Course Description:

The course will go over such types of Indian scriptures as the Vedas and Upanishads, the Bhagavad Gita, the Puranas etc. It will examine the history of their emergence and prevalence, the key themes their composers were interested in, their purpose and relevance today. As narrative texts, they require specific methods of study at which the course will look next. Then, the vision of the divine feminine and masculine characteristic of the Puranas will be explored. The course will showcase the vision of the feminine divine in Devi Mahatmya of the Markandeya Purana. Finally, it will look at the worship of Nature in the Puranas as worship of the feminine principle

Learning Objectives:

The objectives of the course include imparting to the scholar a good understanding of the history of Indian scriptures. The scholar will be gain familiarity with the different types of scriptures on the Indian tapestry. They will be able to name the key themes prevalent in Indian scriptures, speak about the purpose of the same and understand their relevance today.

The course also will introduce the Puranas as a body of Indian scriptures to the scholar. They will understand what distinguishes the Puranas from other Indic scriptures. The will also learn the relevant methods for grappling with the Puranas as narrative texts. Furthermore, the scholar will see how the feminine and masculine divine principles are represented in the Puranas. The scholar will explore the Devi Mahatmya of the Markandeya Purana and gain an understanding of this foundational Shakta text and its key themes as they relate to the course. Finally, a parallel will be drawn between the worship of nature in the Puranas and the worship of the divine feminine for the scholar to understand how the puranas view the relationship between manifest nature and shakti.

Pedagogy for the course:

The course will be taught via text studies and extensive discussions of the same.
