Dear Mr. Attorney General:

This is in reference to your submission under Section 5 of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, of Mississippi Laws of 1971, Chapter 493, amending Section 2970 of the Mississippi Code.

After careful consideration of the enclosed legislation and the naturals submitted with it, we must enter an objection on behalf of the Atterney General, to the implementation of this statute.

The act is question authorises all boards of supervisors, by a majority wote, to redistrict and/or conduct at-large voting for certain county offices, and is similar in impact to a 1966 amendment which was submitted and found objectionable is 1969. It also closely parallels an act passed in 1968 which was not submitted under Section 5. Based on the facts available to us. the purpose and effect of the present set appears to be the same as the prior enertments. Further, so assurance is made that the state will prevent enforcement of at-large election plans adopted under the authority of this enabling legislation without their first being submitted under Section 5. In this regard, I note that the legislature considered but did not exact a provision which would have spelled out the responsibility of each county to obtain clearance of such plans under Section 5. We are therefore unable to conclude, as we must under the Voting Rights Act, that this legislation does not have the purpose and will not have the effect of abridging the right to vote on the besis of rare.

As you know, Section 5 provides that you may still seek to make this statute operable by successfully bringing a suit for declaratory judgment in the District Court for the District of Columbia on the Assue of whether the submitted legislation has the purpose or will have the effect of denying or abridging the right to vote on account of race.
