Background

Pursuant to A.R.S. § 41-2953, the Joint Legislative Audit Committee assigned the sunset review of the Arizona Commerce Authority (ACA) to the Senate Government Committee of Reference and the House Commerce Committee of Reference.

Established in 2011 through <u>Executive Order 2010-12</u> and codified by the Legislature through <u>Laws 2011, Second Special Session, Chapter 1</u>, the mission of the ACA is to provide private sector leadership in growing and diversifying the economy of Arizona, creating high quality employment in Arizona through expansion, attraction and retention of businesses and marketing Arizona for the purpose of expansion, attraction and retention of businesses.

The ACA has a Board of Directors (Board) consisting of 19 voting members, including the Governor serving as Chairperson, the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) of the ACA and 17 private sector business leaders who are chief executive officers of private, for-profit enterprises. Of the 17 private sector voting members, nine are appointed by the Governor, four are appointed by the President of the Senate and four are appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives. The Board also has 10 ex officio members without the power to vote and 9 technical advisors that serve the Board to enhance collaboration among state agencies to meet infrastructure needs and facilitate growth opportunities throughout Arizona. The CEO is appointed by the Board and has the statutorily prescribed responsibility for managing, administering and supervising the activities of the ACA.

The duties of the ACA include: 1) administering tax credits and incentives for businesses; 2) administering various grants to qualified businesses to enhance economic development, including through the Arizona Competes Fund; 3) managing the State Broadband Office to coordinate the implementation of local, state and federal broadband programs and coordinate and execute federal broadband grant applications with public and private stakeholders; 4) establishing a program by which entrepreneurs become aware of permits, licenses or other authorizations needed to establish, expand or operate in Arizona; and 5) establishing and supervising the operations of full-time or part-time offices in other states and foreign countries for the purpose of expanding direct investment and export trade opportunities for businesses and industries in Arizona if the ACA determines that the effort would be beneficial to the economy of Arizona (A.R.S. Title 41, Ch. 10).

The ACA is statutorily set to terminate on July 1, 2024, unless legislation is enacted for its continuation (A.R.S. § 41-3024.31).

Committee of Reference Sunset Review Activity

Pursuant to A.R.S. § 41-2954, the Senate Government Committee of Reference met on Wednesday, January 17, 2024, to review the Auditor General's Performance Audit and Sunset Review Report, consider the ACA's responses to the statutorily-outlined sunset factors and receive public testimony.

Committee of Reference Recommendations

The Senate Government Committee of Reference recommended that the ACA be revised or consolidated.

Arizona Commerce Authority (ACA)

- Established in 2011
- Board consists of 19 voting members: Governor, ACA CEO, and 17 Governor/State-appointed private sector business leaders
- Sandra Watson serves as Chief Executive Officer
- We conducted ACA's previous sunset review in 2015



ACA's key responsibilities and activities for growing the State's economy

- Administers various tax incentives and grants
 - Reviews tax incentive applications, assesses whether applicants meet eligibility requirements, and approves applicants
 - Awards Competes Fund grant monies, administers grant agreements, and verifies eligibility and performance
- Manages the State's broadband office



ACA's key responsibilities and activities continued

- Contracts for foreign trade offices
- Assists entrepreneurs, businesses, and manufacturers
- Assists with workforce development
- Administers fund to bid on and host major events and program to promote film production in the State
- Hosts events for business executives



ACA met some statutory objectives

- Appropriately approved all 10 Qualified Facility tax credits we reviewed as applicants met capital investment and wage requirements
- Distributed Arizona Coronavirus Relief Fund donation monies we reviewed for approved purposes, including personal protective equipment and grant monies to nonprofits supporting vulnerable citizens



ACA serves State by providing economic development resources

- Developed community profile reports providing population and economic information for 15 counties and 92 urban and rural communities
- Offers small business bootcamp and rural economic development webinars to help businesses in urban and rural areas



Problem identified

ACA lacked evidence showing it verified businesses met some requirements when reviewing and approving nearly \$11 million in financial incentives



ACA lacked evidence it verified incentive requirements were met

ACA lacked documentation it verified business-reported information for:

- Job creation for 21 Quality Jobs tax credits totaling \$7.5 million
- Capital investment for a \$306,000 tax credit
- Job creation for more than \$3.4 million in grant monies paid to 4 businesses

