generated by the online program fees authorized in section 124D.095, subd. 7(d) . Currently the agency has the authority to collect this fee, but not to spend it. The revenue will be used for research partnerships with organizations to improve the quality of programs, stipends to outside experts to validate and support program applications and reviews, and travel expenses for the Online Learning Specialist to meet on site with staff planning an Online Learning program.

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#### Expanded Use of Head Start Funds

The Governor recommends expanding the use of Head Start state funds currently to allow Head Start programs to build internal program operations, infrastructure and reconfigure facilities in order to increase their capacity overtime to serve more children across the state. Currently, state statute requires Head Start programs to use state funds to support minimum funded enrollment. This proposal will allow a program to determine based on their community needs if they will use state Head Start funds to fund program operations, infrastructure and facility reconfiguration or serve additional children.

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#### Tribal Head Start Set-Aside

The Governor recommends designating 10.72% of the total Head Start annual allocation to Tribal Head Start programs, where the funds will be divided among the federally designated tribal Head Start programs. This proposal will not change how Head Start state funds are allocated to non-tribal or migrant/seasonal Head Start programs.

#### ABE Hold Harmless Formula Clarification

The Governor recommends a statutory clarification of the Adult Basic Education (ABE) funding growth formula, ensuring continued funding for ABE at current levels.

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#### Compensatory Spending at Generating Site

The Governor recommends increasing the amount of compensatory revenue that must be spent on qualifying programs at the generating sites from 50 percent to 80 percent. This proposal ensures that a higher proportion of the revenue is spent on programs serving students at the sites generating the revenue, while still providing the district with some flexibility to support programs for under-prepared and under-performing learners across the district.

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#### Technical Correction: Require Q Comp Funds to be Spent on ATPPS

The Governor recommends a technical correction to ensure that districts continue to expend unused Q Comp funding only on uses within the Alternative Teacher Professional Pay System program. This technical change will allow the Minnesota Department of Education to ensure that funds are not used for unintended purposes.

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#### Clarifying Intended Recipients of American Indian Education

The Governor recommends refining the uses for American Indian Education Aid to clarify that aid must be prioritized on programming and services for American Indian children. The change would dedicate existing funding to educational programming for American Indian students in Minnesota.

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#### Link Programs to General Education Formula Allowance

The Governor recommends linking certain categorical programs to the general education basic formula allowance beginning with FY 2024. The programs include English Learner, Local Optional Revenue, Extended Time Revenue, American Indian Education Aid, and Long-Term Facilities Maintenance. There are no costs to this recommendation; however, additional costs would occur if formula allowance increases are enacted in future years.

#### Align Student Eligibility Criteria to State-Approved Alternative Programs

The Governor recommends that the eligibility criteria to participate in a State-Approved Alternative Program be simplified to more intentionally focus the state's resources for underserved youth to progress to graduation from high school. Students who are actually not on track to graduate will benefit as the resources will be more targeted towards their needs.

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#### Increase Earnings Limitation for Retired Teachers

The Governor recommends increasing the Teachers Retirement Association (TRA) earnings limitation for retired teachers thereby allowing former teachers to spend more time in the classroom and fill full-time and substitute vacancies that are occurring from the teacher shortage.

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### Prof Educator Licensing Std Bd

#### Educators Online Licensing System

The Governor recommends funding to ensure the Professional Educator Licensing and Standards Board can review and approve educator licensing applications in a timely and effective manner. The first year project plan consists of enhancements to the Educator Licensing system that will improve user experience and ease challenges with processing educator license applications. Ongoing costs would fund system upgrades and fixes, which include many licensing enhancements not able to be completed in the first year.

##### Underrepresented Student Teacher Grant (USTG)

The Governor recommends increased funding to expand and administer the Underrepresented Student Teacher Grant program. This program seeks to reduce the financial barriers eligible students from underrepresented communities face when completing a required 12-week student teaching experience by providing a grant of up to \$7,500. These experiences often require students to leave their current employment or reduce their hours in order to complete their student teaching requirement (usually unpaid). As a result, individuals may not complete a teacher preparation program because they are not financially able to provide for themselves or their families during this 12-week period without any income. The current appropriation is insufficient to award all eligible students at the maximum award amount.

