1. **INTRODUCTION**

In addition to the Online Wikipedia, it is now possible to download a copy of these Wikis and configure them to use offline, which means the content is still accessible even without internet connection! The Wikipedia for Schools includes content that has relevance to students both in High Schools and Colleges carefully handpicked and edited by SOS volunteers. Adult and irrelevant content is edited by deletion.

Anyone can take advantage of this fact to carry out an outreach project to schools with the offline (DVD) version of Wikipedia for Schools, and empower the students with a huge knowledge base free of cost. This guide will walk you through all the requirements and the process of installation, configuration and use of Wikipedia for Schools DVD version.

PS: This guide focuses on and makes references to the DVD version of Wikipedia for Schools Suite, compiled by [Wikimedia Kenya](#).

2. **CONTENTS**

This DVD suite contains:

- Kiwix Directory-this contains the software that reads the Wikipedia Content
- The Wikipedia for Schools.zim--this is the file that is the content. It is compressed in a .zim format
- The Wikipedia for Schools-User Manual--this is what you are reading now! It is the guide to use and installation of the Wikipedia for Schools. It also has support and troubleshooting information

3. **REQUIREMENTS:**

Software:

- Kiwix v0.9 alpha 7 (provided in the DVD suite)
- Wikipedia for Schools 2008/2009 Zim file (Included in the suite)
- A computer with Linux or Windows Operating system
- An optimum of 10GB of space in the Hard Disk

4. **KIWIX**

Kiwix is a small free license software that is used to view web pages offline by reading a special compressed package of the website known as a ZIM file (*.zim)

a. **Downloading**

The installation package for this software can be downloaded from the Kiwix.org website.

