Mr. NELSON of Nebraska, from the Committee on Appropriations, reported the following original bill; which was read twice and placed on the calendar

A BILL

Making appropriations for the legislative branch for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2010, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*
3 That the following sums are appropriated, out of any
4 money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the
5 legislative branch for the fiscal year ending September 30,
6 2010, and for other purposes, namely:

2 LEGISLATIVE BRANCH
3 SENATE
4 EXPENSE ALLOWANCES

5 For expense allowances of the Vice President,
6 \$20,000; the President Pro Tempore of the Senate,
7 \$40,000; Majority Leader of the Senate, \$40,000; Minor-
8 ity Leader of the Senate, \$40,000; Majority Whip of the
9 Senate, \$10,000; Minority Whip of the Senate, \$10,000;
10 Chairmen of the Majority and Minority Conference Com-
11 mittees, \$5,000 for each Chairman; and Chairmen of the
12 Majority and Minority Policy Committees, \$5,000 for each
13 Chairman; in all, \$180,000.

14 REPRESENTATION ALLOWANCES FOR THE MAJORITY
15 AND MINORITY LEADERS

16 For representation allowances of the Majority and
17 Minority Leaders of the Senate, \$15,000 for each such
18 Leader; in all, \$30,000.

19 SALARIES, OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES

20 For compensation of officers, employees, and others
21 as authorized by law, including agency contributions,
22 \$178,982,000, which shall be paid from this appropriation
23 without regard to the following limitations:

24 OFFICE OF THE VICE PRESIDENT

25 For the Office of the Vice President, \$2,517,000.

1 OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENT PRO TEMPORE

2 For the Office of the President Pro Tempore,
3 \$752,000.

4 OFFICES OF THE MAJORITY AND MINORITY LEADERS

5 For Offices of the Majority and Minority Leaders,
6 \$5,212,000.

7 OFFICES OF THE MAJORITY AND MINORITY WHIPS

8 For Offices of the Majority and Minority Whips,
9 \$3,288,000.

10 COMMITTEE ON APPROPRIATIONS

11 For salaries of the Committee on Appropriations,
12 \$15,844,000.

13 CONFERENCE COMMITTEES

14 For the Conference of the Majority and the Con-
15 ference of the Minority, at rates of compensation to be
16 fixed by the Chairman of each such committee,
17 \$1,726,000 for each such committee; in all, \$3,452,000.

8 For Office of the Secretary, \$25,790,000.

4 ITY AND MINORITY OF THE SENATE

5 For expense allowances of the Secretary of the Sen-
6 ate, \$7,500; Sergeant at Arms and Doorkeeper of the Sen-
7 ate, \$7,500; Secretary for the Majority of the Senate,
8 \$7,500; Secretary for the Minority of the Senate, \$7,500;
9 in all, \$30,000.

11 INQUIRIES AND INVESTIGATIONS

12 For expenses of inquiries and investigations ordered
13 by the Senate, or conducted under paragraph 1 of rule
14 XXVI of the Standing Rules of the Senate, section 112
15 of the Supplemental Appropriations and Rescission Act,
16 1980 (Public Law 96–304), and Senate Resolution 281,
17 96th Congress, agreed to March 11, 1980, \$145,500,000.

18 EXPENSES OF THE UNITED STATES SENATE CAUCUS ON

19 INTERNATIONAL NARCOTICS CONTROL

20 For expenses of the United States Senate Caucus on
21 International Narcotics Control, \$520,000.

22 SECRETARY OF THE SENATE

23 For expenses of the Office of the Secretary of the
24 Senate, \$2,000,000.

1 SERGEANT AT ARMS AND DOORKEEPER OF THE SENATE

2 For expenses of the Office of the Sergeant at Arms
3 and Doorkeeper of the Senate, \$153,601,000, which shall
4 remain available until September 30, 2014.