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##### Student Teachers in Shortage Areas (STSA)

The Governor recommends increased funding to expand and administer the Student Teachers in Shortage Areas grant program. The program provides postsecondary financial assistance to eligible students enrolled in Minnesota teacher preparation programs who are working in teaching shortage areas. Awarded students receive grants of up to \$7,500 during the term in which they are completing their required student teaching experience. These grants reduce financial impact to students who must leave or reduce employment to complete student teaching. The current appropriation for this program is not sufficient to award all eligible students at the maximum award amount.

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##### Teacher Shortage Loan Repayment Expansion and Increase

The Governor recommends increased funding to expand and administer the Teacher Shortage Loan Repayment program. The Teacher Shortage Loan Repayment program provides student loan debt relief, in the form of annual repayment awards for up to five years, to eligible teachers working in designated teacher shortage areas. There is currently greater demand than the existing appropriation can support. For FY 2022, the Office of Higher Education received 440 applications from eligible teachers; however, OHE anticipates only awarding 194 at the existing appropriation levels.

The Governor recommends funding a pilot program to eliminate college application fees for undergraduate post-secondary applications through the College Application Fee Waiver program. #### Student Parent Center Grants

The Governor recommends funding to establish and administer the Student Parent Center Grant program. The program provides campus support and resources to address the unique needs of expectant and parenting college students. Specifically, the funds will provide competitive grants to create new programs and build capacity of existing programs. Student parents face multiple barriers to college enrollment, persistence, and completion. Research shows that they benefit from holistic supports including specialized advising, intentional creation of cohorts and support groups, access to and assistance with navigating applications for public benefits programs, and campus-based programs like career and personal counseling. The challenges facing expectant and parenting students were further magnified by the COVID-19 pandemic, and the re-enrollment and new enrollment rates for this population have markedly declined since March 2020.

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#### Emergency Assistance for Postsecondary Students (EAPS)

The Governor recommends increased funding to expand and administer the Emergency Assistance for Postsecondary Students grant program. In FY 2022, OHE received significantly more applications than the current appropriation could support. The increased appropriation will meet existing demand and expand the number of institutions participating in the EAPS program.

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#### State Grant Modifications

The Governor recommends increased investments in the State Grant program by modifying eligibility requirements. This recommendation promotes continued affordability of Minnesota's postsecondary education system for low-wage working adults and middle-income families. More than 40% of State Grant recipients are students of color and Indigenous students. Specifically, this proposal modifies the program eligibility requirements in three ways: 1. Under this proposal, only counting credits in which the student has received \$1 or more in State Grant aid by term toward their lifetime eligibility. 2. Allowing students to qualify for a State Grant for up to 10 semesters or equivalent of grant receipt. 3. Amend the State Grant award calculation statute to discontinue subtraction of the Federal Pell Grant for students who financially qualify for a Pell Grant but are not receiving one because they do not meet program eligibility requirements.

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#### Tribal College Supplemental Grant Assistance Program Expansion

Minnesota's tribal colleges are valuable assets to their tribes, local communities, and the State. #### Additional Funding For Dual Training Competency Grants

The Governor recommends additional funding to expand and administer the Dual Training Competency Grant (DTG) Program and the Department of Labor and Industry Pipeline Program. The additional funding will allow the programs to meet existing demand and expand eligibility to the Childcare/Early Childhood Education and Transportation industries. The DLI Pipeline Program works with industry councils to identify competency standards necessary for employment in specific occupations. The DTG program helps employers fill critical vacancies, provide training for their workforce, and support trainees in earning industry-recognized degrees, certificates, or credentials. Specifically, the program reimburses grantees for the costs of tuition, fees, required books, and required materials of their dual trainees.

