RESOLUTION NO. 2022-11

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ISSAQUAH, WASHINGTON, ADOPTING A CULTURAL & RELIGIOUS HOLIDAY CALENDAR FOR THE REMAINDER OF 2022 AND 2023 AND ESTABLISHING A POLICY OF AVOIDING SCHEDULING CITY MEETINGS ON RELIGIOUS & CULTURAL HOLIDAYS WITH SIGNIFICANT WORK RESTRICTIONS.

WHEREAS, as part of the City's commitment to increase diversity and inclusion in our City, the Administration asked the Equity Board to create a list of cultural and religious holidays the City should take into consideration when scheduling public meetings.; and

WHEREAS, a Cultural & Religious Calendar was recommended by the Equity Board at the February 2, 2022 Equity Board meeting; and

WHEREAS, the purpose of the Religious & Cultural Calendar is to provide a diversity and inclusion tool for City staff by creating a list of important religious and cultural holidays the City should take into consideration and make every effort to avoid scheduling public meetings on; and

WHEREAS, the purpose of the Religious & Cultural Calendar is also to formalize the City's commitment to diversity and inclusion and help increase awareness of the religious and cultural diversity represented in Issaquah; and

WHEREAS, the Religious & Cultural Calendar was reviewed by the City Council Services, Safety & Parks Committee at the July 19 meeting; and

WHEREAS, the City Council wishes to establish a policy of avoiding scheduling City meetings on certain cultural and religious holidays with significant work restrictions; and

WHEREAS, the City Council wishes to proceed to adopt the 2022-2023 Religious & Cultural Calendar; NOW, THEREFORE,

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ISSAQUAH, WASHINGTON, HEREBY RESOLVES AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Recognition of Holidays with Significant Work Restrictions. It will be the policy of the City to make every effort to avoid scheduling meetings of City legislative bodies (City Council, Commissions and Boards, Council Committees, Task Forces) and any public meetings, other than those being held to recognize the cultural or religious holiday, on any cultural or religious holiday that incorporates significant work restrictions as identified in the Religious & Cultural Calendar and listed in Exhibit A.

Section 2. Adoption of Religious & Cultural Calendar. The City adopts a Religious & Cultural Calendar for the remainder of 2022 and all of 2023. The 2022 Calendar is attached as Exhibit B.

Section 3. Monitoring. The City commits to receiving feedback on the Calendar in consultation with community members and cultural and religious leaders. The Calendar will be reviewed by City Council Services & Safety Committee in the fall of 2023. The Committee will provide a recommendation to the City Council on changes and adoption of future calendars.

Section 4. This resolution will take effect immediately.

What is the purpose? The intent for creating this calendar is two-fold:

- 1. To provide a diversity and inclusion tool for City staff by creating a list of important religious and cultural holidays the City should take into consideration and make every effort to avoid scheduling public meetings on.
- 2. Formalize the City's commitment to diversity and inclusion and help increase awareness of the religious and cultural diversity represented in Issaquah.

How were holidays chosen and prioritized? Due to the extensive number of cultural holidays, the following criteria was applied:

- 1) Priority was given for holidays that pose work restrictions and therefore would limit community members' ability to participate in public engagement.
- 2) Consideration was given to the demographic representation in Issaquah.
- 3) Consideration was given for holidays that provide an opportunity for individual and community reflection, increased awareness and understanding.

Notes & suggestions for scheduling public meetings

- 1. City Staff should **make every effort to avoid scheduling** public meetings on **religious holidays that** are marked with an asterisk (*) and highlighted in red. These holidays have work restrictions, may require fasting, or may have an utmost significance in one's religion or culture.
- 2. Additional holidays are included as they provide opportunities to increase awareness and promote the diversity of our communities and are meant to invite respect, understanding, and individual and community reflection. City Staff should **take into consideration these holidays** when scheduling public meetings. Staff may use their own discretion based on the type of meeting, community impact, and desired outcome, and are invited to take a moment to acknowledge the respective holiday.
- 3. Federal holidays are also included and highlighted in gray.

Continuous updates and improvement

Due to regional and cultural differences, some holidays listed may be celebrated on different dates by individuals of the same faith who come from different regions of the same country or culture. Many holidays are based on the lunar and lunisolar calendars and therefore the dates will vary from year to year. The list below provides the dates for 2022 (Gregorian Calendar).

The list of proposed religious and cultural holidays is not exhaustive, and it is intended to be a live document with ongoing modifications based on community input. We ask for your patience if we missed important dates that apply to your culture or group.