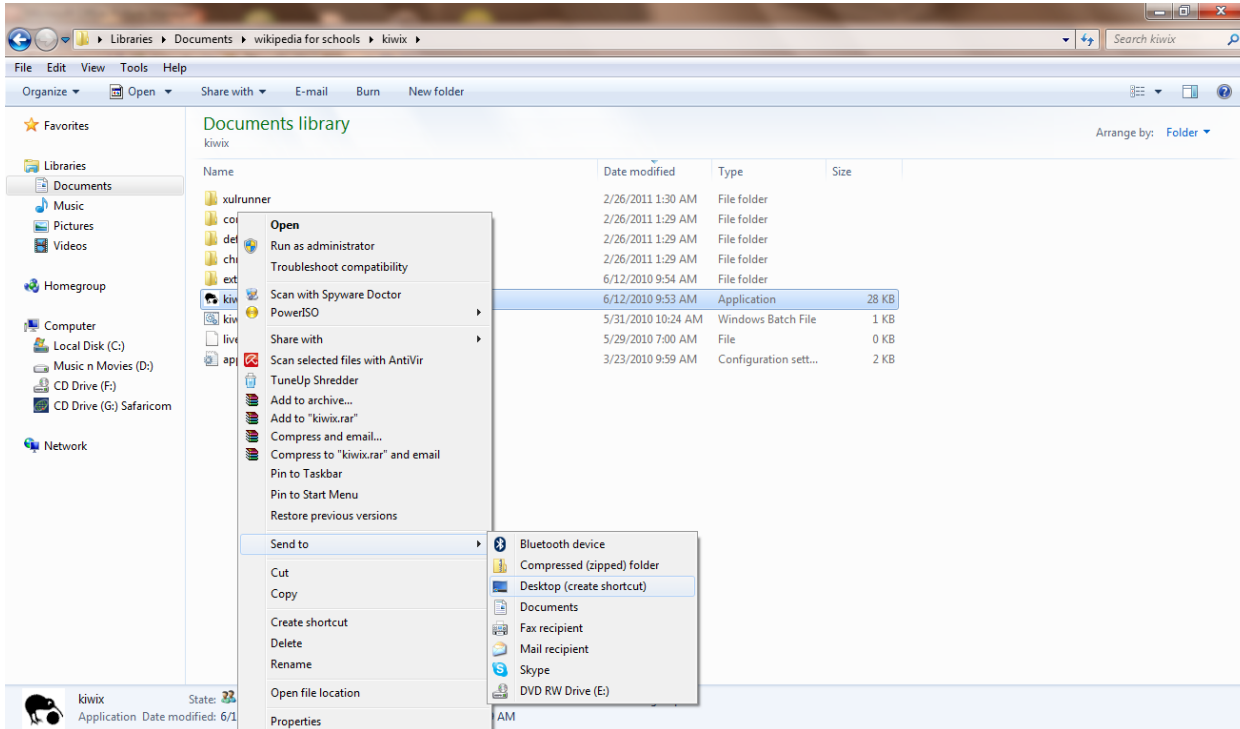
b. **Installation**

The DVD suite comes with a Kiwix installation directory, so you do not need to download it. Installation is very simple:

For Windows OS

- i. Insert the DVD and browse its content. Copy the entire folder named **KIWIX**
- ii. Go to C:\Program Files in your computer. This is reached by opening the start menu> My Computer> Local Disk(C)>Program files
- iii. Paste the Kiwix folder there
- iv. Open the folder that you pasted (C:\Program Files\Kiwix)

- v. Scroll down to a file named Kiwix (with a black image of a bird head ) and right click on the file. On the menu that appears, point the cursor on “send to” and select – Desktop(create shortcut)

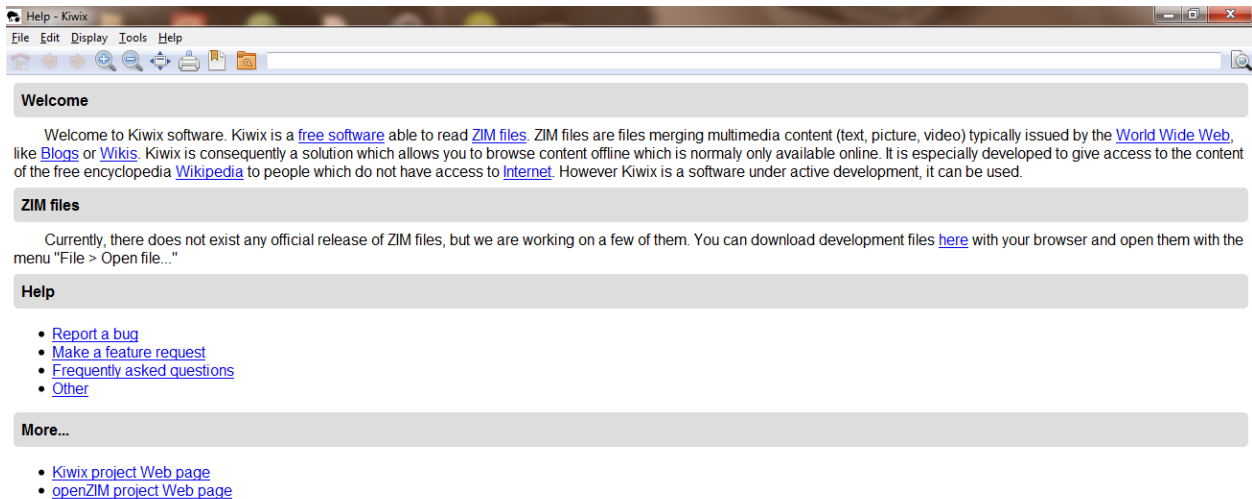


You have successfully installed Kiwix and you can run it by double clicking on the Kiwix Shortcut on the desktop

c. Use

When you open Kiwix, you will see the following screen. Now the next step is to open the Wikipedia for Schools using Kiwix.

Please read the next part below under the use of Wikipedia for schools to know how to open the zim file.



