INDIANA

The Fox News Poll is conducted under the joint direction of Anderson Robbins Research (D) and Shaw & Company Research (R).

The poll was conducted by telephone with live interviewers April 18-21, 2016 among a random state sample of 1,205 Indiana likely primary voters. Respondents were screened to identify likely primary voters.

Results for the full sample have a margin of error of plus or minus 2.5 percentage points. Results for the 603 likely Democratic primary voters have a margin of error of plus or minus 4 percentage points and results for the 602 likely Republican primary voters have a margin of error of plus or minus 4 percentage points.

Landline (632) and cellphone (573) numbers were randomly selected from a statewide voter file of registered Indiana voters using a probability proportionate to size method. This simply means phone numbers are proportionally representative to the number of voters in all regions across the state of Indiana. Fieldwork conducted by Braun Research, Inc. of Princeton, NJ.

An asterisk (*) is used for percentages of less than one-half percent. A dash (-) represents a value of zero. Some results may not add to 100% due to rounding.
