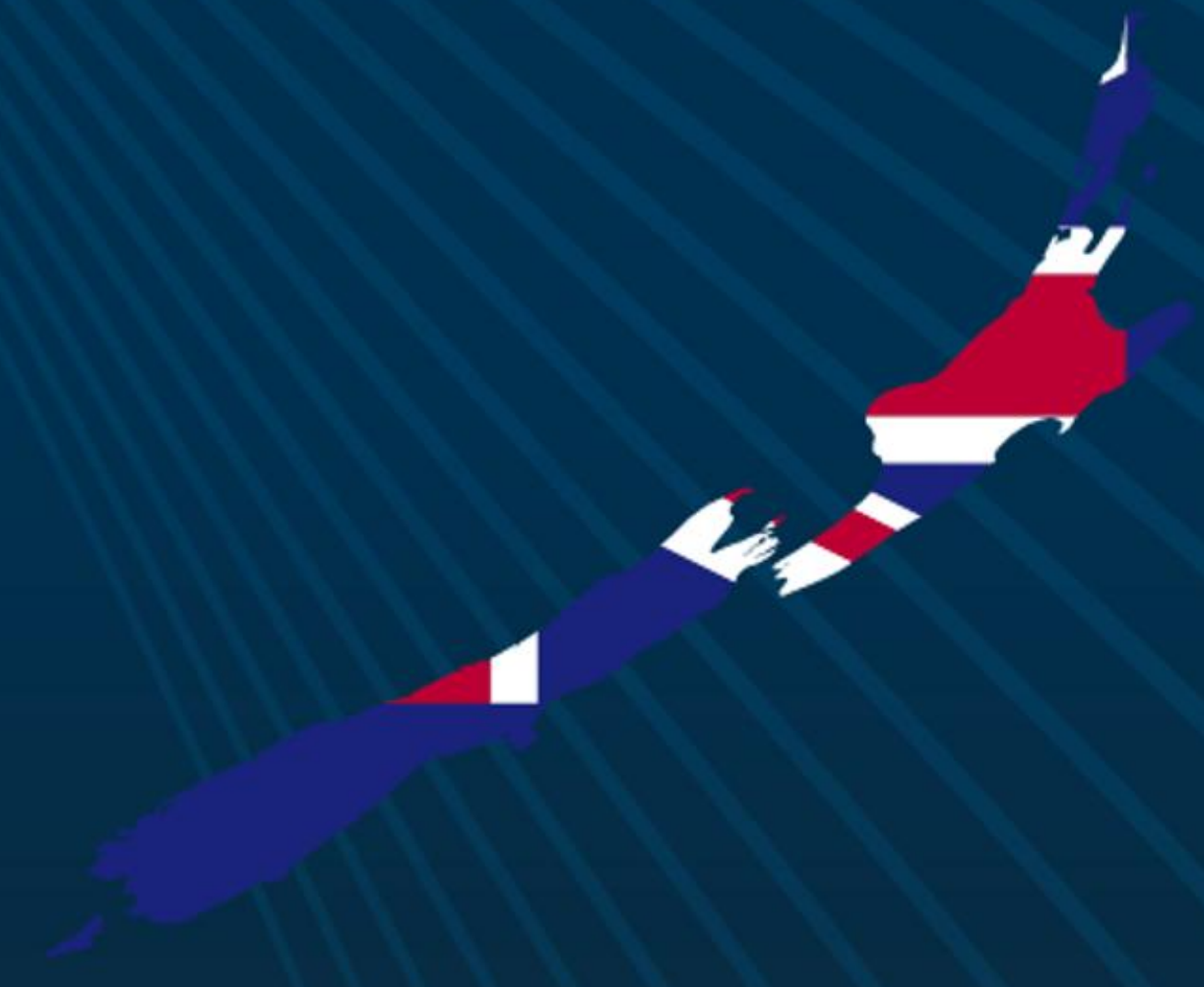




# NEW ZEALAND

Region: East Asia and Pacific  
Income Category: High Income



**Human capital – knowledge, skills, and good health – empowers people to achieve their potential and drives economic growth.** This brief tracks progress by New Zealand in building and using human capital. This page presents the Human Capital Index (HCI), its components parts, and relevant benchmarks. The HCI quantifies how underinvestment in education and health for today’s children reduces future incomes. Data are the most recently available as of 2020. The back page presents a set of Human Capital Complementary Indicators (HCCI) that shows progress at each stage of the lifecycle.