5 MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS

6 For miscellaneous items, \$19,145,000, of which up
7 to \$500,000 shall be made available for a pilot program
8 for mailings of postal patron postcards by Senators for
9 the purpose of providing notice of a town meeting by a
10 Senator in a county (or equivalent unit of local govern-
11 ment) at which the Senator will personally attend: *Pro-*
12 *vided*, That any amount allocated to a Senator for such
13 mailing shall not exceed 50 percent of the cost of the mail-
14 ing and the remaining cost shall be paid by the Senator
15 from other funds available to the Senator.

16 SENATORS' OFFICIAL PERSONNEL AND OFFICE EXPENSE

17 ACCOUNT

18 For Senators' Official Personnel and Office Expense
19 Account, \$425,000,000.

20 OFFICIAL MAIL COSTS

21 For expenses necessary for official mail costs of the
22 Senate, \$300,000.

1 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISION
2 GROSS RATE OF COMPENSATION IN OFFICES OF
3 SENATORS

4 SECTION 1. Effective on and after October 1, 2009,
5 each of the dollar amounts contained in the table under
6 section 105(d)(1)(A) of the Legislative Branch Appropria-
7 tions Act, 1968 (2 U.S.C. 61-1(d)(1)(A)) shall be deemed
8 to be the dollar amounts in that table, as adjusted by law
9 and in effect on September 30, 2009, increased by an ad-
10 ditional \$50,000 each.

11 JOINT ITEMS

12 For Joint Committees, as follows:

13 JOINT ECONOMIC COMMITTEE

14 For salaries and expenses of the Joint Economic
15 Committee, \$4,814,000, to be disbursed by the Secretary
16 of the Senate.

17 JOINT COMMITTEE ON TAXATION

18 For salaries and expenses of the Joint Committee on
19 Taxation, \$11,327,000, to be disbursed by the Chief Ad-
20 ministrative Officer of the House of Representatives. For
21 other joint items, as follows:

22 OFFICE OF THE ATTENDING PHYSICIAN

23 For medical supplies, equipment, and contingent ex-
24 penses of the emergency rooms, and for the Attending
25 Physician and his assistants, including: (1) an allowance

1 of \$2,175 per month to the Attending Physician; (2) an
2 allowance of \$1,300 per month to the Senior Medical Offi-
3 cer; (3) an allowance of \$725 per month each to three
4 medical officers while on duty in the Office of the Attend-
5 ing Physician; (4) an allowance of \$725 per month to two
6 assistants and \$580 per month each not to exceed 11 as-
7 sistants on the basis heretofore provided for such assist-
8 ants; and (5) \$2,366,000 for reimbursement to the De-
9 partment of the Navy for expenses incurred for staff and
10 equipment assigned to the Office of the Attending Physi-
11 cian, which shall be advanced and credited to the applica-
12 ble appropriation or appropriations from which such sala-
13 ries, allowances, and other expenses are payable and shall
14 be available for all the purposes thereof, \$3,805,000, to
15 be disbursed by the Chief Administrative Officer of the
16 House of Representatives.

17 OFFICE OF CONGRESSIONAL ACCESSIBILITY SERVICES

18 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

19 For salaries and expenses of the Office of Congres-
20 sional Accessibility Services, \$1,377,000, to be disbursed
21 by the Secretary of the Senate.

22 STATEMENTS OF APPROPRIATIONS

23 For the preparation, under the direction of the Com-
24 mittees on Appropriations of the Senate and the House
25 of Representatives, of the statements for the first session

1 Chief of the Capitol Police in connection with official rep-
2 resentation and reception expenses, \$64,354,000, to be
3 disbursed by the Chief of the Capitol Police or his des-
4 ignee: *Provided*, That, notwithstanding any other provision
5 of law, the cost of basic training for the Capitol Police
6 at the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center for fis-
7 cal year 2010 shall be paid by the Secretary of Homeland
8 Security from funds available to the Department of Home-
9 land Security.