2015 audit found similar issues

- ACA lacked evidence it verified some businessreported information and did not always document grant application, review, and award information
- Our 18-month followup published in 2017 found:
 - ACA developed policies and procedures for verifying information but failed to fully verify information for 1 grant we reviewed
 - ACA identified what information should be documented



Why this matters

Lack of verification documentation increases risk of fraud and waste of public monies



Key recommendations

Ensure tax credit and grant recipients meet all requirements prior to approving tax credits or distributing grant monies by developing procedures for:

- Verifying business-reported information
- Documenting verification



ACA responsible for managing broadband development grant monies

ACA coordinating the implementation of local, State, and federal broadband programs, including:

- \$100 million in broadband development grant awards to 20 awardees it announced in July 2022
- \$1 billion Broadband, Equity, Access, and Deployment (BEAD) Program grant



Problem identified

- ACA planned to distribute monies but had not established policies and procedures for administering grant programs or overseeing contractor
- This increases risk of misuse and inaccurately accounting for and reporting on use of grant monies
- ACA could be responsible for repaying monies to federal government



ACA contracts for trade offices to identify trade and investment opportunities

- As of April 2023, ACA contracts for 7 trade offices:
 - Guanajuato, Mexico
 - Chihuahua, Mexico
 - Mexico City, Mexico

- Frankfurt, Germany
- Tel Aviv, Israel
- Seoul, South Korea
- Taipei, Taiwan
- Contacts we reviewed were generally consistent with recommended practices and included performance measures



Problem identified

ACA did not:

- Provide documentation it verified trade offices' reported progress in achieving contractual performance measures
- Monitor trade office performance to ensure deliverables were received
- Address trade office nonperformance



ACA's Israel trade office failed to meet performance measures

- ACA reported CEO Forums were marketing campaigns held around the Waste Management Phoenix Open golf tournament and the 2023 Super Bowl
- Attended by private sector executives, their spouses, and ACA staff



ACA spent more than \$2.4 million on private CEO Forums from 2018 to 2023

ACA reported some company attendees proposed business in State

ACA reported 23 of 118 companies whose executives attended CEO Forums proposed nonbinding investment and jobs commitments in Arizona

- Per ACA, CEO Forums were not the only reason companies proposed potential investments and jobs
- Encouraging companies to invest in Arizona takes multiple conversations/interactions, sometimes years of relationship building



ACA is dissimilar to other State agencies that market Arizona

- Exempt from State accounting manual, which prohibits purchasing alcohol, establishes acceptable lodging rates, and requires documentation of public purpose for providing food and beverage
- Exempt from State procurement, but must adopt its own policies, procedures, and procurement practices



ACA reported consulting with legal counsel about hosting CEO Forums

- Arizona Constitution's gift clause requires payment of public monies is for a public purpose and value received is not far exceeded by consideration paid
- ACA reported it consulted with in-house legal counsel and third-party attorney to ensure CEO Forums comply with State laws and regulations
- ACA cited that the jobs and investments from companies that have participated in CEO Forums outweigh Forum cost



Arizona Commerce Authority Performance Audit and Sunset Review


Overview – ACA Performance Audit



Update on ACA Actions In Response to September 2023 Performance Audit

Overview

- For a period of more than nine months in 2023, Arizona Commerce Authority (ACA) staff worked closely with the Office of the Auditor General to complete a statutorily required performance audit in conjunction with the ACA's sunset review.
- The Auditor General's performance audit included 17 recommendations. The ACA agreed to all findings and committed to implementing all recommendations.
- The ACA has taken action to implement all 17 recommendations outlined by the Auditor General and taken additional steps to optimize management and oversight of state financial incentive programs.

Below follows a summary of Auditor General recommendations and ACA actions to implement those recommendations.

Dear President Sandra Watson:

The sunset review process prescribed in Title 41, Chapter 27, Arizona Revised Statutes, provides a system for the Legislature to evaluate the need to continue the existence of state agencies. During the sunset review process, an agency is reviewed by legislative committees of reference (CORs). On completion of the sunset review, the CORs recommend to continue, revise, consolidate or terminate the agency.

