Following their sold out 2022 recital, 'The Composer in Hollywood', soprano Anush Hovhannisyan and singer-pianist Sam Jewison return to the Royal Opera House with the next in their series of concerts exploring the golden age of

'The Composer on Broadway' celebrates the master innovators of musical theatre, who drew together the traditions of opera and operetta, as well as popular song and jazz, to create a truly captivating, all-American art form. These nowlegendary composers were inspired by and wrote for a broad range of singers, from Rodgers and Hammerstein's casting of renowned Italian operatic baritone Ezio Pinza in South Pacific, to Cole Porter's writing for famed vocal powerhouse Ethel Merman, and everything in-between. The stirring overtures and evocative ballet sequences of the great Broadway composers have made their way into the core repertoires of orchestras worldwide, beloved by audiences and musicians alike. A handful of notables even reached beyond the confines of the theatre, writing music specifically for the concert hall. Perhaps the two most famous names are Leonard Bernstein and George Gershwin, with highlights from the latter's 1924 work 'Rhapsody in Blue' being performed this afternoon one-hundred years after its premiere at Aeolian Hall in New York.

This irresistible vocal cross-section is represented by Hovhannisyan and Jewison as they tour the crème-de-lacrème of classic musical theatre, including selections from Carousel, West Side Story, Porgy and Bess, My Fair

Photography and filming are prohibited during performances in any of our auditoriums. You are welcome to take pictures throughout the rest of the building and before performances and share them with us through social media.