10 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISION

11 TRANSFER AUTHORITY

12 SEC. 1001. Amounts appropriated for fiscal year
13 2010 for the Capitol Police may be transferred between
14 the headings “Salaries” and “General expenses” upon the
15 approval of the Committees on Appropriations of the
16 House of Representatives and the Senate.

17 OFFICE OF COMPLIANCE

18 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

19 For salaries and expenses of the Office of Compli-
20 ance, as authorized by section 305 of the Congressional
21 Accountability Act of 1995 (2 U.S.C. 1385), \$4,418,000,
22 of which \$883,990 shall remain available until September
23 30, 2011: *Provided*, That not more than \$500 may be ex-
24 pended on the certification of the Executive Director of

1 the Office of Compliance in connection with official rep-
 2 resentation and reception expenses.

3 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISION

4 DISPOSITION OF SURPLUS OR OBSOLETE PERSONAL
 5 PROPERTY

6 SEC. 1101. (a) IN GENERAL.—Title III of the Con-
 7 gressional Accountability Act of 1995 (2 U.S.C. 1381 et
 8 seq.) is amended by inserting after section 305 the fol-
 9 lowing:

10 **“SEC. 306. DISPOSITION OF SURPLUS OR OBSOLETE PER-
 11 SONAL PROPERTY.**

12 “The Executive Director may, within the limits of
 13 available appropriations, dispose of surplus or obsolete
 14 personal property by interagency transfer, donation, or
 15 discarding.”.

16 (b) TECHNICAL AND CONFORMING AMENDMENT.—
 17 The table of contents for the Congressional Accountability
 18 Act of 1995 (2 U.S.C. 1301 et seq.) is amended by insert-
 19 ing after section 305 the following:

“Sec. 306. Disposition of surplus or obsolete personal property.”.

20 (c) EFFECTIVE DATE.—The amendments made by
 21 this section shall apply with respect to fiscal year 2010,
 22 and each fiscal year thereafter.

1 CONGRESSIONAL BUDGET OFFICE

2 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

3 For salaries and expenses necessary for operation of
4 the Congressional Budget Office, including not more than
5 \$6,000 to be expended on the certification of the Director
6 of the Congressional Budget Office in connection with offi-
7 cial representation and reception expenses, \$45,165,000.

8 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISION

9 EXECUTIVE EXCHANGE PROGRAM FOR THE

10 CONGRESSIONAL BUDGET OFFICE

11 SEC. 1201. Section 1201 of the Legislative Branch
12 Appropriations Act, 2008 (2 U.S.C. 611 note; Public law
13 110–161; 121 Stat. 2238) is amended—

14 (1) in subsection (b)—

15 (A) in paragraph (1), by striking “3” and
16 inserting “5”; and

17 (B) in paragraph (2), by striking “3” and
18 inserting “5”;

19 (2) by striking subsection (d), and redesignig-
20 nating subsection (e) as subsection (d); and

21 (3) in subsection (d) (as redesignated by this
22 section), by striking “Subject to subsection (d), this”
23 and inserting “This”.

1 ARCHITECT OF THE CAPITOL

2 GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

3 For salaries for the Architect of the Capitol, and
4 other personal services, at rates of pay provided by law;
5 for surveys and studies in connection with activities under
6 the care of the Architect of the Capitol; for all necessary
7 expenses for the general and administrative support of the
8 operations under the Architect of the Capitol including the
9 Botanic Garden; electrical substations of the Capitol, Sen-
10 ate and House office buildings, and other facilities under
11 the jurisdiction of the Architect of the Capitol; including
12 furnishings and office equipment; including not more than
13 \$5,000 for official reception and representation expenses,
14 to be expended as the Architect of the Capitol may ap-
15 prove; for purchase or exchange, maintenance, and oper-
16 ation of a passenger motor vehicle, \$106,587,000, of
17 which \$5,400,000 shall remain available until September
18 30, 2014.

19 CAPITOL BUILDING

20 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care
21 and operation of the Capitol, \$33,305,000, of which
22 \$6,499,000 shall remain available until September 30,
23 2014.