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#### Fostering Higher Education Grants Adjustment

The Governor recommends additional funding for the Fostering Independence Higher Education Grants. The grant program provides financial aid to eligible foster children attending an eligible postsecondary institution for up to five years. Currently, the statutory language requires Federal Education and Training Voucher Program funds that an eligible student receives be deducted from a student's cost of attendance when determining eligibility. This conflicts with Federal law, which requires the program to be a last dollar program. The proposed additional investment would offset the removal of the federal program from consideration when determining awards.

The Governor recommends funding for the safe and responsible legalization of cannabis for adults in Minnesota, which will include a fiscal impact for the Office of Higher Education. ##### Increase Access to the University: Reduce Cost of Attendance Burden for Minnesota Residents

The Governor recommends funding to address the University of Minnesota's goals to attract, educate, and graduate students and to reduce financial barriers to student achievement. This proposal seeks to achieve that goal by targeting aid to those students who most need support to offset tuition, fees, and other costs of attendance items, as well as creating a new scholarship program specifically supporting students from Greater Minnesota system campuses.

The Governor recommends a one-time direct payment to Minnesotans. The one-time payment would equal \$350 for married joint and head of household filers and \$175 for single and married separate filers. To be eligible for the payment, a taxpayer must have filed either a 2020 income tax return by October 15, 2021 or a 2020 property tax refund by December 31, 2021. Returns with some income in the top income tax bracket would not be eligible.

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###### Expand the K-12 Education Credit

The Governor recommends changing the income eligibility for the K-12 credit to use federal adjusted gross income rather than total household income, expanding the number of households that can qualify for the credit, and simplifying the calculation. Additionally, the recommendation increases the phase-out threshold from \$33,500 to \$70,000 in tax year 2022, and adjusts the threshold annually for inflation beginning in tax year 2023. ##### Working Family Credit Expansion for Individual Taxpayer Identification Numbers (ITINs)

The Internal Revenue Service issues ITINs in lieu of social security numbers to individuals who are required to file a federal tax return but are not eligible for a social security number. Under current law, a taxpayer must generally be eligible for the federal earned income tax credit in order to receive the state working family credit. Taxpayers filing an income tax return with an ITIN are not eligible for the federal credit, and therefore cannot receive the working family credit. Under the proposal, individuals with a valid ITIN who are otherwise eligible for the working family credit could qualify.

##### Workforce Incentive Fund for Caring Professions

The Governor recommends revitalizing the state's behavioral health, disability, housing, and older adult workforce by establishing a workforce incentive fund. This fund could be used to offer additional compensation, including but not limited to hiring bonuses, financial assistance for post-secondary education (loans and scholarships), and child care assistance. Employers in these industries would be allowed to apply for grants to deliver these incentives to employees who have been employed for six months or longer and who meet certain wage thresholds.

##### Stabilizing Working Minnesotans

The Governor recommends changes to how the state calculates benefits for the Minnesota Family Investment Program (MFIP) and General Assistance (GA) to provide more consistent financial support to lower income Minnesotans. This change will set MFIP benefits based upon six month reporting periods rather than monthly income reporting. This recommendation will also set benefits based upon income from the last 30 days rather than income from two months prior. ##### Addressing Deep Poverty

#### Critical Resources for Licensing

The Governor recommends investing in additional licensing staff to respond to the growth in the number of foster care and home and community-based services (HCBS) licensed programs and related maltreatment and licensing complaints. The Licensing Division in the Office of Inspector General performs a critical role in ensuring the health and safety of the vulnerable adults and children receiving services through licensing reviews and maltreatment investigations. Licensed programs and investigations have increased significantly while staffing has failed to keep pace with this growth. This proposal will decrease the time it takes to conduct HCBS licensing visits from once every 4.5 years to every 3 years, increase timeliness of reviews of foster care license applications and licensing actions, and ensure that the department meets statutory timelines for maltreatment complaints.

