2. INTRODUCTION

The overall aim of the subject area 'Legal Practice Workshop 2' is for students to understand the special part of Law, with a predominantly practical approach through different mechanisms. These mechanisms include the handling of legal basis both online and in physical documents. Students will also gain practical knowledge of how to manage an office in terms of financial and management matters.

All these matters will be taught by external professionals related to different areas of law. Students will also be encouraged to solve practical cases involving legal conflicts and management conflicts in law firms.
