

From governor's veto to special session



Aug. 10, 1989: Surrounded by graphs and charts, Gov. Rudy Perpich released his tax reform proposal at the Capitol.

At midnight on June 2, Gov. Rudy Perpich set the stage for a special session when he vetoed a property tax relief bill that the Legislature passed in the final days of the regular session.

In August, the governor announced a tax reform proposal aimed at avoiding a projected 14 percent tax increase in 1990. It also called for a new 6 percent sales tax on garbage collection to pay for a statewide recycling program. Other goals included: reducing disparities between highest- and lowest-taxed classes of property; allowing local governments to levy sales taxes; requiring the state to pay for the programs it mandates; simplifying the system by reducing the number of

property tax rates from 21 to 10; and narrowing differences in tax rates among cities and counties.

A few days later, the governor's tax advisers presented the proposal to the House Ways and Means Committee. The governor later made some alterations to the plan.

In early September, House Speaker Rep. Robert Vanasek (DFL-New Prague) and Senate Majority Leader Sen. Roger Moe (DFL-Erskine) appointed a 24member reconciliation team (12 House and 12 Senate members). The team met several times to iron out problem areas. Legislative leaders held further meetings with executive branch officials to reach final agreement.

The governor then called a special session that lasted three days during which time committees held meetings and public hearings. Each body, meeting separately in the Senate Chamber, passed the bill which the governor signed into law earlier this month.













Sept. 27, 1989: It's the first time in Minnesota's history that the House of Representa




Highlights of the bill include:

- adjustments that will hold the statewide average increase in property taxes next year to 1.4 percent, rather than the projected 14.1 percent (according to Department of Finance estimates);
- a 6 percent sales tax on garbage collection to finance a new statewide waste recycling program;
- property tax relief targeted at businesses and rental property owners, including elimination of the 4 percent sales tax on purchases of capital equipment for new and expanding businesses;
- accountability provisions for state and local governments so taxpayers know who makes taxing and spending decisions;
- fewer property tax classes (down from 21 to 10) to simplify the system;
- a requirement that the governor recommend spending reductions in state government over the next three years;
- an increased state tax on charitable gambling, and an expanded child care credit;
- a mechanism to fund certain mental health services and procedures for allocating costs of certain human services between the state and county agencies.



Bill Introductions Special Session HF1 - 25

HF1-Long (DFL) Appropriations

Financing and operation of government in Minnesota; changing tax rates and bases; modifying the administration, collection, and enforcement of taxes; imposing taxes; creating tax exemptions; changing the computation, administration, and payment of aids, credits, and refunds; providing new aids and credits; making technical corrections and clarifications; changing proposed property tax notice provisions; changing levy limits and other local government powers and duties; allowing certain units of local governments to impose taxes; changing tax increment financing provisions; providing that the state will be supplier of gambling equipment; authorizing establishment of an economic development authority in the city of Otsego and in Kandiyohi County; exempting Itasca County from a levy limit penalty and authorizing a special levy; modifying the levy authority of the Red River Watershed Management District; authorizing an appropriation by Aitkin County; providing for payment of certain aid to the cities of Falcon Heights and Lauderdale; extending the duration of tax increment financing districts in the cities of Moorhead and Chanhassen; exempting a redevelopment district in the city of Minneapolis from certain requirements; granting certain powers to towns; modifying certain bond allocation procedures; authorizing a transfer by the Tower-Soudan School District; requiring studies of state and local finance issues; requiring the governor to recommend spending reductions; setting the amount of the budget reserve; establishing plans and programs to reduce waste generated, recycle waste, develop markets for recyclables, address materials that cause special problems in the waste stream, prevent, control, and abate litter, inform and educate the public on proper waste management; requiring a mechanism to fund certain mental health services; providing procedures for allocating costs of certain human services between the state and county agencies; imposing penalties; appropriating money; amending statutes; repealing statutes; proposing coding for new laws.