#### Building Child Care Capacity/Grants to Stabilize Child Care Providers

The Governor recommends additional funding for grants to support child care providers experiencing financial hardship. The ongoing COVID-19 pandemic continues to place financial burdens upon child care providers. This proposal would extend the availability of additional financial support for child care providers after federal funds made available from the American Rescue Plan (ARP) are exhausted to ensure the continued availability of child care slots. This proposal also extends funding for local child care support services originally developed using ARP funds, including technical assistance for child care providers, training and recruitment of qualified staff to work in the child care sector, child care shared services alliances, and support for provider business practices through technology access and supports.

The Governor recommends a series of investments to reduce the number of children entering the child welfare system. This recommendation expands several programs with the goal of supporting more families by expanding their and making prevention and family preservation a central focus. ##### American Indian Child Welfare Initiative Planning - Mille Lacs Band of Ojibwe

The Governor recommends funding to the Mille Lacs Band of Ojibwe for support the tribal government's implementation of Minnesota's American Indian Child Welfare Initiative. Once fully implemented in fiscal year 2025, the tribal government will begin receiving child welfare cases from counties to offer culturally based services. This recommendation funds a two-phase approach to support tribal capacity to develop a federally reimbursable, tribally administered foster care and child welfare service. These funds will provide resources for the Mille Lacs Band of Ojibwe Family Services to hire staff to manage the growth in administrative and direct care programs.

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##### Family First Implementation Phase 3

The Governor recommends additional investments to support the implementation of the federal Family First Prevention Services Act (FFPSA). This recommendation provides additional state staff to implement new or expanded Title IV-E eligible prevention services, provides funding to operationalize the IT requirements of FFPSA, and creates a new grant program to pay for individuals to retain their Child and Adolescent Needs and Strengths (CANS) tool certification.

The Governor recommends connecting Minnesota children and families to additional services and supports. The funding would create a temporary two-year expansion of existing community support services to serve an additional 5,000 households. This proposal includes funding for a multilingual statewide helpline that will help connect people to community services and supports during the pandemic and post-pandemic recovery period, and additional resources for programs currently administered by the Resettlement Programs Office at the department. Additionally, this proposal funds outreach and research aimed at addressing systemic economic barriers for children living in poverty by improving the take up rate of Minnesota families for the child tax credits.

The Governor recommends an expansion of the Family Assets for Independence in Minnesota program. This program gives Minnesotans with low income matched savings accounts. #### Coordination & Local Community Resource Hubs

The Governor recommends a series of investments into Community Action Agencies and Tribal Nations to create community resource hubs to better connect families to services and supports. These sites will be geographically disbursed across the state with each agency eligible for up to three funded site partners. Current community Resource Hubs will be included as site partners moving forward. When fully implemented it is anticipated there will be over 100 community resource sites.

These funds may also be used to provide outreach and application assistance to ensure eligible Minnesotans who are not enrolled in SNAP can receive SNAP benefits.

#### Expanding Children's Inpatient Psychiatric and PRTF Beds

The funding would be issued through a competitive request for proposal process to hospitals or mental health providers to retain, build or expand existing facilities to add beds for children in need of acute psychiatric care.

The Governor recommends additional funding for startup grants for new Psychiatric Residential Treatment Facilities. This recommendation also expands the allowable uses of start-up grants to include emergency workforce shortage uses, as determined by the Commissioner.

The Governor recommends expanding mobile transition units and strengthening person-centered discharge planning activities. This recommendation also funds certified individuals to work with adults, children and their parents, to develop person-centered transition planning as part of discharge planning.

It is anticipated this new service will expand the number of children and families served from 175 to 800 a year.

##### Expanding First Episode Psychosis (FEP) and Developing an Emerging Mood Disorders Program

The Governor recommends expansion of the First Episode Psychosis grant program and the creation of an emerging mood disorder program. First Episode Psychosis programs serve people 15 to 40 years old with early signs of psychosis. The Emerging Mood Disorder program would use evidence-informed interventions for youth and young adults who are at risk of developing a mood disorder or are experiencing an emerging mood disorder.

