Finding Hope Through Music:

Voices gather for historic concert celebrating Ukraine at St Paul's Cathedral

Today, London's **St Paul's Cathedral** plays host to a historic concert celebrating the importance of Ukrainian culture amidst Russia's ongoing invasion.

The **Ukrainian Ambassador to the United Kingdom Valerii Zaluzhnyi** will be in attendance this evening, demonstrating the power of Ukrainian sovereignty and freedom as Russia's illegal and unprovoked war in Ukraine continues.

Valerii Zaluzhnyi, Ukrainian Ambassador to the United Kingdom, said:

'This concert is a testament to the indomitable spirit of the Ukrainian people. Through music, we not only showcase our rich cultural heritage but also send a powerful message of resilience and hope to the world. As we gather here, we stand united in our resolve to preserve our culture and our freedom.'

This evening, audiences will experience a one-time performance by the **Ukrainian Freedom Orchestra** – an orchestra of Ukrainian musicians under the patronage of **First Lady Olena Zelenska** and founded by conductor **Keri-Lynn Wilson** – accompanied by singers from the **Royal Opera House's Songs for Ukraine Chorus** – a group formed to bring Ukrainians living in London, many who were forced to flee their homes, to sing together in the wake of the ongoing war.

Beethoven's Ninth Symphony – which celebrates its 200th anniversary this year – will be performed in the Ukrainian language, symbolic of what the concert represents: using joy, music and culture in Ukraine's ongoing fight against tyranny.

This concert follows First Lady of Ukraine Mrs Olena Zelenska recent visit to the UK, where she met the Royal Opera House's Songs for Ukraine Chorus at Number 10 Downing Street.

Yaroslava, a member of the Royal Opera House Songs for Ukraine Chorus, says:

'It's important to remind the world that Ukraine is more than this war. Performing a classic masterpiece like Beethoven's Ninth alongside new music gives Ukrainian musical and artistic heritage a well-deserved place on the arts stage.'

The importance of using culture and continuing to put a spotlight on Ukraine has been a major focus of President Zelensky, who earlier this year said that "in times of war – even more so than in times of peace – we must all remember the significance of culture. And people of culture matter. Everyone who speaks out for Ukraine. Who voices what's on their hearts. Who preserves everything we go through. Who revives what could have been forgotten but renewed, gives people strength, gives emotions."

This concert, presented by the **Barbican**, the **Royal Opera House**, and **Askonas Holt**, is not only an opportunity for these musicians to proudly showcase their talent, their culture and their rich history – it's also a way for the rest of the world to show that the plight of Ukraine has not been forgotten.

Keri-Lynn Wilson, the founder of the Ukrainian Freedom Orchestra, and a world-renowned conductor, says:

'Putin is trying to silence a nation. The purpose of our orchestra is to show that Ukrainians will not be silenced. Whether through **Victoria Vita Polevá**'s **Bucha Lacrimosa**, written in memory of the innocent victims massacred at the hands of Russian invaders in 2022, or through our Ukrainian language rendering of Beethoven's monumental Ninth Symphony. We are out here on the international stage, on a mission to show the power of a Ukrainian artistry that offers both hope and solace as we fight for liberty and democracy on the cultural front.'

Members of the **Royal Opera Chorus**, conducted by Royal Opera Chorus Director, **William Spaulding**, have performed with the Songs for Ukraine Chorus since the group first formed, and will join these incredible Ukrainian musicians and singers at St Paul's Cathedral in solidarity.
