6. **ISSUE:** Taxis – Biennial Review

DISCUSSION: Ms. North provided an overview of the Biennial Review and the proposed changes that staff recommended.

PUBLIC TESTIMONY:

Fassil Berhe, with Union Cab, spoke in support of the changes to the age requirements and fares and asked that there be an extension for any vehicles that reach the maximum age before Council reviews the amendment to the City Code.

Yassin Meri spoke in support of the changes to the age requirements and fares.

Kyle Summers, with Yellow Cab, spoke in support of the staff recommendations for changes to the age requirements and fares.

Daniel Woldegiorgis spoke in support of the changes noting this will help with competition with Uber and Lyft.

Abdul Karim, with King Cab, spoke in support of the changes and noted the signatures of support from drivers.

BOARD ACTION: Mr. Kane moved to approve the staff recommendations in the Biennial Review with the following modifications: (1) Increase the taxi fare to \$3.50, but recommend the City Manager approve a \$0.50 surcharge once the current surcharge expires and the Board should discuss changes to fares in Fall 2023 taking into consideration any fare changes in neighboring jurisdictions; and (2) Eliminate the age requirement for taxis and extend the current authorizations for any vehicles who reach the age limit prior to the City Code amendment being reviewed by City Council. Ms. Bonnard seconded, and the motion was approved 6-0.

ISSUE: Written Staff Updates & Public Hearing Follow-up

A. Parklet Program

A total of 24 parklets are permitted and operating in the City and 10 other businesses are interested in participating in the program starting this spring. The majority of these parklets (21) are located in Old Town, while 2 are located in North Old Town and 1 in North Ridge/Fairlington.

Staff is working with each business to ensure they meet the Parklet Requirements, which includes constructing a platform to provide a level connection to the sidewalk. Almost all parklets have platforms and are furnished according to the Outdoor Dining Design Guidelines and the Parklet Requirements. City staff are currently collaborating internally to update the Parklet Requirements to address additional feedback received from business owners and other stakeholders since the Requirements were last updated and approved by the Board in May 2022. This update is intended to make the Requirements clearer and easier to navigate for all parties. Staff plans to bring this update with tracked changes before the Board at their February 27 meeting as a public hearing item for their approval.

ISSUE: Residential Permit Parking – 2100 Block of Potomac Avenue

REQUESTED BY: Residents of the 2100 block of Potomac Avenue

LOCATION: 2100 block of Potomac Avenue (Residential Permit Parking District 13)

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: That the Board recommend that the Director of T&ES install 2-hour parking restrictions from 8:00 AM to 5:00 PM, Monday through Saturday, Residential Permit Parking (RPP) District 13 permit holders exempt on the 2100 block of Potomac Avenue.


BACKGROUND: In 2021, the Board reviewed the creation of RPP District 13 for the Potomac Yard neighborhood which was later approved by the City Council. Following the district creation, residents submitted petitions for installing signage on their blocks, which were approved by the Traffic and Parking Board in July 2022. A total of 16 blocks were approved for restrictions from 8:00 AM to 5:00 PM, Monday through Saturday. However, City staff did not receive a complete petition from residents of the 2100 block of Potomac Avenue until recently.

The 2100 block of Potomac Avenue has 7 parking spaces, all on the west side of the street, and is located between Diamond Avenue and E. Custis Avenue, across from Potomac Yard Park. The abutting blocks of both Diamond Avenue and E Custis Avenue already have posted Residential Permit Parking restrictions. The location of the 2100 block of Potomac Avenue is shown in Attachment 1.

<u>DISCUSSION</u>: In order to add signage within an existing District, Section 5-8-75 of the Code requires a petition be submitted by more than 50% of the residents on the block. The requestor garnered signatures from 7 out of 12 households on this block (Attachment 2). The requested signage is consistent with the signage posted on adjacent blocks in this district.

<u>OUTREACH</u>: Staff notified the Potomac Yard Homeowners Association of this petition on January 5, 2023. The HOA indicated that they would not take an official position on the signage for each block in Potomac Yard. Rather, they would leave it up to each block to obtain the required number of signatures and demonstrate a majority want the restrictions on their block.

ISSUE: Residential Pay by Phone – 300 block of Duke Street

REQUESTED BY: Residents of the 300 block of Duke Street

LOCATION: 300 block of Duke Street

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: That the Board recommend the Director of T&ES implement a residential pay by phone requirement (\$1.75 per hour) for the 300 block of Duke Street

BACKGROUND: The Residential Pay by Phone Program allows residents to request parking restrictions that require non-residents to pay a fee to park. Pay stations are not generally installed on Residential Pay by Phone blocks; instead, signage referring to the available payment methods on these blocks replaces existing signage. Consistent with the existing residential permit parking program, residents who wish to add this signage must initiate the request through a petition signed by the residents of the block. To be eligible for Residential Pay by Phone signage, a block must meet the parking occupancy threshold, must already have posted parking time restrictions for non-residents, and must be directly adjacent to another pay by phone block.

The residents on the 300 block of Duke Street have submitted a petition requesting these restrictions. This block is located between S. Fairfax and S. Royal Streets and within 2 blocks of the heart of King Street and 3 blocks from the waterfront. Parking is only allowed on the north side of the block. There are approximately 8 spaces on this block. The block is residential except for St. Mary's Lyceum at 315 Duke Street. See Attachment 1 for more location information.

<u>DISCUSSION</u>: Staff reviewed the request per the requirements outlined in the City Code and found it is eligible for the signage. The table below summarizes the block's compliance with the requirements.

