### EXAMPLE PROJECT

In FY2023, EDA awarded **\$3,998,434 in Public Works funds to support the Fort Mojave Aha Macav Power Service** with developing a new source of clean and renewable energy for the Fort Mojave Reservation through the construction of a 2.3-megawatt solar power system. The project will help with infrastructure, sustainable revenue, and increase job creation that will benefit the Reservation in Mohave County, Arizona.