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##### Children's Mental Health Community of Practice

The Governor recommends creating a Community of Practice focused exclusively on children's mental health issues. The Transition to Community Initiative assists people exiting Anoka-Metro Regional Treatment Center, community mental health psychiatric units, and Community Behavioral Health Hospitals, as well as people who are on the Forensic Mental Health Program. These programs were expanded during the 2021 legislature, and those expansions currently end in fiscal year 2024. This recommendation makes those expansions permanent.

The Governor recommends a rate increase for adult day treatment services. Adult day treatment services stabilize an individual's mental health and improve independent living and socialization skills. #### Children's Mental Health Respite Grant Clarifications

The proposal also increases access for children who are already in out-of-home placement, but who are at risk of a change in placement or a higher level of care due to their mental health conditions. Respite care grants provide temporary relief to families of children with emotional disturbances or severe emotional disturbances.

The proposal revises Minnesota Statutes related to Direct Access implementation, repurposes administrative funds for counties and tribal nations, and adds American Society of Addiction Medicine service definitions.

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#### OERAC Updates

The Governor recommends changes to the Opiate Epidemic Response Advisory Council (OERAC) composition and the Opiate Epidemic Response Fund distribution of funds.

This includes expanding the membership of OERAC to include a representative from all 11 federally recognized American Indian tribes. Currently, only two have membership with OERAC. Additionally, it would require that 40 percent of the OERAC grants are awarded to projects that have culturally-specific or culturally responsive components. The proposal would continue existing funding for traditional healing grants in the base, starting in FY 2025, which are currently set to expire. The proposal includes funds for grant administration and for establishing a reporting structure for counties and cities to monitor promising practices as the OERAC makes recommendations on statewide strategies to address the opiate epidemic.

#### Legalizing Adult-Use Cannabis

The Governor recommends funding for the safe and responsible legalization of cannabis for adults in Minnesota, which will include a fiscal impact for the Department of Human Services. A new Cannabis Management Office would be responsible for the implementation of the regulatory framework for adult-use cannabis, along with the medical cannabis program, and a program to regulate hemp and hemp-derived products. This recommendation includes funding for the department to establish and administer the Substance Use Disorder Advisory Council whose purpose will be to develop and implement a comprehensive statewide approach to substance use disorder prevention and treatment. This recommendation establishes a substance use disorder treatment and prevention grant account and provides grant funding starting in FY 2024. This recommendation also includes administrative funding to provide for the expungement of non-violent offenses involving cannabis.

These services help individuals to transition to and sustain permanent supporting housing.

#### Medical Assistance for Former Foster Care Youth

The Governor recommends expanding Medical Assistance (MA) eligibility to include former foster care youth who were enrolled in Medicaid in another state to comply with federal law. The federal Substance-Use Disorder Prevention that Promotes Opioid Recovery and Treatment for Patients and Communities (SUPPORT) Act requires Minnesota to cover former foster care youth, ages 18-26 who were in foster care and enrolled in Medicaid on their 18th birthday in another state. Minnesota has already adopted this expansion for former foster care youth who lived in Minnesota on their 18th birthday and were enrolled in MA when they left foster care as part of the requirements of the Affordable Care Act.

The Governor recommends removing the requirement that doulas be supervised by a licensed provider to be eligible for payment under the medical assistance program. #### Lead Remediation in Schools and Childcare Settings

The Governor recommends a grant program for projects targeting the reduction of lead in drinking water in public and private schools and childcare facilities. These grants will fund the remediation of plumbing and fixtures that are known to contain lead. Reductions in exposure to lead in water will improve the health and safety of Minnesota's children through enhanced brain development and increased lifetime productivity.