Requirement	Compliance
The area subject to parking fee must be on a block with existing metered spaces, adjacent to an existing metered block, or adjacent to a block where a residential pay by phone parking fee has also been approved.	The 300 block of Duke Street is adjacent to the 200 block of Duke Street, which has residential pay by phone parking fees implemented (see Attachment 1).
The area subject to parking fee must already be posted with residential parking restrictions.	Current restrictions (<i>District 1</i> permitholders exempt): • 2hr 8AM-2AM Mon-Sun
The request to add a pay by phone parking fee must be initiated by the residents of the block through a petition signed occupants of more than 50% of the residential properties abutting the block.	The petition submitted was signed by 8 out of the 15 total households (53%) on the block (see Attachment 2).
The parking occupancy must be 75% or more.	A parking survey was conducted on Monday, January 9, 2023, and staff found that 7 out of 8 parking spaces (87.5%) were occupied at that time. Staff also observed that 3 of the vehicles parked on this block or 38% of the spaces were occupied by non-residents of the district.

OUTREACH: Staff notified the Old Town Civic Association (OTCA) of this petition, who expressed similar concerns with this petition as with previous requests for residential pay by phone restrictions that have been heard by the Board. Specifically, OTCA noted that the City Code's requirement for a parking study for these types of requests should be updated to require more than one survey. OTCA also suggested that the City consider whether a household has offstreet parking when reviewing petitions for these restrictions on their block.

Staff also notified the Basilica of Saint Mary of this petition since the church owns property along this block but had not heard back prior to publishing this docket. Per the requestor, this requested change was opposed by the occupant of 321 Duke Street. Staff also received a phone call from an anonymous resident of Duke Street on January 17, 2023, who does not support this requested change and plans to attend the Board meeting to voice his concerns.

ISSUE: City Code Amendment – Taxi Update

REQUESTED BY: City Staff

LOCATION: Citywide

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: That the Board recommend the City Council approve the amendment to the City Code.

BACKGROUND: The City is required by City Code to evaluate the regulations overseeing the taxi industry every two years and make recommendations for changes to those rules at that time. At the November 2022 Traffic and Parking Board meeting, the Board considered the Biennial Review and recommended the City Manager approve the report and implement the recommendations for changes to the maximum age of vehicles and an increase in fares. The City Manager has reviewed the Biennial Review and agreed with the Board's recommendation. In order to implement these regulations, an amendment to the City Code is required.

<u>**DISCUSSION**</u>: Attachment 1 provides the proposed changes to two sections of the City Code related to taxicabs. These changes include:

• Eliminate the maximum age for vehicles: Section 9-12-81 establishes the maximum age for vehicles permitted as 10 years for non-hybrid vehicles and 12 years for hybrid vehicles. As noted during the Biennial Review discussion, new car and truck sales are projected to be down almost 20% from pre-pandemic levels, resulting in supply issues for both new and used cars. Additionally, studies show that vehicles are lasting longer and the average age of all vehicles is increasing each year.

The proposed amendment would eliminate the age requirement altogether and allow the taxi companies to establish age requirements for their own fleets, similar to how the ride-hail companies operate. The annual state safety inspection is still required, which ensures a vehicle, regardless of age, meets state safety requirements. By eliminating this requirement, the City removes an additional regulatory burden on the industry.

Over the next two years, staff will monitor the impacts of removing this requirement. If problems arise, reinstating an age limit can be considered during the next Biennial Review.

• *Increase Existing Fares*: Section 9-12-132 establishes the fares taxis are permitted to charge. There have not been any permanent changes to taxi fares in over a decade yet, the costs to operate a vehicle have increased. The City Manager did approve a \$1 fuel surcharge in March 2022 to offset the rising cost of gasoline; however, this surcharge will expire in March 2023.

The proposed amendment would increase the Initial Meter Charge (or Drop Fee) by \$0.50, which brings this to \$3.50. This will partially offset the elimination of the meter surcharge when it expires and brings the fares in line with other counties and the District. Staff will continue to coordinate with the neighboring jurisdictions on any changes they are making in attempt to standardize rates for the region.

As part of the Traffic and Parking Board's review, the Board recommended staff also look at implementing a second \$0.50 fuel surcharge to offset the expiration of the full \$1 surcharge while allowing time for coordination with other jurisdictions on their fares. The City Code outlines specific criteria for the City Manager to consider when implementing a surcharge. Staff will review these criteria and work with the City Manager to approve this second surcharge.

OUTREACH: The Biennial Review was shared with the taxi companies that are currently operating in Alexandria prior to the November Board meeting. At that meeting, there were several speakers speaking in support of the proposed changes. Staff has notified the taxi companies about the next steps related to implementing these changes, including the required City Council action to adopt the City Code amendment and they remain supportive of the changes.

Attachment 1 – Proposed City Code Amendment

Section 9-12-81 - Requirements for vehicles.

Every taxicab and the equipment used in connection therewith, subject to a vehicle permit pursuant to this division, shall at all times comply with the following minimum standards

(l) Age of vehicles. Except for hybrid or alternative fuel vehicles, no vehicle permit shall be issued for a taxicab that is older than ten model years. No vehicle permit shall be issued for a hybrid or alternative fuel taxicab that is older than 12 model years. [Reserved];

Section 9-12-132 - Amount of fare to be charged.

- (a) The rates to be charged to passengers in taxicabs shall be as follows. It shall be unlawful to make any greater or lesser charge:
 - (1) For the initial meter charge, \$3.00\$3.50.
