Libraries to Host WE READ Bubbler Artists-in-Residence

Madison Public Library is bringing together two of its favorite programs for the WE READ Bubbler Artists-in-Residence program and welcoming new artists to its summer schedule! Nine local teaching artists will be joining the Bubbler in the libraries from June to August.

The Bubbler connects artists to the community through hands-on, free events and exhibitions. WE READ is the library's year-round celebration of reading.

Each artist will have a summer residency at one of the nine neighborhood libraries, where they will repeatedly interact with the community while pursuing creative art projects. The artists work in various media, from painting and drawing to textiles and 3D printing.

Wisconsin Book Festival Celebrates a Successful Spring

The Wisconsin Book Festival had a recordbreaking spring season, made possible only by the unwavering support of sponsors, festival members, and other donors. Your contributions to our work ensure that our programming stays world-class, and that we're able to host events to our community's delight!

From school visits to larger-scale off-site evenings, the festival held 23 events this spring, bringing in more than 5,500 attendees across the board. Featured writers ranged from international best-selling authors like Valeria Luiselli and Ijeoma Oluo, all the way to local stars and debut artists like Terese Allen and Mylo Choy. This spring, the festival hosted the biggest event in its history, with Amor Towles drawing almost 1,400 book lovers to The Orpheum Theater to hear about and receive a free copy of his new short story collection, Table for Two!

There's nothing quite like seeing people's faces after receiving a much-anticipated free book, and it's thanks to donor support that we're able to make this magic happen on such a large

scale. But even beyond these bursts of joy, we're honored to be able to present authors who instill a sense of hope in our community. "Wonderful speaker and content," wrote an attendee of Trish O'Kane's Birding to Change the World event in her survey response. "[I] left touched and excited

about our relationship with the future, however it plays out."

The Wisconsin Book Festival has accomplished so much this past year, and our sights are set even higher for the 2024 Fall Celebration and the year ahead.

Meet the Wisconsin Book Festival's Behind-the-Scenes Volunteer Coordinator

Cynthia Schuster has been an active member of Madison's creative community for decades. For the last 15 years, she has served as the Wisconsin Book Festival's Volunteer Coordinator.

Schuster started volunteering for the festival in 2007. She became the coordinator in 2009 after the previous coordinator stepped down. As the festival transitioned from a four-day festival to year-round programming, Schuster helped the festival behind the scenes by securing more volunteers to work at events.

As the Volunteer Coordinator, Schuster ensures there are volunteers for every event the Wisconsin Book Festival holds. In 2023, 55 volunteers supported the festival's four-day Fall Celebration; Schuster organized the volunteer schedule and ensured that every aspect was covered, whether it be tabling or setting up an online stream of an event.

"August [or] September is when we start really hitting the ground running: getting myself briefed on what's happening operationally in the festival, and then getting the volunteers trained and oriented to what they need to do," Schuster said.

To Schuster, the friendships and connections

are one of the best aspects of volunteering with the Wisconsin Book Festival.

"Building community among volunteers and cultivating that same enjoyment for what the library is doing — I think that's what I love the most about it," Schuster said. "We're building friendships, we're making memories, and we're enjoying some great authors at the same time."

Schuster also navigates where she is needed most. On some festival event days, she'll work closely with volunteers, and others, she'll work closely with Festival Director Jane Rotonda.

"You won't find a more welcoming group of people than those who run the Wisconsin Book Festival," Schuster said. "Jane Rotonda is not only a warm presence who makes you feel at home, but she curates a lineup that appeals to so many cross-sections of our community. Through that, human connection is built around shared interests."

Community service is a focal point of Schuster's career. She serves as Public Information Officer for the Madison Fire Department, a role she has held since 2015. She also coordinates the department's Occupant Services Unit, which offers assistance to those affected by fires or other disasters.

Before joining the Fire Department, she was a producer, talk show host, and announcer for Wisconsin Public Radio. Schuster still has a music show on WSUM, UW-Madison's radio station, and a jazz show on WVMO, Monona's radio station. Her show on WSUM, Heavy Petting Zoo, will mark its 19-year anniversary in June.

Additionally, Schuster volunteers at the Dane County Restorative Court (CRC), Nehemiah, and a local community garden. When she's not working or volunteering, she enjoys reading, gardening, and traveling.

While Schuster enjoys reading nonfiction books – specifically biographies and books about psychology and sociology - her most

"The [Madison] Public Library itself has really done a lot to make some pretty amazing authors, poets, and human beings available to the whole community for free," Schuster said. "You really get to see a wide variety of folks that come into the library to enjoy it and get to be a part of the celebration."

WE READ Card Game Returns This Summer

Madison Public Library's WE READ card game has returned to offer families a summer-long reading experience! Every card and deck is fully bilingual in English and Spanish. The two kinds of cards, "read" and "play," offer learning activities and reading-based awards for players.

Children can earn specialty prizes each week by filling out Share Your Voice prompts at library desks. While prizes are not tied to the decks, the card game is a great way to practice reading.

When picking up a WE READ card deck, you can also grab a free WE READ tote bag from any Madison Public Library location or the Dream Bus, and at Parks Alive events.

AASPIRE Marketing Intern Returns to Library

Madison Public Library is hosting an AASPIRE (Affirmative Action Student Professionals In Residence) intern again as part of a citywide program this summer. A Madison Public Library Foundation grant is paying the intern's salary.

Isabel Chiriboga-Pineda, a junior majoring in sociology at UW-Milwaukee, worked with Madison Public Library staff as a Marketing Intern last summer. By attending community events like Juneteenth and Parks Alive, working on the library's Spanish Facebook page, and listening in on library board meetings, Isabel contributed to the library's goal of equitable access to experiences, ideas, and resources. She also had the opportunity to learn about other city departments such as human resources, transportation, and engineering, and

gained valuable insight into the many roles each department holds.

Additionally, by collaborating with Interim Digital Services and Marketing Manager Liz Boyd and other staff, Isabel developed new skills in graphic design, data analysis, and online communication. This summer, Isabel returned to her position to further her skills.

AASPIRE internships offer underrepresented groups on-the-job experience with the City of Madison. The internships are available to current college students from an accredited university, a two-year technical college program, or from the city's Community Partners training program. Students who have graduated within the past two years are also eligible to apply. Isabel Chiriboga-Pineda is back at Madison Public Library for her second summer as an AASPIRE Marketing Intern.



This paid summer internship lasts for eight to 10 weeks. Interns work on a limited-term, management-level project. City managers provide guidance, mentoring, and a deeper understanding of public service. Interns are eligible for positions limited to city employees for up to six months after completing the internship.

After a quick lunch break, staff had a movement-focused time slot with options to do chair yoga, take a wellness walk, engage in a scavenger hunt, or play lawn games together before coming back for the *Telling Your Library Story* afternoon session with Madison Public Library Foundation board member and professional marketer Tom Kuplic.

WE READ Youth Voices Contest Deadline June 30