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#### Community Health Workers

The Governor recommends a competitive grant process to expand and establish new Minnesota school-based health centers. These clinics are located within schools and provide quality health care to all students, including physical, dental, mental, and behavioral health care. Funds will be used to establish partnerships between schools and community health organizations, such as community health centers, hospitals, or local health departments to deliver health care services and dental care and education within a school-based clinic. School-based health centers are on the forefront of addressing the COVID-19 pandemic and its negative health and well-being impacts on young people. #### Medical Education and Research Cost Fund Administration

#### No Surprises Act Enforcement

The Governor recommends the implementation of a state-based enforcement of the newly enacted, federal No Surprises Act. This request expands the authority of the Department of Health to enforce federal No Surprises Act provisions on the health plans the department regulates as well as providers, facilities, and enrollees of those plans. Enforcement includes auditing health plans for compliance with federal reporting requirements for receiving and resolving complaints and enforcement of health plan/provider contract requirements in the law. The law provides sweeping reforms that protect enrollees in group and individual health insurance coverage from surprise medical bills.

The complexity and number of plan review requests are increasing with the expansion and modernization of nursing homes and hospitals. Plan review fees vary based on the expected cost of the construction project; plan review fees in the lowest tiers do not even cover the staff time required to read the technical documents submitted as part of an emailed request and prepare the documents for review.

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#### Home Visiting

The Governor recommends an increase in prevention-focused family home visiting services to families with children under age five. This investment will expand family home visiting services to pregnant women, families, mothers, fathers, and other caregivers of young children so that more families have service access. The proposal seeks to serve 38,275 families in Year 1, 66,670 families in Year 2, and 103,414 families in Year 3 through universal short-term home visiting services to all children born in Minnesota, focusing on home visiting to priority populations (homelessness, incarcerated families, and children and youth with special health needs) and expansion of long-term home visiting to families. **Maximize Federal Transportation Climate Funding**

The Governor recommends providing funding to fully leverage federal infrastructure funding opportunities through the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act that reduce greenhouse gas emissions or build resiliency to address climate change. **Corridors of Commerce Project Scoring and Statute Clarification**

##### Community Stabilization

The Governor recommends a one-time increase in funding to preserve and improve existing housing commonly referred to as Naturally Occurring Affordable Housing (NOAH). Investing in existing housing is an important and cost-effective way to maintain housing that is currently affordable to low-income households. In recent years the affordability of housing throughout the state has been eroded as older apartments and single-family homes are purchased and upscaled, leading to increased rents or home values. Community Stabilization is a new program, and the resources will be used to acquire, rehabilitate, and preserve existing rental and homeownership housing so that it remains affordable for current and future households. With this investment, an estimated 2,850 homes will be preserved.

##### Workforce and Affordable Homeownership

The Governor recommends an increase in funding to increase the supply of single-family homes across the state. The Workforce and Affordable Homeownership Program finances homeownership development grants to cities, tribal governments, non-profit organizations, cooperatives and community land trusts for development of workforce and affordable homeownership projects. Funds can be used for development costs, rehabilitation, land development and manufactured home park infrastructure. This recommendation will create an estimated 900 homes.

##### Housing Trust Fund - Rental Assistance

#### Economic Development and Housing Challenge Program

The Governor recommends an increase in funding for the Economic Development and Housing Challenge program to produce more new housing opportunities across the state. Many employers across the state are hiring more people, but often the limited supply of housing is impacting business expansion. The priority for the funding will be on increasing rental and homeownership housing opportunities in communities where the lack of housing is impacting job growth, as well as providing downpayment assistance to first-time homebuyers through community-based nonprofit organizations and local units of government. This recommendation will create an estimated 1,225 housing opportunities across the state over three years.

#### Family Homelessness Prevention and Assistance Program (FHPAP)

The Governor recommends an increase in funding for the Family Homelessness Prevention and Assistance Program (FHPAP). Significant one-time federal resources, including the COVID-19 Emergency Rental Assistance program, will run out in 2022, leaving many renters one life incident away from losing their housing without adequate homelessness prevention resources. The priority for funding will be on direct assistance, but the funds may also be used to better coordinate access to prevention services and funding. The housing assistance is typically paid to the housing provider or property owner. We estimate that the new funding will serve an estimated 19,250 households over three years.