## THE HUMAN CAPITAL INDEX

A child born in New Zealand will be **78%** as productive when she grows up as she could be if she enjoyed complete education and full health.

This is higher than the average for the East Asia & Pacific region (59%) and High Income countries (71%).

## THE HUMAN CAPITAL INDEX COMPONENTS

- **Probability of Survival to Age 5.** Of every 100 children born in New Zealand, **99** survive to age 5.
- **Expected Years of School.** In New Zealand, a child who starts school at age 4 can expect to complete **13.7** years of school by her 18th birthday.
- **Learning-Adjusted Years of School.** Factoring in what children actually learn, expected years of school is **11.4** years.
- **Average Harmonized Test Scores.** Students in New Zealand score **520** on a scale where 625 represents advanced attainment and 300 represents minimum attainment.
- **Adult Survival Rate.** Across New Zealand, **94%** of 15-year-olds survive until age 60.
- **Fraction of Children Under 5 Not Stunted.** Internationally comparable data on stunting are not available for New Zealand.

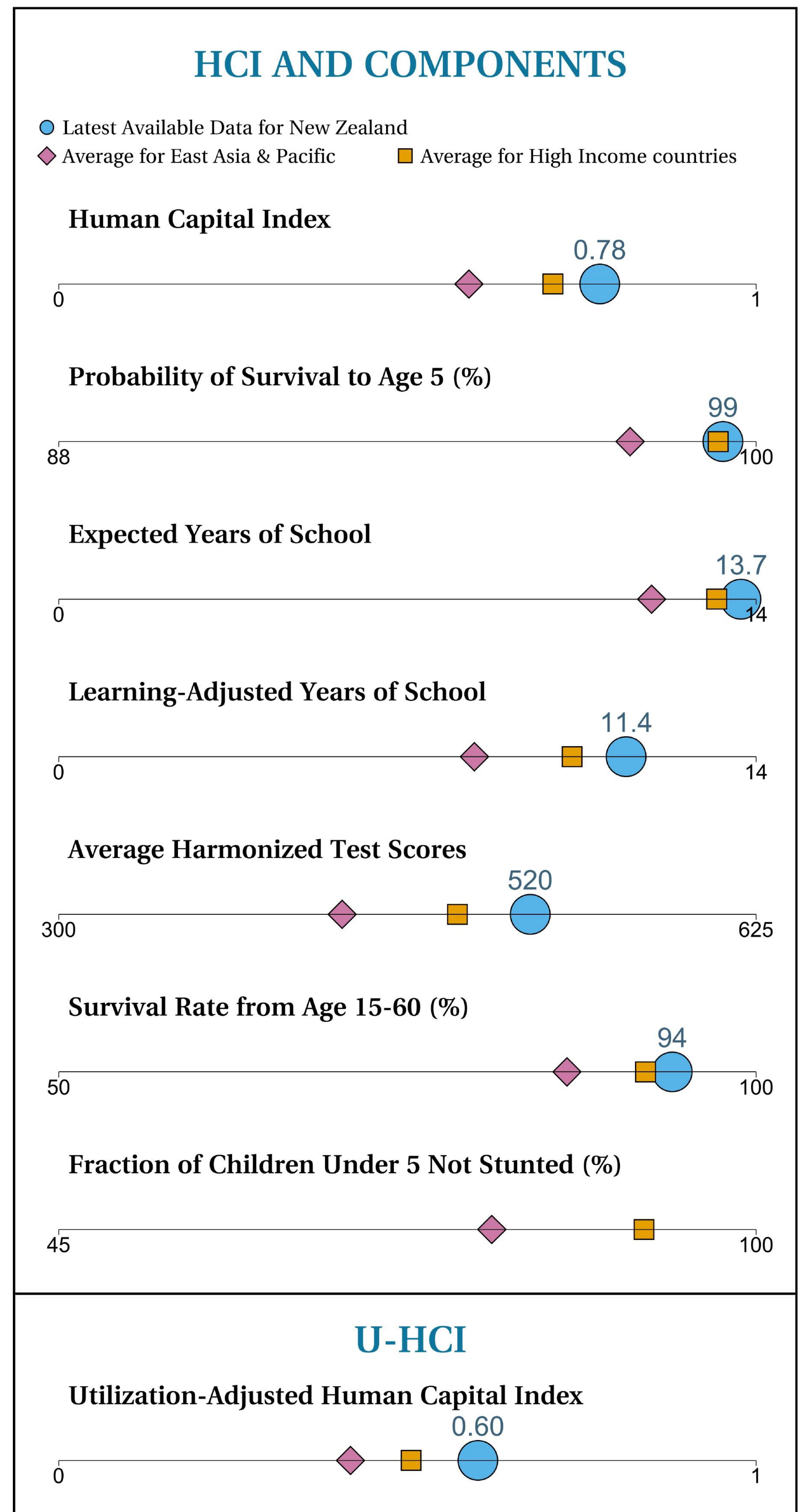
## UTILIZATION-ADJUSTED HUMAN CAPITAL INDEX

