



JACOBS and HENDRICKSON to receive 1981 Outstanding Achievement Awards

EDNESDAY evening, January 28, 1981, once again east meets west when The Moles accord their highest honor the "outstanding achievement in construction" Awards to J. Donovan Jacobs, Chairman and Founder of Jacobs Associates of San Francisco, California and Milton A. Hendrickson, President of Hendrickson Bros., Inc., of Valley Stream, New York. The Award Dinner will be held in the grand ballroom of the New York Hilton in New York City.

Donovan Jacobs the Non Member Award Recipient was born in Motley, Minnesota on December 24, 1908. He earned a B.S. in C.E. from the University of Minnesota in 1934 and joined the Walsh Construction Company where he worked as Engineer and Estimator on the Fort Peck Dam diversion tunnels; Sandusky Bay Bridge; the Delaware Aqueduct; Queens Midtown Tunnel; and the Clark

MILTON A. HENDRICKSON, The Moles' Member Award Recipient was born on October 13, 1915 in Valley Stream on Long Island, New York; the town where the firm's headquarters, equipment storage yard and maintenance buildings are located.

Milton went to work for his father and two uncles during summers while still attending school. After graduation from Central High in Valley Stream

Hill Dam. In a joint venture of Kaiser, Walsh, Perini and Raymond as Chief Engineer he worked on the Snowy Mountain (tunnels and dams) Project in Australia.

In 1954 he formed Jacobs Associates and has become one of the foremost consultants for contractors, owners and consulting firms on tunnel construction world-wide. This includes new tunnels, tunnel trouble and tunnel equipment.

Mr. Jacobs has received other honors of the profession including the 1930 Beavers' Engineering Award, and was elected a member of the National Academy of Engineering. Mr. Jacobs is listed in Engineers of Distinction and in Who's Who in America. He was Chairman. U.S. National Committee on Tunnel Technology in 1977; is a Fellow, A.S.C.E.; and the Institution of Engineers, Australia; a member of the AIME, NSPE, and the British Tunneling Society.

in 1933 he was employed full time working his way through all phases culminating in 1953 with his election to the Presidency of the firm.


Serving during World War II as a pilot in the United States Air Force, Milton flew 30 combat missions and was separated from service with the rank of Captain in September 1945.

During Milton's tenure as President, Hendrickson Bros., Inc., has grown and prospered from a local grading and drainage contractor to the present sophisticated complex of super-highway construction, asphalt plants, docks and other structures. Aside from all this, Milton works continuously for the betterment of the industry through his work with the GCA and the AGC as well as other professional and trade organizations.

He has served The Moles over the years as committee member, Trustee and Officer. He was President during the period from May 1, 1978 through April 30, 1979 and serves currently as a Trustee. He is also a Past President of the New York State Chapter of the Associated General Contractors of America; the New York City Post of the Society of American Military Engineers; the New York State Bituminous Concrete Producers Association and the Nassau-Suffolk Contractors Association.

The Moles are proud to announce that The Honorable Thomas P. O'Neill, Jr., has agreed to give the principal address at the Annual Award Dinner to be held on January 28th.

Thomas P. "Tip" O'Neill, Jr. as Speaker of the U.S. House of Representatives is the second most powerful office holder in America. Elected unanimously twice as Speaker and twice as Majority Leader, he has been on the political trail since he ran for the city council as a senior at Boston College. He was elected at the age of 23 to the Massachusetts legislature and became its first Democratic Speaker in history 13 years later.


Tip O'Neill took John F. Kennedy's place in the House in 1952 when he (Kennedy) ran for the U.S. Senate. In 1970 he started on the leadership ladder when he was named whip.

He has championed the cause of the workingman and the less fortunate. "Work and Wages" are his motto. He lives by the words: "Politics is the art of compromise."

As Speaker, he functions through personal contact, on the floor and in the cloakroom. He meets the press daily and sees the President once a week.

Born December 9, 1912 in Cambridge, Massachusetts, he has been honored as Outstanding Alumnus of Boston College where a chair in politics is endowed in his name. He has been named Good Scout of the Year by the Boy Scouts, National Father of the Year, Outstanding Catholic of the Year with Notre Dame's Laetare Medal, fourteen honorary degrees and Chairman of the Democratic National Convention.

JOHN D. SAUNDERS, President of Slattery Associates, Inc., is the Chairman of the Award Committee this year. He also serves on The Moles' Executive Committee.

Born April 4, 1926 in Flushing, New York, he was raised in Great Neck and graduated from Cornell University with a B.C.E. degree in 1948. While attending Cornell, he was elected Cornell Class President for 1947; also to the Chi Epsilon and Tau Beta Pi, National Honorary Engineering Societies. He is currently a member of the Cornell Society of Engineers.