5. **WIKIPEDIA FOR SCHOOLS**

Wikipedia for Schools is a wiki project that contains open source content covering most of the subjects that are taught in schools. This version comes in a zim format, packaged in a DVD

a. **What is a Zim file?**

A zim file is a highly compressed package that contains the full content of a website that can be browsed offline, plus some other Meta data to enable ease of navigation

b. **The offline (DVD) version**

The zim version of Wikimedia for schools can be downloaded online [here](#). Wikimedia Kenya has compiled a DVD that contains the zim file ready, so it can be used without requiring any internet connection. This is what has been referred to as the offline version of Wikipedia for Schools.

c. **Installation**

- Insert the DVD and open it to view the files.
- Copy the file named Wikipedia for Schools.zim to whichever location you like. I recommend that you copy it and paste it in the “Documents” folder. To do this, go to the start menu of the computer and click “My Documents”. Paste the file there

d. **Configuration**

Up to now, the installation is almost complete. Just a few things to note:

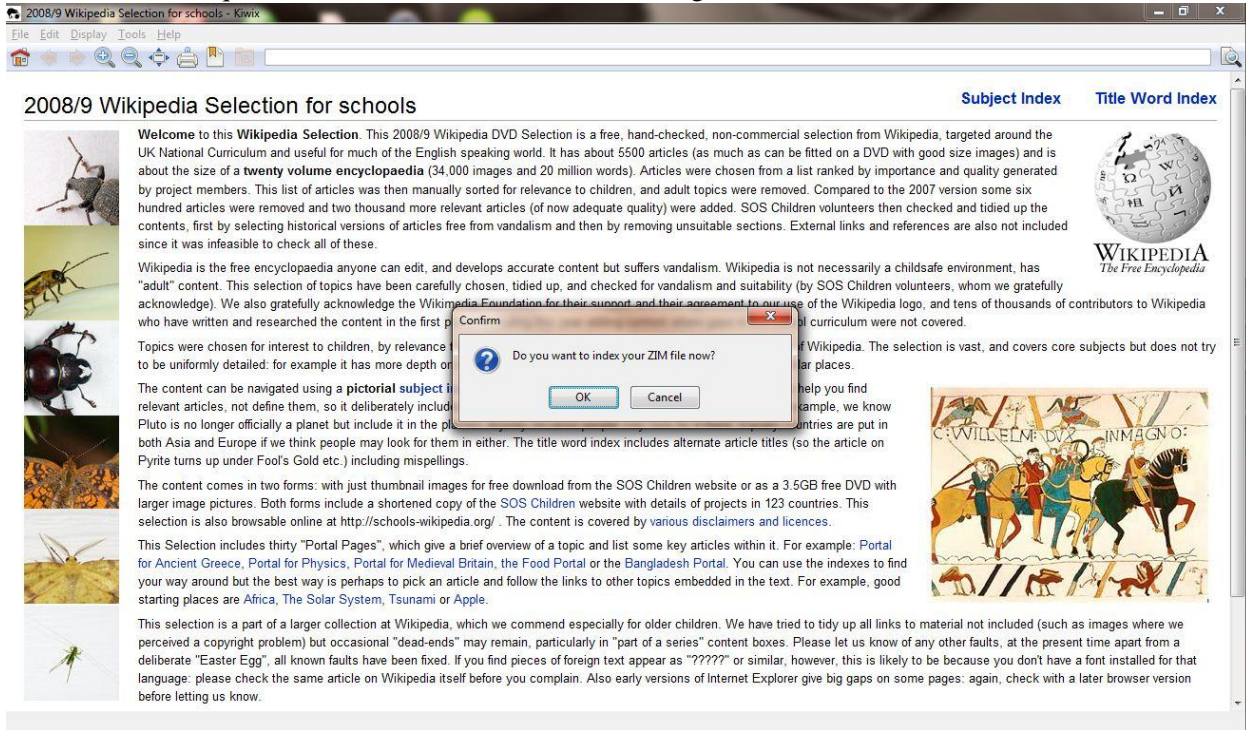
Please paste the zim file in a location where no one can tamper with it, and do not move this file unless it is necessary.