1 Thurgood Marshall Federal Judiciary Building and the
2 Folger Shakespeare Library, expenses for which shall be
3 advanced or reimbursed upon request of the Architect of
4 the Capitol and amounts so received shall be deposited
5 into the Treasury to the credit of this appropriation,
6 \$118,597,000, of which \$25,074,000 shall remain avail-
7 able until September 30, 2014: *Provided*, That not more
8 than \$8,000,000 of the funds credited or to be reimbursed
9 to this appropriation as herein provided shall be available
10 for obligation during fiscal year 2010.

11 LIBRARY BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

12 For all necessary expenses for the mechanical and
13 structural maintenance, care and operation of the Library
14 buildings and grounds, \$40,754,000, of which
15 \$14,470,000 shall remain available until September 30,
16 2014.

17 CAPITOL POLICE BUILDINGS, GROUNDS AND SECURITY

18 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care
19 and operation of buildings, grounds and security enhance-
20 ments of the United States Capitol Police, wherever lo-
21 cated, the Alternate Computer Facility, and AOC security
22 operations, \$26,160,000, of which \$7,050,000 shall re-
23 main available until September 30, 2014.

1 BOTANIC GARDEN

2 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care
3 and operation of the Botanic Garden and the nurseries,
4 buildings, grounds, and collections; and purchase and ex-
5 change, maintenance, repair, and operation of a passenger
6 motor vehicle; all under the direction of the Joint Com-
7 mittee on the Library, \$11,898,000, of which \$1,280,000
8 shall remain available until September 30, 2014: *Provided*,
9 That of the amount made available under this heading,
10 the Architect may obligate and expend such sums as may
11 be necessary for the maintenance, care and operation of
12 the National Garden established under section 307E of
13 the Legislative Branch Appropriations Act, 1989 (2
14 U.S.C. 2146), upon vouchers approved by the Architect
15 or a duly authorized designee.

16 CAPITOL VISITOR CENTER

17 For all necessary expenses for the operation of the
18 Capitol Visitor Center, \$22,756,000.

19 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS

20 DISPOSITION OF SURPLUS OR OBSOLETE PERSONAL

21 PROPERTY

22 SEC. 1301. (a) IN GENERAL.—The Architect of the
23 Capitol shall have the authority, within the limits of avail-
24 able appropriations, to dispose of surplus or obsolete per-
25 sonal property by inter-agency transfer, donation, sale,

1 trade-in, or discarding. Amounts received for the sale or
2 trade-in of personal property shall be credited to funds
3 available for the operations of the Architect of the Capitol
4 and be available for the costs of acquiring the same or
5 similar property. Such funds shall be available for such
6 purposes during the fiscal year received and the following
7 fiscal year.

8 (b) EFFECTIVE DATE.—This section shall apply with
9 respect to fiscal year 2010, and each fiscal year thereafter.

10 FLEXIBLE AND COMPRESSED WORK SCHEDULES

11 SEC. 1302. Chapter 61 of title 5, United States Code,
12 is amended—

13 (1) in section 6121(1) by striking “and the Li-
14 brary of Congress” and inserting “the Library of
15 Congress, the Architect of the Capitol, and the Bo-
16 tanic Garden”; and

17 (2) in section 6133(c) by adding at the end the
18 following:

19 “(3) With respect to employees of the Architect
20 of the Capitol and the Botanic Garden, the authority
21 granted to the Office of Personnel Management
22 under this subchapter shall be exercised by the Ar-
23 chitect of the Capitol.”.

1 DISABLED VETERANS; NONCOMPETITIVE APPOINTMENT

2 SEC. 1303. Section 3112 of title 5, United States
3 Code, is amended—

4 (1) by inserting “(a)” before “Under”; and

5 (2) by adding at the end the following:

6 “(b) For purposes of this section, the term ‘agency’
7 shall include the Architect of the Capitol and the Botanic
8 Garden. With respect to the Architect of the Capitol and
9 the Botanic Garden, the authority granted to the Office
10 of Personnel Management under this section shall be exer-
11 cised by the Architect of the Capitol.”.