The Utilization-adjusted Human Capital Index (U-HCI) scales down the HCI by taking into account how many adults are not employed. The U-HCI for New Zealand is **0.60**. Thus, children born today will be 60% as productive in adulthood as they could have been if they had access to full health and education, and they became fully employed adults. The U-HCI for girls is even lower at 0.58.

The Human Capital Complementary Indicators (HCCIs) offer a snapshot of human capital investments at four stages of the lifecycle. The figures show the latest available data, benchmarked against regional averages. The figures also report progress over the previous 5 years.

## EARLY CHILDHOOD

- **Neonatal mortality rate.** The neonatal mortality rate is 3 per 1,000 live births (2021). This remains unchanged since 2016. The indicator is lower than the regional average.
- **Participation rate in organized learning.** In 2019, 91% of children who were one year younger than the official primary school entry age participated in an organized learning program, compared to 93% in 2015. The indicator is above the regional average.
- **DTP vaccination rate, third dose.** In 2022, 89% of infants received the third dose of the diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis vaccine, compared to 94% in 2017. The indicator is higher than the regional average.

## SCHOOL AGE

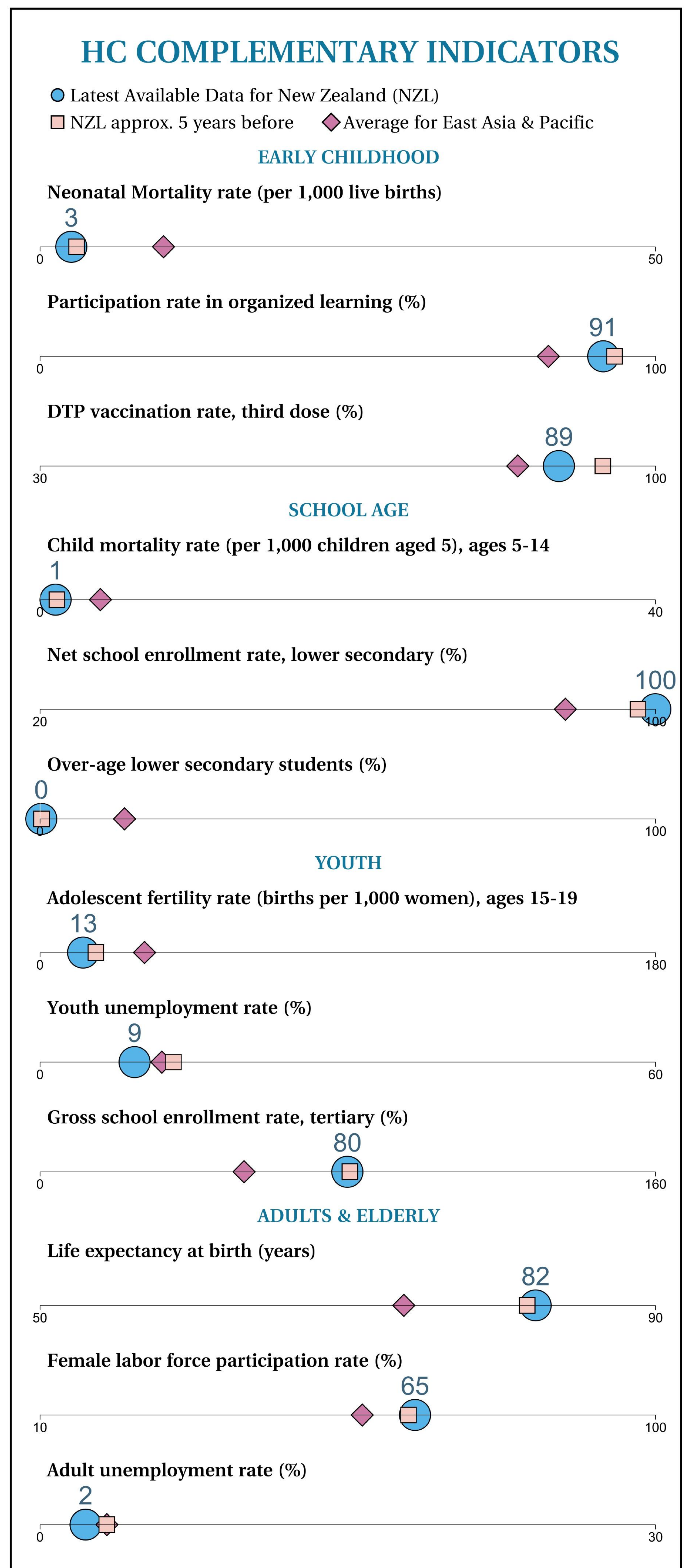
- **Child mortality rate.** The mortality rate for children ages 5-14 is 1 per 1,000 children aged 5 (2021). This remains unchanged since 2016. The indicator is lower than the regional average.