Now go to the desktop to open Kiwix as explained in section 3 (b) above.

e. **Indexing**

When Wikipedia for Schools zim file is opened for the first time, it is not possible to type keywords in the search bar for easy access. In order to achieve this, the zim files needs to undergo indexing. This process enables Kiwix to create an index of all the words contained so that it can be easy for the user to access any article by searching the keywords.

The indexing process starts automatically when the zim is opened the first time. Allow or accept the indexing option when prompted for the first time. (You can then use the Wikipedia for Schools on subsequent times without the need for indexing)



Let the indexing process run to 100%

f. **Using Wikipedia for Schools**

Your computer is now fully configured to use the offline version of Wikipedia for Schools. Let us now walk you through some simple navigation guides on using Wikimedia for schools. There are two ways you can find the articles you need to study:

i. **Using the Search bar:**

Click on the search bar and type any keyword for the topic or subject you want.

On the left sidebar list of related hyperlinks will appear. Select the one that suits you or what you are interested in.

2008/9 wikipedia Selection for schools

Welcome to this **Wikipedia Selection**. This 2008/9 Wikipedia DVD Selection is a free, hand-checked, non-commercial selection from Wikipedia, targeted around the UK National Curriculum and useful for much of the English speaking world. It has about 5500 articles (as much as can be fitted on a DVD with good size images) and is about the size of a **twenty volume encyclopaedia** (34,000 images and 20 million words). Articles were chosen from a list ranked by importance and quality generated by project members. This list of articles was then manually sorted for relevance to children, and adult topics were removed. Compared to the 2007 version some six hundred articles were removed and two thousand more relevant articles (of now adequate quality) were added. SOS Children volunteers then checked and tidied up the contents, first by selecting historical versions of articles free from vandalism and then by removing unsuitable sections. External links and references are also not included since it was infeasible to check all of these.

Wikipedia is the free encyclopaedia anyone can edit, and develops accurate content but suffers vandalism. Wikipedia is not necessarily a childsafe environment, has "adult" content. This selection of topics have been carefully chosen, tidied up, and checked for vandalism and suitability (by SOS Children volunteers, whom we gratefully acknowledge). We also gratefully acknowledge the Wikimedia Foundation for their support and their agreement to our use of the Wikipedia logo, and tens of thousands of contributors to Wikipedia who have written and researched the content in the first place, including this year adding content where gaps in the school curriculum were not covered.

Topics were chosen for interest to children, by relevance to the National Curriculum and including much of the very best of Wikipedia. The selection is vast, and covers core subjects but does not try to be uniformly detailed: for example it has more depth on Llandudno, which is featured in the curriculum, than other similar places.

The content can be navigated using a **pictorial subject index**, or a **title word index** of all topics. The subject index is to help you find relevant articles, not define them, so it deliberately includes topics which people may search for under the subject. For example, we know Pluto is no longer officially a planet but include it in the planets anyway because people may look for it there. Equally countries are put in both Asia and Europe if we think people may look for them in either. The title word index includes alternate article titles (so the article on Pyrite turns up under Fool's Gold etc.) including misspellings.

The content comes in two forms: with just thumbnail images for free download from the SOS Children website or as a 3.5GB free DVD with larger image pictures. Both forms include a shortened copy of the **SOS Children** website with details of projects in 123 countries. This selection is also browsable online at <http://schools-wikipedia.org/>. The content is covered by **various disclaimers and licences**.

This Selection includes thirty "Portal Pages", which give a brief overview of a topic and list some key articles within it. For example: [Portal for Ancient Greece](#), [Portal for Physics](#), [Portal for Medieval Britain](#), [the Food Portal](#) or the [Bangladesh Portal](#). You can use the indexes to find your way around but the best way is perhaps to nick an article and follow the links to other topics embedded in the text. For example, good starting places are [Africa](#), [The Solar System](#)