After graduation, he joined the Slattery Contracting Company. During the next 22 years he supervised several contracts on arterial highways including the Major Deegan, Cross Bronx, Long Island, Clearview and Gowanus Expressways. He also supervised the construction of the Midtown Sixth Avenue Subway Extension, Brooklyn Bridge Manhattan Plaza and numerous Manhattan building foundation contracts for the firm.

In 1969 he became Executive Vice President of Slattery Associates, Inc., the successor company to Slattery Contracting Co., Inc. He was made President in 1974. John is also Vice President of Alpha Portland Industries, the parent company of Slattery Associates, Inc.

In the last decade, the Slattery Organization has grown considerably through geographical dispersion and the acquisition of the following subsidiaries: Grow Tunneling Corp., H. Sand & Co., Inc., Underpinning & Foundation Constructors, Inc. and A.S.C. Constructors, Inc.

CAPT. THOMAS, J. DOYLE, CEC-USN (Ret.) died on August 20, 1980 at Saint Claire's Hospital, Denville, New Jersey. He was 62.

A graduate of Purdue University, Captain Doyle joined the U.S. Navy Civil Engineer Corps in 1941. For the following twenty seven years he held numerous commands in the Navy and was responsible for the direction of major construction projects in the Southwest Pacific, Europe and the United States. In his last Navy assignment he served as Deputy Commander for Management in the Navy Facilities Engineering Command in Washington, D.C. where he directed construction operation and maintenance for the world-wide Naval shore activities.

In 1971 Tom joined Louis Berger International as Director of Construction Management and was responsible for many complex projects beginning with the construction management of a sophisticated, multi-million dollar nuclear test facility in Idaho. Other assignments included the direction of the Rahad Irrigation project in Sudan; the establishment of a construction equipment leasing corporation in Haiti; the rehabiliation and maintenance of the Nile River Irrigation Works in Egypt; the design of thirty-seven pumping Stations on the Nile River; the management of the first phases of construction of a major naval base in Iran; the coordination of the Euphrates Basin Irrigation project in Syria; the procurement of heavy construction equipment for the Roads and Bridges Public Corporation

DAVID S. FINE died on September 13, 1980 at his residence in Manhattan. He was 85.

Dave, a veteran construction engineer whose achievements over a 44 year period included some of the New York area's most famous bridges and buildings, retired from American Bridge Division of U.S. Steel in 1960.

Born in Philadelphia, he graduated in 1916 from the University of Pennsylvania with a degree in Civil Engineering. His first job was with Pencoyd Iron Works and in 1918 he joined American Bridge as a draftsman in their construction department. In 1939 he became Manager of Erection and was named District Construction Manager in 1952.

Some of the notable jobs he supervised were: the hingeless arch of the Henry Hudson Bridge over the Harlem River, the Marine Parkway Bridge, the Bronx-Whitestone Bridge, and the Tappan Zee which crosses the Hudson River at Tarrytown, as well as the spinning of the cables for the Triborough Bridge. Before retiring he directed the cable work on the Throgs Neck Bridge.

He was a familiar figure in hard hat and work clothes on the job at many structures that became landmarks. His accomplishments led one of those with whom he had been associated to remark, "the projects Dave supervised over the years read like a Who's Who in building."

He is survived by two daughters, Susan Kamarow and Edna Greenbaum; a brother, Harry; and five grandchildren.



ROBERT D. WILSON died on May 27, 1980 after surgery in Houston, Texas to install a valve in his heart. He was 60.

At the time of his death Mr. Wilson was Vice Chairman of the Board of Peter Kiewit Sons', Inc.

Born January 3, 1920 at Holly, Colorado he was graduated from Colorado State University in 1947 after serving meritoriously with the U.S. Army in World War II in Europe.

He joined PKS after graduation serving as a timekeeper and steadily advanced through a variety of highway and heavy construction assignments in Colorado and Wyoming as an engineer, foreman and job superintendent. In 1950 he was made General Superintendent and in 1961 moved to the Home Office in Omaha as an assistant to the President, Peter Kiewit. He was elected a Vice President in 1964 and the following year, he became Executive Vice President for Operations and a Member of the Board of Directors. The Board elected him President in 1969 marking the first time since the founding of the firm as a family business in 1884 that anyone other than a Kiewit was named President.

After helping build PKS for 33 years and guiding it as President for 10 years, Bob Wilson announced his retirement in the autumn of 1979 saying: "Being a part of the Kiewit company has been a wonderful, rewarding experience, and I regret that my health will not permit me to continue the relationship." In 1968 he became a Senior Vice President and Director of Raymond International Inc., when they acquired Healy Tibbitts. He served in that capacity until he retired in 1972: and continued to serve as a Director until 1977. Bob is currently active as a Consultant doing Construction Management work on marine and heavy construction projects. He travels extensively but finds time to keep in shape with swimming and boating. Bob says his prime hobby is trying to keep up with the computer age.