#### Strengthen the Supportive Housing Model

The Governor recommends an increase in funding to strengthen supportive housing for individuals and families who are at-risk of or have experienced homelessness. Certain costs—such as front desk and security costs— are needed for permanent supportive housing developments to operate effectively; however, many do not have a reliable or coordinated source of funding. This creates up-front and ongoing challenges to building and maintaining this critical type of housing. The funding may be used to create partnerships with the health care sector to demonstrate more sustainable ways to provide services for supportive housing residents, improve access to health care, and reduce use of expensive emergency and institutional care.

#### Homework Starts With Home

The Governor recommends additional funding to expand the Homework Starts with Home program. On any given day, around 8,000 school-age children are identified as homeless or highly mobile in school districts across the state. This impacts more than 1,400 schools in 300 school districts that cover 77 of Minnesota's 87 counties. Priority for the new funding will be to serve younger children and pregnant families experiencing, or at-risk, of homelessness. An estimated 5,000 young children not yet in school, are identified as being at-risk or experiencing homelessness, when they access certain state early childhood programs. The funding will provide rent and other housing assistance to families with or expecting children that lack housing stability. The funding will provide housing assistance for an estimated 1,425 families each year.

#### Greater Minnesota Workforce Housing

The Governor recommends an increase in funding for the Greater Minnesota Workforce Housing Development program. This program builds new rental housing in Greater Minnesota, typically in cities and towns with populations under 5,000. While many communities have had increased jobs in the region, the market has not added adequate new housing. The development of new housing in all regions of Greater Minnesota is critical for economic growth and job creation. The additional funding will create an estimated 865 new units of housing in Greater Minnesota over three years.

#### Downpayment Assistance

The Governor recommends an increase in funding for additional downpayment and closing cost assistance. Minnesota has one of the nation's highest rates of homeownership (more than 70%), and also has one of the largest disparities in homeownership rates between white households and Black, Indigenous, and households of color. There are an estimated 179,000 renter households between the ages of 25 and 44 who are potentially income-ready to buy a home. With home prices increasing significantly in recent years and interest rates on the rise, the need for additional downpayment and closing cost assistance is critical to address the wealth needed to become a first-time homebuyer. This recommendation will help an estimated 2,667 households become first-time homebuyers.

**Landlord Risk Mitigation Fund**

The Governor recommends an increase in funding to expand the Landlord Risk Mitigation Fund program. The purpose of the program is to provide a financial guarantee, and case management services, to incentivize rental housing owners to rent to tenants they would otherwise not likely rent to. With a tight rental market, it can be challenging for any renter to find housing and people with felony records, multiple evictions, behavioral health challenges, and long-term or chronic homelessness face significant challenges in finding stable housing and meeting the rental screening criteria. The funding will help an estimated 2,000 households find stable housing.

**Flexible Financing for Capital Costs**

The Governor recommends an increase in funding for a Flexible Financing for Capital Costs program to fund financing gaps in housing development. For example, the costs of construction materials increased 17% last year compared to the previous year. This funding will assist around 333 units of rental housing.

**Future of Minnesota Premium Security Plan**

The Governor recommends an extension of the Premium Security Plan financed through an assessment on the fully insured market. This extension is contingent upon the federal government holding the MinnesotaCare program harmless from any potential lost Basic Health Plan revenue resulting from this extension. This assessment will be determined annually by Minnesota Comprehensive Health Association (MCHA) to fund the state's share of the reinsurance program. This assessment revenue will also be directly received by the MCHA board. The cost of this recommendation reflects annual appropriations of \$4.784 million to MNsure to replace revenue lost because of the extension of the reinsurance program, and \$216,000 for administrative costs to commerce to manage reporting and extensions of the federal 1332 waiver.

##### Weatherization Assistance Program Pandemic Relief

The Governor recommends additional funding to supplement the Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP) by offering relief to income-eligible households throughout Minnesota. This proposal also expands into services that cannot be covered by existing federal funding including pre-weatherization works that prevent structures from qualifying for weatherization services. These funds will help reduce the possibility of a service cliff caused by a significant increase in funding by the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) that will end in September 2022.