- **Net school enrollment rate, lower secondary.** The percentage of lower secondary school-aged children enrolled at that level is 100% (2020), compared to 98% in 2016. The indicator is above the regional average.
- **Over-age lower secondary students.** The percentage of lower secondary school students who are older than the typical age for their respective school level is 0% (2020). This remains unchanged since 2015. The indicator is lower than the regional average.

## YOUTH

- **Adolescent fertility rate.** The number of births for every 1,000 women ages 15-19 is 13 (2021), compared to 16 in 2016. The indicator is lower than the regional average.
- **Youth unemployment rate.** Unemployed youth as a share of the youth labor force (ages 15-24) is 9% (2022), compared to 13% in 2017. The indicator is below the regional average.
- **Gross school enrollment rate, tertiary.** Tertiary school enrollment as a percentage of people ages 18-24 is 80% (2020), compared to 81% in 2015. The indicator is higher than the regional average.

## ADULTS & ELDERLY

- **Life expectancy at birth.** Life expectancy at birth is 82 years (2021). This remains unchanged since 2016. The indicator is higher than the regional average.
- **Female labor force participation rate.** Female labor force participation as a percentage of the female working-age population (ages 25+) is 65% (2022), compared to 64% in 2017. The indicator is above the regional average.
- **Adult unemployment rate.** Unemployed adults as a share of the adult labor force (ages +25) is 2% (2022), compared to 3% in 2017. The indicator is lower than the regional average.