12 ACCEPTANCE OF VOLUNTARY STUDENT SERVICES

13 SEC. 1304. (a) Section 3111 of title 5, United States
14 Code, is amended by adding at the end the following:

15 “(e) For purposes of this section the term ‘agency’
16 shall include the Architect of the Capitol. With respect to
17 the Architect of the Capitol, the authority granted to the
18 Office of Personnel Management under this section shall
19 be exercised by the Architect of the Capitol.”.

20 BOTANIC GARDEN VENDOR CONTRACTS

21 SEC. 1305. Section 307E of the Legislative Branch
22 Appropriations Act, 1989 (2 U.S.C. 2146) is amended—

23 (1) in subsection (b)(1), by striking “an ac-
24 count entitled ‘Botanic Garden, Gifts and Dona-

1 tions’.” and inserting “an account entitled ‘Botanic
2 Garden, Operations and Maintenance’.”;

3 (2) by redesignating subsection (d) as sub-
4 section (e); and

5 (3) by inserting after subsection (c) the fol-
6 lowing:

7 “(d) CONTRACTS WITH VENDORS.—

8 “(1) IN GENERAL.—The Architect of the Cap-
9 itol may enter into a commission-based service con-
10 tract with a vendor who, notwithstanding section
11 5104(e) of title 40, United States Code, may sell re-
12 freshments at the Botanic Garden and National
13 Garden.

14 “(2) DEPOSIT AND USE OF COMMISSIONS.—Any
15 amounts paid to the Architect of the Capitol as a
16 commission under paragraph (1) shall be—

17 “(A) deposited in the account described
18 under subsection (b); and

19 “(B) available for operation and mainte-
20 nance in the same manner as provided under
21 subsection (b).”.

22 LIBRARY OF CONGRESS

23 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

24 For necessary expenses of the Library of Congress
25 not otherwise provided for, including development and

1 maintenance of the Library's catalogs; custody and custo-
2 dial care of the Library buildings; special clothing; clean-
3 ing, laundering and repair of uniforms; preservation of
4 motion pictures in the custody of the Library; operation
5 and maintenance of the American Folklife Center in the
6 Library; preparation and distribution of catalog records
7 and other publications of the Library; hire or purchase
8 of one passenger motor vehicle; and expenses of the Li-
9 brary of Congress Trust Fund Board not properly charge-
10 able to the income of any trust fund held by the Board,
11 \$441,033,000, of which not more than \$6,000,000 shall
12 be derived from collections credited to this appropriation
13 during fiscal year 2010, and shall remain available until
14 expended, under the Act of June 28, 1902 (chapter 1301;
15 32 Stat. 480; 2 U.S.C. 150) and not more than \$350,000
16 shall be derived from collections during fiscal year 2010
17 and shall remain available until expended for the develop-
18 ment and maintenance of an international legal informa-
19 tion database and activities related thereto: *Provided,*
20 That the Library of Congress may not obligate or expend
21 any funds derived from collections under the Act of June
22 28, 1902, in excess of the amount authorized for obliga-
23 tion or expenditure in appropriations Acts: *Provided fur-*
24 *ther,* That the total amount available for obligation shall
25 be reduced by the amount by which collections are less

1 tions credited to this appropriation during fiscal year 2010
2 under section 708(d) of title 17, United States Code: *Pro-*
3 *vided*, That the Copyright Office may not obligate or ex-
4 pend any funds derived from collections under such sec-
5 tion, in excess of the amount authorized for obligation or
6 expenditure in appropriations Acts: *Provided further*, That
7 not more than \$5,861,000 shall be derived from collections
8 during fiscal year 2010 under sections 111(d)(2),
9 119(b)(2), 803(e), 1005, and 1316 of such title: *Provided*
10 *further*, That the total amount available for obligation
11 shall be reduced by the amount by which collections are
12 less than \$34,612,000: *Provided further*, That not more
13 than \$100,000 of the amount appropriated is available for
14 the maintenance of an “International Copyright Institute”
15 in the Copyright Office of the Library of Congress for the
16 purpose of training nationals of developing countries in
17 intellectual property laws and policies: *Provided further*,
18 That not more than \$4,250 may be expended, on the cer-
19 tification of the Librarian of Congress, in connection with
20 official representation and reception expenses for activities
21 of the International Copyright Institute and for copyright
22 delegations, visitors, and seminars: *Provided further*, That
23 notwithstanding any provision of chapter 8 of title 17,
24 United States Code, any amounts made available under
25 this heading which are attributable to royalty fees and