The Joint Legislative Audit Committee (JLAC) has assigned the sunset review of the Arizona Commerce Authority to CORs comprised of members of the Senate Commerce Committee and the House of Representatives Commerce Committee. JLAC has directed the Auditor General to conduct a performance audit of the Arizona Commerce Authority.

Pursuant to A.R.S. § 41-2954, the COR is required to consider certain sunset factors in deciding whether to recommend continuance, modification or termination of an agency. In addition to the sunset factors, which are addressed in the Auditor General performance audit, please provide your agency's written response to the required factors as listed below:

- 1. The extent to which the agency potentially creates unexpected negative consequences that may require additional review by the COR, including increasing the price of goods, affecting the availability of services, limiting the abilities of individuals and businesses to operate efficiently and increasing the cost of government.
- 2. The extent to which the agency has addressed deficiencies in its enabling statutes.
- 3. The extent to which the agency has determined whether the Attorney General or any other agency in Arizona has the authority to prosecute or initiate actions.
- 4. The consequences of eliminating the agency or consolidating it with another agency.

Your response should be received by September 1, so that we may proceed with the sunset review and schedule the required public hearing. Please submit the requested information to:

1. The extent to which the agency potentially creates unexpected negative consequences that may require additional review by the COR, including increasing the price of goods, affecting the availability of services, limiting the abilities of individuals and businesses to operate efficiently and increasing the cost of government.

Answer: The ACA is aware of no such unintended consequences.

2. The extent to which the agency has addressed deficiencies in its enabling statutes.

Answer: The ACA is aware of no such deficiencies.

3. The extent to which the agency has determined whether the Attorney General or any other agency in Arizona has the authority to prosecute or initiate actions.

Answer: The ACA has authority to either contract with the Attorney General or outside counsel to initiate legal action. Since its inception, the ACA has contracted with outside counsel for various legal services including contract draft and review, as well as guidance on a variety of matters.

4. The consequences of eliminating the agency or consolidating it with another agency.

Answer: The negative impact of eliminating the ACA would be felt in communities across the state and result in significant lost economic opportunities in the near term, while greatly hindering the long-term prosperity of the state.

Most directly, eliminating the ACA would significantly diminish the state's ability to compete for economic development projects, resulting in lost new jobs and the loss of current jobs as Arizona companies are lured away. Because the ACA administers financial programs on behalf of the state, elimination of the agency would put these programs in disarray. Eliminating the agency also would eliminate key support resources utilized by small businesses and small to mid-sized manufacturers, inhibiting the growth of established Arizona businesses.

On a broader level, the loss of the ACA's convening ability and statewide leadership would result in stalled advancement for a myriad of economic priorities such as technological advancement, workforce development, trade promotion, and infrastructure improvement, such as broadband. The ACA is leading numerous efforts on behalf of the state to position Arizona to benefit from federal funding opportunities, such as the CHIPS Act, Inflation Reduction Act and the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act. In particular, the state's strategy for the Broadband, Equity, Access, and Deployment (BEAD) and Digital Equity which represents nearly \$1 billion in funding. Arizona's BEAD Program is the largest broadband investment in the state's history with the principal objective of universal broadband access for all. The program will ensure high-speed internet is available to every household, business, anchor institution and community within the state. Arizona's broadband related investments will increase accessibility and improve the affordability of online



video conference services for social programs, education and distance learning, and telehealth services. As Arizona's only statewide economic development agency, the ACA brings a unique leadership role to advancing these and other efforts.

In addition to these efforts, Arizona is experiencing historic economic growth. Since our inception, the ACA has successfully won over 1,000 competitive projects that represent more than 267,000 projected new jobs and more than \$100 billion in capital investment in Arizona communities. Arizona's momentum has never been greater. Our results for the most recent full fiscal year, FY 23, saw single year records in terms of projected new jobs, wages, and capital investment. In FY23 companies committed to investing a record \$40 billion in local communities and have committed to creating over 24,000 new jobs for Arizona citizens.

In summary, Arizona's economic and technological leadership on the global stage would be dramatically reduced without the ACA. The mere existence of a state-level organization is a critical demonstration of the state's commitment to economic development. Having a state-level organization is an established model nationally – every state in the U.S. has a statewide economic development organization. Consequently, eliminating the ACA would significantly diminish Arizona's national and global competitiveness.