#### Free Primary Care Expanded Form and Rate

**Wastewater & Drinking Water Energy Feasibility**

##### **Paid Family and Medical Leave Insurance**

The Governor recommends \$11.748 million from the general fund in FY 2023 only and applying a 0.6% employer premium rate to employee wages beginning in calendar year 2024 to establish a Paid Family and Medical Leave Insurance program. The Governor recommends allowing employees to pay for one-half of the premium rate. In FY 2024 only, DEED recommends a transfer of \$11.748 million from the Paid Family and Medical Leave fund to the general fund to reimburse agencies' startup costs.

While the U.S. Department of Treasury has to approve all programs, the Department's terms and exits would be designed to meet business needs and could change with Treasury's guidance. This proposal would also exempt DEED from business subsidy law, which already exists for certain monies received from the U.S. Department of Commerce and Economic Development Administration, by adding the U.S. Department of Treasury.

#### Safe Housing for the Elderly and Vulnerable Adults

#### Increasing Equity in Apprenticeship

The Governor recommends an increase in funding for the Labor Education and Advancement Program (LEAP). LEAP helps to better facilitate the participation and retention of women, people of color and Indigenous people in registered apprenticeship programs and employment in careers that pay a family-sustaining wage. Current grantees have expressed that the funding is insufficient to establish meaningful programming to support women, people of color, and Indigenous people in registered apprenticeship programs. Funding will enable community-based and non-profit organizations to implement services, supports, and programming to improve participation, retention, and completion of women, people of color, and Indigenous people in high-wage registered apprenticeship career opportunities.

The Governor recommends additional funding for the Minnesota Department of Veterans Affairs (MDVA) to staff and operate a fourth State Veterans Cemetery in Redwood Falls. This cemetery is expected to open in late 2022.

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##### Tenancy supports and landlord engagement activities

The Governor recommends increased funding for the Minnesota Department of Veterans Affairs (MDVA) Homes for Veterans program, creating additional incentives provided to landlords who are renting units to Veterans experiencing homelessness. This program will create additional staffing for tenancy support services and landlord engagement services and will create a Flex Fund to remove housing barriers.

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##### Low-barrier, permanent supportive housing for Veterans

The Governor recommends establishing permanent supportive housing options for Minnesota veterans. These housing options will have no barriers to entry and will support the goal of ending chronic and long-term homelessness among Veterans. This proposal is intended to construct 50 Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs) throughout Minnesota and convert or construct a Safe Haven for 50 Veterans in the 7-county metro area. These housing options will have permanent supportive services available.

### Veterans Affairs

#### Increase engagement and outreach activities

The Governor recommends additional funding for the hotel and outreach program for Minnesota Veterans. This proposal is intended to reduce chronic and long-term homelessness and disparities within the response system. Hotel rooms that have been provided to Veterans experiencing homelessness throughout the pandemic have proven successful in increasing engagement and housing outcomes, and reducing average days to housing. Additional outreach in encampments and shelters, and peer supports are needed to engage with individuals in the precontemplative stage of change. This proposal will provide continued support for the hotel program and increase outreach capacity throughout Minnesota. This proposal will also provide additional staffing for outreach efforts.

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### Military Affairs

#### Holistic Health and Fitness Program

The Governor recommends the creation and operation of a Holistic Health and Fitness (H2F) program for members of the Minnesota National Guard. This program includes numerous staff to support the program, including a program director, a program developer, a course manager, a physical therapist, and a nutritionist. H2F would be based on an existing federal program and would be designed to enhance readiness through education across five domains: mental, sleep, nutritional, physical, and spiritual. H2F would focus on preventing injuries and fitness failures, preparing Guard members for missions, and educating Guard members on positive self-sustaining cultural change.

#### Licensing & Enforcement Programs Support

The Governor recommends increasing the staffing complement of the Board of Accountancy. #### Earned Sick and Safe Time

The Governor recommends statutory changes to require employers to provide employees one hour of earned sick and safe time for every 30 hours worked up to a maximum of 48 hours per year.