1 payments received by the Copyright Office pursuant to
 2 sections 111, 119, and chapter 10 of such title may be
 3 used for the costs incurred in the administration of the
 4 Copyright Royalty Judges program, with the exception of
 5 the costs of salaries and benefits for the Copyright Royalty
 6 Judges and staff under section 802(e).

7 CONGRESSIONAL RESEARCH SERVICE

8 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

9 For necessary expenses to carry out the provisions
 10 of section 203 of the Legislative Reorganization Act of
 11 1946 (2 U.S.C. 166) and to revise and extend the Anno-
 12 tated Constitution of the United States of America,
 13 \$112,836,000: *Provided*, That no part of such amount
 14 may be used to pay any salary or expense in connection
 15 with any publication, or preparation of material therefor
 16 (except the Digest of Public General Bills), to be issued
 17 by the Library of Congress unless such publication has
 18 obtained prior approval of either the Committee on House
 19 Administration of the House of Representatives or the
 20 Committee on Rules and Administration of the Senate.

21 BOOKS FOR THE BLIND AND PHYSICALLY HANDICAPPED

22 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

23 For salaries and expenses to carry out the Act of
 24 March 3, 1931 (chapter 400; 46 Stat. 1487; 2 U.S.C.
 25 135a), \$70,182,000, of which \$30,577,000 shall remain

1 available until expended: *Provided*, That of the total
2 amount appropriated, \$650,000 shall be available to con-
3 tract to provide newspapers to blind and physically handi-
4 capped residents at no cost to the individual.

5 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS

6 REIMBURSABLE AND REVOLVING FUND ACTIVITIES

7 SEC. 1401. (a) IN GENERAL.—For fiscal year 2010,
8 the obligational authority of the Library of Congress for
9 the activities described in subsection (b) may not exceed
10 \$123,328,000.

11 (b) ACTIVITIES.—The activities referred to in sub-
12 section (a) are reimbursable and revolving fund activities
13 that are funded from sources other than appropriations
14 to the Library in appropriations Acts for the legislative
15 branch.

16 (c) TRANSFER OF FUNDS.—During fiscal year 2010,
17 the Librarian of Congress may temporarily transfer funds
18 appropriated in this Act, under the heading “Library of
19 Congress”, under the subheading “Salaries and Ex-

6 MAINTENANCE AND CARE OF PRIVATE VEHICLES

23 appropriated for is different from that specifically estab-
24 lished by such Act, the rate of compensation and the des-

18 and interns of offices of Members of Congress and other
19 offices of the House of Representatives and Senate.

20 (b) At the direction of the Capitol Police Board, or
21 at the direction of the Architect of the Capitol with the
22 approval of the Capitol Police Board, guided tours of the
23 United States Capitol which are led by employees and in-
24 terns described in subsection (a) may be suspended tempo-
25 rarily or otherwise subject to restriction for security or re-

1 lated reasons to the same extent as guided tours of the
2 United States Capitol which are led by the Architect of
3 the Capitol.

4 COMPLIANCE DATE RELATING TO CERTAIN VIOLATIONS
5 OF OSHA WITHIN THE LEGISLATIVE BRANCH

6 SEC. 209. Section 215(c) of the Congressional Ac-
7 countability Act of 1995 (2 U.S.C. 1341(c)) is amended
8 by striking paragraph (6).