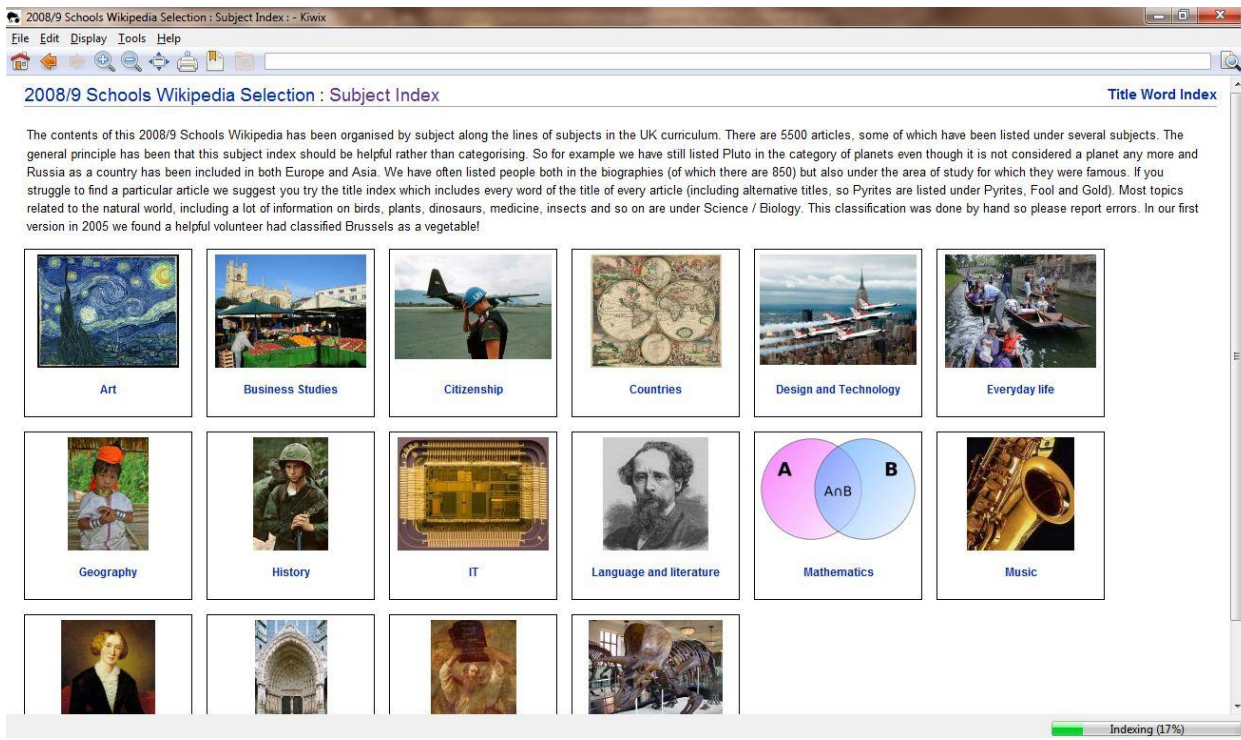
NB: Hyperlinked text (appearing in blue) will also take you to that article.

