

What is a mini-session?

A mini-session is a concentrated series of committee meetings held during the interim (the timebetween the two regular sessions of the biennium). During mini-sessions, representatives may study proposed legislation, conduct public hearings, and make formal recommendations on bills.

The Minnesota House of Representatives has scheduled three such sessions this year: Winona and Rochester (Sept. 13-16); Worthington (Oct. 18-20); and Moorhead (Nov. 15-17). In past years, the House has held minisessions in Alexandria, Eveleth, Mankato, and St. Paul.

Meetings away from the Capitol help bring state government to residents who otherwise may not have the chance participate in the process. Topics for mini-sessions vary, but usually include concerns of local residents. When legislators are not in committee meetings, they often tour surrounding areas, participate in community activities, and meet with local residents.

The Legislature has held minisessions since 1972 when voters approved the flexible sessions constitutional amendment. The amendment marked the third time voters extended the length of legislative sessions. It allows the Legislature to meet each year from January to May for 120 legislative days over the biennium (two-year period). Lawmakers, however, may continue committee work during the recess with the same power to make recommendations on bills that they have during a legislative session.



For the 16th consecutive year, the Minnesota House of Representatives went to the State Fair. At the information exhibit in the Education Building, fairgoers could visit with House members and staff, get answers to questions about state government, and pick up materials about the Legislature and the legislative process. More than 500,000 fairgoers, all ages included, visited the Minnesota House of Representatives Information Exhibit in the Education Building during the State Fair. Some stopped to glance at legislative district maps with lawmakers' photos to find out who represents them at the State Capitol. Others took a four-part quiz on Macintosh computers to test their knowledge of state government. Children who played the State Symbols Game discovered that the loon is Minnesota's official state bird, and milk, the state drink.

The annual unofficial opinion poll asked fairgoers questions on several unresolved issues and gave them a chance to cast their ballots on an Optech III-P optical scanning machine, which some Minnesotans used for the first time in the 1988 general election.

Many visitors stopped to chat with state representatives and almost 10,000 picked up visor caps adorned with the State Capitol dome. The visors gave fairgoers a chance to take the dome home!







The term 'session'

In the Legislature, the word "session" has several meanings:

• Session: the biennial (two-year) period during which the Legislature meets, e.g., the 76th Session.

• **Daily session:** a meeting of the House or Senate in their respective chambers. Many people use the term "daily session" interchangeably with "legislative day."

• Joint session: meeting of the House and Senate together, same as joint convention.

• Mini-session: a concentrated series of committee meetings held in the interim during which lawmakers may consider proposed legislation and recommend action on bills.

• **Regular session:** the annual meeting of the Legislature between the first Tuesday after the first Monday in January (1989 session: Jan. 3), and the first Monday after the third Saturday in May (1989 session: May 22).

• Special or extra session: a session held after the expiration of 120 legislative days in a biennium or after the date the law prescribes for annual adjournment. Only the governor may call the Legislature into special (or extra) session. But the governor may not dictate the matters the Legislature will consider, nor the length of the special session.