ii. ***Using the Subject or Title index***

Above the Kiwix, are the title boxes of the Subject and index option

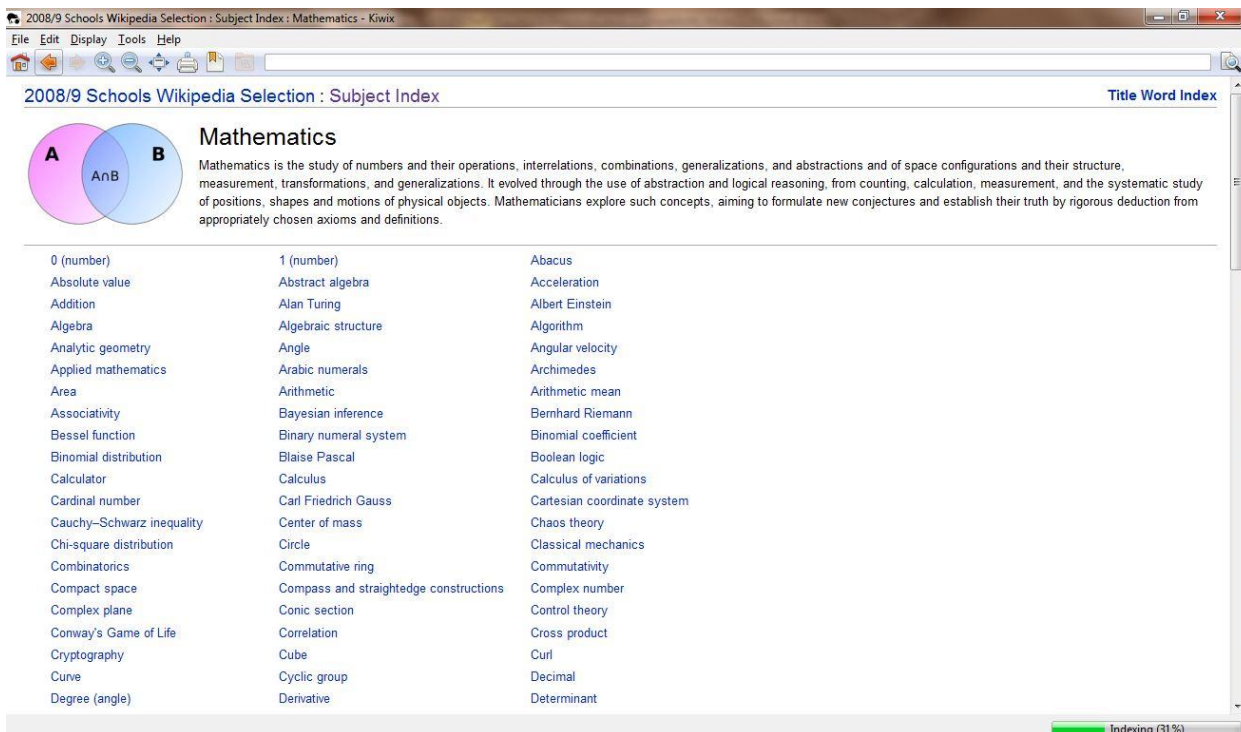
The subject index lists all the subject matter covered: like Geography, Physics, Biology and so forth)

Select the subject matter you wish to read on like Mathematics



Select

from the list of topics covered in Mathematics that you want to read on e.g.



Calculus and off u go...

The Title Word Index lists all the articles in alphabetical order. Simply click on the Title Word Index tab above the Kiwix and then select the alphabetical letter representing the article you wish to read or find. All the articles are listed. Select that which you want.

6. **ADDITIONAL TROUBLE SHOOTING**

(i) Why does the software index again when opened?

The zim file index that is created during the indexing process depends on the location of the .zim file. If you change the location of the zim file slightly, the indexing process has to be done again for the search functionality to work. That is why it is advisable that you save the zim file in a location where no one can tamper with it unnecessarily. However, you can still use the Title and Subject indices even without indexing or while indexing is in progress.

(ii) My search does not return what I want?

Well, probably you misspelled your search criteria or what you are looking for has a different name. Try a synonym or related word (it happened to me when I was searching for Menstruation, it did not return anything but when I tried Female reproductive system, there I got it!!)

(iii) I deleted the Kiwix Shortcut from my Desktop, How can I open Kiwix again?

Never worry! The desktop shortcut is not the only way to open Kiwix. You can open Kiwix any time by opening the installation directory i.e. C:\Program Files\kiwi by opening the Start menu>My Computer>Local Drive C > Program Files > Kiwix. In this folder, right click to open the application file named Kiwix.

You can then restore the Desktop shortcut as previous.

(iv) The installation of Kiwix Says, ‘Not enough memory’

Well maybe you double clicked on the Kiwix.exe in the directory. It is attempting to install. Since the Kiwix version used here does not necessarily need to be installed, just refer to the Kiwix installation section at the beginning. However should you want to install, cancel the installation and then create a directory/folder in a drive of your choice that has enough capacity Start the installation again by double clicking on the kiwix.exe and then browse to the folder you created...finish off the installation..
